I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer for gallantry in action in northern France:

CAPTAIN HOBBY H. McCALL, 0422737, Inf, United States Army. On 26 July 1944 near * * *, France, a company in Capt McCall's battalion suffered exceptionally heavy casualties when crossing the * * *, River. All of the officers of the company with the exception of a second lieutenant became casualties. Capt McCall, S-3 of the battalion, was sent forward to assume command of the company, reorganize it and continue the attack. Without regard for his own safety and while still under heavy enemy artillery, mortar fire and fire from tanks, he joined the company and went about, personally exposing himself to fire, regrouping the men and encouraging them in the attack. After reorganizing the unit he placed himself at the head of the company and led it in an assault which finally gained the objective although nearly 50% of the effective strength of the company had become casualties in the effort. Capt McCall was wounded in the action and later evacuated but not until the company had reached its objective. This gallant action was a fine example of outstanding courage and devotion to duty and a fine example of the best traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Texas.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

Tec 5 Nunzio A. Camerato, 31302567, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Tec 5 Camerato volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Tec 5 Richard L. Riley, 38126728, Inf (then Pfc) United States Army. On 6 July 1944 Tec 5 Riley demonstrated an outstanding devotion to duty by maintaining wire communication for his organization at a critical time and while under heavy enemy shelling. Entered service from Oklahoma.

Tec 5 Aloysius J. Kowalczyk, 16099562, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counter-attack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Tec 5 Kowalczyk volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy enemy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from Illinois.

Pfc James E. Robertson, 7070352, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Pfc Robertson volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from New York.

Pfc John D. Thomas, 33140100, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Pfc Thomas volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Pfc Oscar J. Lucas, 35769768, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Pfc Lucas volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from West Virginia.

Pfc George F. Redwood, 32503413, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Pfc Redwood volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from New York.

Pfc Francis O. Laventure, 20110181, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Pfc Laventure volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Pfc Herbert J. Beck, 38155240, Inf, United States Army. On 25 July when the unit with which he was serving came under heavy artillery fire and was pinned down, Pfc Beck heard a wounded man calling for assistance from approximately 75 yards away. Pfc Beck crawled and ran to the assistance of the wounded soldier and aided in evacuating him to the rear even though it was necessary to drive through a shelled area to the place of shelter. Entered service from Texas.

Pfc Adolph F. Tschabrunn, 12159048, Med Dept, United States Army. On 10 June 1944 near * * *, France, when the Commanding Officer of an Infantry company was wounded and left within enemy territory, Pfc Tschabrunn, on his own volition, stayed with the wounded officer throughout the night although the territory was still under heavy artillery fire. Pfc Tschabrunn's devotion to duty resulted in the evacuation of the officer and the saving of the officer's life. Entered service from New York.

Pfc Louis J. Noon, 32798223, Inf, United States Army. On 22 July 1944 Pfc Noon maintained a wire line for his organization at a critical time when the route through which his wire line ran was constantly under heavy mortar and artillery barrages. Although the heavy fire caused numerous breaks in the line, Pfc Noon kept the line in working order at all times despite heavy casualties in the area. Entered service from New York.

Pfc Glen M. Benedict, 38104072, Inf, United States Army. On 13 July 1944 Pfc Benedict shifted his radio to a place where he could gain radio contact with his unit and stayed on the job continually during a critical situation even though his position was being constantly shelled. Pfc Benedict thereby maintained communication for the necessary period of time to enable his unit to reach its jump-off line, attack and drive the enemy out of position. Entered service from Colorado.

Pfc Esker M. King, 38099702, Inf, United States Army. On 22 July 1944 Pfc King maintained a wire line for his organization at a critical time when the route through which his wire line ran was constantly under heavy mortar and artillery barrages. Although the heavy fire caused numerous breaks in the line, Pfc King kept the line in working order at all times despite heavy casualties in the area. Entered service from Texas.

Pvt Clayton H. Baublitz, 33513660, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack on 6 July 1944 forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines. Pvt Baublitz volunteered to accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy enemy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from Pennsylvania.


Pvt Freddie Hanks, 38487444, Med Dept, United States Army. On 19 June 1944 the battalion to which Pvt Hanks was assigned was holding a line between two points when the unit came under heavy surprise machine gun and mortar fire. They withdrew and established their line further to the north where they had better fields of fire. The aid men and litter bearers evacuated as many of the wounded as they could while the company was withdrawing but eight wounded men were left on the battle field. Pvt Hanks, fully realizing that the company had withdrawn, that the area was under heavy fire and that the enemy had infiltrated into the position, volunteered to go out and get the wounded men. Pvt Hanks was taken prisoner but through his ingenuity and determination made his escape and returned to our lines and resumed his duties. Entered service from Louisiana.

Pvt James L. McDonald, 31398760, Inf, United States Army. Pvt McDonald volunteered to accompany a patrol to penetrate deep into enemy territory in the vicinity of * * *, France on 25 July 1944. Finding nothing in that area, they were ordered to reconnoiter further. They proceeded to the town of * * * and captured a German paratrooper who later gave valuable information to our troops. They continued their reconnaissance further and discovered four other enemy soldiers, two of whom were killed and the others put to flight. In their action, one member of the patrol of four was killed, the others returning to the lines. Entered service from Maine.

I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66 First U. S. Army, vs., the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

CAPTAIN HAROLD H. MILLER, 01011334, Inf, ** Tank Bn, United States Army. On 3 August 1944 in the vicinity of ***, France during an intense artillery barrage, Capt Miller saw a mortar half-track which was hit by shrapnel start smoking and burning. Realizing the danger to friendly troops in the immediate vicinity from explosions of the ammunition on the truck, Capt Miller personally ran to the vehicle and began to smother the fire with sand, quickly getting the fire somewhat under control. He remained at the truck, supervised the unloading of the ammunition and also supervised the removal of it to a place of relative safety. Entered service from New York.

CAPTAIN ANTHONY A. FEBBRARO, 0472066, MC (then 1st Lt) United States Army. On 12 June 1944 when a unit with which he was serving came under heavy artillery and mortar fire, it suffered a large number of casualties. Capt Febbraro had just arrived on the scene and had been unable to dig-in his aid station when a large number of casualties were brought in. As the first patients began to arrive, enemy artillery and mortar fire began to fall in the area. Four of the casualties were in such serious condition that they could not be moved further without endangering their lives and blood plasma was required to be used immediately. Disregarding his own personal safety, Capt Febbraro, with four other companions, remained in the shelled area to administer the blood plasma to the seriously wounded men and to render assistance to newly arriving casualties although the Infantry began falling back, leaving the position exposed. At times the fire was so intense that they were forced to lie on the ground for a period of thirty minutes beside the patients, administering the plasma. Sporadic fire continued to fall in the position and cold rain added to the discomfort. Captain Febbraro persisted in his efforts until he had evacuated a total of forty patients including twenty-four litter cases. The courageous action on the part of Capt Febbraro unquestionably saved the lives of at least four of the seriously wounded men and was a fine example of gallantry under fire, devotion to duty, and exemplified the finest traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

S Sgt James C. Little, 37153862, Inf, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, when his platoon was in position under heavy enemy fire, friendly tanks began an assault on his position and the enemy began firing on him. S Sgt Little, sensing the seriousness of the situation, disregarded his own personal safety and secured an orange flag and ran to an exposed position, signalling the tanks that they were firing on friendly troops. In the face of cross-fire from enemy machine guns and rifle fire and fire from our own tanks, his instantaneous analysis of the grave situation resulted in the stopping of the tank fire and overcoming the enemy. This gallant act exhibited quick thinking, courage and devotion to duty resulting in a successful operation which might have become disastrous to his unit. Entered service from Nebraska.

S Sgt Carl L. Hoffman, 33041515, Inf, United States Army. On 5 July 1944 when a companion on a flank patrol of his unit had been wounded, Sgt Hoffman and a companion were granted permission to go out and get the wounded soldier who was in urgent need of first aid. They had to crawl approximately seventy-five yards to reach the wounded soldier and upon reaching him they could hear Germans talking behind a nearby hedgerow. The enemy was moving down behind the hedgerow to flank the platoon position. Sgt Hoffman and his companion placed themselves behind a hedgerow and as the Germans appeared they opened fire, killing two and driving off the remainder. They were then able to evacuate their wounded companion by dragging him to the rear through an area which was still exposed to enemy machine gun fire and in which enemy mortar fire continued to fall. Their determination and disregard for their own personal safety exemplified gallantry in action which is in keeping with the best traditions of the military service. Entered service from Virginia.

Sgt Alvin G. Gillig, 38155266, Inf, (then Pfc) United States Army. On 5 July 1944 when a companion on a flank patrol of his unit had been wounded, Sgt Gillig and a companion were granted permission to go out and get the wounded soldier who was in urgent need of first aid. They had to crawl approximately seventy-five yards to reach the wounded soldier and upon reaching him they could hear Germans talking behind a nearby hedgerow. The enemy was moving down behind the hedgerow to flank the platoon position. Sgt Gillig and his companion placed themselves behind a hedgerow and as the Germans appeared, they opened fire, killing two and driving off the remainder. They were then able to evacuate their wounded companion by dragging him to the rear through an area which was still exposed to enemy machine gun fire and in which enemy mortar fire continued to fall. Their determination and disregard for their own personal safety exemplified gallantry in action which is in keeping with the best traditions of the military service. Entered service from Texas.

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(Sec I Award of Silver Star GO 43 Hq 90th Inf Div 21 Aug 44 contd)

Pfc Patrick L. Palacio, 39687750, Inf (then Pvt) United States Army. On 8 August 1944 near * * *, France, Pfc Palacio's company was ordered to attack along the main road and had almost reached the town when they were suddenly pinned down by two machine guns and four machine pistols. Pfc Palacio crawled under this fire over open ground to a position behind a stone wall where he was able to observe the enemy action. With no thought of his own personal safety, he stood up behind the wall and exposed himself to enemy fire and killed six Germans and wounded three more with his M-1 rifle, reducing the small arms fire and permitting the advance of our forces into the town. This gallant action contributed materially to the capture of the town and was a fine example of courage and devotion to duty. Entered service from California.

II. POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded posthumously to the following named enlisted man for bravery in action in northern France:

S Sgt. Alfred R. McCunniff, 57705452, Inf (then Pvt) United States Army. On 7 July 1944 near * * *, France, when two companies of his battalion were cut off and completely surrounded by the enemy, ammunition, rations and water were very short. A patrol from his company was formed to fight their way through and bring back the needed supplies immediately. Resistance along the route was stronger than expected and three of the seven men were killed. Two had gone back to the company and Sgt McCunniff and the officer leading the patrol remained and engaged an enemy machine gun which they succeeded in knocking out. They then knocked out two other machine guns and succeeded in reaching the battalion and securing assistance. This gallant act was a fine example of the stern determination and persistence of the soldier and exemplified the highest traditions of the military spirit. Sgt McCunniff was killed in a later action. Entered service from Colorado.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

1ST LT JOHN M. McLEAN, 0422874, Inf, United States Army. On 29 June 1944 Lt McLean's company received a heavy enemy counter-attack. Lt McLean, commanding the supporting mortar platoon, being unable to get quick wire communication from his battery of mortars to an observation post, personally took the wire line through a zone swept by enemy fire. During this action and at numerous other times, Lt McLean has shown aggressiveness and ingenuity in seeking and securing observation so that his platoon has rendered outstanding mortar support to the troops. Entered service from California.

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(Sec III. Award of Bronze Star GO 43 Hq 90th Inf Div 21 Aug 44 cont)

2D LT MARION R. FERRIS, 01320619, Inf, United States Army. On 6 July an enemy counterattack against two companies of Lt Ferris' battalion cut off the units from the remainder of the battalion. Lt Ferris took command of the remaining members of one company and succeeded in making their way back to the battalion where he was given the mission of reorganizing stragglers and replacements into a nucleus of a company and holding a position until the situation was neutralized. Lt Ferris' skill, courage and leadership in this difficult situation was outstanding. Entered service from Michigan.

1st Sgt Robert D. Forbes, 37179668, Inf (then Tec 4) United States Army. On 22 July 1944 Sgt Forbes maintained a wire line for his organization at a critical time when the route through which his wire line ran was constantly under heavy mortar and artillery barrages. Although the heavy fire caused numerous breaks in the line, Sgt Forbes kept the line in working order at all times despite heavy casualties in the area. Entered service from Missouri.

T Sgt Norman G. Burandt, 17050614, Inf, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 when two companies of his battalion were making an attack and became somewhat disorganized because of heavy losses, Sgt Burandt's company was ordered to reorganized and fill a gap in the line. Since there was no officer available in his company, Sgt Burandt took command, leading the company into position which he held, exhibiting skill, calmness and control under enemy fire. Entered service from Minnesota.

T Sgt Albert F. Lambricht, 38098899, Inf (then S Sgt) United States Army. On 13 June 1944 near * * * France, Sgt Lambricht, acting platoon sergeant, led the right half of his platoon in an attack upon a strongly held enemy position. Despite heavy fire from the two enemy machine guns and strong opposition by small arms fire, he led his men across exposed ground and into the enemy positions. A heavy counterattack was launched by the enemy, causing Sgt Lambricht's platoon to withdraw a short distance, where he quickly reorganized it, exposing himself to enemy fire many times, checking his men and encouraging his men to hold, which he was successful in doing thus stopping the enemy counterattack. Entered service from Texas.

T Sgt John W. McNeill, 38088347, Inf, United States Army. On 12 June 1944, when his platoon was under heavy machine gun fire and receiving numerous casualties, the objective was gained and the platoon leader became a casualty and was evacuated, T Sgt. McNeill took charge of the platoon and under heavy fire personally directed the reorganization of the platoon and placed the men in position, displaying valor, initiative and composure, going from man to man checking their position. As a result of this action, the platoon was able to hold its position despite a counterattack by the enemy. Entered service from Oklahoma.

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(Sec III Award of Bronze Star GO 4³ Hq 90th Inf Div 21 Aug 44 contd)

T Sgt Elmo S. Tynes, 17046067, Infantry (then S Sgt) United States Army. On 13 June 1944 near * * * France, Sgt Tynes mortar platoon Sergeant supporting an Infantry company, worked his way, under enemy fire, to a favorable observation point. His accurately directed fire blew up an enemy ammunition point and enabled the unit to advance and carry the position. Entered service from Missouri.

