II. BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER).-1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal awarded to Lieutenant Colonel OLIVIOUS C. MARTIN, Jr., as published in General Orders Number 15, Headquarters 94th Infantry Division, 27 January 1945, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster was awarded to him. The citation is as follows:

Lieutenant Colonel OLIVIOUS C. MARTIN, Jr., 0268400, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 2 January 1945 to 20 January 1945.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal awarded to Lieutenant Colonel BENJAMIN E. THURSTON, as published in General Orders No. 12, Headquarters 94th Infantry Division, 25 January 1945, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster was awarded to him. The citation is as follows:

Lieutenant Colonel BENJAMIN E. THURSTON, 016408, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 2 January 1945 to 20 January 1945.

AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Private First Class DONALD J. SAILORS, 17165122, Medical Department, 376th Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States on 9 October 1944 in France. Performing duties with the Battalion Surgeon he learned that a wounded comrade was lying helpless in a dangerously exposed area 75 yards away. Unhesitatingly and totally disregarding his own personal safety, he made his way across open ground covered by enemy automatic weapons fire and speedily evacuated the stricken soldier to the safety of a nearby orchard. After carrying the wounded man to this point, he applied immediate first aid and prepared him for return to the aid station by jeep. The unselfish courage, fearless action and supreme devotion to duty displayed by Private SAILOR were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from McCook, Nebraska.

Private First Class THOMAS S. MORIE, 34498893, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States on 19 January 1945 in Germany. During an enemy counter attack on a town in Germany he distinguished himself by killing two Germans who had advanced to within a few feet of his position. Completely disregarding his own personal safety he threw a hand grenade at the rapidly advancing enemy, knowing that the closeness of his position would endanger his own life. This daring action eliminated the attackers. Continuing his fearless action, he shot and killed a German lieutenant who was leading his men forward, thereby frustrating this attack. Then, concentrating on a bazooka position he poured a withering fire on this installation neutralizing the weapon which was about to open fire on Tank Destroyers nearby. The quick thinking, daring aggressiveness and utter disregard for personal safety displayed by Private MORIE were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Dandridge, Tennessee.

First Lieutenant MAURICE O. BOYD, 01047032, Coast Artillery Corps, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States on 14 December 1944 in France. Making a reconnaissance near the

front lines, on a road leading into Germany, he was attracted by the sound of small arms fire. Investigation disclosed an American officer pinned down by the fire of an enemy patrol. Acting immediately and without regard for personal safety and the fact that he was outnumbered by the enemy, Lieutenant BOYD quickly and deftly made his way around to the exposed flank of the patrol. Securing a vantage point, he opened an accurate and devastating fire, distracting and drawing the fire of the enemy. This momentary distraction allowed the officer heretofore pinned down to scramble to a better vantage point and team up with Lieutenant BOYD to deliver a withering cross fire upon the attacking forces. Stunned by this accurate and deadly cross fire the enemy patrol surrendered. His courageous and aggressive action not only saved the life of a fellow officer but was directly responsible for the ultimate capture of the entire patrol. His courage, aggressiveness and devotion to duty exemplified the highest traditions of the service. Entered the military service from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

First Lieutenant JOHN M. SIMMONS, O1299486, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France on 15 January 1945. Learning that a jeep was in danger of being completely destroyed by fire, caused by enemy strafing attack, he and his driver rushed to the scene, but were unsuccessful in extinguishing the blazing gasoline cans. Quickly dispatching his driver for fire fighting equipment, he remained at the scene and controlled the flames until the equipment arrived, and he extinguished the fire with a minimum of damage, then took the added precaution of concealing the vehicle from enemy observation. His quick action resulted in the saving of valuable United States property and, removed from the highway a potential target for enemy planes. Entered the military service from Indianapolis, Indiana.

Private First Class MARCO A. VALENTI, 32657438, Medical Department, 376th Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, on 9 October 1944. While performing duties with the Battalion Surgeon, he learned that fierce and overwhelming enemy fire had forced a combat patrol to withdraw from their positions, leaving three wounded soldiers behind them. Unhesitatingly, and with total disregard for his own personal safety, Private VALENTI and three litter bearers made their way across terrain covered by enemy automatic weapons fire and speedily evacuated their wounded comrades to the safety of an orchard. He applied immediate first aid to the men and prepared them for return to the aid station by jeep. The unselfish courage, fearless action and supreme devotion to duty displayed by Private VALENTI were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

SILVER STAR MEDAL - Awards I

I. SILVER STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

✓ Private First Class APO S. P. GREEN, 34576897, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 18 January 1945. Performing duties as ammunition bearer while advancing to a new position in Germany, his company was caught in an intense barrage of enemy artillery fire. Pinned down by the deadly bombardment, both of his companions were wounded, one mortally. With utter disdain for personal safety, he crawled 75 yards through this withering artillery and small arms fire to his wounded comrades and after administering first aid including tourniquets, dragged the men one at a time to a sheltered area away from the falling shells and then returned to his post. His deep concern for the welfare of his fellow soldiers and his disregard of his own personal safety, provided an example of inspiring heroism and was a credit to the highest traditions of the Army of the United States. Entered the military service from Canton, Georgia.

✓ Technician Fourth Grade HERMAN R. HEPPEL, 32598280, Medical Department, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany during the period 17 January 1945 to 19 January 1945. Performing duties as aid man, he worked unceasingly under the most trying conditions to keep the men in fit condition for battle. During certain operations, he was the only aid man available and although continually exposed to enemy fire, worked untiringly and relentlessly in caring for the wounded. Disregarding his own severe case of frost bitten feet and with the sole thought of comforting fellow soldiers, he courageously and unselfishly remained at his post throughout three days of snow, rain and bitter cold weather. On another occasion after enemy artillery fire inflicted four serious casualties in the company area, he hastened bravely to the aid of the men and immediately thereafter rushed them to an aid station. His heroic achievement in rescuing wounded comrades under enemy fire is in keeping with the highest traditions of the Medical Corps of the United States Army. Entered the military service from Union City, New Jersey.

II. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.-- By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-40, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Staff Sergeant CHARLES K. SCHWAB, 32659459, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 16 January 1945. Performing duties as Section Sergeant in a Mortar Platoon, it was necessary to move his section into position under a lethal hail of enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire. When a rifle platoon was pinned down by a devastating cross fire from two enemy machine guns, and heavy casualties were being sustained, he directed his section to deliver fire on the enemy installations. Despite the danger of his own position and in the face of concentrated enemy attacks, the unerring accuracy of his fire, at a range of over 300 yards, completely destroyed the enemy positions and permitted the platoon to advance and attain their objective. The ability and courageous leadership displayed by Sergeant SCHWAB was an inspiration to all and reflects great credit upon himself and the Army of the United States. Entered the military service from New York, New York.

Private First Class STEPHEN B. WOOD, 36862527, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 18 January 1945. While performing duties in a Mortar Squad he became aware that communication lines to forward positions had been severed by enemy artillery fire. Knowing the vital importance of these communications and fully aware of the dangerous task, he went forward in the face of an intense enemy artillery barrage and repaired the damaged lines. With communications restored, effective fire was concentrated on the enemy installations which forced the enemy to withdraw and frustrated a determined attack. The initiative, unwavering courage and heroic disregard for personal safety displayed by Private WOOD in this action is in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service. Entered the military service from New Troy, Michigan.

AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Private First Class MORITZ V. YOHE, 33493169, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 17 January 1945 to 19 January 1945. After the capture of a town in Germany, it became imperative to establish communications immediately with higher Headquarters. This line, which was constantly severed by German artillery fire, had to be run over exposed terrain. Realizing the importance of keeping communications open, he maintained communications for 3 days and nights without rest and while constantly exposed to enemy artillery and mortar fire. His calm courage, cool daring and devotion to duty was greatly instrumental in helping his unit complete its mission successfully; was an inspiration to his comrades and was in keeping with the highest tradition of the service. Entered the military service from York, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class CHARLIE W. WILLIAMS, 34830106, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 17 January 1945 to 19 January 1945. After the capture of a town in Germany, it was necessary to string communication lines over a long and hazardous route. Realizing the importance of this line to successful coordination of operations he worked tirelessly for 3 days and nights maintaining these vital communications. On many occasions and in full view of the enemy he would venture forth to repair broken lines completely oblivious of enemy artillery. His outstanding devotion to duty and disregard for personal safety was greatly instrumental in the successful completion of the mission. Entered the military service from Pogensville, Georgia.

Sergeant NICHOLAS POPARAD, (then Private First Class), 35594250, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 17 January 1945. During a savage enemy counter-attack against his machine gun position, Sergeant POPARAD was wounded by enemy artillery fire. Despite the excruciating pain caused by the wound and the danger of sustaining additional

injuries in his exposed position, he doggedly remained at his post and directed effective, devastating fire against the advancing enemy. Not until the attack was repulsed would he submit to medical treatment, and then, he immediately returned to his squad and was greatly instrumental in repulsing several later enemy thrusts. The undaunting courage, disregard for personal safety, and fearless devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant POPARAD was an inspiration to his comrades and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Canton, Ohio.

Technical Sergeant BUN R. McKEE, 34026434, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 17 January 1945. A German counter-attack threatened to retake a town held by our forces. Observing an attempted encircling maneuver by the enemy, with total disregard for personal safety he broke up this movement by bringing a concentrated fire upon the attacking forces. Still in an exposed position he manned a heavy machine gun and with a continuous and accurate fire, completely routed the attacking forces. His initiative, courage, and quick thinking were directly responsible for frustrating this attempted German counter-attack. Entered the military service from Ellenwood, Georgia.

Staff Sergeant WILLIAM E. BURTON, 33386443, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 18 January 1945. When his Section was pinned down under an incessant enemy artillery barrage and a comrade was seriously wounded by shrapnel, with utter disdain for personal safety, he crawled to the side of the stricken man and dragged him to the shelter of a nearby house. After administering first aid and despite the murderous shelling, he carried the man to a vehicle and returned him to the battalion aid station. His rapid and efficient action in the midst of the intense enemy bombardment and deep concern for the welfare of a wounded comrade are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Cambridge, Maryland.



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

BRONZE STAR MEDAL - Awards.....II

I. BRONZE STAR MEDAL - Posthumous awards. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was posthumously awarded to:

Private First Class JOSEPH E. TIGUE, 33611772, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 15 January 1945 to 17 January 1945. Working day and night, with utter disregard for personal safety and under incessant enemy artillery and mortar fire, he installed and maintained lines of communication for his unit. As the wires had to be run over terrain subjected to enemy shelling, repairs were continually required. While repairing one of these numerous breaks Private TIGUE was mortally wounded. His gallantry, aggressiveness and outstanding devotion to duty aided materially in repelling numerous enemy counter attacks and are in keeping with highest traditions of the Army of the United States. Next of Kin: Mrs Mary Tigue, (Mother) 1762 Wayne Avenue, Scranton, Pennsylvania.

Sergeant DONALD S. BALL, 33611578, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 15 January 1945 to 16 January 1945. After a German town had been captured, it was necessary to establish and maintain defensive positions on high ground outside the town. Under constant enemy observation and artillery fire, and with utter disregard for personal safety, he remained at his post courageously and effectively through long, endless hours, without rest, until mortally wounded by shrapnel. In occupying these positions, the loss of which would have been detrimental to the security of adjoining units, Sgt BALL displayed a tenacious devotion to duty which is in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Next of Kin: Mrs Edna Ball, (Mother) 26 Maple Avenue, Carbondale, Pennsylvania.

