WALTER C. KELLY, 36357539, Staff Sergeant, INF, Service Company, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 19 October 1944 to 18 April 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

MICHAEL J. PETRUS, 02009613, First Lieutenant, INF, Company K, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of Kerlingen, Germany. During an attack by Company K, First Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) PETRUS took charge of two platoons whose leaders had been wounded, and led them through dense fog and heavy artillery fire with conspicuous courage, audacity and skill. When an enemy machine gun held up one platoon, he and two others outflanked the gun and killed the gunner. Later, when lack of communications periled the company defensive position, First Lieutenant PETRUS reorganized the remnants of two platoons into a strong perimeter defense which later stopped a counter attack. His courageous actions and initiative reflect great credit on him and are in keeping with the highest military traditions. Entered military service from Illinois.

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Par. D, Sec. IV, Weekly Information Bulletin No. 38, Hq. Second Army, 22 September 1945, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following:

CARL L. DANIELSON, 37287579, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company H, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 18 October 1944 to 13 April 1945, at Metz, France. During the attack on Metz, France, the section leader of the 81mm mortar platoon was seriously wounded and evacuated. Staff Sergeant DANIELSON, then squad leader, immediately took charge and has done an excellent job in that capacity through all the campaigns in which the company has participated. During the same attack Staff Sergeant DANIELSON was also wounded, but remained at his post. In the attack on Saarlautern-Roden, Staff Sergeant DANIELSON went forward with the attacking elements of Company G riflemen as a forward observer and was subjected to heavy enemy fire. Many times he moved to exposed positions to better observe mortar fire and thereby layed down effective fire on the enemy. Entered military service from Minnesota.

EDWARD E. HALL, 35333099, First Sergeant, INF, Headquarters & Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 3 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lippebourg, Germany. Upon learning that an enemy Mark V tank had maneuvered into a position to seriously impair a planned river crossing of the 1st Battalion, First Sergeant HALL, in charge of a squad, unhesitatingly moved his 57mm anti-tank gun into position in clear view of the enemy tank so that it could be knocked out quickly. First Sergeant HALL, personally firing the gun, eliminated the enemy tank with eighteen rounds of ammunition, thus materially assisting the Battalion in making a successful river crossing the next morning with a minimum of casualties. Entered military service from Ohio.

CHARLES R. WESTPHAL, 36249018, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company D, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in North Lunen, Germany. Serving as Section Sergeant, Staff Sergeant WESTPHAL remained at his gun under extremely heavy enemy artillery and 82mm AA fire in order to deliver accurate fire on the enemy. An enemy counter attack was delayed by his heroic work. Additional rifle troops had moved up. His unselfish devotion to duty exemplifies the highest military traditions and reflects great credit on himself. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

HENRY S. SZWEDA, 36834790, Private First Class, INF, Company K, 378th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 5 April 1945, in the vicinity of Ost Tunnen, Germany. Private First Class SZWEDA voluntarily exposed himself to a heavy volume of enemy machine gun fire. The squad of which he was a member was attacking the outpost positions of the enemy lines when one of the scouts was seriously wounded and the squad pinned down. Private First Class SZWEDA without regard for his personal safety placed himself in an exposed position and held the enemy fire to a minimum with steady volume of fire from his M1 during which time the wounded soldier was evacuated to cover and the squad again was able to continue its attack and carry out its mission successfully. Private First Class SZWEDA'S daring and courage was directly responsible for the successful completion of the mission and his actions bring great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest military traditions. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

WILLIAM E. SHEWARD, 35224327, Technician Fourth Grade, MD, Medical Detachment, 378th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations, on 23 January 1945, in the vicinity of Frualautein, Germany. Technician Fourth Grade SHEWARD, while attached to Company E was advancing with the troops clearing the street and houses in Frualautein, Germany. Endeavoring to escape a sudden artillery barrage three of the men jumped over a wall and landed in a mine field seriously injuring themselves. Without thought of danger from the mines of the continuing barrage. Technician Fourth Grade SHEWARD went into the mine field, administered first aid, and evacuated all casualties. His courage and heroic devotion to duty reflect distinct credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

ROBERT R. SKALMOSKI, 16093280, Technical Sergeant, INF, Company D, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in the vicinity of North Lungen, Germany. Serving as platoon sergeant, Technical Sergeant SKALMOSKI reorganized his platoon while pinned down by enemy fire and led them to new positions behind the enemy from which he was able to inflict many casualties. Seeing the enemy in retreat, he directed artillery fire to inflict even more casualties. His courage and heroic devotion to duty reflect distinct credit on himself and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