T Sgt Michael Yensko, 6947005, Infantry (then S Sgt) United States Army. On 6 July 1944 near * * * France Sgt Yensko assumed command of his platoon and reorganized it under heavy mortar and artillery fire. His resourcefulness was the deciding factor in holding off a strong enemy counterattack. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

S Sgt Stanley O. Pingel, 37190197, Infantry, United States Army. On 11 June 1944 near * * * France when Sgt Pingel's radio was knocked out by enemy fire, he voluntarily and with complete disregard for his own safety, acted as runner between the OP and the Artillery. The several trips he made over an exposed area, under fire, enabled the Artillery to support our troops so they could hold the ground previously gained. Entered service from Iowa.

S Sgt Thomas J. Riley, 32030553, Infantry (then Cpl) United States Army. On 9 July 1944 near * * * France Sgt Riley was a gunner in an 81mm mortar squad which had been reduced by heavy enemy fire to 50% strength. Sgt Riley and a companion were firing their mortar at such a rapid rate that it was necessary to leave several exposed rounds in front of the mortar. Sparks from a fired round ignited the increments of the exposed mortar ammunition. Sgt Riley and his companion stayed with the gun, extinguished the fire and succeeded in maintaining a rapid rate of fire until the enemy attack was stopped. Entered service from New York.

S Sgt Albert L. Le Mmon, 39712278, Infantry, United States Army. On 25 July 1944, Sgt Le Mmon volunteered to accompany a patrol to penetrate deep into enemy territory in the vicinity of * * * France. Finding nothing in that area, they were ordered to reconnoiter and volunteered to push further into enemy territory where they proceeded to a village. Investigating a building they captured a German paratrooper, who later gave valuable information to our troops. They pushed their reconnaissance further and discovered 4 other Germans, 2 of whom were killed and the others put to flight. In their action, one member of this patrol of 4 was killed, the others returning to the lines. Entered service from California.

S Sgt Hugo C. Boecklen, Jr, 37404890, Infantry, United States Army. On 15 July 1944, Sgt Boecklen shifted his radio to a place where he could gain radio contact with his unit, stayed on the job continually during the critical situation, while his position was constantly being shelled thereby maintaining communications which enabled his unit to reach its jump off line, attack and drive the enemy out of position. Entered service from Missouri.

Sgt Albert C. Byers, 37555325, Infantry, United States Army. On 25 July 1944, Sgt Byers volunteered to accompany a patrol to penetrate deep into enemy territory in the vicinity of * * * France. Finding nothing at that point, the patrol was ordered to penetrate deeper where they came into the village of * *. Investigating a building in that town, they captured a German paratrooper, who later gave valuable information to our troops. They pushed further on their reconnaissance and discovered 4 other Germans, 2 of whom were killed and the others put to flight. In their action, one member of this patrol of 4 was killed, the others returning to the lines. Entered service from Minnesota.

Tec 4 Charles E. Gambill, 6285995, Med Dept (then Pvt) United States Army. On 19 June 1944, when his unit came under surprise machine gun and mortar fire while holding a line between two points, they were forced to withdraw and established their line farther to the north where they had better fields of fire. The aid men and litter bearers evacuated as many of the wounded as they could while the company was withdrawing, but eight wounded men were left on the battlefield. Tec 4 Gambill, fully realizing that the company had withdrawn, that the area was under heavy fire and that the enemy had infiltrated into the position, volunteered to go out and get the wounded men. Tec 4 Gambill was taken prisoner but through his ingenuity and determination made his escape and returned to our lines and resumed his duties. Entered service from Oklahoma.

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(Sec III Award of Bronze Star GO 43 Rq 90th Inf Div 21 Aug 44 contd)

Tec 4 Charles H. McArthur, 37172278, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack near * * * France, on 6 July 1944, forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines and No Man's Land. Tec 4 McArthur volunteered to and did accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from North Dakota.

Tec 4 Raymond Twitty, 38125229, Med Dept, United States Army. When his organization was struck by a heavy counterattack near * * * France, on 6 July 1944, forcing elements of his battalion back, many wounded were left within the enemy lines and No Man's Land. Tec 4 Twitty volunteered to and did accompany a group into this area, which was still under heavy machine gun fire, and evacuated a number of the wounded to a place of safety. Entered service from Texas.

Cpl Nick A. Lovetro, 33566695, Infantry (then Pvt) United States Army. On 9 July 1944 near * * * France. Sgt Lovetro was a gunner in an 81mm mortar squad which had been reduced by enemy fire to 50% strength. Sgt Lovetro and a companion were firing their mortar at such a rapid rate that it was necessary to leave several exposed rounds in front of the mortar. Sparks from a fired round ignited the increments of the exposed mortar ammunition. Sgt Lovetro and his companion stayed with the gun, extinguished the fire and succeeded in maintaining a rapid rate of fire until the enemy attack was stopped. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Tec 5 Dwight M. Goodrich, Jr, 38088021, Infantry, for his outstanding devotion to duty at a critical time in maintaining radio communications for his battalion in the vicinity of * * * France, on 5 July 1944. Entered service from Oklahoma.

Tec 5 Omer R. Crouthers, 57179782, Med Dept, United States Army. On 10 July 1944 between * * * and * * * France, while evacuating wounded soldiers from that vicinity, his jeep was hit but he continued diligently on his mission. Later, his jeep was blown completely from under him but he continued to evacuate the wounded. Entered service from Missouri.

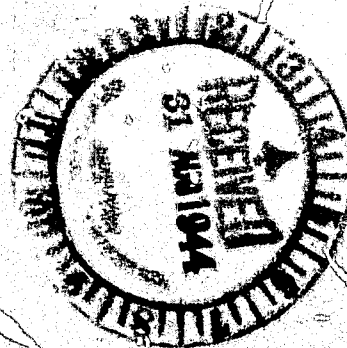

I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

MAJOR VLADIMIR B. KEDROVSKY, 0451831, Cav. * * * Tank Bn, United States Army. On 3 August 1944 when a vehicle preceding Maj Kedrovsky out of * * *, France, was hit by enemy strafing planes, the ammunition on it began to explode, blocking the road. Maj Kedrovsky immediately mounted a tank and, unmindful of the danger from exploding ammunition, guided it in such a manner as to cut a path around the burning vehicle, thus allowing the column to proceed. Entered service from Indiana.

1ST LT EUGENE T. GODFREY, 0101125, Inf. * * * Tank Bn, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 Lt Godfrey was moving near the head of a column when his vehicle was suddenly fired on by some high velocity weapons and machine guns. Although the suddenness of the fire caused some confusion, Lt Godfrey proceeded calmly to develop the enemy situation and set up a base of fire which enabled the Infantry to advance and seize its objective in a very short time. Entered service from Missouri.

S Sgt William F. Schwenke, 38155164, Med Dept, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 Sgt Schwenke was assisting in an aid station when the area came under intense enemy fire and the Infantry in front withdrew. Sgt Schwenke with four other companions voluntarily remained in position in the area although it remained under constant enemy mortar and artillery fire. Entered service from Texas.

S Sgt Daniel M. Regan, 20114314, Inf, United States Army. On 12 July 1944 an enemy shell set fire to a truckload of ammunition and fire spread to small arms ammunition. Sgt Regan and one other companion, realizing that if the fire reached heavier caliber ammunition it would at once begin to explode and endanger the lives of wounded men near the truck, quickly removed the ammunition and then assisted the wounded men to a place of safety. Entered service from Massachusetts.

S Sgt George Montgomery, 38126692, Inf, (then Sgt) United States Army. On 6 July 1944 near * * *, France, Sgt Montgomery's company had reached its objective but a terrific enemy mortar and artillery barrage hit the area before a defensive position could be organized. Forward elements of a company on the left fell back and left his company exposed on three sides and the position was immediately subjected to an enemy counterattack. Sgt Montgomery worked into a favorable position with an improved field of fire and, although exposed to fire throughout the action, manned a machine gun, thereby protecting the right flank and enabling his company to maintain its position. Entered service from Oklahoma.

S Sgt Aram J. Deragon, Jr, 31247260, Inf (then Pfc) United States Army. On 13 July 1944 when Sgt Deragon's squad was advancing through hedgerows, it came under surprise machine gun fire and one man of his party was wounded. Sgt Deragon worked his way to a position where he could fire on the machine gun with his M-1 rifle. His fire was so effective that he silenced the machine gun, allowing other members of the platoon to get to cover and at the same time protecting the squad leader so that he could get the wounded man back to safety. Entered service from Rhode Island.

S Sgt Anthony Scachetti, 20111794, Inf, United States Army. On 6 July 1944 near * * *, France, Sgt Scachetti, a machine gun section leader, was with his section in the center of a field when an enemy counterattack developed. Sgt Scachetti left his machine gun section with his second in command and helped repulse the attack with bayonet and hand grenades, assisting rifle elements throughout the afternoon. This fine example of leadership and courage was in line with the highest traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Tec 4 Canuto L. Rivera, 38103934, Med Dept, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 Tec 4 Rivera was assisting in an aid station when the area came under intense enemy fire causing the Infantry in front to fall back. Tec 4 Rivera, with four other companions, voluntarily remained in position in the area although it was under constant enemy mortar and artillery fire. Entered service from New Mexico.

Tec 4 Alfred B. Copt, 37170671, Med Dept, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 Tec 4 Copt was assisting in an aid station when the area came under intense enemy fire causing the Infantry in front to fall back. Tec 4 Copt, with four other companions, voluntarily remained in position in the area although it was under constant enemy mortar and artillery fire. Entered service from Minnesota.

Tec 5 Salvador A. Belli, 31204699, Med Dept, United States Army. On 8 July 1944 Tec 5 Belli voluntarily went to the aid of a wounded soldier and removed him to a place of safety just before another shell, which would have killed the wounded man, fell into the position. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Tec 5 William S. Humenasky, 33139971, Med Dept (then Pfc) United States Army. On 12 June 1944 Tec 5 Humenasky was assisting in an aid station when the area came under intense enemy fire causing the Infantry in front to fall back. Tec 5 Humenasky, with four other companions, voluntarily remained in position in the area although it was under constant enemy mortar and artillery fire. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Tec 5 George S. Rogers, Jr, 33491946, Med Dept, United States Army. During the period 5 to 9 July 1944 when the companies to which he was attached suffered numerous casualties, Tec 5 Rogers disregarded enemy small arms and mortar fire repeatedly to assist the wounded men and also assisted wounded men of adjacent units. In one instance particularly, when one man was hit by enemy machine gun fire 200 yards away, Tec 5 Rogers ran through the machine gun fire to the wounded man and succeeded in taking him to the aid station although in returning, he himself was wounded. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR.

Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66 First U.S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to CAPTAIN GEORGE M. INGRAM, O336212, FA, United States Army. For extraordinary meritorious service in action in France against an enemy of the United States from 5 to 8 July 1944. Entered service from Texas.

Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U.S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to S Sgt Edward J. McCabe, 31005462, Inf, United States Army. For extraordinary meritorious service in action in France against an enemy of the United States from 5 to 13 July 1944.

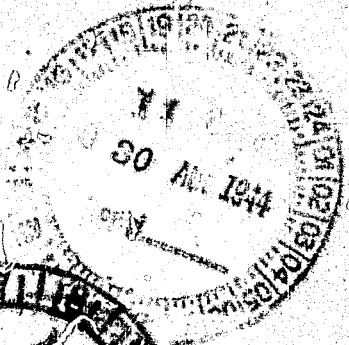

I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

CAPTAIN MAX K. WILSON, 0325793, Inf, United States Army. On 12 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, enemy artillery made a direct hit on a truck load of ammunition setting the truck on fire. Unable to put out the fire, Capt Wilson and another soldier quickly removed the heavier 105 mm ammunition from the truck and removed some wounded men to a place of safety during which time small arms ammunition on the truck was exploding. Entered service from Oregon.

CAPTAIN WHEELER COY, 0332167, Inf, United States Army. On 10 June 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Capt Coy was engaged in a bitter fight with the enemy against a well defended position and heavy casualties had been inflicted on our troops. A withdrawal and establishment of a new position was necessary. Capt Coy returned to the position which they had evacuated and, with aid men, evacuated the wounded. This action required three trips between the position of the wounded and the aid station and was accomplished under extremely heavy machine gun, mortar and artillery fire. Entered service from Washington.

Name amended by 17048, 26 Aug 44
* 1ST LT ARTHUR B. CARLAN, 0513498, Inf, United States Army. On 15 July 1944 when Lt Carlan's unit was ordered to attack, it came under heavy artillery and mortar fire and was pinned down. Lt Carlan, the platoon leader, immediately placed himself at the head of the platoon, ordered them up and led them forward in the attack against the enemy machine gun fire and continued shelling. He continued to move back and forth along the line encouraging the men forward and through his diligent and aggressive leadership succeeded in establishing a bridgehead which permitted the remainder of the company to move forward. Entered service from Georgia.

T Sgt Berry L. Adcock, 18108866, Inf, United States Army. When the enemy attempted to flank his unit's position on 5 July 1944, Sgt Adcock, an Infantry soldier, finding no artillery forward observer in the immediate vicinity, on his own initiative directed artillery through his own telephone. Although the enemy tried repeatedly to move up the road, he directed effective artillery fire on them and forced them to withdraw each time, permitting his unit to remain in position. During the entire action Sgt Adcock was in an area exposed to continuous enemy fire. Entered service from Louisiana.

Tec 5 Dencil D. Huffman, 33389057, FA, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 when the unit which Tec 5 Huffman's battalion was supporting received a warning that an armored attack from the exposed north flank of the Division was imminent, joined a patrol and encountered an enemy reconnaissance vehicle. The patrol permitted the vehicle to approach to a very close range and then opened fire, killing the driver and one member of the crew and disabling the vehicle and thereby giving his battalion time and warning. Entered service from Maryland.

Pfc Edward Weeder, 33412778, FA, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 Pfc Weeder shot down an enemy air plane. Pfc Weeder was a machine gunner on the wire truck of his battery. When the plane, endeavoring to elude allied aircraft which it had engaged in a fight, came low over his position, Pfc Weeder immediately opened fire on the plane and destroyed it. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

ii. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR.

Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66 First U.S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to MAJOR WILLIAM J. FALVEY, 0337929, Inf, (then Capt) United States Army. For extraordinary meritorious service in action in France during the period 2 June to 12 August 1944 against an enemy of the U.S. Entered service from Indiana.

Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66 First U.S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to CAPTAIN THOMAS W. CALDECOTT, 0340851, Inf, United States Army. For extraordinary meritorious service in action in France during the period 12-17 June 1944 against an enemy of the United States. Entered service from California.

Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66, First U.S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to Tec 5 Walter G. Hahn, 36005322, Inf, * * Tank Bn, United States Army. For extraordinary meritorious service in action in France during the period 5-8 August 1944 against an enemy of the United States. Entered service from Illinois.

I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 66 First U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

LT COL DONALD G. GORTON, 0268295, Inf, United States Army. During the period 3-8 July 1944 Lt Col Gorton's battalion was ordered to move forward and attack the high ground near * * *, France. He immediately received a counter-attack by the enemy, supported by tanks. Lt Col Gorton immediately went forward exposing himself to enemy small arms and machine gun fire, encouraging his men by personal example to maintain their position. On 5 July 1944 the battalion was again attacked by infantry and tanks. Lt Col Gorton again by personal leadership moved from place to place along the lines, encouraged the men to hold their position and during the night stayed with his men on the position. He went from unit to unit, reorganizing them for a continuation of the attack the following morning, making it possible to take the high ground in and about * * * and accomplishing the mission of the battalion. By taking the assigned objective through his gallant action, Lt Col Gorton was a fine example to his men, showing outstanding leadership, courage and determination. His action is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Nebraska.

MAJOR JOHN F. SMITH, 0316592, Inf, (then Capt) United States Army. On 8 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, Major Smith's battalion had been given an order to attack and seize an objective. Maj Smith in command of the battalion vigorously pushed it forward until the objective was taken. The enemy immediately counterattacked and Maj Smith disregarding his own personal safety in an area swept by enemy small arms and artillery fire, personally went from unit to unit encouraging his men by personal example to maintain their position. Although the enemy moved in from both flanks, cutting the battalion off for more than 24 hours, Maj Smith's personal example and firm determination withstood six enemy counterattacks against the position which were beaten back and the position maintained until reinforcements arrived and communications were re-established. The gallant action of Maj Smith is a fine example of military leadership, determination and courage. Entered service from Texas.

CAPT ROBERT F. BURNS, 0384203, Inf, United States Army. On 12 July 1944 Capt Burns, battalion S-3, while forward, located the remnants of three rifle companies. Due to high losses the morale of the men was very low and they were completely disorganized. Capt Burns, working under heavy enemy fire, completely reorganized the remainder of these companies into a provisional unit and stayed in command until relieved by another battalion. Capt Burns' fearlessness and leadership under very difficult circumstances was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Illinois.

1ST LT JAMES R. WALLACE, O460012, Inf, United States Army. On 10 July 1944 at the edge of * * *, France, Lt Wallace organized and personally occupied a sniper's position on the roof of a farmhouse which was under continual enemy machine gun and rifle fire. By his constant presence, Lt Wallace encouraged a shift of enlisted men to take turns along with him on the roof. Lt Wallace, with his comrades fired the sub-machine gun and rifles at the enemy from this position and accounted for fifteen of them among whom were three officers. Lt Wallace's action set a fine example of courage and leadership for his men and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from South Carolina.

T Sgt Claud Spain, 38146536, Inf, (then S Sgt) United States Army. On 11 June 1944 near * * *, France, Sgt Spain's platoon had been pinned down by enemy fire and was badly disorganized. The platoon leader and platoon sergeant had become casualties. Sgt Spain took command of the platoon and immediately re-organized it. He located the enemy machine gun and with two companions assaulted and knocked it out with bayonets. This enabled the platoon to continue to advance. Entered service from Oklahoma.

II. POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provision of AR 600-15 and Circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded posthumously to the following named enlisted man for bravery in action in northern France:

Pfc Charles H. G. Frazier, 35777823, Inf, (then Pvt) United States Army. On 23 July 1944 near * * *, France, Pfc Frazier maintained a wire line of great importance to his unit while the area through which the line passed was under heavy artillery fire. Although Pfc Frazier was a rifleman with no wire experience and because of the heavy artillery fire, wire men were not sent into the area, Pfc Frazier volunteered to make repairs in the wire line. He thereby reestablished communications which had been lost. Pfc Frazier was killed in a later action. Entered service from West Virginia.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and circular 66, First U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

1ST LT BENEDICT V. AMATO, O1310202, Inf, United States Army. On 8 July 1944 near * * *, France, Lt Amato's company was preparing defensive positions when they were struck by a surprise enemy counterattack. The enemy shelled their position with heavy artillery and covered it with small arms fire. Lt Amato made his way to the front line platoons and began gathering up all hand grenades that were available. He then worked himself into a position where he threw the grenades with great accuracy into the German positions, killing several and routing others, enabling his company to accomplish its mission. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

1ST LT EUGENE H. AMORY, JR, O1296968, Inf, United States Army. On 6 July 1944 at * * *, France, Lt Amory showed exceptional leadership and courage by leading tanks that were attached to his company, forward through heavy enemy fire to a position where they could bring effective fire on machine gun positions. This act on a part of Lt Amory enabled the tanks to knock out the machine guns and facilitate the advance of his unit. Entered service from New York.

1ST LT FRANK L. MEAD, 01305287, Inf, United States Army. On 9 Aug 1944 near * * *, France, Lt Mead's company was in a field adjacent to one in which Engineer troops were engaged in destroying enemy material and ammunition. In attempting to destroy some equipment, a thermite grenade was dropped on a pile of ammunition causing the ammunition to ignite, critically endangering personnel and vehicles. Fragments ignited a truck and trailer loaded with AT mines and demolition equipment. Lt Mead and six other companions, at great risk to themselves, were diligent in removing the vehicles and other equipment from the area after the personnel had been evacuated to an area of safety. This action on the part of Lt Mead and his companions resulted in saving valuable material and equipment. Entered service from Illinois.

1ST LT MAX SHORT, 01297966, Inf, United States Army. On 23 July 1944 near * * *, France, Lt Short's platoon was in position and receiving machine gun fire from a German strong point. Lt Short, unable to obtain artillery observation, took a small telephone and wire and, in order to gain observation of the target, crawled forward 200 yards across an open field to the bank of the * * River. During this time continuous concentrations of artillery and mortar fire were falling in the area. Lt Short got communications to the artillery and adjusted fire driving the Germans from their position. Entered service from Massachusetts.

2D LT EUGENE F. HEIL, 01320456, Inf, United States Army. On 12 July 1944 near * * *, France, when his unit came under heavy enemy fire, Lt Heil observed his company commander and a sergeant wounded by mortar fire. Without regard for his own personal safety, Lt Heil proceeded across the open field which was still under enemy mortar and small arms fire, reached the wounded men and administered first aid and carried them both to a place of safety in the rear. Entered service from Wyoming.

1st Sgt George A. Bond, 38000482, Inf, United States Army. On 9 Aug 1944 near * * *, France, Sgt Bond's company was in a field adjacent to one in which Engineer troops were engaged in destroying enemy material and ammunition. In attempting to destroy some equipment, a thermite grenade was dropped on a pile of ammunition and causing the ammunition to ignite, critically endangering personnel and vehicles. Fragments ignited a truck and trailer loaded with AT mines and demolition equipment. Sgt Bond and six other companions, at great risk to themselves, were diligent in removing the vehicles and other equipment from the area after the personnel had been evacuated to an area of safety. This action on the part of Sgt Bond and his companions resulted in saving valuable material and equipment. Entered service from Arizona.

T S. George J. Roehm, 37172912, Inf, (then 3 Sgt) United States Army. On 9 July 1944 Sgt Roehm saw that a squad of his unit had been cut off by heavy enemy fire. Without regard for his own safety, Sgt Roehm ran across a heavily shelled area with an aid man and reorganized the squad which was by this time in a state of utter confusion. The aid man was hit by shrapnel while doing this and Sgt Roehm administered aid and returned him to a point of safety. Entered service from North Dakota.

T Sgt Telesfore R. Ulaszewski, 35918668, Inf, (then Pvt) United States Army On 8 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sgt Ulaszewski, a member of a bazooka team, on his own initiative crawled under intense fire to aid a wounded comrade. He brought his comrade back to the safety of our lines and then went back to firing his weapon until he and his partner ran out of ammunition. They immediately equipped themselves with more ammunition and resumed their mission. By the ingenuity of the team, they brought such heavy fire on the German position they caused them to withdraw. Entered service from Ohio.

S Sgt Howard P. Hayes, 34434934, Inf, (then Pfc) United States Army. On 8 July 1944 near * * *, France, Sgt Hayes' company was preparing a defensive position when the enemy launched a surprise counterattack covering their advance by heavy artillery fire. A party of Germans were seen gathering in a corner of the field. Sgt Hayes and a companion crawled about 150 yards under heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire to secure bazooka ammunition. Sgt Hayes and his companion, with utter disregard for their safety, returned to their former position where they put the bazooka in operation from a good point of observation, firing into the enemy position and throwing them into confusion, killing five and causing the remainder to withdraw. Entered service from North Carolina.

S Sgt Fred E. Smith, 38146844, Inf, (then Sgt) United States Army. On 4 July 1944 at * * *, France, Sgt Smith's company had reached their position and met intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire. Two of his companions were seriously wounded and his unit dropped back to a more tenable defensive position. Sgt Smith volunteered to go into "No Man's Land" which was still under enemy fire. He found both wounded men and evacuated them to a place of safety in the rear. Entered service from Oklahoma.

Tec 5 Robert G. Ambrass, 33309908, Med Dept, United States Army. On 13 Jun 1944 near * * *, France, when a companion was wounded, Tec 5 Ambrass volunteered to cross an open field which was under enemy observation and fire. Tec 5 Ambrass gave first aid to the soldier and then evacuated him to a place of safety. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Tec 4 Julius E. Johnson, 37153869, Med Dept, (then Tec 5) United States Army. On 7 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, when the unit with which Tec 4 Johnson was serving fell back, they left many casualties on the field in "No Man's Land". Tec 4 Johnson learned that fifteen wounded men were left in the area from which his unit vacated. Alone, he crawled about 200 yards to the area under heavy mortar, artillery and machine gun fire where he treated the wounded men and as soon as it was dark, led litter squads to them and directed their evacuation. Entered service from Kansas.

Tec 5 George Rothschild, 38543310, Inf, (then Pvt) United States Army. On 10 July 1944 near * * *, France, Tec 5 Rothschild volunteered to go into the enemy lines and demand the surrender of the German troops. The enemy refused to surrender and opened fire on Tec 5 Rothschild. His action, however, disclosed the enemy position which was immediately brought under heavy fire, resulting in the surrender of several of the enemy the following morning. Entered service from Texas.

Pfc George J. Brown, 32531658, Inf, United States Army. 

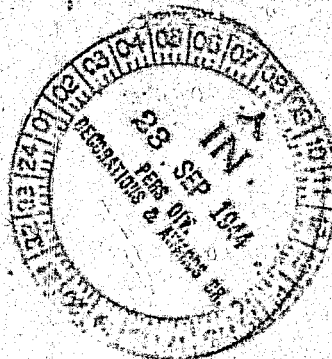

I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6 Third U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers for gallantry in action in northern France:

MAJ LEROY R. POND, O370275, Inf, (then Capt) United States Army. On 8 July 1944 the enemy attacked in great force with tanks and Infantry completely cutting off Major Pond's Battalion. He quickly organized his Battalion for defense, climbed a tree and directed Artillery fire until the Artillery liaison officer could take over this function. Although under heavy enemy fire he moved from place to place checking the position of his units and encouraging the men to hold until relief arrived. His courage and coolness so inspired the men that although isolated for 38 hours he held the position and repulsed each counterattack. His gallantry, courage and determination under extremely difficult circumstances were outstanding and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Arkansas.

CAPT CLIFFORD E. THOMPSON, O385363, CF, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 near * * * France, when elements of his Company were engaged in combat with the enemy defending a road block they came under a heavy enemy mortar and Artillery fire with excellent enemy observation. Two enemy tanks had succeeded in getting into the position by a flanking movement and brought heavy fire on the road block. When some of the supporting troops began to fall back, Capt Thompson immediately and with disregard to his own personal safety moved from position to position under fire encouraging the men to remain and placing them in a favorable position to defend. He then directed anti-tank fire at the enemy tanks putting two of them out of action. His devotion to duty and disregard of his own safety was an inspiration to those who saw his action and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Illinois.

II. AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6 Third U. S. Army, cs, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to the following named enlisted men for heroism, not involving actual conflict with an enemy, in northern France:

M Sgt Clarence L. Wheeler, 6211493, FA, United States Army. On 22 July 1944 an enemy shell set fire to two trucks containing 105mm ammunition. Sgt Wheeler with disregard for his own personal safety procured a fire extinguisher, rushed to the burning trucks in which ammunition was then exploding and succeeded in bringing the fire under control. By his cool and courageous act he prevented the total amount of ammunition in the trucks from exploding, thereby

saving the lives of members of his unit who were nearby. Entered service from Oklahoma.

The explosion caused heavy timber to become dislodged, blocking the hatch and injuring several men. While others were abandoning the ship, Sgt Jones on his own initiative and in disregard for his own personal safety, remained in the hold and assisted three injured companions by removing the beams which were pinning them down and assisted them on deck thereby saving their lives. Pvt Howell with complete disregard for his own personal safety leaped into the flames, disconnected the trailer enabling the truck to pull away to a place of safety and saving the lives of the six enlisted men. Entered service from Oklahoma.

In numerous cases he disregarded his own safety going forward in spite of heavy enemy fire to obtain OP's and adjust Artillery fire. By his aggressive action the Battalion was able to repulse the enemy counterattack and coordinate its position on its objective. Entered service from Texas.

1ST LT WILLIAM R. MATHEWS, 0500490, FA, United States Army. On 2 August 1944 as an observer pilot in an advance into enemy territory, with very little or no screen of reconnaissance troops preceding the column, he quickly located enemy Artillery and mortar positions which held up the column enabling them to quickly reduce this resistance. He persisted in his mission despite the danger from enemy aircraft which were active in the area and the information he noted and transmitted to our troops greatly facilitated their advance. Entered service from Texas.