II. BRONZE STAR MEDAL. - By Direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Private First Class PEARL VERNER, 34499973, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in

connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 19 January 1945. When enemy forces attacked a house in which members of his squad were sleeping, Private VERNER promptly disposed of 3 members of the attacking forces who were about to enter the dwelling. Quickly changing position, he concentrated withering bursts of fire on an enemy machine gun, permitting other members of the squad to assume positions of advantage and repulse the attack. His complete disregard for personal safety and devotion to duty were directly responsible for frustrating an enemy counter attack composed of numerically superior forces and reflect the highest credit on himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Ducktown, Tennessee.

Private First Class LEONARD K. WILLIAMS, 37681997, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 15 January 1945. While attacking an enemy fortified town, the advance was temporarily halted when an enemy machine gun pinned down a platoon. Aware of this condition, Private WILLIAMS dashed across terrain covered by enemy fire, fearlessly attacked the position and killed or wounded the crew, thus permitting our troops to continue the attack. His fearless and unhesitant actions and disregard for personal safety were an inspiration to all and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Entered the military service from McIntyre, Iowa.

Private First Class JOSEPH DeMARTINO, 32933872, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 15 January 1945. 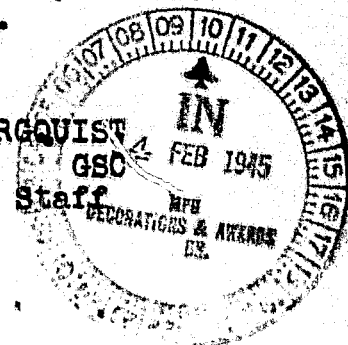

AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Staff Sergeant HOWARD M. HENDERSON, 6245904, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 15 January 1945. When his company captured a town in Germany, enemy forces by unrelenting artillery and small arms fire succeeded in severing our supply routes. After several attempts to secure rations and supplies proved futile, Sergeant HENDERSON, without hesitation, volunteered to lead a carrying party over 800 yards of open terrain, under constant enemy mortar and small arms fire. Carefully selecting his route, and on successive occasions, he brought his party through the hostile shellfire without sustaining casualties and secured the badly needed ammunition and supplies. 

When a wounded comrade lay helpless and was the object of relentless enemy sniper fire, courageously, and without hesitation, he dashed to the side of his stricken friend and although wounded himself succeeded in dragging him to a position of cover. When some of his men were badly shaken up by the continuous bombardment, with complete disregard for personal safety, he immediately assumed their duties. Wounded and exhausted from lack of sleep he persisted in his work until the mission was completed. His display of coolness under fire, regard for a wounded comrade and tireless devotion to duty reflect the highest credit on himself and the military service. 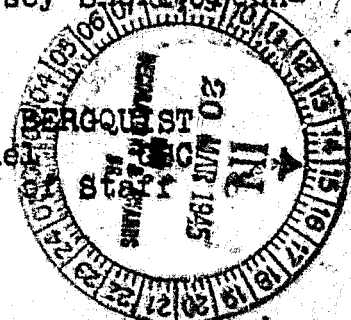



I. SILVER STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

First Lieutenant THOMAS A. DALY, O1318416, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action on 16 January 1945 and 19 January 1945 in Germany. When a 25 man enemy combat patrol penetrated our lines on 16 January 1945, Lieutenant DALY planned an ambush which routed the enemy and, in addition, with devastating fire from his machine pistol, personally killed one enemy captain, two first lieutenants and two second lieutenants. Again on the morning of 19 January 1945, an enemy patrol of 18 men, part of a numerically superior force attempting to retake our positions was repulsed when he jumped into a tank destroyer, personally manned the 50 calibre machine gun against the enemy attackers and directed 90 millimeter fire on the house which the Germans had occupied and were using as an observation post. His gallantry, aggressiveness and disregard for personal safety on this and many other occasions reflect the highest credit on himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Elmhurst, N. Y.

II. BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER). - By direction of the President under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal awarded to First Lieutenant THOMAS A. DALY, as published in General Orders Number 412, Headquarters 94th Infantry Division, 7 December 1944, a bronze Oak Leaf Cluster was awarded to him. The citation is as follows:

First Lieutenant THOMAS A. DALY, O1318416, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 15 January 1945. Performing duties as platoon leader, his and another platoon were ordered to take and hold a German town. Nearing the objective he noticed that the platoon on his left flank had become separated during the advance. When an enemy machine gun fired upon his platoon, rather than lose the effect of supporting artillery, he quickly split his unit to attack both sides of the town.

as the advance progressed, another enemy machine gun wounded his right scout and subsequently pinned the squad down. His fearless action and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Elmhurst, N.Y.

AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Technician Fifth Grade RICHARD W. BOWMAN, 32624565, Medical Department, *** Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Belgium on 9 January 1945. While performing duties as Medical Aid Man, attached to an Airborne Unit, with utter disdain for personal safety and in the face of deadly and devastating enemy fire, he fearlessly went to the aid of a wounded comrade. Crawling three hundred yards through snow and mud under intense fire he rendered first aid to the stricken soldier and then dragged him back to a position of comparative safety. The entire route was covered by enemy small arms, artillery and tank fire, but, thinking only of the wounded man, he succeeded in removing him from the danger area. His gallantry, concern for the welfare of a fellow soldier and outstanding devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

Sergeant HOWARD E. HUGHES, 6911751, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in Germany on 21 January 1945. After establishing his forward observer's post the position was suddenly brought under terrific enemy artillery and machine gun fire. When it became so intense the infantry platoon he was supporting withdrew to new positions Sergeant HUGHES gallantly elected to remain in place and continued to deliver devastating artillery fire covering the withdrawal of the unit. After the platoon had established a new position, Sergeant HUGHES and his radio operator, under a lethal hail of small arms fire, crawled to the newly organized position. His conspicuous courage and profound devotion to duty reflect great credit on himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Columbia, South Carolina.

Staff Sergeant LEONARD E. SEITH, 16155769, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in France on 13 November 1944. When his platoon leader became a casualty Sergeant SEITH, himself painfully wounded in the chest and hand, gallantly went to the rescue of the wounded officer. With complete disregard for personal safety, he dragged the stricken officer along the ground approximately 100 yards through an area covered by incessant enemy small arms and artillery fire. After



By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Soldat First Class JOSEPH CADO, French Forces of the Interior, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations 25 October 1944 in Brittany, France. He and four other members of the French Forces of the Interior were manning a machine gun at a forward Observation Post when a heavy concentration of enemy artillery fell on the position. When the bombardment had ceased, an enemy combat patrol of approximately 100 men attacked the position and in the ensuing action a machine gunner was killed and another wounded. Soldat First Class CADO immediately manned the gun and was wounded. Despite his wounds he continued to fire on the advancing patrol accounting for two known enemy dead and wounded forty-seven others. The attack lasted for three hours and with utter disregard for personal safety, declining medical aid, remained at his post, fearlessly exposing himself to direct his comrades defending the position. Only after the enemy had been routed would he submit to medical aid and then immediately returned to duty at his post in the line. His fearless action and devotion to duty in the face of enemy fire reflect highest credit upon himself and the military service.

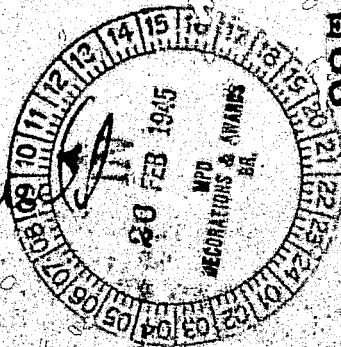

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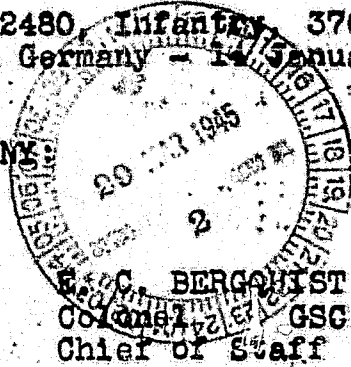

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

Entered the military service from Beloit, Wisconsin.

First Lieutenant ROBERT E. Subsequent to the capture of two German towns, the enemy employed such an intense barrage of artillery, rocket, and mortar fire, that it was necessary to bring supplies forward by carrying parties. Under cover of darkness, although the enemy had excellent observation of his position, Lieutenant FOSTER organized several carrying parties as combat patrols, personally led them over the treacherous route and procured rations and ammunition. Without hesitation he made several trips, still under constant fire, until satisfied that sufficient supplies had been obtained. His disregard for personal safety and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Des Moines, Iowa.

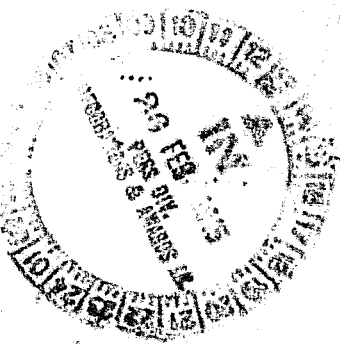

His conspicuous leadership and devotion to duty were an endless source of inspiration to the men of his command and represent the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Reatha V. Miller (Wife), 115 Montague Avenue, Winchester, Virginia.

Staff Sergeant FRED HARDING, 37338875, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 26 January 1945. During an advance against a strongly defended position his squad was pinned down by intense fire from two enemy machine guns and approximately twenty enemy riflemen, strongly entrenched in an orchard. With utter disdain for personal safety, he led his squad in a bold assault across 300 yards of open terrain against the positions. In the ensuing action the squad destroyed both enemy machine gun nests, killed 23 Germans and captured 3. In this fierce action the gallant sergeant was mortally wounded. His courageous leadership, determination to destroy the enemy, and conspicuous heroism, exemplify the finest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Helen Harding, (Wife), 3293 Kersley Lake Boulevard, Flint, Michigan.

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

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

Throughout this period these men existed on seven cans of "C" rations and crusts of bread taken from Germans they had killed. On the seventh day advancing troops were contacted and under intense enemy fire the platoon withdrew from their position. During the seven day period they killed or wounded some 150 enemy troops and kept the enemy in constant confusion as to the true location of our lines. Their action relieved enemy pressure upon the town occupied by our forces. The gallantry, courageous determination and devotion to duty, many times displayed by each member of this group, are an inspiration to all and exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Rupert, West Virginia.