WILLIAM C. SAMPSON, 33594483, Private First Class, INF, Company H, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarlautern, Germany. While acting in the capacity of assistant forward observer for an 81mm mortar platoon, Private First Class SAMPSON volunteered to go out under heavy enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire to repair the communication line running from the observation post to the gun positions one mile away which had been broken by artillery fire. In tracing the wire, he discovered the break and as he stopped to repair it, an artillery shell exploded and he was wounded in the thigh by shrapnel. Before he could allow himself to be evacuated, he made the necessary repairs. His actions enabled fire to continue and made possible the advance of our rifle troops. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

ROBERT B. PERKINS, 15105875, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 370th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarlautern-Roden, Germany. At approximately 0900 Private First Class PERKIN'S, a rifleman took charge of his squad when his squad leader was wounded by enemy fire. After two unsuccessful attempts to contact the balance of the company and secure medical attention for the wounded, Private First Class PERKIN'S ran 300 yards through enemy sniper and sporadic mortar fire to make contact with company medics in order to secure treatment for his wounded squad leader. This demonstration of courage and disregard for personal safety resulted in the rendering of proper medical attention to the wounded squad leader, and reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

JACK C. DIETRICH, 36463490, Technician Fifth Grade, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 9 November 1944, in the vicinity of Maizières-les-Metz. While Technician Fifth Grade DIETRICH'S squad was held down by small arms and mortar fire from the enemy he lead three other men to the bottom of the slag pile where he killed two of the enemy with grenades and took three prisoners. Although wounded in his daring advance he assaulted a bunker on the slag pile by braving the terrible enemy fire and menacing mortar shells which were constantly bursting and exploding around him. His courageous performance of self-imposed duties was of invaluable assistance to the success of the operation and reflected great credit on Technician Fifth Grade DIETRICH and on the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

ALEX A. PASQUINZO, 26509115, First Sergeant, FA, Battery B, 920th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 November 1944 in the vicinity of Maizières-les-Metz. Serving as a communications sergeant during an attack made by the 2nd Battalion, 377th Infantry Regiment, First Sergeant PASQUINZO was constantly under deadly artillery and mortar fire, repairing communications so the field artillery forward observer could fire missions that were very vital to the operation. For sixteen hours during the furious fighting, First Sergeant PASQUINZO fearlessly exposed himself, drawing enemy machine gun fire many times while repairing wire lines in the face of the enemy. His heroic devotion to duty typifies the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on First Sergeant PASQUINZO and on the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

CHARLES B. LINDSTROM, 33421538, Private First Class, INF, Company H, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Kamen, Germany. While supporting elements of Company E in the attack on Kamen, German the machine gunners became pinned down by heavy enemy mortar and small arms fire. Private First Class LINDSTROM and another soldier, in the face of the heavy enemy fire, set up their machine guns and immediately opened up on the enemy. This unexpected concentration of fire reversed the condition and the enemy became pinned down. Through the excellent continuous fire of the machine gunners, the riflemen were able to advance on the enemy positions taking prisoners and breaking up the temporary set back they were suffering while moving forward and taking their objective. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

RICHARD A. HELMS, 32948064, Sergeant, INF, Company H, 379th Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Kamen, Germany. During the attack on Kamen, Germany, the attacking riflemen of Company E became pinned down. No one could move without being fired on as the entire area was being bombarded by heavy enemy fire. Nearly everyone stayed under cover in trenches and low spots in the ground. Sergeant HELMS, with his section leader, another squad leader and two gunners broke the lull in the advance by climbing up a steep railroad cut and of necessity set up a machine gun in full view of the enemy and began a counter offensive. Through the excellent overhead fire of the machine gunners, the riflemen immediately advanced on the enemy positions, taking approximately 35 prisoners, three 20mm AA guns and continued on to take their objective. Entered military service from New York.