2D LT CHARLES L. CRABTREE, 01178746, FA, United States Army. On 8 August 1944, during an advance of his unit from * * France, to * * France, as forward observer for his Battalion, Lt Crabtree coordinated the activity of the tank platoon which had lost its commander during a critical phase of the operation. He proceeded under heavy mortar and small arms fire to an OP on which he could observe enemy action and direct fire on the enemy position and on their columns which were trying to escape from the pocket. His action contributed in large measure to their stopping and their eventual capture. Entered service from Illinois.

2D LT EDWARD R. EFAW, 01176946, FA, United States Army. On 8 August 1944, during an advance of a unit which his Battalion supported from * * to * * France, Lt Efav was a forward observer who consistently under enemy Artillery fire worked his way to positions of advantage for observation where he could quickly bring fire on enemy weapons. This reduced enemy road blocks and also knocked out one armored tank and two armored vehicles, enabling the column which his Artillery was supporting to advance rapidly and cut off the retreat of the enemy resulting in their eventual capture. Entered service from Wisconsin.

Sgt Kenneth L. Aune, 37172741, FA, United States Army. On 10 July 1944, Sgt Aune, as a liaison Sergeant with his Battalion under very critical situations, voluntarily maintained wire communications for his section. Although the wire was cut many times he under all conditions went out under heavy enemy fire to mend the breaks and inspired his men to the same determined effort. During this period he personally went back three times through mortar and Artillery fire to repair breaks and restore communication. His diligence permitted communications at critical times when it was necessary to beat back enemy counterattacks in great strength. Entered service from Minnesota.

Cpl Walter S. Cagle, 6270761, FA, (then Pvt) United States Army. Entered service from Texas.

Tec 5 Ray L. Ingham, 37678085, FA, (then Pvt) United States Army. On 7 August 1944 the liaison section adjusting fire on enemy tanks was hit by an enemy shell which killed one and wounded another officer of the section and wounded an enlisted man. Although the position was still under heavy fire, Tec 5 Ingham ran to the aid of the wounded man and succeeded in moving him from the place of danger. Entered service from Iowa.

Pvt Ralph E. Elliott, 38088101, FA, United States Army. On 10 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * * France, Pvt Elliott stayed at his OP, which was under fire, attempting to knock out an enemy field piece which was shelling our lines. During this mission his determination to remain at his post despite shelling of the position resulted in Pvt Elliott being severely wounded. His tenacity in staying at his position during this heavy fire to direct fire at enemy positions in spite of his wounds contributed materially to the success of the mission. Entered service from Oklahoma.

1st Lt COL GEORGE B. RANDOLPH, 0227591, Cav, United States Army. On 1 August 1944 Lt Col Randolph was given the special mission of pushing back enemy detachments in order to facilitate capture of * * *. He personally went forward many times under fire to direct the reduction of pockets of resistance by his special force. In the advance on * * * and * * *, he personally directed reduction of numerous road blocks under fire of enemy antitank weapons. He showed exceptional gallantry in action in the attack on * * * France in leading the same force and under fire reducing more than ten antitank defensive positions greatly facilitating the advance of the remainder of the force and resulting in the capture of several hundred prisoners. Entered service from Georgia.

Cpl Stanley P. Klapowski, 33398815, * * * Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 near * * * France, Cpl Klapowski, was gunner in the lead tank of a column which came suddenly upon twelve vehicles towing antiaircraft weapons. His tank swung rapidly into action taking the enemy vehicles under fire by surprise. Although they attempted to uncouple weapons and did succeed in bringing one gun into action, the courageous action and excellent gunnery of Cpl Klapowski quickly knocked out the enemy gun and destroyed all twelve of the vehicles with only one round for each. The expert gunnery and courage of this man prevented the escape of the enemy convoy and drove the force back into the woods where they were later captured thus enabling our troops to bypass the position and cut off the retreat of the enemy forces. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6 Third U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

CAPT WALTER B. THORNTON JR, 0380574, FA, (then 1st Lt) United States Army. During the period 3 - 10 July 1944 he performed outstanding service as a liaison officer of an Infantry Battalion and repeatedly disregarded his own safety in accomplishing his missions. He moved to positions of vantage to assist in delivering timely Artillery fire and frequently remained for long periods of time under enemy fire, enabling the supporting Infantry to accomplish its mission and to successfully repel successive enemy counterattacks. Entered service from Texas.

Sgt Shortall dismounted from the tank and personally went forward through the brush while probing into enemy territory and effectively covered the tank from surprise from enemy antitank weapons which were numerous in the area. Entered service from Illinois.

Sgt Wesley D. Lockard, 38322730, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 in * * * France, Sgt Lockard was tank commander in an especially important operation involving a rapid advance and an attack on this area. Enemy counter thrusts threatened the advances of the column. Sgt Lockard's tank was given a special mission in the village of * * * which immediately came under heavy fire. In disregard of his own personal safety, Sgt Lockard maintained his position blocking a bridge and preventing the enemy from crossing it by destroying the bridge with heavy fire, thereby permitting our forces to reach the rear of the enemy position which resulted in their ultimate destruction. Entered service from Oklahoma.

Sgt Max D. Lutcavish, 39158397, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 12 August 1944 near * * * France, when his tank was set on fire by enemy fire, Sgt Lutcavish with complete disregard for his own personal safety remained in the tank firing on a German Mark V tank which had knocked out the tank directly behind him. He continued to direct fire on the enemy tank until it was destroyed and then left the tank which was now burning beyond control. Entered service from California.

Sgt Walter J. Pratt, 6580926, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 near * * * France, Sgt Pratt stood up in his tank in the face of enemy fire and guided by a church steeple in the village directed the fire of his gun crew and led his tank against enemy disposed in hedgerows. This resulted in the killing of many Germans, driving their lines back into the woods and breaking up their counterattack. Entered service from California.

Sgt James Warron, 6653251, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 in * * * France, and during the advance on * * * France, while covering the advance of the column which was attacked by an enemy force, Sgt Warron maintained his position under fire and succeeded in scoring three direct hits on an enemy 88mm gun and destroyed it. Entered service from Kentucky.

Sgt Leon Ziebarth, 36006218, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 near * * *, France, the enemy attacked a column which his platoon was covering. One tank was disabled and abandoned and the elements of the platoon took up positions to develop the enemy strength. In this situation Sgt Ziebarth and one companion worked their way to the disabled tank found its guns uninjured and from this place of vantage put such heavy fire on the enemy position that they destroyed the enemy gun. Entered service from Illinois.

Cpl Fergus P. O'Farrell, 36407971, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 12 August 1944 near * * * France, Cpl O'Farrell's tank was set on fire by enemy fire. With complete disregard for his personal safety, Cpl O'Farrell remained in the tank firing on a German Mark V tank which had knocked out the tank directly behind his own. He continued to fire on the enemy tank until it was destroyed and then left his tank which was then burning beyond control. Entered service from Michigan.

Tec 5 Albert T. McDonald, 39080903, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 12 August 1944 near * * * France, Tec 5 McDonald's tank was set on fire by enemy fire. With complete disregard for his personal safety, Tec 5 McDonald remained in the tank firing on a German Mark V tank which had knocked out the tank directly behind his own. He continued to fire on the enemy tank until it was destroyed and then left his tank which was now burning beyond control. Entered service from California.

Pfc Antonio D'Arpino, 31228669, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. During the period 6 - 8 August 1944 from * * * to * * * France, the regular driver of a tank was disabled and Pfc D'Arpino without previous experience in combat driving, took over the tank and maneuvered it on a German motor convoy. When his radio went out preventing communication with the guiding tank, Pfc D'Arpino opened the turret, driving his tank in the face of the enemy where it could deliver the most destructive fire on their positions. This resulted in dispersion of the enemy and capture of the position. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Pfc Tolbert V. Hodges, Jr, 38323030, Mod Dept, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 6 August 1944, after working all day without rest evacuating wounded Pfc Hodges returned to the front about midnight to an area covered by enemy small arms and Artillery fire. He sought out and recovered two wounded men whom he brought to safety. He then worked to within 20 yards of the enemy to administer aid to a wounded platoon leader. He remained in the position administering to the wounded man even though the Infantry had withdrawn leaving him in "no man's land". Entered service from Oklahoma.

Pvt Elbert Melton, 34476078, * * *, Tank Battalion, United States Army. On 12 August 1944 near * * * France, Pvt Melton's tank was set on fire by enemy fire. With complete disregard for his personal safety, Pvt Melton remained in the tank firing on a German Mark V tank which had knocked out the tank directly behind his own. He continued to fire on the enemy tank until it was destroyed and then left his tank which was now burning beyond control. Entered service from Mississippi.

Pvt Jake H. Pope, 18194673, Mbd Dept, * * *, Tank Battalion. Then he worked to within 20 yards of the enemy to administer aid to a wounded platoon leader. He remained in the position administering aid to the wounded leader even though the Infantry had withdrawn leaving him in "no man's land". Entered service from Texas.

I. POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded posthumously to the following named enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

S Sgt Joseph J. Bride, 31032356, Infantry, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 near * * * France, his company attacked a wooded area and received heavy casualties from enemy fire. Sgt Bride led his squad forward in the face of intense fire. After succeeding in locating two enemy machine gun nests, he placed his squad to cover them and personally assaulted first one machine gun and then the second, knocking them both out by the use of rifle grenades. This action on the part of Sgt Bride resulted in enabling his company to continue to advance and to reach its objective. This gallant act of Sgt Bride was a fine example of leadership, aggressiveness and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Massachusetts.

S Sgt Lewis D. Huddleston, 38103893, Infantry, United States Army. On 13 June 1944 near * * * France, when his platoon was attacking a strong enemy position and his company was held up by intense enemy fire, Sgt Huddleston placed himself at the head of the squad and courageously led it on an assault on the enemy position. He repeatedly exposed himself to enemy fire, maintained control of his men and inspired them to assault the enemy and take the position. His disregard during the action for his own safety, an example set on the field of battle, was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from New Mexico.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6 Third U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

S Sgt Albert J. Apple, 38535813, Infantry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 * * * France, when the column with which he was operating cut a German column, a skirmish started, and the tanks did not move forward. Sgt Apple led his squad with utmost energy and with complete disregard for his own safety under heavy Artillery fire pressed the attack and although wounded by a German Artillery piece he continued to lead his squad and the supporting tanks into action, defeating the enemy and gaining their objective. This gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Texas.

S Sgt. Ramon V. Lopez, 194629, Infantry, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 at * * * France, when an attack on the city of * * * France, had bogged down due to heavy enemy fire and grenades thrown from the buildings, Sgt Lopez gallantly led his squad rapidly against the bridge which was one of the objectives of the attack. The rapidity with which he charged the bridge drove off the German detail, which had been left to complete its demolition, and prevented its destruction. After crossing the bridge he again led the advance through the outskirts of the town and assisted materially in consolidating and securing it from attack. His personal leadership and gallant action contributed materially to the success of the operation in securing a vital objective, completing the mission of the force sent to capture the town and secure the bridge. This action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Texas.

S Sgt Anthony J. Modica, 33566736, Infantry, (then Sgt) United States Army. On 6 Aug 1944 on the outskirts of * * * France, while brzoeka men in his unit were firing on tanks, Sgt Modica led a squad of his platoon into a flank position, capturing two men and killing a third. Enemy fire was severe and our own tanks were firing into the hedgerow at the time. After completing this act, Sgt Modica saw that his platoon leader was pinned down in the field after covering the return of the group. Sgt Modica hastily organized a firing line and delivered fire in sufficient quantity to enable the platoon leader to return to his lines. Later in the evening, Sgt Modica led a patrol through an area covered by enemy machine gun fire which became so intense that the patrol was forced to seek cover. Seeing that two men were not accounted for he immediately went out alone under enemy fire and located and returned the missing men to our lines. This gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Tec 5 Melvin A. Wurm, 20519310, Med Dept, United States Army. On 26 July 1944 near * * * France, the unit in which he was acting as aid man was held up temporarily by heavy enemy fire from the front and flank and casualties became very heavy. Without waiting for the shelling to slacken, Tec 5 Wurm constantly went from place to place giving first aid to the wounded, moving them to a place of safety and administering to their care. During this time he definitely saved the life of one man and possibly the lives of two other who were bleeding badly and treated lesser wounds of several others. His complete disregard for his own safety while the position was still under heavy enemy fire showed his devotion to duty and his gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Ohio.

Pfc Joseph S. Bonsall, 13175156, Infantry, United States Army. On 7 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * * France, his company moved out to attack a village from which friendly troops had been driven out twice before. After heavy fighting the town was again occupied. During the attack, Pfc Bonsall, a runner, fighting with the leading elements, displayed heroic courage. When his platoon was cut in two by a machine gun section of

Germans, and were unable to advance, Pfc Bonsall on his own initiative worked his way through enemy machine gun fire to within grenade throwing range of the machine gun nest and succeeded in knocking it out, killing the crew. During the operation, he was seriously wounded by shell fire and was evacuated but not until after he had fully accomplished his mission. This gallant act was a fine example of courage, determination and aggressiveness, and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Pfc George W. Scott, Jr, 36584304, Infantry, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 near * * * France, a part of a motorized patrol came under enemy machine gun and automatic rifle fire and the four lead vehicles took cover behind a crest of a hill. Pfc Scott jumped off the lead vehicle, ran forward and urged the men to follow him firing as he advanced. Although the enemy continued to fire automatic weapons at the patrol and the machine guns in the vehicles delivered overhead fire, Pfc Scott led the advance full into the enemy position, firing his BAR from the hip and moved across the road where the enemy were taking cover. Several of the enemy came out to surrender but one made a rush for one of Pfc Scott's men coming up from the rear. Pfc Scott killed the onrushing enemy and in the resulting action ten men were killed and four captured, permitting the uninterrupted advance of the column. Pfc Scott's gallant action was a fine example of determination and of courage and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Michigan.