At the dawn of morning of 20 January 1945 this unit was completely cut off from friendly troops and entirely surrounded by the enemy. Without communication facilities, in full view of the enemy and continually subjected to severe artillery, mortar and small arms fire, the group held its position, dug a perimeter defense and inflicted heavy losses on the enemy forces attempting to dislodge them. For seven days this group tenaciously defended their position in spite of lack of food, bitter cold and snow. Throughout this period these men existed on seven cans of "C" rations and crusts of bread taken from Germans they had killed. On the seventh day advancing troops were contacted and under intense enemy fire the platoon withdrew from their position. During the seven day period they killed or wounded some 150 enemy troops and kept the enemy in constant confusion as to the true location of our lines. Their action relieved enemy pressure upon the town occupied by our forces. The gallantry, courageous determination and devotion to duty, many times displayed by each member of this group, are an inspiration to all and exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. 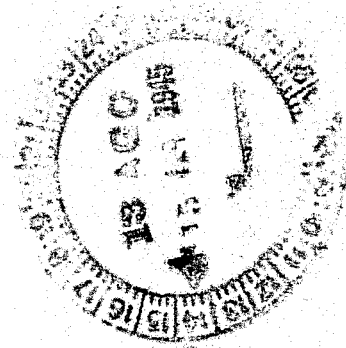

I. SILVER STAR MEDAL.-- Posthumous awards.-- By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was posthumously awarded to:

Private First Class CLAIR HUNEYCUTT, 38279845, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 16 January 1945. Private HUNEYCUTT was a rifleman of an Infantry platoon making an attack on enemy pillboxes and entrenched positions. In his eagerness to close with the enemy, and despite intense enemy machine gun fire, Private HUNEYCUTT advanced well in front of the platoon, where he was mortally wounded by fire from three enemy machine gun nests, the prompt disclosure of which saved the lives of many members of the platoon. Even on the threshold of death Private HUNEYCUTT continued to display gallantry and contempt for the enemy. As he sank to his knees, this intrepid soldier continued firing at the enemy and fell in glorious death. Next of kin: Mrs. Dora M. Huneycutt, (Wife), Box 162, Route 2, Gainesville, Texas.

Technician Fifth Grade WILLIAM L. CLEARY, 35524864, Medical Department, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 16 January 1945. During an assault against enemy pillboxes, Technician CLEARY was serving as medical aid man attached to an assault platoon. As the platoon crossed a road in face of intense machine gun fire, three members were wounded. With complete disregard for his own safety, Technician CLEARY crossed the road, and despite withering machine gun fire, administered first aid to the wounded until he himself received a mortal wound. His unselfish courage, exemplary heroism and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Erma Cleary (Mother), 3220 Saratoga Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio.

II. SILVER STAR MEDAL.-- By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Technician Fifth Grade FURMAN B. McCOY, 34593478, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 26 January 1945 to 30 January 1945. Under intense enemy artillery barrages and accurate small arms fire, he repeatedly repaired broken communications lines. Although suffering from a severe case of frost-bitten feet, he tenaciously remained on duty, refusing to be evacuated until the operation had been completed, and all lines were kept open. His fortitude, cour-

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

While his platoon was pinned down by a numerically superior enemy, he spotted a force of 15 Germans maneuvering to make an attack from the rear. Acting quickly, and under a rain of enemy machine gun and rifle fire, he dashed into an unoccupied house, set up a position, and immediately engaged the forces attacking from the rear. He killed seven, wounded three and routed the others. His gallant aggressiveness, unstinted courage and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. ✓ Private First Class WERNER G. KRONCKE, 42033403, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 26 January 1945. When his platoon sergeant was wounded in an attack on an enemy machine gun emplacement, Private KRONCKE, under heavy fire, with utter disdain for personal safety, dashed to the side of the stricken soldier and dragged him to a position of safety. In the ensuing action, he charged an enemy pillbox and maneuvered to a position where he could fire on the occupants. Knowing the futility of attacking the installation with a rifle, he boldly exposed himself, demanded and received the surrender of sixteen Germans. His gallantry and outstanding devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the Army of the United States. Entered the military service from New York, New York.

✓ Sergeant ANTHONY S. RAO, 31423452, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 23 January 1945. When a wounded comrade was cut off from his platoon by enemy machine gun and small arms fire, Sergeant RAO, without hesitation, and in the face of murderous fire, fought his way to the side of the stricken soldier and assisted him to a sheltered position. In the fierce engagement which ensued he killed four of the enemy and took two prisoners. His inspiring heroism and deep concern for the welfare and safety of his fellow soldier are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Gloucester, Massachusetts.

✓ First Lieutenant HARRY J. LEWIS, 0539814, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 26 January 1945, 27 January 1945 and on 28 January 1945. When his platoon was pinned down, just short of its first objective, Lieutenant LEWIS, with utter disregard for personal safety, arose, ordered his men to follow, and gallantly led them over 1500 yards of heavily mined terrain, under intense artillery, mortar, rocket, and small arms fire, to their objective. Although wounded in this action he refused to be evacuated. During subsequent fighting, the gallantry

Despite the fact that every precaution was taken, his fellow officer was severely wounded when he stepped on a snow covered mine. After rendering first aid, Lieutenant CALLAWAY secured medical aid men and led them through the mine field to the stricken officer. His deep concern for the welfare of his fellow officer and heroic devotion to duty under fire reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Kansas City, Missouri.

✓ Second Lieutenant ROBERT J. LEONARD, 01012286, Cavalry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945. In an attack on a town in Germany, the leading tank destroyer struck a mine and was disabled. Without hesitation, Lieutenant LEONARD volunteered to reconnoiter a route to the town through fields which were known to contain enemy mines. Disregarding enemy artillery and mortar fire, he set about this task, moving cautiously over a field which was covered by a recent snowfall. Despite the fact that he exercised every precaution, Lieutenant LEONARD was severely wounded when he stepped on a snow-hidden mine. His daring actions and complete disregard for personal safety reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Canton, New York.

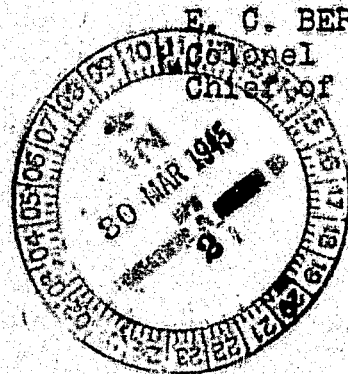



During an attack on enemy positions Sergeant FUSON'S squad protected the left flank of his unit. When the enemy supported by two static machine guns attempted to surround his platoon, Sergeant FUSON fearlessly led his squad against an enemy machine gun squad and destroyed it relieving pressure on the remainder of the company. After setting up defense positions he controlled his men with such confidence and efficiency that all enemy counter attacks were repulsed and no casualties sustained. 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

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Staff Sergeant DONNIS E. FIELDS, 20444616, Field Artillery, *** Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 15 December 1944.

First Lieutenant RALPH T. BROWN, 0354104, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 27 January 1945 to 29 January 1945. Disregarding his own personal safety, and while suffering from frost bite, Lieutenant BROWN braved devastating enemy fire to inspect his front line positions day and night to inspire and encourage his men who were defending under extremely adverse climatical conditions. By his conspicuous courage and determination he led his company in repulsing numerous enemy patrols and counter attacks. Lieutenant BROWN'S indomitable spirit, leadership in battle and concern for his men reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Cairo, Georgia.

Private First Class FRED W. STUBBS, 35879758, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 16 January 1945. During an attack on enemy pillboxes and entrenched positions, Private STUBBS was painfully wounded. Completely ignoring his wounds and displaying an indomitable spirit, he was with the leading elements of the platoon when they stormed the fortification which resulted in the capture of two pillboxes, 58 prisoners, and 30 enemy killed. 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

SCHAEFER, JR., 16025335, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945. When the Infantry assault company to which his artillery forward observation section was attached captured a German town, the command post was set up in a building which sheltered 18 American wounded soldiers. In the ensuing action, enemy troops set fire to the building and as the flames spread German small arms and artillery ammunition, stored in the building, began exploding. Ordering a German prisoner of war to assist, Corporal SCHAEFER, with another member of his section, with utter disregard for personal safety and despite intense enemy shelling, removed all the wounded personnel from the burning building to another place of shelter. When an enemy counter-attack reached a point within 40 yards of his aid station, Captain LADDEN steadfastly refused to move to the rear. Disregarding incessant artillery, mortar, rocket and small arms fire he continued to administer to the wounded. On one occasion an enemy tank fired a shell point-blank through the wall; enemy machine guns and small arms denied him the use of one section of the aid station; a grenade was tossed into the building and exploded. Despite this and the fact that all windows were shattered and the upper stories of the house were destroyed by enemy artillery Captain LADDEN continued with his work until wounded by flying shrapnel. His disregard for personal safety, heroic determination, and deep concern for the welfare of others are in keeping with the highest traditions of the Medical Corps and the military service. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class LeROY J. AYERS, 16156891, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 23 January 1945. While resting at a Battalion Aid Station prior to his return to duty, enemy artillery and mortars pounded the area, severely wounding two Infantrymen. Disregarding advice that the two Infantrymen could not have possibly survived the intense barrage and with shells falling all around him, Private AYERS went to their aid. Finding one alive, he carried him to the Aid Station. Several hours later, braving concentrated artillery and mortar fire, he assisted an aid man in bringing two more wounded soldiers to safety. The heroism of Private AYERS in rescuing wounded comrades under fierce enemy fire, is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

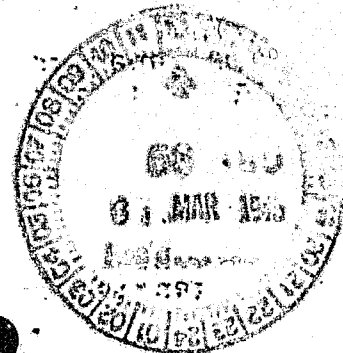

I. SILVER STAR MEDAL - Posthumous award. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was posthumously awarded to:

Private First Class PAUL G. SCARBOROUGH, 34891628, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 18 January 1945. Private SCARBOROUGH was a member of an 18 man patrol which had been sent to obtain badly needed ammunition and rations for their company, which had taken and had been defending a German town against numerous enemy counter attacks for four days. As the patrol approached the town from which they were to procure the supplies, the town was subjected to intense shelling by enemy rockets. The patrol took cover in shell holes and ditches during the barrage. Upon cessation of the rocket barrage the patrol arose to continue on their mission, but was immediately pinned down by automatic weapons fire from an enemy patrol. As speed was essential in getting the needed supplies to the company, Private SCARBOROUGH volunteered to act as a scout and make a run for it, the patrol to cover him and knock out the enemy patrol. The plan succeeded. The enemy patrol was routed, but Private SCARBOROUGH fell mortally wounded. Private SCARBOROUGH'S courage and gallant determination exemplify the highest traditions of the military service for which he gave his life. Next of kin: Mrs. Paul S. Scarborough, (Wife), 716 Ashboro Street, Greensboro, North Carolina.

II. SILVER STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Sergeant MICHAEL P. BAJZIK, 35593169, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 26 January 1945. Learning that several wounded men were lying in the middle of a mine field and could not be reached because the area was mined, Sergeant BAJZIK fearlessly went to their rescue. Knowing the mines were non-metallic and aware that his detector equipment would not operate effectively, he courageously entered the mine field making footprints in the snow for medical aid men to follow. Wounded by fragments when an artillery shell exploded nearby, he did not divulge this fact until a route had been cleared and the men removed to safety. Sergeant BAJZIK'S courage and aggressive concern for the welfare of others reflect credit upon himself and the Army of the United States. Entered the military service from Canton, Ohio.

Staff Sergeant ANTHONY B. EWASKO, 33457256, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action. Sergeant EWASKO, a squad leader of an Infantry company, repeatedly demonstrated the heroism and courageous leadership that distinguish him as an outstanding soldier. On 20 January 1945, during action in GERMANY, this intrepid soldier, on five separate occasions, with utter disregard for enemy artillery, rocket, machine gun and small arms fire, led his men in determined attacks, inflicting heavy losses upon the enemy, until it was necessary to evacuate him for wounds. Sergeant EWASKO'S audacious determination and fearless, inspirational leadership exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Scranton, Pennsylvania.