CHARLES W. FERRAR, 33888760, Private First Class, INF, Company E, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lippburg, Germany. Private First Class FERRAR while serving as a radio operator was attached to a rifle platoon of Company E which had been assigned the mission of clearing out a small village and the surrounding area near Lippburg, Germany. This was a special mission with the purpose of allowing supply vehicles of another battalion to pass through this area and reach their units which had been isolated by enemy action. Communications were especially important during this operation since it was a highly important task and every effort was to be made to accomplish it. Private First Class FERRAR was moving with the platoon leader when they began receiving heavy enemy small arms and mortar fire. From his position he found that his radio would not work satisfactorily and that he had no communication with his company CP. Without regard for his own safety, he began crawling to a better location which was also an exposed position where he set up a radio and continued to operate it under the enemy's continuing fire to keep up the lines of communication to the Company CP open. This contributed greatly to the success of the mission and the killing of fifteen enemy and the capturing of thirty six. Entered military service from Maryland.

CARL E. RAY, 36061733, Sergeant, INF, Company H, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 15 April 1945, in the vicinity of Schwerte, Germany. Sergeant RAY, while standing by his heavy machine gun, set up in a window, saw an enemy rifleman dug in on the opposite bank of the Ruhr River, who had pinned down two of our machine gunners securing water from a partially exposed position. While firing on our men, the sniper critically wounded a civilian. Sergeant RAY immediately opened up and silenced the gun. Another started firing on him, shattering the window glass above his head. Sergeant RAY continued to fire on possible enemy positions attracting fire to himself, and thereby permitting our men to get back to a covered position. Entered military service from Illinois.

RINDALL P. HUNT, 34737427, Sergeant, INF, Company D, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in North Lunen, Germany. Serving as a squad leader, Sergeant HUNT performed his duty with such aggressiveness and heroism that an enemy counter attack was repulsed. Under extremely heavy enemy fire, he moved his gun to a more advantageous position to deliver fire which caused many casualties among the enemy. Entered military service from Tennessee.

JOHN BLAZEK, 01315661, First Lieutenant, INF, Company G, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in the vicinity of Schwerte, Germany. Taking command of Company G, First Lieutenant BLAZEK, lead his men in a successful night attack, under adverse conditions, without any casualties sustained. The result of this successful attack was one "35" and crew captured and 80 prisoners taken. First Lieutenant BLAZEK'S expert leadership reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

SANTIAGO MARTINEZ, 38584243, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 March 1945, in the vicinity of Uerdingen, Germany. Private First Class MARTINEZ was serving as an assistant light machine gunner and participating with his company in the attack on enemy positions nearby. The company was advancing through open terrain to a group of buildings which was their immediate objective. While approaching this group of buildings, they began receiving heavy enemy fire which forced them to withdraw and reorganize for a second attempt. In this engagement the gunner in Private First Class MARTINEZ'S squad was wounded, and displaying aggressiveness and high personal courage, he immediately took over the weapon and began operating it to cover the advance of the company. So devastating was his fire that the demoralized enemy sought cover from which they could be protected from his hail of bullets. Entered military service from New Mexico.

EDWARD P. MANSUETI, 31417416, Private First Class, INF, Company A, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 6 April 1945, in the vicinity of Hilbeck, Germany. Private First Class MANSUETI volunteered to go on a night patrol in the hope of saving a wounded comrade. Crossing the most difficult of terrain the patrol accomplished its mission without attracting the attention of the enemy. Although the wounded soldier later died the valiant efforts of each member of the patrol reflect great credit on them and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

WILLIS D. WATERMAN, 34340240, Private First Class, INF, Company B, 378th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 9 December 1944, in the vicinity of Ensdorf, Germany. In the early morning darkness the enemy counter attacked a pillbox of the Siegfried Line held by Company C. A charge of dynamite was swung into the corridor by the enemy by means of a wire from the top of the pillbox, the explosionounding Private First Class WATERMAN. Despite the fact that his left arm was rendered useless, he used a captured pistol, and despite numerous concussion grenades, he fired repeatedly through a slit guarding the entrance. By this fearless act he denied entrance to the enemy through the previously blown door until daylight when the enemy was forced to withdraw. Private First Class WATERMAN'S intrepid conduct and heroic devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the entire military service. Entered military service from Kansas.

CLAY E. CANUPP, 34388594, Private First Class, INF, Company I., 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 11 April 1945, in the vicinity of Wichmeder,

Germany. When Company A was held up in their attack Private First Class CINNUPP voluntarily went out through heavy mortar and bazooka fire with one other man to an advantageous point. From that spot they killed three enemy and took two prisoners, thus destroying the enemy position, and permitting Company A to continue the attack. Entered military service from South Carolina.