Pvt Ervin N. Johnson, 35896040, Infantry, United States Army. On 6 August 1944 near * * * France, Pvt Johnson's company was attacking a German force, that was moving in to recapture * * * and were delivering heavy machine gun fire on the position from five different points. Pvt Johnson worked himself to the flank of his company position in order to knock out the machine guns. During this operation he encountered ten enemy riflemen who were attempting to flank the company. Pvt Johnson personally accounted for at least four of the enemy and his action was successful, enabling the company to hold its position. The gallant act on the part of Pvt Johnson was in keeping with the highest standards of the military spirit. Entered service from Indiana.

III. AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to the following named enlisted men for heroism, not involving actual conflict with an enemy, in northern France:

Cpl William Sergi, 33439926, Infantry, United States Army. On 9 August 1944 in * * * France, a comrade of Cpl Sergi accidentally spilled a quantity of gasoline on his clothes. The gasoline ignited and the soldier became panic stricken and started to run. Cpl Sergi and a companion tackled him in spite of his burning clothes, threw him to the ground and smothered out the flames with a shelter-half and towel, thereby saving the soldier's life. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Pfc Peter P. Foulkrod, 33355422, Infantry, United States Army. On 9 August 1944 in * * * France, a comrade of Pfc Foulkrod accidentally spilled a quantity of gasoline on his clothes. The gasoline ignited and the soldier became panic stricken and started to run. Pfc Foulkrod and a companion tackled him in spite of his burning clothes, threw him to the ground and smothered out the flames with a shelter-half and towel, thereby saving the soldier's life. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

IV. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

CAPTAIN B. F. ADAMS, O-325642, Inf, United States Army. During the period 6 - 7 August 1944 from * * to * * , Capt Adams diligently and persistently led his unit in attacks on the enemy. His company and a platoon of tanks comprised the advance guard for the Task Force moving on the above mission. On one occasion, Capt Adams ordered his men to dismount from the tanks and to advance on foot in an effort to contact and knock out the enemy. After a short forward movement the leading elements called for tank support immediately. Capt Adams promptly went to the lead tank, mounted it and personally directed the tank forward. Upon arriving among the front elements, he directed the tank to attack aggressively, repelled the enemy and coordinated the advance of the Task Force. Entered Service from Arkansas.

CAPTAIN ROBERT I. PROEBSTEL, O-311502, Infantry, United States Army. During 11 - 12 June 1944 southwest of * * * France, Capt Proebstel's company was given the mission of maneuvering against a strongly held position. In the initial advance, his company suffered heavy casualties. When the advance was effectively stopped, he persistently held on to ground gained until armored replacements arrived the following morning. He launched the attack the following morning with the Infantry following the tanks closely, and protecting the tank crews. His company gained the battalion objective and by personal example and determination secured it against strong opposition. Entered Service from Oregon.

1ST LT RAY H. HATLESTAD, O-1320455, Infantry, (then 2d Lt), United States Army. On 7 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * * France, Lt Hatlestad's battalion was occupying a position south of the town. The enemy launched a vigorous counterattack supported by artillery and mortar fire. Lt Hatlestad, commanding a mortar section, was ordered to move up his position. As soon as the mortars began firing they came under a heavy enemy counter battery fire. Notwithstanding this fire, Lt Hatlestad kept his position and section firing and in two days fired over 6,000 rounds of ammunition. Due to the inspiring leadership of Lt Hatlestad, coordinated fire from all weapons was carried out until the mission was completed and the counterattack stopped. Entered Service from North Dakota.

T Sgt Herman B. Brenno, 37172523, Infantry, United States Army. On 6 August 1944 near * * France, when his platoon was advancing through an open field, accompanied by friendly tanks, the platoon leader became a casualty and due to heavy fire the troops were pinned down and the accompanying tanks withdrew. Sgt Brenno took command of the platoon, moved them to a favorable position where he covered the flank of his company and this succeeded in protecting the company from a flanking attack. Entered service from North Dakota.

T Sgt George W. Hairl, Jr, 37179834, Infantry (then S Sgt) United States Army. During the period 7 - 9 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Sgt Hairl's company had been under heavy fire and suffered many casualties. Sgt Hairl assisted in the evacuation of the wounded during the night in addition to his other duties in daylight hours. When his company was surrounded and needed reinforcements badly he fought his way with two companions out of the position to secure help. Finding a group of about 30 men from different organizations, he organized them, secured abandoned arms and fought his way back to the relief of his company. This action was a big factor in enabling his company to maintain its position against repeated enemy counterattacks. Entered service from Missouri.

T Sgt Major A. McLaughlin, 18062712, Infantry, (then S Sgt) United States Army. On 14 June 1944 near * * France, Sgt McLaughlin's squad became the base squad for the movement of his Battalion on that town. Near the town he came under very heavy cross fire from enemy machine guns. Notwithstanding which he exhibited fine traits of courage and leadership and worked his squad forward, brought up a base of fire and permitted his company to advance. Entered service from Texas.

T Sgt Robert M. Bentz, 35045744, Infantry (then S Sgt) United States Army. On 7 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Sgt Bentz's platoon suffered heavy casualties from machine, - fire including his platoon leader and platoon Sergeant. Sgt Bentz assumed command of the platoon, placed them in a defensive position where he was able to defend the flank of the company until Artillery could be placed on the enemy and drive them from their position. Entered service from Ohio.

S Sgt Stephen A. Husak, 37171930, Infantry (then Pfc) United States Army. On 13 June 1944 near * * * France, when his squad leader became a casualty and his squad was under heavy enemy Artillery fire, Sgt Husak took command, reorganized it and repelled an enemy counterattack. Entered service from Minnesota.

S Sgt Floyd B. Vickery, 38003535, Infantry, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 at * * France, Sgt Vickery's company was moving on the town of * * France when it was stopped by enemy machine gun fire from approximately five weapons. Without regard for his own safety Sgt Vickery moved to a position from which he directed mortar fire on the enemy guns and knocked out four of the five guns. This caused the other to retreat. Entered service from California.

Sgt Anthony R. Bochenko, 31025322, Infantry, United States Army. On 11 June 1944 near * * France, Sgt Bochenko, although slightly wounded by shell fragments, concealed these wounds from his officers and comrades, took over the duties of squad leader of a squad which had been filled with green replacements and continued to lead it until his wounds became infected. This resulted in his having to be evacuated to the rear on orders of his officers. His wilfull determination to fight and destroy the enemy, even though wounded, was a fine example of courage, fortitude and endurance. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Tec 4 Virgil R. Gage, 38155112, Med Dept, United States Army. On 11 June 1944 near * * France, Tec 4 Gage was attached as aid man to a company of Infantry which was attacking a wooded area. In spite of heavy enemy fire, Tec 4 Gage stayed in the area giving aid to the wounded men. The platoon was subject to heavy Artillery, machine gun and rifle fire and casualties were heavy and because of the heavy concentration the platoon was forced to withdraw. During the withdrawal, Tec 4 Gage stayed behind to care for two wounded men who had not been evacuated and was cut off from friendly troops by enemy action. He later made contact with a squad from a friendly company which also had been cut off. He remained all night with the wounded men, caring for them and was able to have them evacuated into our lines. Entered service from Texas.

Opl George A. Lewis, Jr, 31152997, Med Dept, United States Army. On 26 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, when two of his companions were seriously wounded he crawled from a place of safety to render first aid to the wounded men and while so doing was himself wounded. Entered service from Maine.

Tec 5 Stanley E. Shedlock, 31039420, Med Dept, United States Army. On 6 August 1944 near * * France, Tec 5 Shedlock as a medical aid man attached to an Infantry company, hearing the call for aid men, volunteered to leave his position with his mortar platoon and went forward to the rifle units. Tec 5 Shedlock went into an area covered by small arms fire to give aid to two men who had been hit by 20mm fire and to other men of another Infantry company. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Pfc Robert C. Blevins, 35446478, Infantry, United States Army. On 13 June 1944 near * * France, Pfc Blevins was an ammunition bearer for a machine gun squad. In spite of heavy fire he continued to maintain the ammunition supply until severely wounded. Before he would be evacuated, he crawled back to the other members of his squad and informed them of his condition in order that they might keep on with his work. Entered service from West Virginia.

Pfc Harvey W. Merritt, 34038039, Med Dept, United States Army. On 3 August 1944 at * * France, Pfc Harvey W. Merritt was a member of a medical detachment supporting an Infantry Battalion when the town came under heavy enemy Artillery fire, resulting in many casualties among the soldiers and citizens. Although shells were still falling in the area, he continued to pick up the wounded men with his litter, removing them to an aid station. His devotion to duty in an area while still under heavy enemy fire was an outstanding example of courage and of great value to the morale of his unit. Entered service from South Carolina.

Pvt Paul Bauman, 12132649, Infantry, United States Army. On 9 August 1944 when Pvt Bauman was a member of a special task force he showed exceptional diligence in locating enemy positions. Finding a rifle squad without a leader, he assumed leadership of the squad, worked it forward to a favorable position and knocked out an enemy tank. While on this mission, he was severely wounded in the leg. He at all times showed exceptional courage, diligence and devotion to duty. Entered Service from New Jersey.

Pvt Phillip Le Shay, 33024440, Infantry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 near * * * France, the position from which Pvt Le Shay was operating was hit by an enemy shell wounding him. Although suffering from shrapnel lacerations, he continued to operate his radio directing mortar fire on the enemy until they were driven out of their position. Pvt Le Shay refused to be evacuated from the area until he could be replaced by a competent operator. Entered Service from Pennsylvania.

V. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to S Sgt Gleason R. Swanson, 33126646, Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious service in action on 8 July 1944, against an enemy of the United States, in France, Entered service from Oklahoma.

I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6 Third U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

✓ 1ST LT BURROWES G. STEVENS, JR, 025950, Infantry, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 at * * France, the troops had the mission of securing a bridge. This bridge had been prepared for demolition by the Germans and a detail left to complete the demolition. Lt Stevens worked his platoon to a position to which it could be carried by assault and at the proper time gave the signal and personally led the assault on the bridge, which at the time was covered by small arms fire. He reduced the effectiveness of the enemy fire and charging it at a run prevented the enemy from completing the demolition, secured the bridgehead intact enabling tanks and heavy material to cross. Entered service from Georgia.

✓ 2D LT RICHMOND M. HAGGARD, 0887520, Infantry, (then T Sgt) United States Army. On 9 July 1944 at * * France, Lt Haggard commanded a machine gun platoon in an attack. The platoon suddenly came under intense small arms fire and received severe casualties, wiping out one gun crew. Lt Haggard courageously ran across the field still covered by hostile fire, recovered the gun and manned it himself. He kept the German position under fire, permitting his platoon to move to a more favorable position. It was not until the platoon was well in its new position that Lt Haggard rejoined his unit. T Sgt Evey G. Ashor, 6663223, Infantry, United States Army. On 21 July 1944 near * * France, Sgt Ashor's Battalion was occupying a defensive position with his platoon well forward as an out guard. Under heavy enemy fire Sgt Ashor repaired eight breaks in the wire keeping communications open and allowing the action to succeed. Entered service from Ohio.

~~1st Sgt Leonard J. Szczepkowski, 35009181, Infantry, United States Army.~~
When Sgt Szczepkowski's Regiment was counterattacking a strong enemy force, his mortar section was called on for an exceptional expenditure of ammunition. After firing steadily for one hour, the ammunition was very low. Sgt Szczepkowski organized carrying parties and diligently and persistently pushed ammunition supplies forward to the mortars. Enemy counterbattery brought the area under fire. Without regard for his personal safety, Sgt Szczepkowski personally led the parties into the shelled area and helped to prepare the ammunition for use. His coolness and leadership was vital to the success of the operation and assisted materially in backing up the counter-attack. Entered service from Ohio.

S Sgt James P. Blankenship, 38099424, Infantry, United States Army. On 6 August 1944 near * * France, when Sgt Blankenship was leading his squad in an attack, he found that the ammunition supply was nearly exhausted. The squad was also pinned down by enemy machine gun fire from five separate locations. Leaving his men in a firing position, Sgt Blankenship crawled to the rear, secured additional ammunition, brought it back helping the squad to continue in action stopping the enemy advance. S Sgt Jim H. Kolos, 38155528, Infantry, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 near * * France, Sgt Kolos was in command of a heavy machine gun section engaged in an attack on the town. When the riflemen which he was supporting drew heavy fire, Sgt Kolos moved into the fire swept zone and led his men forward without support to a position from which he could deliver heavy fire on the enemy, and covered the reorganization of the rifle unit which under his continued support regrouped and resumed the attack, successfully crossing the river. 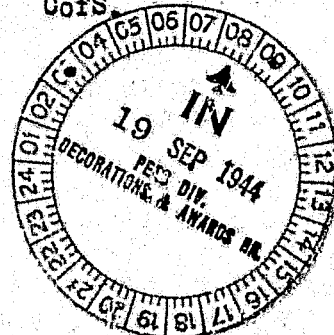

On 7 August 1944 near * * * France, Lt McLean pushed his platoon under enemy fire to a favorable location to an OP in a house which was under fire of enemy tanks and so directed fire on the advancing Infantry that it was driven back and dispersed. On 8 August 1944 Lt McLean's units surprised an enemy motorized column on the road and he showed unusual capacity in speedily placing his platoon in action, placing fire directly on the column, causing the crews to abandon their vehicles, resulting in the killing or capturing of these crews. Entered service from California.

S Sgt Charlie H. Lancaster, 6968024, Infantry, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 near * * * France, Sgt Lancaster's unit was under heavy small arms fire from the opposite bank of the * * * river. A French civilian was caught between the fire of the two forces and severely wounded. Sgt Lancaster left his place of safety and went to the aid of the wounded Frenchman, taking him to a place where medical assistance could be rendered. Entered service from Georgia.