Chaplain (Captain) WILLIAM F. STEINMEIER, 0545254, Corps of Chaplains, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 26 January 1945. When an assault Infantry company ran into an enemy mine field, many casualties were sustained. Learning that litters, litter-bearers and aid men were urgently needed to evacuate wounded, Chaplain STEINMEIER promptly improvised litters and organized aid teams. With complete disregard for personal safety and despite intense enemy artillery, machine gun and small arms fire, the Chaplain led the way to the stricken men. Lacking sufficient medical personnel, he administered first aid and remained in the danger area until all were evacuated. The initiative, courage, and aggressive concern for the welfare of comrades-in-arms, displayed by Chaplain STEINMEIER reflect great credit on himself and the Corps of Chaplains. Entered the military service from St. Louis, Missouri.

Sec Lieutenant SYLVESTER M. BEYER, 02006442, Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 27 January 1945. The attacking Infantry company, with which Lieutenant BEYER was assigned as artillery forward observer, was pinned down by intense enemy artillery and mortar fire while crossing an open field. Perceiving the situation, Lieutenant BEYER decided to push home the attack. Encouraging the men, he stood upright, assumed command, and led the attack through the enemy barrage. In the ensuing battle when the advance of supporting tanks was delayed by an enemy anti-tank gun firing from a pillbox, Lieutenant BEYER placed a captured German 88mm gun in position, laid, loaded, and fired direct fire at the pillbox and silenced the enemy anti-tank gun, permitting our tanks to advance. The aggressive leadership, intrepid courage and total disregard for personal safety displayed by Lieutenant BEYER are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Entered the military service from Wheaton, Illinois.

Seriously wounded while attacking numerically superior enemy forces in house to house fighting, Lieutenant SIMURO refused medical attention and courageously continued to lead his platoon. In taking their objective, the platoon captured 21 enemy and killed 30. Direct fire from enemy tanks caused heavy casualties, and Lieutenant SIMURO was again wounded. When the building became untenable, it was necessary to take up new positions, the Lieutenant was the last man to leave and on reaching friendly troops again refused medical treatment until all wounded had been cared for. Lieutenant SIMURO's gallantry, inspiring leadership, and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the service and reflect great credit on himself and the military service. Captain JAMES R. HORNER, 0453718, Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 6 January 1945 to 15 January 1945.

Private RAY J. HEFELE, 20746237, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 15 January 1945 to 19 January 1945.

Corporal ALFRED L. HAUGEN, 3755486, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 18 January 1945 to 19 January 1945.

Private First Class ABRAHAM O. BLITFIELD, 32655191, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 19 January 1945 to 24 January 1945. While serving with a liaison communications team he repeatedly exposed himself to enemy mortar and machine gun fire in order to repair vital communication lines that had been severed. Working in a position extremely vulnerable to enemy artillery fire, he also maintained radio contact between our forces, directing devastating artillery fire upon the enemy, which, in one instance, materially assisted in the complete route of an enemy attempt to encircle our troops with armor and infantry. His bravery under fire, determination and unswerving devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

Staff Sergeant CHESTER W. RONDEAU, 3265477, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 18 January 1945. During a savage enemy counter attack against company positions the attacking forces concentrated on the area held by the squad led by Sergeant RONDEAU. Calmly and effectively, Sergeant RONDEAU deployed his men under the heavy enemy tank fire and by his dauntless courage and outstanding leadership inspired his men in battle. When severely wounded by a point-blank shot from an enemy tank he valiantly continued to fight and to encourage his men until evacuated. His complete disregard for personal safety and supreme devotion to duty reflect high credit upon himself and the Army of the United States. Entered the military service from Ausable Forks, New York.

Technical Sergeant FRANK F. TRAISTER, 20651852, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. When three of his comrades were wounded by enemy artillery fire Sergeant TRAISTER, with complete disregard for his own safety, under intense artillery and mortar fire he carried the wounded men to a point of safety. While doing so he received a shrapnel wound but steadfastly refused medical evacuation. Sergeant TRAISTER'S courage, determination, and unselfish concern for his comrades are worthy of great praise and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from La Crosse, Wisconsin.

Staff Sergeant DANIEL PASH, 36627213, (then Private First Class), Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. During an attack against enemy positions it became necessary to cross a deep tank-trap before entering a wooded area where the enemy was in position. Private PASH, a BAR man attached to a squad, was one of the first to cross the tank-trap. As supporting artillery fire lifted, enemy machine gun fire raked the attacking forces. In full view of the enemy Private PASH placed deadly fire on enemy positions pinning them down and permitting the squad to advance. He continued to cover the advance of the squad which destroyed a log-bunker and captured six German prisoners. His daring actions, courage and disregard for personal safety reflect high credit upon himself and the Army of the United States. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

Staff Sergeant DOUGLAS E. BISHOP, 34517351, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. During an enemy counter attack he suffered a painful shrapnel wound which required prompt medical care. After receiving first aid he immediately returned to his squad and led them in repulsing the attacking forces. Ignoring the intense pain caused by the wound he continuously exposed himself to enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire to encourage and inspire his men throughout the action. Sergeant BISHOP'S disregard for personal safety, courageous determination and devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Greer, South Carolina.

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AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the president, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Technician Fourth Grade GEORGE H. TIETZE, 32597586, Medical Department, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 22 January 1945. Serving in the capacity of driver for a litter squad, evacuating casualties from the field of combat in Germany, Technician TIETZE established his litter loading post dangerously near the enemy line to facilitate more expeditious evacuation of wounded men. After having notified the litter squad of his location, he spent the intervening time, until the load of casualties was made up, with fearless disregard for personal safety, under an incessant hail of enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire, administering first aid to a number of wounded men. During the performance of these first aid measures, Technician TIETZE was wounded by a shell fragment. Despite his painful wound, he remained, with heroic determination, at his task of evacuating other wounded soldiers, before submitting to personal first aid. Technician TIETZE'S unselfish courage, and supreme devotion to duty, although painfully wounded at the time of performance of his duties, are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from East Orange, New Jersey.

Sergeant CHARLES HAZEL, 33259043, (then Private First Class), Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 23 January 1945. In the absence of the section leader of his light machine gun section, Sergeant HAZEL took command of the section, directing all activities throughout his company's initial attack upon enemy installations. During the early stages of the assault, his section was cut off and pinned down by a heavy volume of small arms and automatic weapons fire set up by a superior enemy force. One man of his section was mortally wounded in the intense action, but, if it had not been for Sergeant HAZEL'S courageous move in springing into the midst of enemy fire, firing his light machine gun from the hip as he advanced, pinning the enemy down, more of his men would have been killed. His heroic action cleared the way for the men of his section and gave them a fighting chance to rejoin their company for reorganization. Covering the entire action, Sergeant HAZEL left his precarious position only after he saw that all of his men had safely cleared the area. His inspiring leadership, fearless courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Altoona, Pennsylvania.

Technician Fifth Grade ANDREW URAM, 16012065, (then Private First Class), Medical Department, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operation against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 25 January 1945. Seeing that a soldier had fallen, severely wounded by enemy sniper fire, across and up the street toward an enemy position approximately 75 yards, Technician URAM elected to attempt to rescue the man, although, by so doing, his every move endangered his own life. Waiting patiently until a lull in the firing occurred, he dashed across the street; worked his way to the wounded man, from the cover of one building to the next; picked the man up quickly but gently; and, complying with every means of safety precaution available to his

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knowledge, carried the stricken man back safely to the Aid Station. Technician URAM'S heroic achievement in rescuing a wounded comrade under enemy sniper fire, is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from River Rouge, Michigan.

Private First Class WILLIAM O. ERWIN, 36888798, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 23 January 1945. When all means of communication between forward attacking platoons and the supporting mortar section were disrupted by heavy enemy mortar and artillery fire, Private ERWIN, runner for the mortar section, with no thought for personal safety, valiantly braved the concentration of enemy fire to make the necessary repairs. Although constantly besieged by intense enemy artillery and hampered by snow, he worked fearlessly on, repairing and maintaining connections between units. Private ERWIN'S valorous, efficient work, while exposed to adverse conditions of snow and hazardous enemy artillery and mortar fire, served materially in the successful completion of the attack. His heroic accomplishment, without regard for personal safety, is in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Entered the military service from Detroit, Michigan.

Technician Fifth Grade MEYER ZELKIND, 32497426, Medical Department, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. During an eight day assault, directed by his unit, against enemy installations in Germany, Technician ZELKIND distinguished himself heroically by repeated performances of duties as an aid man, under adverse conditions of weather and hostile fire. On the night of 20 January 1945, making his way to the side of a wounded man, through cold flurries of snow and under constant danger of deadly enemy small arms and artillery fire, he administered immediate first aid. Completing the task of treating the man's wounds, Technician ZELKIND dragged him to a point several yards away, from which he could be carried with a minimum of danger from enemy fire, to an aid station. Technician ZELKIND'S heroic achievement, while exposed to heavy enemy fire and cold flurries of snow, with no thought of personal safety, reflects highly commendable credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Bronx, New York.

Technical Sergeant DAVID A. LORD, 32666340, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. On the morning of 20 January 1945, the unit, with which Sergeant LORD'S platoon was operating in an attack upon enemy fortified positions in Germany, under incessant hostile mortar and artillery fire, captured and destroyed its objective. As the assault team, of which Sergeant LORD was a member, withdrew to prepare for an attack upon another objective, one of the men of the team was wounded by mortar fire, disabling him to such an extent that he could not continue without assistance. Disregarding the hazardous hail of mortar and artillery fire all about him, with thoughts only of the welfare of his wounded comrade, Sergeant LORD carried the stricken man to a place of comparative safety. Sergeant LORD'S unselfish courage and exemplary heroism in rescuing his friend are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Troy, New York.

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Sergeant LAVERN D. SINCLAIR, 37327453, (then Private First Class), Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 27 January 1945 to 28 January 1945. Being the only bazooka man left in his unit, after withstanding 36 hours of devastating enemy small arms and artillery fire, Sergeant SINCLAIR, now moving in a unit greatly understrength, boldly attacked two enemy tanks to clear the way for the successful completion of his unit's attack upon a German town. In the first instance, three German heavy tanks charged upon the company, firing light and heavy machine guns as they approached. As the rest of the company withdrew to seek cover, Sergeant SINCLAIR remaining in a forward position, fired one bazooka round and set the tank on fire, thus causing the remaining two tanks to abandon their proposed assault. On the following day, after an enemy tank, cleverly concealed in a haystack, had disabled a tank supporting the company attack and inflicted heavy casualties, Sergeant SINCLAIR maneuvered to a position within range of the enemy tank and, with one well aimed round from his bazooka setting the haystack on fire, silenced the enemy tank. His heroic accomplishments, without regard for personal safety, uphold the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from St Paul, Minnesota.

Private First Class ALONZO M. GRAY, 35643270, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 2 February 1945. While exposed to incessant enemy mortar and artillery fire, Private GRAY, serving as a member of a carrying party conveying high explosives for the demolition of captured enemy pill-boxes, made nine hazardous trips to fulfill his assigned mission. On each return trip to the ammunition dump, he worked with voluntary initiative in aiding and evacuating the wounded. Private GRAY'S heroic work, without regard for personal safety, upholds the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Huntington, West Virginia.

Private JAMES R. THOMPSON, 34584148, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operation against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 2 February 1945. When all other members of the carrying party to which he was originally attached became casualties under intense enemy mortar and artillery fire. Private THOMPSON, with voluntary initiative, joined another party to continue his work of conveying high explosives for the demolition of enemy pill-boxes. On the completion of his work with the carrying party, he volunteered, with fearless disregard for personal safety, to evacuate the wounded from the field of enemy fire. Private THOMPSON'S heroic accomplishments of conveying explosives and evacuating wounded are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Tutton, Alabama.

Private First Class LESLIE H. KENEIPP, Jr., 32654388, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 2 February 1945. Following his unit's capture of a wooded area in Germany, Private KENEIPP, serving as a member of a carrying party, conveyed high explosives for the demolition of enemy pill-boxes, for a period of 10 hours under extremely heavy concentrations of enemy mortar and artillery fire. On each return trip to the ammunition dump, he worked with voluntary initiative in aiding and evacuating the wounded. Private KENEIPP'S heroic work, without regard for personal safety, upholds the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Harding Park, New York.

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Private First Class TADMAGE R. WILSON, 34535789, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. With enemy forces dug in on three sides of his platoon, leaving an open area of 1000 yards, covered by enemy artillery and mortar fire, as the only means of escape, Private WILSON'S platoon was virtually isolated from all contact with the battalion. Undaunted by two previous unsuccessful attempts to establish contact, he joined a third volunteer patrol which forged through successfully, though the course was beset by incessant enemy fire and hampering snowdrifts. Private WILSON'S valiant courage and voluntary initiative reflect high credit on himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Long Beach, Mississippi.

First Lieutenant JOSEPH H. KLUTSCH, Jr., 01289922, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 26 January 1945. While leading his platoon in an attack upon German objectives, Lieutenant KLUTSCH was severely injured when he stepped on a German mine. Seeing that medical aid men were approaching, he ordered them to remain beyond the dangers of the mine field. Undaunted by his painful injury, he continued to shout decisive instructions and inspiring encouragement to his platoon. After the last of his platoon had forged fiercely ahead in the assault, Lieutenant KLUTSCH, coaching another wounded soldier clear of the mines as he went, crawled from the mine field to the aid men who were standing by to administer first aid to his wounds and evacuate him. Lieutenant KLUTSCH'S inspiring leadership, fearless courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

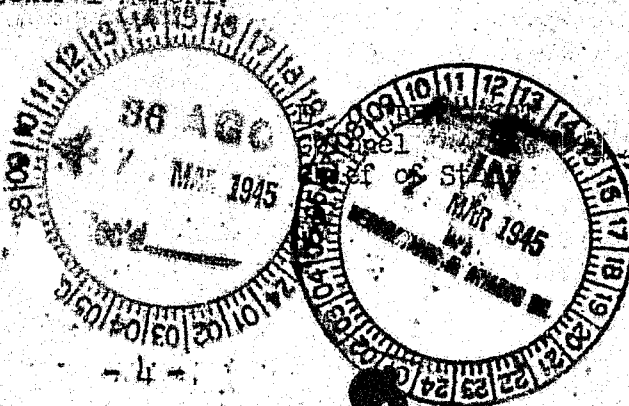
Private First Class LOUIS MORRIS, 33472857, Medical Department, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945. While serving as Surgical Technician advancing with attacking Infantry units on a German town, Private MORRIS'S attention was attracted to one of the advance party who had been severely wounded by fragments of a German mine. Although the man lay in a field pounded by heavy concentrations of enemy small arms and artillery fire, Private MORRIS, with no thought for personal safety, applied immediate first aid; and, in a crouched position, dragged the wounded man approximately 100 yards to the comparative safety of a nearby building. After attending to the immediate needs of the stricken man, he carried the responsibility of treatment of all wounded until more medical men arrived. His heroic achievement in rescuing and treating the wounded reflects highly commendable credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

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I. BRONZE STAR MEDAL - Posthumous award. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was posthumously awarded to:

Private DONALD E. PAULSON, 36285443, Field Artillery, ~~36285443~~ Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945. Private PAULSON, while serving as radio operator with a forward observation post, found it necessary to move to a better position. The new site was strategically important to the operation, but located on a ridge covered by enemy fire. Despite the great danger involved, Private PAULSON worked his way forward to the new location without hesitation. In the resulting action, he lost his life. Private PAULSON'S vallant courage, and heroic devotion to duty, exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Alice Paulson, (Mother); Dorchester, Wisconsin.

Captain EDWIN S. DAVIS, 0387997, Field Artillery, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945. Captain DAVIS, commander of an artillery battery, with voluntary initiative and total disregard for personal safety, preparatory to performing duties as relief forward observer, reported to the vicinity of his observation post on the morning of 27 January 1945. The position required that he and his radio operator take a location on an exposed ridge in the midst of enemy artillery and mortar fire. Fully aware of the dangers involved, but realizing the exigency of covering the flank to the rear of the main effort of the division, which was thinly held by the Infantry, Captain DAVIS, with his radio operator, occupied and improved the exposed observation post in this vital spot until mortally wounded by enemy artillery fire. His fearless courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Alvild T. Davis, (Wife); 207 Fairview Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey.

II. BRONZE STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

First Lieutenant FREDERIC D. BAERTSCH, 01171444, Field Artillery, United States Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 29 January 1945 to 30 January 1945.

Technician Fifth Grade ALBERT E. EVANS, 32812083, Ordnance Department, ~~32812083~~ Ordnance (LM) Company, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France from 10 September 1944 to 8 February 1945.

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Technician Fifth Grade MAJOR L. TODD, 34517115, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 19 January 1945 to 23 January 1945. Throughout a fierce German counter-attack, Technician TODD remained on duty as radioman with a forward observation section. During the action he not only operated his radio efficiently, but fought as an infantryman as well, killing a German who got as far as his fox-hole. Later, Technician TODD was wounded in the hand by shrapnel. Despite the handicap of the bandaged hand he continued his work for two more days, and also repaired communication lines. His valiant courage, and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Entered the military service from Honea path, South Carolina.

Private First Class HENRY F. AUBIN, 32666434, Corps of Engineers, *** Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 19 January 1945. Although confronted by the problem of transporting a supply of mines from the rear source of supply to forward positions over a road subjected to constant enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire, Private AUBIN braved the dangers of the situation to make five trips. His trips were not without mishap. On several occasions he was forced to leave his vehicle and take cover from the intensity of the hostile fire, and, on one particular occasion, the concussion of an exploding shell knocked him from his vehicle. Fortunately, Private AUBIN suffered no more than a rough shaking up, so, on recovering from the sudden jolt, he caught the vehicle, which was continuing slowly down the road. Two other soldiers nearby were not so lucky, being wounded by fragments of the shell. Loading the wounded men into the vehicle, he took them, as he had several other wounded men on previous return trips, to the aid station. Private AUBIN'S courageous determination, disregarding personal safety, and devotion to duty in supplying his unit with the necessary mines and in evacuating wounded men on his return trips are exemplary of the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Ausable Fork, New York.

Technician Fifth Grade RAYMOND G. SIMPSON, 39225791, Corps of Engineers, *** Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 30 January 1945. As the patrol, with which Technician SIMPSON was operating on the night of 30 January 1945, was approaching the edge of a wooded area in Germany, a withering cross fire of small arms pinned the patrol down, wounding several members of the patrol in the sudden onslaught of enemy fire. Attracted by the moans of a wounded comrade a few yards ahead, Technician SIMPSON crawled, with fearless disregard for personal safety, to administer immediate aid for the stricken man's wounds. Waiting until the firing had subsided, he attempted to carry his wounded friend back to an aid station, but was caught in a grazing fire which inflicted severe wounds in both of his legs. Technician SIMPSON'S unselfish courage and exemplary heroism in attempting to get his comrade to an aid station for medical care are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Los Angeles, California.

Technician Fifth Grade PAUL E. SAEGER, 35593935, (then Private First Class), Corps of Engineers, *** Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 17 January 1945. Attacking an enemy concrete observation post and pillbox, Private SAEGER'S assault team was brought under an intense artillery and mortar barrage. Carrying 60 pounds of explosive and in full view of the enemy, he and a companion charged the pillbox, applied the charge and destroyed the installation, killing the occupants. The coolness, heroism, skill and devotion to duty displayed by Private SAEGER reflect high credit upon himself, his unit and the military service. Entered the military service from Canton, Ohio.

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Staff Sergeant GROVER D. MASON, 35594¹¹, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 18 January 1945. During an intense enemy artillery barrage, Sergeant MASON received painful shrapnel wounds in the legs. Ignoring his wounds he dashed to the side of three stricken comrades, making three trips under enemy observation and fire, and carried them over 100 yards to the safety of a sheltered bunker. After taking up new positions, he refused medical treatment, until the other wounded men had been cared for. Sergeant MASON'S heroic actions and regard for the welfare of his comrades are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from New Philadelphia, Ohio.

Private First Class FLOYD V. HARRISON, 34498714, (then Private), Corps of Engineers, ~~444~~ Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 17 January 1945. Attacking an enemy concrete observation post and pillbox, Private HARRISON'S assault team was brought under an intense artillery and mortar barrage. Carrying 60 pounds of explosive and in full view of the enemy, he and a companion charged the pillbox, applied the charge and destroyed the installation, killing the occupants. The coolness, heroism, skill and great devotion to duty displayed by Private HARRISON reflect high credit upon himself, his unit and the armed forces. Entered the military Service from Knoxville, Tennessee.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal was awarded to:

Private First Class JUNIOR L. FACEMIRE, 35745496, Corps of Engineers, *** Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 14 January 1945 to 23 January 1945. Aware that the advance of Infantry Units was halted by intense enemy automatic and small arms fire, Private FACEMIRE and another soldier maneuvered to a flanking position and killed three of the enemy, permitting the Infantry to move forward. On another occasion, during an assault on a pillbox, despite enemy automatic weapons, mortar and artillery fire, Private FACEMIRE, assisted by a comrade, boldly approached the pillbox and set off a charge which killed 30 of the enemy. Seven remaining Germans were taken prisoners. Private FACEMIRE'S heroic accomplishments, with total disregard for personal safety, were an inspiration to his comrades and a credit to himself. Entered the military service from Sutton, West Virginia.

Staff Sergeant ENOCH WRIGHT, 34583970, (then Sergeant), Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 23 January 1945. When a supporting tank was knocked out and set afire in an attack on enemy positions, Sergeant WRIGHT and a comrade, despite intense enemy fire, dashed to the burning tank, directed five members of the crew to safety, and then carried the wounded tank commander out of the danger area. Sergeant WRIGHT'S heroic accomplishment in rescuing a wounded officer, under threatening enemy fire, is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Carbon Hill, Alabama.

Private First Class KENNETH L. HESS, 13146223, (then Private), Corps of Engineers, *** Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 14 January 1945 to 23 January 1945. Aware that the advance of Infantry Units was halted by intense enemy automatic and small arms fire, Private HESS and another soldier maneuvered to a flanking position and killed three of the enemy, permitting the Infantry to move forward. On another occasion, during an assault on a pillbox, despite enemy automatic weapons, mortar and artillery fire, Private HESS, assisted by a comrade, boldly approached the pillbox and set off a charge which killed 30 of the enemy. Seven remaining Germans were taken prisoners. Private HESS'S heroic accomplishments, with total disregard for personal safety, were an inspiration to his comrades and a credit to himself. Entered the military service from Indiana, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class WALLACE M. GALLANT, 11122799, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 23 January 1945. When a supporting tank was knocked out and set afire in an attack on enemy positions, Private GALLANT and a comrade, despite intense enemy fire, dashed to the burning tank, directed five members of the crew to safety, and then carried the wounded tank commander out of the danger area. Private GALLANT'S heroic

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accomplishment in rescuing a wounded officer, under threatening enemy fire, is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Steep Falls, Maine.