Sgt Richard L. Riley, 38126728, Infantry, (then Tec 5) United States Army. On 6 August 1944 near * * * France, Sgt Riley was a wire crewman laying and maintaining wire in a very critical situation along a street in * * * which was under small arms and mortar fire. Sgt Riley with disregard for his own safety kept the line repaired and extended forward. He has shown similar courage and persistence in laying and maintaining communications by wire, in numerous other situations involving hazardous work and hardships. Entered service from Oklahoma.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6 Third U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

CAPT IOWA K. REDMAN, 01298130, Infantry, (then 1st Lt) United States Army. On 5 July 1944 near * * * France, Capt Redman was serving in the capacity of Battalion S-3 in the attack from * * * to * * *. Capt Redman was on duty without relief of the Battalion OP and under almost constant shell fire, he showed exceptional diligence in moving about among the front line units ascertaining their situation, giving directions, seeking out the stragglers and reorganizing them and returning them to their company. On finding a company in a state of disorganization, he immediately took command, reorganized the company and placed it in a suitable position. His

1ST LT VINCENT D. SHEERAN, 01318582, Infantry, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, when his unit after fighting heavily all day was very short of ammunition, rations and water, and had their supply cut off by the enemy, Lt Sheeran volunteered to lead a carrying party of 96 men to the rear during the cover of darkness to bring up supplies. Lt Sheeran made a personal reconnaissance of the route to be followed and was able to procure the necessary supplies, thus enabling his Battalion to accomplish their mission. Entered service from New York.

1ST LT RICHARD E. SMITH, 01305662, Infantry, (then 2d Lt) United States Army. During the period 5 - 7 August 1944, when acting as a forward observer for an 81mm mortar platoon, Lt Smith showed exceptional resourcefulness in selecting the CP and courage under enemy fire while on duty. During the attack on * * , he found a rifle squad stopped in its advance and personally led it forward in the face of heavy enemy small arms fire to seize its objective. Near * * , Lt Smith was called on to fire on a bridge across which the enemy was moving. As his mortars were engaged with other targets, he climbed aboard a friendly tank, directed its fire on the bridge, killing enemy personnel and forcing them from the bridge. Entered service from Texas.

S Sgt Armin W. Wesoloh, 37153407, Infantry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, when a vehicle towing a trailer full of ammunition, demolitions, explosives and gasoline, was hit by an enemy shell and caught fire, the squad leader who was riding in the vehicle was wounded. Sgt Wesoloh summoned an aid man and disregarding his own personal safety rescued the wounded man and evacuated him to a place of safety. Entered service from Kansas.

Sgt Lathor S. Balog, 33457910, Infantry, United States Army. On 21 July 1944 south of * * France, Sgt Balog manned a machine gun supporting an advance of his unit. The enemy retaliated with heavy Artillery and small arms fire against his position. He concealed his own vehicle and then attacked the enemy vehicle, knocking it out and killing the occupants. During the entire advance from * * to * * , he was aggressive and courageous in all actions. Entered service from Oklahoma.

Pfc Edward J. Cyr, 31066235, Infantry, United States Army. On 7 August 1944, Pfc Cyr was acting as driver and interpreter for his Company Commander. The Company was moving forward on medium tanks. Pfc Cyr, by moving ahead of the column was able to give information of a large group of enemy in a wood on the route of travel. On one occasion he encountered and helped knock out an enemy command car, capturing two German officers who gave vital information as to their troop dispositions. Entered service from Massachusetts.

After it passed his position, he identified it and found it to be a German Mark V tank. Sgt Czekovsky seized his bazooka, ran to the side of the tank, fired into it and destroyed the tank. This gallant action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Massachusetts.

On 20 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, while his Company was in position, assisting in holding the encircled enemy forces, the enemy attempted to break through with two armored cars and three other vehicles. Pvt Griggs, armed with a bazooka and a carbine, left his post of safety and under enemy fire moved out into the open. Using his bazooka he knocked out the two armored cars forcing the other three vehicles to withdraw. This gallant action on the part of Pvt Griggs was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the service from Maryland.

During the period 6 - 7 July 1944, when as radio man during a heavy German counter-attack all the wire lines were cut by enemy fire, he maintained his radio and kept communications, despite heavy opposing fire. This enabled the supporting troops to break up the counterattack and hold their position. Entered service from Oklahoma.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

Wt Sgt Lawrence G. Speed, 37155121, Infantry, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 near * * France, Sgt Speed's platoon had been given the mission of supporting tanks to break through enemy lines to an encircled unit. When the detachment came under heavy enemy mortar fire, Sgt Speed in the absence of the platoon commander rallied his men, who had started to retreat, pushed them forward and supported the tanks which succeeded in accomplishing their mission and reestablishing communications with the isolated company. Entered service from South Dakota.

T Sgt Joseph S. Stich, 35002705, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 near * * France, when his platoon leader became a casualty the enemy launched a strong counterattack using tanks supported by Artillery. Sgt Stich maintained his guns in position although supporting Infantry fell back and by his courage and determination succeeded in knocking out 2 enemy tanks. Entered service from Ohio.

WS Sgt Harold W. Dalby, 37171890, CE, (then Sgt) United States Army. On 9 July 1944 near * * France, when Sgt Dalby was acting as observer for the mortar section at a position which was being constantly shelled by Artillery and mortar fire, he was twice rendered unconscious by the concussion of near hits of enemy shells. So effected and dazed Sgt Dalby continued his observation which resulted in the Engineer mortar section knocking out 7 enemy machine guns and one section of three enemy mortars, repulsing a strong enemy counterattack. Entered service from North Dakota.

Sgt Frank H. Eimer, 37138425, Infantry, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, he lead his squad under heavy enemy fire on an important patrol resulting in the capture of 14 prisoners and mopping up of the area assigned. Entered service from Missouri.

Sgt George R. Lambert, 11030995, * * Tank Destroyer Bn, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, as a member of a tank destroyer gun crew, he moved the tank destroyer into a dangerous position. Although his vehicle was immediately struck twice by enemy fire, Sgt Lambert continued to direct the operation of his gun until one enemy tank was destroyed and the other withdrew. He then had the destroyer backed to a place of safety, where he assisted in extinguishing the fire and prevented its destruction. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Sgt Robert C. Latimer, 35135579, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944 near * * France, when his tank destroyer came under fire from three enemy Mark IV tanks, his calmness and deliberation in directing fire on the 3 enemy tanks caused their destruction. Entered service from Ohio.

Sgt Oliver G. Lydick, 33017515, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, while serving as a member of the pioneer platoon of his company, Sgt Lydick's aggressiveness and initiative in attacking an enemy force of approximately 100 troops defending the town of * * France, contributed greatly toward routing an enemy force. Although a companion car was almost immediately disabled, Sgt Lydick ordered it by-passed and advanced toward the enemy and while subjected to small arms fire, stood up in the ring mount unprotected and manned the sub-machine gun. By his courageous act, Sgt Lydick assisted in killing 3 of the enemy, wounding 7, capturing 30 and expelling the remainder of the enemy force from the town. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Sgt Harold W. Scott, 36039675, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, U. S. Army. On 16 August 1944, Sgt Scott was gun commander in a tank destroyer section supporting an attack on * * France. When a strong counterattack by the enemy drove our forces from the town, he maintained his gun in position enabling the retiring troops to form and rally around his position. Although enemy tanks were delivering a heavy volume of fire on his position and other members of his crew had sought safety in fox holes, Sgt Scott and one other companion kept up fire from the gun knocking out an enemy tank. His example of devotion to duty stopped the advance of the enemy and permitted our troops to form for counter-attack. Entered service from Illinois.

Sgt William Wallace, 35570952, Infantry, (then Cpl) United States Army. On 9 August 1944, Sgt Wallace was a mortar squad leader in a rapidly moving column on the way to * * * France. On one occasion when the flank was hit suddenly and the column came under heavy small arms fire, Sgt Wallace remained with his truck, unloaded the mortar and brought it quickly into action. All other members of the squad had taken cover. This courageous action quickly neutralized the enemy fire and permitted the column to proceed. Entered service from Indiana.

On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, he voluntarily drove his vehicle across a zone swept by fire from friendly and enemy tanks firing at each other in order to deliver an important message. Cpl Earl W. Keenum, 18097136, CMP, United States Army. On 2 August 1944, in * * France, while directing traffic at a control post the column which he was directing came under enemy strafing. An ammunition truck was struck and caught fire threatening to explode and block the traffic. Cpl Keenum, without regard for his own safety, rushed to the truck secured the fire extinguisher and extinguished the flames, this permitted the resumption of traffic in a very short time. Entered service from Arizona.

Cpl Joe Logan, 35133410, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. Quickly locating one of the tanks, Cpl Logan destroyed it with one round. Unable to locate the other two tanks, he made contact with an artillery observer and fired upon them by unobserved fire until they were reported destroyed. Entered service from Kentucky.

Cpl Shirley maintained his gun in position enabling the retiring troops to form and rally around his position. Although enemy tanks were delivering a heavy volume of fire on his position and other members of the crew had sought safety in fox holes, Cpl Shirley and one other companion kept up fire from the gun knocking out an enemy tank. His example of devotion to duty stopped the enemy advance and permitted our troops to form for a counterattack. Entered service from Oregon.

Tec 5 Berne Davis, 39385295, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944, in the vicinity of * * France, while serving as a driver of a tank destroyer, Tec 5 Davis drove his vehicle into an exposed position while under fire from enemy tanks and remained until the enemy had been destroyed. Entered service from Washington.

Pfc Edward P. Cornell, 35619114, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Pfc Cornell was serving as a cannoner on a tank destroyer which came under fire from 3 German Mark IV tanks. Pfc Cornell remained at his post courageously while subjected to heavy enemy fire and assisted in the destruction of the three enemy tanks. Entered service from Ohio.

Pfc Chester Horn, 38099975, Infantry, United States Army. Obtaining an interpreter, he persuaded the German force that their escape was so hazardous that the entire force of 214 Germans surrendered to him and were returned to our lines. Entered service from Texas.

Pvt Robert J. Bauman, 35537365, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 4 August 1944 near * * France, when the position of Pvt Bauman's section was attacked by an enemy patrol, Pvt Bauman was struck by an enemy hand grenade. With great presence of mind he quickly threw it back, stunning the enemy officer. His prompt action not only saved the lives of his companions but caused the enemy patrol to become disorganized under fire and stopped the attack. Entered service from Indiana.

Pvt R. L. Burruss, 39533895, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, as a member of a tank destroyer gun crew, Pvt Burruss' vehicle was moved into a dangerous position. Although it was immediately struck twice by enemy fire, Pvt Burruss continued to operate his gun until one enemy tank was destroyed and the other withdrew. The tank destroyer was then backed into a place of safety where he assisted in extinguishing the fire and prevented its destruction. Entered service from California.

Pvt Dexter W. Driver, 14092913, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, as a member of a tank destroyer gun crew, Pvt Driver's tank destroyer was moved into a dangerous position. Although it was immediately struck twice by enemy fire, Pvt Driver continued to assist operating the tank destroyer gun until one enemy tank was destroyed and the other withdrew. The tank destroyer was then backed into a place of safety where Pvt Driver helped to extinguish the fire and prevented its destruction. Entered service from Tennessee.

Pvt James Farris, 15115277, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Pvt Farris was serving as a cannoneer on a tank destroyer which came under fire from three German Mark IV tanks. Pvt Farris remained at his post courageously while subjected to heavy enemy fire and assisted in the destruction of the three enemy tanks. Entered service from Kentucky.

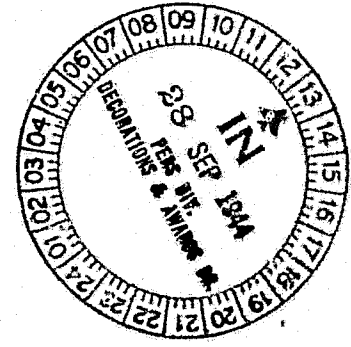
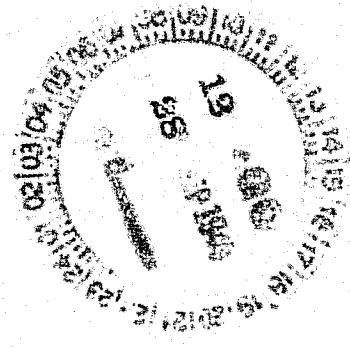

I. AWARD OF OAK-LEAF CLUSTER AND SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, in addition to the Silver Star previously awarded, an Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded the following named officer for bravery in action in northern France:

LT COL GEORGE B. RANDOLPH, 0227591, Cavalry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 between * * and * * France, Lt Col Randolph lead a special task force composed of reconnaissance troops and a company of light tanks as a spearhead followed by Infantry and medium tanks. Lt Col Randolph's personal courage under enemy fire and diligence in pushing the attack and disregard for personal danger was an inspiration to his men. At * * France, he personally organized and led an attack on an enemy position where one tank was knocked out. His aggressive leadership assisted in reducing eight other defended enemy positions. His gallant actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military spirit. Entered service from Alabama.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

COL ROBERT L. BACON, 08657, Infantry, United States Army. On 16 August 1944 while the Infantry of his Regiment was fighting in the town of * * the enemy delivered a strong double envelopment around the right flank using Infantry and tanks. Col Bacon, learning of the situation, went forward personally and seeing the envelopment would cut off his leading Battalion, having no formed troops ready to meet the envelopment and while the area was under heavy Artillery and small arms fire, he personally gathered together rear elements of this Battalion, Engineers, and a part of his Regimental CP, quickly organized them into a unit and personally led the attack of this provisional unit against the enemy envelopment, driving them back and securing the road leading into * * from the east. This prevented the cutting off of his leading Battalion which was then heavily engaged in the town. Col Bacon's disregard for his own personal safety and leadership of the improvised force against a serious enemy counterthrust effectively forestalled it. It set a fine example of leadership to the officers and men of his Regiment and is in keeping with the highest standards of the military spirit. Entered service from Texas.

1ST LT JOHN H. COCHRAN, 01313076, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, during an intense battle, Lt Cochran and another officer discovered an enemy tank column about to break through to the rear of their Battalion. They found an unmanned mortar, manned it themselves as there was little time because the enemy column was only 200 yards away. Despite heavy enemy fire, their action stopped the attacking column, knocked out an enemy tank, and stopped the threat to their Battalion. Lt Cochran's act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Missouri.

1ST LT ROY E. HAMES, 01298862, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 during an intense battle, Lt Hames and another officer discovered an enemy tank column about to break through to the rear of their Battalion. They found an unmanned mortar, manned it themselves as there was little time because the enemy column was only 200 yards away. Despite heavy enemy fire their action stopped the attacking column, knocked out an enemy tank, and stopped the threat to their Battalion. Lt Hames's act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Texas.