First Lieutenant JOSEPH E. GLOVER, 0430957, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 1 February 1945. Returning from enemy territory with his reconnaissance patrol, the unit was attacked by enemy forces and one member was seriously wounded. Ordering the rest of the patrol to withdraw, and, ignoring enemy small arms fire, Lieutenant GLOVER remained with the stricken man for 2½ hours, until he succumbed to his wounds. Lieutenant GLOVER'S indomitable courage and regard for the welfare for his men was an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Entered the military service from Huntington, West Virginia.

Staff Sergeant EDWARD J. CASEY, 32659339, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. With enemy forces dug in on three sides of his platoon, leaving an open area of 1000 yards, covered by enemy artillery and mortar fire, as the only means of escape, Sergeant CASEY'S platoon was virtually isolated from all contact with the battalion. Undaunted by two previous unsuccessful attempts to establish contact, he joined a third volunteer patrol which forged through successfully, though the route was covered by incessant enemy fire and hampering snowdrifts. Sergeant CASEY'S valiant courage and voluntary initiative reflect high credit on himself and the military service. Entered the military service from New Rochelle, New York.

First Lieutenant JOHN R. TRAVERS, 01299145, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945. With enemy forces dug in on three sides of his platoon, leaving an open area of 1000 yards, covered by enemy artillery and mortar fire, as the only means of escape, Lieutenant TRAVERS found his platoon virtually isolated from all contact with the battalion. Undaunted by two previous unsuccessful attempts to establish contact, he led a third volunteer patrol through successfully under incessant enemy fire and hampering snowdrifts. Lieutenant TRAVERS'S heroic disregard for personal safety, inspiring leadership and devotion to duty is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from St. Louis, Missouri.

Technical Sergeant HASKA L. ARMSTRONG, 35115186, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 28 January 1945. After our troops had captured a German town, the retreating enemy set up a machine gun at a strategic position on a hill overlooking the town. Aware that three members of his platoon were isolated and in danger of being cut off by infiltrating enemy troops, Sergeant ARMSTRONG with utter disregard for the enemy machine gun fire, dashed to their assistance. Quickly appraising the situation, he killed one of the enemy, attempting to infiltrate, causing the others to flee in complete disorder. His heroic action in the face of enemy fire reflect high credit upon himself, his unit and the military service. Entered the military service from Vanceburg, Kentucky.

Private First Class STEPHEN P. MIKULKA, 32112724, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 20 January 1945.

Entered the military service from Long Island, New York.

Corporal GORDON A. KARBON, 36285606, Field Artillery, 488th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945, prior to a combined enemy tank and infantry counter-attack, an intense artillery barrage severed communication lines. Corporal KARBON, with no thought for personal safety, and ignoring the incessant enemy artillery made all necessary repairs, enabling friendly artillery to repel the enemy assault. Corporal KARBON'S heroic achievement and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the military service. Entered the military service from Manitowoc Rapids, Wisconsin.

Staff Sergeant NORMAN A. SOKA, 12194475, (then Sergeant), Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 18 January 1945. Sergeant SOKA led his squad across open terrain in an assault on an enemy occupied dwelling. Oblivious of the withering enemy automatic small arms fire, he dashed into the house and personally captured 15 of the enemy. Turning the prisoners over to a member of his squad, he thoroughly searched the house. Noticing smoke billowing from the cellar, Sergeant SOKA dashed down the steps and rescued a wounded comrade from a blazing inferno. Sergeant PATRICK E. KELLEY, 37355111, Field Artillery, 488th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 27 January 1945. Prior to a combined enemy tank and infantry counter-attack, an intense artillery barrage severed communication lines. Sergeant KELLEY, with no thought for personal safety, and ignoring the incessant enemy artillery made all necessary repairs, enabling friendly artillery to repel the enemy assault. Sergeant KELLEY'S heroic achievement and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the military service. Entered the military service from Pueblo, Colorado.

Sergeant BERNARD F. MOAN, 33896533, (then Private First Class), Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 10 February 1945. When the gunner and assistant gunner of a light machine gun were killed by direct fire from an attacking tank, Private MOAN took over the gun, and firing on an enemy tank at a distance of 50 yards forced it to 'button up'. His unhesitating action, and total disregard for personal safety, saved the lives of many of his comrades. Private MOAN'S bold, aggressive actions and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Baltimore, Maryland.

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

While leading a combat patrol in enemy territory, Private SOCKEY was well forward when he encountered a machine gun nest manned by 12 Germans. Quickly firing his B/R he killed 6 of the enemy. Calling on the remaining six to surrender, he was answered by a burst of machine gun fire. Firing only when the enemy was exposed, Private SOCKEY eliminated the entire crew. Heavy enemy artillery concentrations prevented him from destroying the weapon but information he furnished enabled friendly artillery to destroy the position. The conspicuous courage, loyalty and devotion to duty frequently displayed by Private SOCKEY reflect the highest credit upon himself, his unit and the military service. Entered the military service from Poteau, Oklahoma.

Staff Sergeant GEORGE F. O'CONNELL, 32679713, (then Private First Class), Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany from 22 January 1945 to 23 January 1945. While Private O'CONNELL and other members of his squad were emplacing an anti-tank gun, the squad leader was wounded. Realizing that the gun must go into firing position without delay, as enemy tanks were in the vicinity, he took command of the squad and, ignoring the intense barrage, set the gun into position. On another occasion, with voluntary initiative and no thought for personal safety, he carried ammunition and rations to machine gun positions, a distance of 200 yards, under intense enemy small arms and mortar fire. Private O'CONNELL'S inspiring leadership, fearless courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Yonkers, New York.

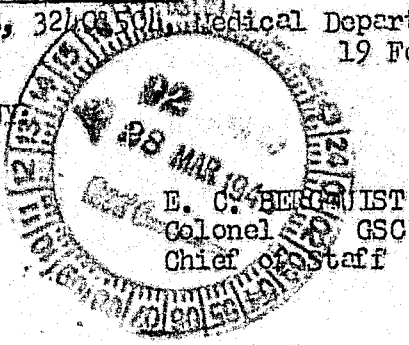

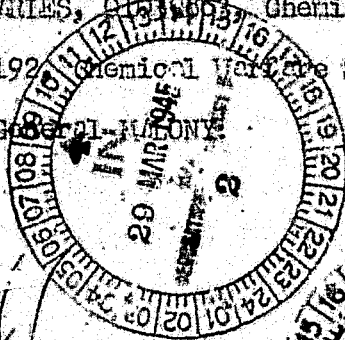

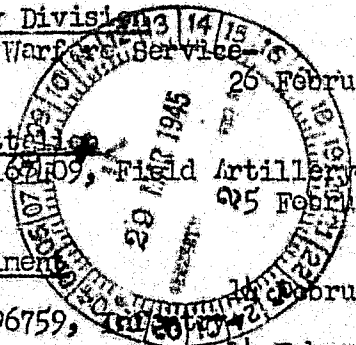

I. SILVER STAR MEDAL - Posthumous award. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was posthumously awarded to:

Staff Sergeant CHARLES J. ANDRUNAITES, 36014293, Field Artillery, Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 23 January 1945. During a night attack by numerically superior forces, one of Sergeant ANDRUNAITES' gun sections became dispersed when their positions were overrun by attacking enemy infantry. At daylight the following morning he succeeded in locating ten of the eleven missing men of the section, four of whom were casualties. Ignoring sniper and small arms fire, he evacuated the wounded to a position of relative safety. Continuing his search for the last man, he encountered an enemy machine gun position. Boldly dismounting a machine gun and firing as he charged forward, the courageous sergeant knocked out the enemy gun. It was while performing this act that Sergeant ANDRUNAITES was killed by sniper fire. His conspicuous gallantry and inspiring leadership are in keeping with the highest traditions of the Army of the United States. Next of kin: Mrs. Ann Andrunaites, Rural Route #2, Eric, Illinois.

Technical Sergeant FRANK A. O'HARA, 32230732, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 19 January 1945 to 25 January 1945. When enemy counter-attacks cut off his platoon from the company, Sergeant O'HARA fearlessly led the group through withering fire and re-established contact without sustaining casualties. During the ensuing assault upon a German town, he personally reconnoitered the terrain to determine the best avenue of approach and led his men against fortified positions. While covering the advance of his platoon from an exposed position, this gallant soldier was mortally wounded. Sergeant O'HARA'S courageous leadership and supreme devotion to duty reflect the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Miss Margaret O'Hara, (Sister), 217 Haven Street, New York, New York.

II. SILVER STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Private First Class EMMETT F. SCHULTE, 35349241, Medical Department, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 26 January 1945 to 28 January 1945. During a fierce attack on enemy positions, Private SCHULTE proved himself to be an outstanding soldier. When his company sustained heavy casualties and all other aid men were wounded and evacuated, Private SCHULTE, working tirelessly and with complete disregard for artillery, mortar, rocket and small arms fire, continued to render first aid to his stricken comrades.

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On another occasion, while fully exposed to enemy machine gun and sniper fire, he made six different trips over one hundred yards of open terrain to evacuate wounded. Despite the fact that, on one occasion, he was knocked unconscious by concussion, and later wounded by shrapnel, he refused to be evacuated and carried on until the operation was successfully completed. His gallantry and unselfish regard for the welfare of his comrades were an inspiration to all and exemplify the highest traditions of the United States Army. Entered the military service from Genoa, Ohio.

Sergeant CHARLES L. FRESLEY, 37401983, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 23 January 1945. While attacking a German town, direct fire from enemy tanks halted his company's advance. Picking up an abandoned rocket launcher, Sergeant FRESLEY, in the face of intense enemy machine gun and small arms fire, dashed to an exposed position and with three well aimed shots, knocked out the tank. As three members of the crew attempted to escape from the disabled tank, he killed them with his rifle. His fearless action caused the enemy to withdraw and permitted the advance to continue. The gallantry, aggressiveness and outstanding devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant FRESLEY exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from New York, New York.

Technical Sergeant EDWARD P. REGAN, 33385924, (then Staff Sergeant), Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 27 January 1945. In a coordinated attack, Sergeant REGAN'S squad was following friendly tanks into a German town when a concealed German 88mm gun knocked out the leading tank. As the gun was traversing to fire on a second tank, Sergeant REGAN, completely disregarding personal safety and in the face of intense fire, dashed to the tank. By banging his rifle on the side, he warned the crew of the imminent danger. Then, by skillful maneuvering, he directed the tank to a new position and adjusted fire which silenced the enemy gun. In the height of battle, when friendly tanks fired on troops in the town, the courageous Sergeant ran to the leading tank and pointed out enemy targets. His gallantry, aggressiveness and outstanding leadership are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Baltimore, Maryland.

I. SILVER STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Colonel EARLE A. JOHNSON, 08240, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 13 March 1945 to 21 March 1945. During this period Colonel JOHNSON led the pursuit of the Germans from the Ruwer River to the Rhine. Handicapped by lack of communications with the Division, and forced to make two changes of direction, Colonel JOHNSON remained with his forward elements and maintained complete control throughout the operation. He foresaw and handled every difficult situation confronting him and successfully maintained the impetus of his attack for a period of 10 days. As illustrative of his success, on one day his regiment moved 40 miles and captured 4,000 German Prisoners of War. The efficient planning, coordination, and supervision of execution by Colonel JOHNSON were outstanding throughout the action and constitute a fine testimonial of his inspiring troop-leading ability. Entered the military service from Virginia.

Staff Sergeant THEODORE F. PARSONS, Jr., 6147901, Infantry, *** Tank Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 19 February 1945 to 21 February 1945. During three days of aggressive attack upon enemy installations, Sergeant PARSONS spearheaded each drive with the unrelenting force of his tank. On one occasion he crossed mined areas and open terrain to destroy five pillboxes; account for 30 of the enemy dead; and effect the surrender of 75 others of the enemy forces. In another instance, when his tank guns jammed, he climbed out of the turret into full view of the enemy; killed two Germans with withering sub-machine gun fire; and effected the surrender of the remaining 12 Germans. Sergeant PARSONS' conspicuous courage, bold determination and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Boston, Massachusetts.

Staff Sergeant HENRY L. SIMPSON, 38020986, Infantry, *** Tank Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 February 1945. While performing duties as platoon leader in an attack upon a German town, Sergeant SIMPSON'S tank was disabled. Disregarding destructive enemy anti-tank fire, he remained in his tank, directing and supporting the moves of each of his tanks with deadly fire. On another occasion he dismounted in the face of withering enemy small arms fire, removed a jammed shell from his 75mm gun and continued leading the attack. Sergeant SIMPSON'S intrepid leadership, valiant courage and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Gage, Oklahoma.

AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-15, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Staff Sergeant EDWARD J. MACEJAK, 36627549, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 12 March 1945. While leading a Reconnaissance patrol, the group encountered intense hostile automatic weapons fire from positions which were thought to be lightly defended. Sergeant MACEJAK quickly formed a skirmish line and boldly advanced into the woods to flank the enemy installations. Fearlessly forging ahead of his men, he led a fierce assault that crushed position after position. During his daring attack upon the numerically superior force, 20 Germans were captured, eight killed and two machine guns destroyed. Sergeant MACEJAK'S conspicuous gallantry, superior leadership and devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class WALTHER P. MARKUS, 36286451, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 21 February 1945 to 28 February 1945. While assault troops were fighting to establish a beachhead, private MARKUS made three river crossings under enemy fire and directed German Prisoners of War in the evacuation of wounded. On another occasion, with a comrade, he entered a German town in advance of assault troops and ordered members of the German Army to surrender. Disarming the Captain in command, Private MARKUS kicked over two enemy machine guns and entering a church in which services were being held, directed the congregation to remain in the church throughout the operations. Private MARKUS, outstanding courage and voluntary initiative reflect the highest of credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Second Lieutenant STANLEY G. MASON, 0540222, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 10 February 1945. In a fierce attack on enemy positions, Lieutenant MASON was severely wounded. Ignoring the intense pain and incessant enemy fire, he courageously picked up a bazooka and fired six accurate rounds at an advancing tank. Weak from the loss of blood and finally forced to leave the field of battle. Before being evacuated, he insisted on reporting to the Battalion Command Post where he oriented the S-3 as to the progress of the operation. Lieutenant MASON'S tenacious determination to be with his troops was an inspiration to all and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Hartford, Connecticut.

Sergeant JOSEPH G. COSTANZO, 33473218, Corps of Engineers, Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 28 January 1945. When intense enemy fire from a stone barn pinned down friendly forces and halted the attack, Sergeant COSTANZO and a comrade, braving intense enemy fire, made three hazardous trips over exposed terrain to place a 300 pound charge against the building. The subsequent blast killed four Germans and was responsible for the surrender of forty-one others. As a result of Sergeant COSTANZO'S gallant actions, the advance continued and the objective was captured. His initiative and courageous devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Despite the intensity of hostile fire and the impending danger of exploding ammunition, private COLBURN seized a fire extinguisher and fearlessly attempted to extinguish the flames. Though wounded by shrapnel and suffering great pain, he heroically continued his task and succeeded in bringing the fire under control. Private COLBURN'S gallantry, initiative and supreme devotion to duty saved the lives of many of his comrades and prevented the destruction of valuable Government equipment. Entered the military service from Chatham, New Jersey.

Private First Class HOMER H. FREEZE, 34035590, Corps of Engineers, Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 28 January 1945. When intense enemy fire from a stone barn pinned down friendly forces and halted the attack, private FREEZE and a comrade, braving intense enemy fire, made three hazardous trips over exposed terrain to place a 300 pound charge against the building. The subsequent blast killed four Germans and was responsible for the surrender of forty-one others. As a result of private FREEZE'S gallant actions, the advance continued and the objective was captured. His initiative and courageous devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Mooresville, North Carolina.

Staff Sergeant ALDEN A. IVES, 31382521, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 January 1945. In an attack on enemy positions, intense machine gun fire pinned down his squad. Completely disregarding artillery and machine gun fire, Sergeant IVES led two men around the flank and attacked the machine gun position. When heavy machine gun and automatic weapons pinned down his platoon, Sergeant MAISTO decided on a frontal attack to eliminate the position. Jumping from his position of cover he charged the enemy position. Performing this heroic act, he was seriously wounded, but his courageous act permitted his platoon to overrun and capture the enemy positions. His conspicuous heroism, above and beyond the call of duty, and his inspiring, courageous leadership and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Jamestown, New York.

Technician Fifth Grade ROMAN W. ROMANIUK, 32659304, Medical Department, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 6 March 1945. When a tank had been hit by enemy fire, the occupants were trapped in the blazing inferno. Technician ROMANIUK without hesitation rushed to the tank, and ignoring intense artillery, small arms, and sniper fire, removed the wounded crew. Technician ROMANIUK aided in their evacuation to an aid station where he assisted the medical officer in rendering medical aid. Technician ROMANIUK'S gallantry and concern for the welfare of his comrades are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from New Rochelle, New York.

Technician SUMMERS without hesitation rushed to the tank, and ignoring intense artillery, small arms, and sniper fire, removed the wounded crew. Technician SUMMERS aided in their evacuation to an aid station where he assisted the medical officer in rendering medical aid. Technician SUMMERS'S gallantry and concern for the welfare of his comrades are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Thomasville, Missouri.

Private First Class JAMES J. BRADY, 33802471, Infantry, *** Tank Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 February 1945. When his tank was momentarily halted in the middle of a mine field Private BRADY saw an infantryman step on a mine and receive severe injuries. Ignoring incessant enemy mortar and small arms fire, he unhesitatingly jumped from the tank, ran to the side of the wounded man and rendered first aid. Technician Fifth Grade WILLIAM B. Private PILLESKEY was performing duties of litter bearer in an area heavily mined and covered by intense enemy artillery fire. With complete disregard for personal safety, he entered the mine field and evacuated a severely wounded soldier. Sergeant JOHN G. MITCHELL, 36411264, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 February 1945. When it became necessary to lay a mine field to safeguard his company's flank from an imminent enemy attack, Sergeant MITCHELL with complete disregard for personal safety and ignoring intense enemy fire, crawled over the exposed area and dug holes for the mines. Still under raking fire and direct enemy observation, he made seven trips



When informed that his forward troops were being attacked, Colonel WALLACH rushed into the midst of the raging battle and personally assumed command. Despite foggy weather and confusion of battle, he skillfully maneuvered his troops and undaunted by withering enemy fire captured 75 Germans and accounted for 40 enemy dead. As a result of his brilliant leadership only two slight casualties were sustained. Colonel WALLACH'S courage, boldness and brilliant leadership were an inspiration to his men and a vital factor in the successful frustration of the enemy assault. Entered the military service from Warrenton, Virginia.

Captain TOM G. GREENFIELD, O377191, Cavalry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 7 March 1945. Receiving information that the enemy had encircled a number of our troops, Captain GREENFIELD organized a patrol of two armored cars and went forward to investigate. In the lead vehicle, the courageous Captain drove through a lethal hail of enemy fire and contacted the commander of the surrounded troops. After obtaining a complete report of the situation, with complete disregard for enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire he again led a dash through the enemy positions and reported the plight of the isolated unit. His grim determination, alert leadership and courageous devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Phoenix, Arizona.

When incessant artillery and mortar fire rendered the only available supply route and means for the evacuation of wounded untenable, Technician BLAIR volunteered to make an attempt to get through with his half-track. Constantly under enemy fire, he made twenty trips evacuating seventy-five casualties and returned with vitally needed rations, medical supplies and ammunition for the attacking forces. Technician BLAIR'S fearlessness, his courage and enthusiasm and loyal, untiring devotion to duty were inspirational to his comrades and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Greensburg, Pennsylvania.

Technician Fifth Grade ALBERT H. CASE, 35689772, Medical Department, *** Medical Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 6 March 1945 to 8 March 1945. While evacuating wounded personnel, his ambulance was halted by enemy troops that had infiltrated behind our lines. Directed to a clump of woods by the enemy commander, Technician CASE and a comrade immediately built a dugout to care for the wounded. In the ensuing battle Technician CASE and his comrade, repeatedly and under intense artillery fire, carried wounded soldiers to their makeshift aid station and rendered first aid. When the enemy was forced to

Sergeant JOHN FREDEL, 36213580, Corps of Engineers, *** Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 January 1945. While leading his demolition squad against an enemy pillbox, Sergeant FREDEL noticed that the route of approach was mined. Unmindful of incessant artillery, mortar and small arms fire he courageously cleared a path to the pillbox. After setting off a charge, he led his squad in a fierce attack on the position and captured all of the occupants. Sergeant FREDEL'S aggressive, alert and courageous leadership reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Cicero, Illinois.





I. SILVER STAR MEDAL - Posthumous award. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was posthumously awarded to:

Staff Sergeant LEROY McPHERSON, 6664532, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 15 January 1945 to 17 January 1945. Occupying a vital ridge near a recently captured town, Sergeant McPHERSON'S machine gun section tenaciously held their position though incessantly pounded by enemy artillery and mortar fire. While at the platoon command post obtaining supplies, Sergeant McPHERSON received word that his section was being subjected to a concentrated enemy counterattack. Ignoring devastating enemy fire, he attempted to make his way back to his section. Before reaching the position the gallant sergeant fell, mortally wounded. He still shouted words of encouragement to his men and ordered them to hold their position at all costs. Sergeant McPHERSON'S exceptional courage, fearless determination and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Ailsa McPherson, (Mother), Huntsville, Kentucky.

Staff Sergeant MICHAEL WICHIC, 36612185, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 28 January 1945. Leading his squad in a fierce assault on a German town, Sergeant WICHIC charged the basement of an enemy occupied house and using grenades, captured the occupants. Dashing fearlessly across the street to a position of better observation, he directed fire on an enemy machine gun position, annihilated the enemy and knocked out the gun. During this intense action, the courageous Sergeant was mortally wounded. Sergeant WICHIC'S gallantry and courageous devotion to duty live on as an inspiration to all of his comrades. Next of kin: Miss Marie Zanich, (Sister), 666 Roscoe St, Chicago, Illinois.