S Sgt James A. G. Causey, 35508457, Infantry, United States Army. On 26 July 1944 in the vicinity of the * * River, Sgt Causey's company after very heavy fighting had reached its objective, sustaining heavy casualties. Intense fighting continued and Sgt Causey, while the area was under heavy enemy fire, moved from place to place encouraging his men and personally fired every type of weapon in the company. During one attack he worked along the hedgerows against a group of German Infantry attempting to infiltrate the flank of the company and stopped the attack. Again, when members of the bazooka team became casualties he took their weapon and fired upon an enemy tank, forcing it to withdraw. His actions were an inspiration to his comrades and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Kentucky.

S Sgt Wallace A. Kurtze, 39710636, Infantry, United States Army. On 6 July 1944 in the vicinity of the * * River, Sgt Kurtze's company had succeeded in reaching its objective although it had sustained extremely heavy losses and had been pinned down due to heavy enemy fire and a tank attack. The fighting had caused the loss of much equipment and it was necessary to gather up some of the equipment of the wounded and lost materiel in order to maintain the position. Sgt Kurtze and one companion, without regard to their own personal safety and under continuous enemy fire worked from place to place giving aid to the wounded and gathering up much needed weapons and ammunition, including the company's radio, two light machine guns and a bazooka, thus enabling the company to hold its position. His gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from California.

Tec 3 Joseph J. Selmer, 12051242, Infantry, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 at * * France, during an attack on the village, Tec 3 Selmer voluntarily drove his vehicle down a road under enemy fire and evacuated a badly wounded soldier. This gallant act on the part of Tec 3 Selmer was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from New Jersey.

Sgt Boatright and one companion, without regard to their own personal safety and under continuous enemy fire worked from place to place giving aid to the wounded and gathering up much needed weapons and ammunition, including the company's radio, two light machine guns and a bazooka, thus enabling the company to hold its position. His gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Sgt Ross N. Boatright, 34625368, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, when commanding a machine gun section and firing on an enemy column Sgt Boatright was charged by an enemy tank. Seeing the threatened danger, he personally took the gun into a more favorable but exposed position, while still under enemy fire and where he was able to pick off enemy personnel riding on the tank causing the tank to withdraw. Sgt Boatright was wounded in this action. His gallantry in meeting the emergency was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Mississippi.

Sgt Donald L. Clites, 37678769, Infantry, (then Pfc) United States Army. On 26 July 1944 in the vicinity of the * * River, when his company had succeeded in reaching its objective after very heavy fighting it sustained exceptionally heavy casualties. The position was under extremely heavy enemy mortar and machine gun fire. During this action, Sgt Clites crossed an open field to reach wounded comrades whom he helped evacuate to the Battalion aid station. He then made two trips through a fire-swept zone to replenish his unit with rocket ammunition, distributing the ammunition to teams along the line under heavy fire. Following this he took his place in the line and assisted in repelling the attack which had by then become intense. His gallant actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Iowa.

Tec 4 Michael Chedrik, 33829857, Med Dept, (then Tec 5) United States Army. On 26 July 44 in the vicinity of the * * River, north of * * France, when his company had succeeded under very heavy fire in reaching its objective it sustained 50% casualties. Throughout the day, and under heavy enemy fire, Tec 4 Chedrik moved about the battlefield giving aid to the wounded and assisted in their evacuation. During the afternoon, casualties had become so great that Tec 4 Chedrik was the only medical soldier with two front line companies. Although greatly fatigued, he continued on his duties throughout that night. His devotion to duty and gallantry in action, was a comfort to the wounded soldiers, saving many lives and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Tec 4 Howard C. De Pierre, 37156076, Infantry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, while a member of a Task Force marching on * * France, Tec 4 De Pierre, seeing friendly tanks being held up by enemy high velocity gun fire attempted to locate the enemy weapons and in so doing he came under enemy fire and his weapon was blown from his hands by an exploding shell. Obtaining another weapon he continued on his mission and assisted materially in reducing enemy fire in order that our tanks could go forward. This gallant act on the part of Tec 4 De Pierre was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Wyoming.

Pfc William F. Thompson, 33766463, Infantry, United States Army. On 25 July 1944 in the vicinity of the * * River, north of * * France, when his company had succeeded in reaching its objective after very hard fighting it sustained exceptionally heavy casualties. The position was under extremely heavy enemy mortar and machine gun fire. During this action, Pfc Thompson crossed an open field under enemy fire to reach wounded comrades whom he helped evacuate to the Battalion aid station. He then made two trips through a fire swept zone to replenish his unit with rocket ammunition, distributing the ammunition to the teams along the line under heavy fire. He took his place in the line and assisted in repelling the attack which had by then become very intense. His gallant actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Pvt Fred C. Meske, 37169733, CMP, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, while a member of a Task Force marching on * * France. On 20 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Sgt Lewis fired an Anti-Tank grenade at an enemy half-track which was attempting to break through his position, disabling the half-track and taking the four occupants prisoner. Entered service from Texas.

Tec 4 Marion E. Carson, 39173559, Infantry, United States Army. I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers for gallantry in action in northern France:

BRIG GEN WILLIAM G. WEAVER, 03413, United States Army. On 1 August 1944 near * * * Francé, when the advance of the leading elements of "Task Force Weaver" spear-headed the drive to cut through the German defensive near * * * and were stopped in front of the city by small arms and Artillery fire, General Weaver personally went forward in the column, directed the rapid development of the situation under fire and quickly took the town by the rapid movements which he directed from his advanced position under Artillery and small arms fire. Again on 6 August 1944, he showed aggressive leadership in the capture of * * * leading the same supporting forces in the same aggressive manner. Later, in the attack on * * *, he showed gallantry in action in directing and leading an attack on a force defending the road to * * * while a part of his force encircled a bridge which was strongly held by a force and had numerous Antitank guns in depth along the road for 20 to 25 miles. This action resulted in the capture of some five hundred prisoners, destruction of much material and the capture of the Northern half of the city of * * *, France. General Weaver's action and aggressive leadership was an inspiration to those under him and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Kentucky.

COL GEORGE B. BARTH, 011241, *Inf*, United States Army. On 6 August 1944 at * * *, France, when a special force led by Colonel Barth arrived at * * *, he was heavily attacked by enemy Infantry and Artillery. He personally directed a rapid attack, driving the enemy Infantry back, and disregarding the threat to his flank, he personally remained at a position under fire, directing his column in a rapid advance past the threatening enemy forces completing their encirclement and resulting in the capture of several hundred prisoners. Later, in order to advance on * * *, when his column was stopped by enemy Infantry and Antitank weapons Colonel Barth personally went forward and observed the reduction of a road block, under fire from enemy Antitank guns and small arms. This gallant action was a fine example to his soldiers and in keeping with the highest military traditions. Also, on August 6, Colonel Barth was ordered to cross the * * * River south of the city and to outflank the defense of the city from the south.

All crossings over the river were destroyed. Colonel Barth placed himself at the head of the Battalion designated to make the crossing and realizing that speed was essential he collected all available small boats and personally, in the face of possible enemy resistance, crossed with the first squad so that he could personally reconnoiter and direct the rapid movement of the Battalion in executing the flank envelopment. His rapid movement and personal leadership brushed aside enemy defenses and the city was quickly occupied and secured. Entered service from Kansas.

LT COL MERTON E. MUNSON, 0260520, FA, United States Army. On 3 July 1944 near * * *, France, when his Battalion was supporting Infantry in the vicinity of * * *, France, wire communications to an important O.P. observing for his Battalion were cut. The route between the OP and the fire direction center was under heavy enemy Artillery and mortar fire at the time. Feeling the importance of quickly finding the break in the line, he quickly organized a small wire crew and went forward with them down the wire line under the enemy fire to hasten to the breach in the line. He proceeded on forward to the OP, which was also under fire, in order to discuss with the forward observer the best means of getting it neutralized. While doing so he was severely wounded and had to be evacuated. Against medical advice he left the hospital and voluntarily went back to his organization for duty. Again at * * *, France, on 2 August 1944, Lt Col Munson's Battalion was supporting the Infantry, having the mission of capturing that town and the bridges over the * * * River. It was important to seize the bridges quickly before they could be blown. Lt Col Munson anxious to quickly get the Artillery support to the troops moving up to seize the bridge, went forward to an OP well up with the leading elements of the Infantry where he came under enemy Artillery fire. He remained at the post, however, and when the assault was launched, and he was asked for Artillery support, he delivered the fire that quickly silenced the enemy and drove them from the town so that all objectives were seized in the quickest possible time. The gallant act of assuming responsibility of checking a wire line because of its urgent importance was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. His persistence in returning to the military service before his wounds were healed and his gallantry at * * *, France, was a fine example of devotion to duty. Entered service from Oklahoma.

II. POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third U. S. Army, cs, the Bronze Star is awarded posthumously to the following named enlisted man for bravery in action in northern France:

S Sgt Clarence W. Rice, 37154832, Inf, United States Army. On 13 June 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, when his squad leader became a casualty, S Sgt Rice took command of the squad, which had been somewhat dispersed by enemy action, and bravely set about the task of reorganizing the squad to meet the new threat. In order to accomplish his mission in as short a time as possible

He exhibited throughout the action diligence, courage, and leadership. Entered service from Missouri.

Cpl John F. Otruba, 38094244, FA, United States Army. During the period from 10 - 24 July 1944 near * * *, France, Cpl Otruba's Battalion forward observer was pinned down by heavy enemy fire. Disregarding the enemy fire, which was cutting limbs from the tree over his head Cpl Otruba worked himself forward, took over the observer's duties and delivered fire on the enemy. They destroyed two houses, an enemy pill box and silenced small arms fire in the area. Again on 10 July at about 1400, Cpl Otruba in disregard of his own safety worked to a position of advantage under enemy fire and successfully adjusted Artillery fire on the enemy position until it was silenced. Entered service from Texas.

Cpl Arnold H. Standeford, 38147019, FA, United States Army. On 10 July 1944 near * * *, France, for laying and maintaining an important wire line from his unit to a supported unit and on his own initiative, laying a duplicate line when he realized it would be difficult to maintain the original line due to heavy enemy fire in the area. This was of material assistance in maintaining the position. Entered service from Oklahoma.

Tec 5 Calvin G. Reed, 38098540, FA, United States Army. Tec 5 Calvin G. Reed on the 12th and 13th August 1944 was a member of a wire team that completed and maintained wire between one of the Battalions and Division Artillery under constant enemy bombardment. Entered service from Texas.

The enemy fire became exceptionally heavy resulting in a number of casualties. Brigadier General Devine personally directed the defenses, moving about under small arms and tank fire in the moonlight. His calmness under fire and gallantry in action were a reassuring influence to the personnel, the action of which was material to turning back the enemy force and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. 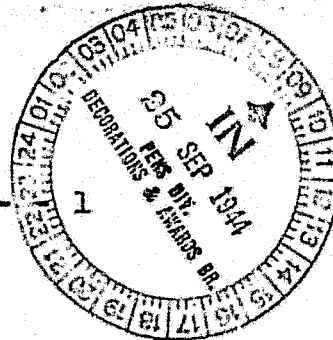

I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third United States Army, current series, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

LT COL HARALD S. SUNDT, 018774, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 16 August 1944 in the vicinity of **, France during a very difficult engagement in which Infantry forces, which his battalion was supporting, had captured the town of ** and were twice driven out, Lt Col Sundt, without regard for his own personal safety, showed exceptional diligence in reconnoitering gun positions to best destroy enemy tanks. At one critical action, he personally manned a tank destroyer gun direct into the path of an enemy attack greatly assisting in the stopping of the enemy attack and the re-capture of the town. This gallant act under enemy fire was an inspiration to both the Infantry and tank destroyer personnel and facilitated in closing the gap at ** and the destruction of the enemy force. Entered service from New Mexico

1ST LT WILLIAM R. MATHEWS, 0500490, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 18-19-20 August 1944 in **, France Lt Mathews was flying his liaison plane during a critical operation when supported troops were attempting to cross **, in order to obtain deeper reconnaissance of the enemy movements. He flew forward of friendly lines although frequently fired on by enemy small arms and Anti-Aircraft weapons. At **, he silenced enemy machine guns which were holding up our lines by directing fire upon them; discovered an enemy column moving across country and destroyed 27 vehicles and many personnel forcing the remnants of the column to retreat into the woods. Near **, France, on 19 August he succeeded in destroying 21 vehicles although he was under fire from an enemy 20mm Anti-Aircraft gun which tore holes in the fabric of his plane. Continuing on his mission, he blew up one ammunition truck, 1 tank and 31 vehicles were left burning from the fire of the Artillery Battalion for which he was observing. On 20 August, he continued long hours of observation, directing the fire of 3 separate battalions of Artillery and destroying enemy columns and formations although on this date he came under Anti-Aircraft fire from an 88mm gun, which did considerable damage to his plane. In 3 days of flying he spent 35 hours in the air directing the fire of his own and attached Artillery battalions with great effect on the enemy. Entered service from Texas.

2D LT SOL BAUER, 01169857, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 6 July 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, when a large force of German paratroopers delivered a counterattack. Lt Bauer disregarding his own personal safety and under heavy enemy fire in an exposed OP adjusted and delivered such a volume of fire against the enemy that the attack was completely broken up and the attacking force completely dispersed. On 11 July 1944 when our troops were receiving heavy casualties near * * *, France, Lt Bauer being unable to locate a satisfactory OP in a concealed position, worked out into the open ground and remained in an exposed position under enemy fire for 2 hours despite the fact that many casualties were being suffered in his vicinity and members of his party became casualties. He remained in this OP adjusting fire on the enemy until he had accomplished his mission. These gallant acts were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from New Jersey.

2D LT FRANK M. BUCHANAN, 01187555 Field Artillery, United States Army. On 19 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * * and * * *, France, while his unit was supporting an Infantry battalion with the mission of closing a gap against the remnants of the 7th German Army attempting to escape through * * *, the enemy made several attempts to break through the position. When they had penetrated very close to his position, he remained at his OP although under heavy enemy fire, and brought down heavy Artillery fire on the armored column, destroying 3 trucks, and one armored vehicle, blocking the road and effectively preventing the escape of vehicles following. As other vehicles attempted to by-pass the position and to overrun the OP, Lt Buchanan moved back and forth along the position in order to keep constant observation on enemy movements. By continuous Artillery support the enemy was beaten from the field and in their attempt to withdraw he knocked out an additional 7 vehicles. Throughout the action, he displayed great coolness under fire greatly encouraging the troops he was supporting and enabling them to maintain their position, drive the enemy from the field and complete their destruction. Entered service from Florida.