Private CLIFFORD R. MACUMBER, 36834981, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 28 January 1945. When assault squads of his company were pinned down by devastating machine gun fire from a basement window, Private MACUMBER, completely disregarding personal safety, dashed to the house, threw a grenade at the position, caused the surrender of eleven enemy occupants and permitted the attack to continue. His gallantry, fearless devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Anna Macumber, (Mother), 2908A North 12th Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

II. SILVER STAR MEDAL - Missing in action. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

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(GO 93 Hq 94th Inf Div 12 Apr 45 Cont'd)

Sergeant JOHN F. PRUSACZYK, 31063582, Field Artillery, *** Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 8 February 1945. As gun commander of a tank destroyer, Sergeant PRUSACZYK, by outstanding leadership and against overwhelming odds repulsed numerous attacks by numerically superior enemy forces. Standing completely exposed in the turret of his tank, he directed devastating fire against the enemy and accounted for one tank destroyed and inflicted heavy casualties. When the attacking forces reached a point twenty yards from his destroyer and were using grenades, he ordered his men to make a run for it. The last to leave, he was seriously wounded. After his men carried him a distance of 100 yards, knowing he was impeding their withdrawal, the courageous sergeant ordered his men to go on without him. Sergeant PRUSACZYK'S unselfish courage, his heroic determination and loyal, untiring devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service. Entered the military service from Worcester, Massachusetts.

III. SILVER STAR MEDAL.- By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Captain CHARLES W. DONOVAN, 01290045, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 22 February 1945 to 25 February 1945. Captain DONOVAN led his company in the initial crossing of the Saar River and subsequent attack on a German town. Despite ceaseless artillery and mortar fire, on reaching the far shore, the courageous captain led a charge against enemy installations, capturing a pillbox and five houses. On another occasion while personally leading a four man patrol, they encountered a numerically superior enemy force. Immediately engaging the hostile group in a fierce fire fight, he maneuvered the enemy patrol into a pillbox and then forced the eleven occupants to surrender. Captain DONOVAN'S gallantry and outstanding leadership reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Merchantville, New Jersey.

Captain DONALD M. ASCHERMANN, 01171439, Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 22 February 1945 to 23 February 1945. Performing duties as Artillery Liaison Officer, Captain ASCHERMANN accompanied the assault wave of infantry in the crossing of the Saar River. When the swift flowing current caused the attacking forces to be landed at widely dispersed points, completely disregarding artillery, mortar and raking machine gun fire, Captain ASCHERMANN reorganized the troops and permitted the advance to continue. When an officer became a casualty, disregarding the terrific small arms fire, he dressed the wound and evacuated him. The conspicuous heroism of Captain ASCHERMANN repeatedly displayed and his courageous determination and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Denver, Colorado.

First Lieutenant LELAND A. MEYER, 01181693, Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 15 February 1945 to 16 February 1945. While performing duties as forward observer from the turret of a captured pillbox, Lieutenant MEYER directed devastating fire on the attacking forces. Four times direct enemy tank fire dislodged him from his position, but each time the courageous Lieutenant returned to continue his outstanding work. His accurate reports were responsible for the elimination of six enemy tanks. The conspicuous heroism Lieutenant MEYER repeatedly displayed and his courageous determination and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Sweet Springs, Missouri.

First Lieutenant HENRY J. FINK, 01324252, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 20 January 1945 to 24 January 1945. During a counterattack by numerically superior forces, the enemy succeeded in occupying a section of a recently captured town and in severing the only supply route. During the following four days, Lieutenant FINK distinguished himself on many occasions by his gallantry. He led combat patrols on numerous occasions to eliminate snipers. After making a personal reconnaissance, he led a platoon and in fierce action, relieved another platoon that had been cut off by the enemy. On three separate occasions he left his position of cover and completely ignoring intense artillery, mortar and sniper fire removed wounded to a position of cover. His gallantry, untiring devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

First Lieutenant SAMUEL G. NORQUIST, 0441267, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 27 January 1945. Limited vision was causing spearheading tanks to delay an Infantry attack upon a German town. With fearless disregard for intense enemy artillery, mortar and sniper fire, Lieutenant NORQUIST preceded the tank advance through the length of the town and pointed out the target upon which the tanks were to fire. Lieutenant NORQUIST'S voluntary initiative, valiant courage and loyal devotion to duty greatly facilitated the capture of the town and exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Yazoo City, Mississippi.

Staff Sergeant LOUIS F. LINEBURG, 37445943, Infantry, *** Ranger Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 December 1944. Given the mission of drawing fire in order to locate enemy positions, Sergeant LINEBURG while performing these duties, encountered an enemy eight man patrol. Without hesitation, he assaulted the group and with his rifle and grenades, eliminated the entire patrol. Information obtained by Sergeant LINEBURG materially aided the highly successful operation of his command the following morning. His gallantry, many times displayed and courageous devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Davenport, Iowa.

Technician Third Grade ERNEST A. SPENCER, Jr., 34789149, (then Private First Class), Medical Department, Special Troops, 94th Infantry Division, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 February 1945. During an intense enemy artillery and mortar barrage, Private SPENCER worked tirelessly applying first aid and caring for the wounded. Completely ignoring flying shrapnel and exploding land mines, he went from man to man, comforting and assisting them. When two of his fellow aid men became casualties he shouldered their responsibilities and carried on his merciful work. Technician SPENCER'S technical skill, gallantry and unswerving devotion to duty are worthy of great praise and exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Alachua, Florida.

Sergeant DUNCAN N. LEACH, Jr., 34517925, (then Corporal), Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 18 January 1945. While performing duties of assistant squad leader, Corporal LEACH manned a borrowed bazooka and, in the face of withering enemy machine gun fire, knocked out an enemy tank. Turning then to a second tank, he caused it to turn aside to become a better target for another bazooka team. As the crew members attempted to escape from the disabled tank, he cut them down with deadly rifle fire. Corporal LEACH'S valiant courage and inspiring aggressiveness exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Effingham, South Carolina.

Corporal DONALD W. KREGER, 33456653, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 15 January 1945. While forward units were fighting off a fierce German counterattack, Corporal KREGER voluntarily drove his jeep through intense enemy artillery, mortar and automatic weapons fire to supply them with urgently needed ammunition. On one occasion, he sighted a squad of German soldiers pinned down by grazing fire from a friendly machine gun and promptly disposed of five of them with withering rifle fire. Returning to his jeep, he transported many of his wounded comrades to the aid station. Corporal KREGER'S valiant courage, superior resourcefulness and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself. Entered the military service from Liberty, Pennsylvania.


Technician Fifth Grade BERNARD C. WHITEAKER, 36288426, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 23 February 1945. Performing duties as a motorcycle driver, when a volunteer was needed to make a crossing of the Saar River, Technician WHITEAKER unhesitatingly accepted the assignment. Loading his motorcycle and trailer of medical supplies on the craft, he made the treacherous crossing. Reaching the far shore, he hooked the trailer to the motorcycle and despite intense sniper fire, delivered the badly needed medical supplies to the front line units. Still under raking fire, he made five such trips and on each occasion returned with a casualty. When his motorcycle was shot out from under him, this courageous soldier pulled the trailer by hand and delivered the supplies. Technician WHITEAKER'S gallantry, valiant courage and loyal devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Lynxville, Wisconsin.

IV. SOLDIER'S MEDAL.— By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Soldier's Medal was awarded to:

Technician Fifth Grade EDWARD F. TAUBER, 37324991, Infantry, 301st Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy in France on 16 February 1945. Seeing the youngest of three small children slip and tumble into a swift moving stream, without hesitation, he plunged into the icy current and rescued the floundering child. On reaching the bank, he applied artificial respiration and revived the youngster. Technician TAUBER'S heroism without regard for personal safety reflects high credit upon himself and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Glenwood, Minnesota.

I. SILVER STAR MEDAL. - By direction of the President, under the provisions of Act 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

First Lieutenant FRANK A. PENN, 01030604, Cavalry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany from 20 February 1945 to 21 March 1945. During the initial stages of an assault upon a German town, Lieutenant PENN was wounded. Despite painful injuries and the intensity of enemy mortar and artillery fire, he boldly led his forces through a mined area to successfully storm and capture a heavily fortified castle overlooking the town. On another occasion when his leading elements encountered a defended road block, Lieutenant PENN led an attack upon the position with such fierce intent that the enemy forces were completely disorganized and 200 Germans were captured. Lieutenant PENN'S fierce aggressiveness, inspiring leadership and valiant courage are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Westfield, New Jersey.

Technical Sergeant JAMES W. LEE, 34451480, (then Private First Class), Infantry 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 February 1945. During an attack upon a heavily fortified enemy hill, Sergeant LEE'S platoon was pinned down by deadly hostile automatic weapons fire. Quickly perceiving the situation, he boldly maneuvered to a flanking position and knocked out an enemy machine gun. During his fierce attack upon the position, he accounted for three enemy dead and one captured. On another occasion while leading his squad in an attack upon a German artillery position, he captured an enemy 88mm gun intact and the entire crew. Sergeant LEE'S valiant courage, determined aggressiveness and superior leadership are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Benson, North Carolina.

Staff Sergeant JAMES C. HUGHES, 12227356, Infantry, 302d Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 February 1945. When hostile sniper fire caused his squad to falter during the initial stages of an attack upon a German town, Sergeant HUGHES charged fearlessly ahead and inspired his men to follow. Employing marching fire as he led his squad's advance through the town, he met and eliminated strong enemy opposition. On one occasion, he entered the second floor of a house by means of a ladder, killed two Germans with rifle fire and effected the capture of four others. The inspiring leadership, fearless courage and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant HUGHES exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Jamaica, New York.

Technician Fifth Grade MORRIS V. DOYLE, 36477428, Infantry, *** Ranger Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in France on 2 December 1944.

In a fierce attack on enemy installations, his M/R gunner was seriously wounded and forced to abandon his weapon. Knowing the necessity of retrieving the weapon, Technician DOYLE left his protected position in a cellar and with utter disdain for intense artillery, mortar and machine gun fire crawled two hundred yards over open terrain and recovered the vitally needed automatic rifle. In the counterattack that followed, devastating fire from the P.M. inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy and was highly instrumental in repulsing the attack. The conspicuous heroism Technician DOYLE repeatedly displayed reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Urbana, Illinois.

Private First Class JACK ZEBIN, 33811311, Infantry, 376th Infantry Regiment, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 18 January 1945. While performing duties as gunner of a bazooka team occupying a house in a recently captured town, Private ZEBIN'S position was counterattacked by German armored forces. With one well aimed bazooka round, he knocked out a German half-track. With complete disregard for personal safety, he raced to the opposite side of the house and, in the face of point blank tank fire, disabled two tanks. As the remaining six tanks turned to withdraw, he knocked out two more. Private ZEBIN'S valiant courage, aggressiveness and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class ABRAHAM C. BLITFIELD, 32655191, Field Artillery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action in Germany on 27 February 1945. While making a reconnaissance with his forward observer to find a location for their forward observation post, two enemy snipers pinned down his companion in an exposed area. With complete disregard for personal safety, Private BLITFIELD, standing up and fully exposed, diverted enemy fire while the observer dashed to a position of cover. Private BLITFIELD then wounded one of the attackers with deadly fire from his carbine and captured the other. His gallantry and fearless devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

II. SILVER STAR MEDAL - Revocation of award. - So much of General Orders Number 38, this headquarters, 1945, as pertains to award of Silver Star Medal to Staff Sergeant FRED GROSSI, 33403483, 376th Infantry Regiment is revoked.

III. PURPLE HEART - Revocation of award. - So much of General Orders Number 83, this headquarters, 1945, as pertains to award of Purple Heart to Staff Sergeant MYRON L. WAGNER, 16138620, is revoked. This award is republished as an Oak Leaf Cluster in Section IV of this order.