2D LT PETER P. PERCIACCANTO, 01324736, Infantry, United States Army. On 6 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, when the company which he was supporting with heavy machine guns was struck by heavy enemy fire and pinned down, Lt Perciaccanto turned his machine gun platoon over to his second in command, crawled forward of friendly lines to within 15 yards of an enemy machine gun position and he attacked the Machine Gun throwing two hand grenades and knocking out the gun, thus facilitating the advance of the company. This gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from New York.

Tec 5 William W. Salo, 37170864, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 19 August 1944 in the vicinity of **, France, Tec 5 Salo was assigned to an OP blocking the German escape route and supporting an Infantry battalion across this route. The importance of this OP was extremely critical. The wire line was knocked out 6 times by enemy action and each time Tec 5 Salo went quickly back over the area under heavy enemy fire repairing the breaks and maintaining the communications. His calmness and courage, determination and aggressiveness, were responsible for the destruction of a large number of the enemy tanks and vehicles, which were heavily engaged in the vicinity and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Minnesota.

Pfc Thomas J. Grosse, 35601887, Infantry, then Pvt, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of **, France, when his company had forced their way into a town and were receiving machine gun fire from a hidden machine gun position, Pfc Grosse worked himself to a position where he discovered the enemy changing the location of the gun. An exchange of hand grenades resulted in two of the enemy being wounded. He then killed a third man of the enemy gun crew with his rifle and wounded a fourth preventing the enemy from moving their machine gun to a position which was enfilading the friendly force. His gallant act was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Ohio.

S Sgt William M. Lewis, 20811410, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 in the vicinity of **, France, Sgt Lewis as a member of a bazooka team knocked out a self-propelled 100mm enemy gun, wounding part of the crew and permitting the capture of the others. Entered service from Texas.

The enemy force was thereby taken by surprise, thrown into disorder and several were killed, wounded or captured, abandoning their vehicles, and the remaining were completely dispersed. Entered service from Texas

2D LT RUSSELL G. LANE, 01172132, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 10 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, his diligence and courage in staying at his OP, under fire, attempting to knock out an enemy field piece then shelling our lines showed great determination and devotion to duty. During this mission his determination to remain at his post despite shelling of the position resulted in Lt. Lane being severely wounded. His tenacity of purpose contributed materially to the success of the mission. Entered service from Ohio.

2D LT LEX E. O'BRIENT, JR, 01017420, Infantry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 near * * *, France, while commanding a light tank platoon in the leading column of a rapid advance during a critical operation, Lt O'Brient exhibited boldness, ingenuity and initiative when his tank was fired on and disabled by an enemy high velocity weapon. He dismounted from the tank and assisted in clearing out enemy machine gun positions thus facilitating the advance of the column. Entered service from North Carolina.

S Sgt Jake R. Parton, 37189194, Infantry, United States Army. On 8 August 1944 near * * *, France, his company was pinned down by heavy fire. Believing it to be friendly fire, as two forces were coming together from opposite directions, and disregarding his own safety he drove his vehicle into plain view where small arms fire was falling in the area. He then fired a volley in the air from his 50 caliber Machine Gun enabling the opposing force to recognize his unit as a friendly force and prevented further hazard as the troops closed in. Entered service from Iowa.

S Sgt James R. White, 37153703, Infantry, United States Army. On 1 July 1944 near * * *, France, Sgt White, while a member of a patrol in enemy held territory was painfully wounded by an anti-personnel mine. In spite of his wounds Sgt White carried one wounded comrade and aided another a distance of 500 yards back to our lines, went personally for aid men, and then went to his CP and reported the results of the patrol action before permitting himself to be treated and evacuated. Entered service from Oklahoma.

On 7 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, Tec 5 Doland drove his vehicle into an exposed position taking an enemy position under fire from which 10 enemy were killed and 4 captured, permitting the column which was following to continue its march on * * *, France. Entered service from Minnesota.

Tec 5 Andrew Hoffman, 38147264, Infantry, United States Army. During the period 6-10 August 1944 near * * *, France, Tec 5 Hoffman served as a driver of a liaison vehicle coming frequently under enemy fire in circumstances requiring quick decision and courageous action. On one occasion when the head of the column came under enemy fire, destroying several of the leading vehicles, and no other communications were available, Tec 5 Hoffman drove his vehicle through the shelled area, to obtain assistance from the Artillery which resulted in the destruction of the enemy guns. Entered service from Texas.

Pfc Miguel A. Booker, 39466904, Infantry, United States Army. On 27 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, his platoon was fired on by an enemy machine gun and were pinned down. When the grenades were thrown by the enemy Pfc Booker was wounded along with one other man. Disregarding his own wound, Pfc Booker stopped and assisted the wounded man to a place of safety. Entered service from Washington.

Pfc Amalio J. Rosati, 31276830, Infantry, United States Army. On 12 June 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, when his company was leading the attack on a village, Pfc Rosati was wounded in the foot. Notwithstanding his own painful wound, Pfc Rosati assisted in evacuating 3 wounded men from the area, although under heavy enemy Artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, before he left the field to have his own wounds treated. Entered service from Connecticut.

Pfc John E. Turner, 34314641, Infantry, United States Army. On 5 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, Pfc Turner crawled into a field in "No Man's Land", lighted by a burning tank and without cover, and assisting in evacuating a seriously wounded comrade although the area was under enemy machine gun fire. Entered service from North Carolina.





I. POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third United States Army, current series, the Silver Star is awarded posthumously to the following named Officer for gallantry in action in northern France:

1ST LT FLOYD I. CHAMBLISS, JR., 01321291, Infantry, United States Army. On 17 July 1944 near * * * France, while commanding a mortar platoon supporting an Infantry advance which came under heavy fire and was pinned to the ground, Lt Chambliss ran through enemy fire to direct the fire of the mortar platoon. Although wounded he continued to encourage and direct his platoon in such a manner that the enemy fire was neutralized and the supporting Infantry was able to reach its position. Despite his wounds, he continued on his mission until it was completed. His gallant action was an inspiration to his men and in keeping with the highest military traditions. Entered service from Georgia.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third United States Army, current series, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

1ST LT ROBERT B. SMITH, 01319557, Infantry, (then 2d Lt), United States Army. On 15 June 1944 near * *, France, when his platoon was ordered to attack a position defended by a strong enemy force, it came under heavy and accurate machine gun fire. Disregarding his own personal safety Lt Smith moved from position to position, urged his men forward and by his leadership assaulted the position and captured five prisoners, dispersing the remainder of the enemy garrison. He then rapidly reorganized his platoon and continued to his objective notwithstanding the appearance of enemy tanks. His gallant action permitted the advance of other troops and was an outstanding example to his men and in keeping with the highest military traditions. Entered service from Kansas.

1st Sgt. Herbert E. Woodward, 20112618, Infantry, United States Army. On 11 June 1944 near * France when his battalion was attacking a town, his platoon came under intense enemy Artillery fire and mortar fire and sustained many casualties. Sgt Woodward moved forward under enemy machine gun fire coming from a building. He threw a grenade into the building and when it failed to explode, he entered the building by a

window and was seriously wounded in the leg. Nevertheless, disregarding his wounds he continued on his mission killing the enemy gunner and putting the machine gun out of action. His gallant actions were in keeping with the highest military traditions. Entered service from Massachusetts.

Pfc Ferdinand B. Chapman, 54762527, Infantry, United States Army. On 7 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France when his company was given the mission of capturing a town and his platoon was pinned down by enemy machine gun fire, Pfc Chapman with complete disregard for his own safety exposed himself to enemy fire in order to take the enemy position under bazooka fire and succeeded in silencing the enemy machine guns. He then proceeded through the town knocking out another machine gun. In the operation he was wounded but despite his wounds, captured two enemy prisoners and returned them to the rear. Entered service from Georgia.

Pfc William E. Gove, 20111593, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 near * *, France, the command post of his battalion was attacked by two German Mark IV tanks and four half-tracks, which came under small arms and bazooka fire. The German force divided in order to encircle the position. Leaving his foxhole, Pvt Gove pursued one of the tanks and two half-tracks for approximately two hundred yards through an orchard, hitting a tank twice with the bazooka projectiles and so disabling it that its crew abandoned it and fled. During this time he was subjected to fire from the two half-tracks. His gallant actions were in keeping with the highest military traditions. Entered service from Massachusetts.

S Sgt Gerald P. Holdsworth, 35294929 (then Pfc) Infantry, United States Army. On 11 July 1944 near * * * France, when wire communications had been shot out and Artillery and mortar fire were falling in the area, Tec 5 Marr worked diligently over a long period of time locating and repairing the breaks. At other times he had shown the same consistent diligence and perseverance. Entered service from Nebraska.

Pfc Dale D. Dehne, 39707116, Infantry, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * * France, when enemy Infantry, riding on enemy tanks, advanced to within 100 yards of his position and opened fire, Pfc Dehne manned his machine gun and killed or wounded all the enemy Infantry, in view of which the tank was forced to withdraw later being destroyed by fire from an Antitank weapon. He was outstanding in the performance of his duty and showed exceptional devotion to his unit. Entered service from Texas.

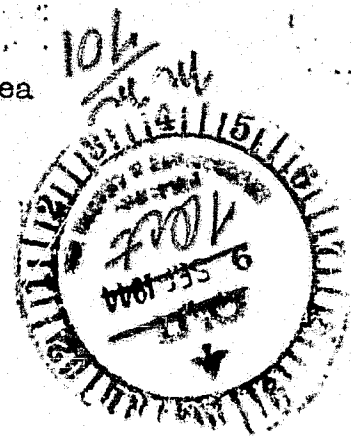

I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third United States Army, current series, the Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer and enlisted men for gallantry in action in northern France:

1ST LT THOMAS M. MICHAELS, 01823328, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, while on the mission of supervising the delivery of ammunition he encountered an enemy tank firing through an opening in a hedgerow. Although the area was under small arms fire, Lt Michaels worked his way into a position from which he was able to throw two hand grenades into the open turret and silence the tank. His coolness and gallantry displayed qualities of courage, aggressiveness and determination in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from New Jersey.

S Sgt Edward L. Gill, 33017597, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Sgt Gill's company encountered a force of approximately 100 enemy troops in a town, who immediately opened fire. An accompanying armored car was immediately disabled but notwithstanding this fact Sgt Gill ordered his armored car to by-pass the first and charge the enemy troops. While under small arms fire from the enemy position in the town, and disregarding his own personal safety, Sgt Gill stood up in the ring mount unprotected and manned the machine gun as the armored car advanced. This resulted in three of the enemy being killed, seven wounded, thirty captured and the remainder being dispersed. This gallant action on the part of Sgt Gill was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

Tec 5 Claude D. Deaton, 14067674, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 17 August 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Tec 5 Deaton was a driver of a tank destroyer which received word that two enemy tanks were located in the town in such a manner that to take them under fire would necessitate exposing his tank destroyer. Notwithstanding this fact Tec 5 Deaton drove the tank destroyer into a street and was immediately hit by two rounds from the enemy tanks. His gunner fired one round knocking out one of the tanks when his gun jammed. Tec 5 Deaton then, after the enemy fire had ignited his tank destroyer backed it into an alley and assisted in extinguishing the fire although his own clothing was on fire at the time. This gallant action on the part of Tec 5 Deaton was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Georgia.

Pfc Frank S. Signa, 34048053, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 18 August 1944 near * * France, when during an engagement with the enemy, the armored car of which Pfc Signa was a crew member, was hit and disabled, Pfc Signa immediately dismounted, joined the foot troops fighting on the ground, and under heavy enemy fire assisted in the capture of the town of * *. His conduct in joining and inspiring those around him in the advance displayed fine qualities of leadership and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered service from Mississippi.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR. Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular 6, Third United States Army, current series, the Bronze Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men for bravery in action in northern France:

LT COL FRANK G. SPIESS, 0266094, Field Artillery, United States Army. On 17 - 18 August 1944 near * * France, Lt Col Spiess displayed initiative, skill and foresight in making disposition of his unit when directed to take position to repel an enemy attack and for mobilizing and holding the pivotal position. He not only placed his weapons on line but marshalled as many men as possible in supporting his weapons with a ground force not otherwise available. His skill and coolness under fire were outstanding. Entered service from Louisiana.

1ST LT BENJAMIN W. PHILLIPS, 01168414, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 19 August 1944 near * * France, while his unit was supporting an Infantry Regiment and the objective of the Infantry Regiment had been taken, the enemy counterattacked with tanks and Infantry in force. Lt Phillips assisted materially in stopping the counterattack when he led his platoon by a brilliant maneuver into position and knocked out two Mark IV Tanks, one staff car and a machine gun position. Entered service from Pennsylvania.

2D LT CYRIL J. FURY, 0887587, Cavalry, (then S Sgt) United States Army. During the period 6 - 8 August 1944 while advancing on * * France and in particular from * * to * * Lt Fury's aggressive leadership in making rapid and accurate reconnaissance was outstanding. In particular near * * France, he led a foot patrol to discover the main position of the hostile force. While under fire he conducted himself always with coolness and displayed fine qualities of aggressive leadership. Entered service from Minnesota.

S Sgt Glen W. Chaney, 38094016, Corps of Engineers, United States Army. On 9 July 1944 in the vicinity of * * France, Sgt Chaney with the aid of two companions evacuated a wounded man, whom they learned was in a shelled area. On their own initiative, they drove a vehicle into the area, which was subjected to heavy Artillery, mortar and small arms fire, driving one-half mile down the road well in sight of the enemy in order to rescue the wounded man and bring him to a place of safety in the rear. Entered service from Texas.

Entered service from Washington.

Sgt Arnold E. Block, 36203300, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. On 20 August 1944 near * * France, in the face of three and one-half hours of fierce combat, as a member of a tank destroyer crew, Sgt Block assisted in destroying an armored column consisting of 118 vehicles and the capture of 229 prisoners. Entered service from Wisconsin.

Sgt Charles J. Eudenich, 20432741, * * Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army.