RICHARD G. HARPST, 37209787, Private First Class, INF, Company E, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Karlsruhe, Germany. Private First Class HARPST participated with a small group of men in a direct assault against an enemy strong point which was holding down several platoons by machine gun and automatic weapons fire. This small group in the face of enemy fire advanced upon these positions killing three enemy and capturing fifteen others. The enemy was completely neutralized, thus making it possible for the unit to continue on their mission. Entered military service from Missouri.

RONNIE LOVELESS, 35463947, Sergeant, INF, Company E, 378th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 4 April 1945 to 16 April 1945, in the vicinity of Dortmund, Germany. While Company E fought its way relentlessly from Paderborn to Dortmund, Sergeant LOVELESS consistently distinguished himself as a fearless and devoted leader. His calm, intrepid conduct under heavy enemy fire was a great encouragement to his comrades. His resourceful initiative in leading patrols deep into enemy territory contributed materially to the decisive accomplishment of numerous missions. Sergeant LOVELESS' conduct in battle reflects great credit on him and exemplifies the high traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Kentucky.

JOHN N. DOYLE, 33373471, Technician Fourth Grade, INF, Headquarters, 95th Infantry Division, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 1 November 1944 to 30 December 1945 and from 16 March 1945 to 5 May 1945, in France and Germany. Entered military service from Maryland.

ROBERT E. WEBER, 35927250, Technician Fourth Grade, INF, Headquarters, 95th Infantry Division, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 1 November 1944 to 8 May 1945, in France and Germany. Entered military service from Ohio.

JAMES E. BRUZEM, 37286822, Technician Fourth Grade, INF, Service Company, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 19 October 1944 to 18 April 1945, in France and Germany.

VLAUGHN C. EMERSON, 37614792, Sergeant, INF, Company C, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 3 January 1945 to 16 April 1945, in Germany. Entered military service from Missouri.

FRANCIS L. FARRELL, 32924173, Technician Fifth Grade, INF, Service Company, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 19 October 1944 to 18 April 1945, in France and Germany.

ERNEST G. JOHNSON, 36251236, Staff Sergeant, INF, Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 19 October 1944 to 15 April 1945, in France and Germany. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

EARL E. KASSMANN, 42142842, Private First Class, INF, Company E, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 20 February 1945 to 15 April 1945, in Germany. Entered military service from New Jersey.

WILLIAM A. KELLY, 35095173, Private First Class, INF, Company C, 379th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 23 January to 14 April 1945, in Germany. Entered military service from Indiana.

JAMES H. LONDON, 38564979, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company K, 378th Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 5 December 1944 to 21 December 1944 in Germany. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Though wounded and dazed by a bazooka shell that had killed his BAR man, he redeployed his men in the quickest and most effective manner and prepared to attack. Attacking across an open field, he courageously led his men in storming and overcoming the enemy positions, personally destroying two machine guns which had inflicted heavy casualties among his men. Through his intrepid action nine Germans were killed and seventeen were captured; thus permitting B Company to cross forward unimpeded to their final objective. First Lieutenant KEMPER'S fearless action was an inspiring contribution to the speedy and complete accomplishment of a very difficult mission. Entered military service from Michigan.

EDWARD K. FULLER, 31371337, Private First Class, L.F., Company A, 379th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action in connection with military operations against the enemy on 9 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarbruecken-Hohen, Germany. Private First Class FULLER, as first scout, advanced alone to reconnoiter an enemy pillbox. Suddenly a hidden enemy machine gun fired upon him, wounding him. Private First Class FULLER, with complete disregard for his own safety, stood upright shouting to the remainder of his platoon, the location of the gun and warning them not to attempt reaching him. He was mortally wounded during this action. Private First Class FULLER's courageous and gallant actions reflect great credit on him and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

He then personally led a rapid advance on the sniper position with a bayonet, killing three enemy in a fox hole while drawing concentrated fire on his person. A sniper killed him as he led the charge, but his inspiring leadership gave his platoon momentum which carried it successfully into the enemy positions. Several more snipers were killed, the remainder routed, and Company B's advance continued. Technical Sergeant TOBIKOWSKI's fearless leadership and unrelenting devotion to duty have brought lasting honor on himself and have typified the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

II. awards OF SILVER STAR By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 300-45, as amended, and Par. D, Sec. IV, Weekly Information Bulletin No. 38, Hq. Second Army, 22 September 1945, the Silver Star is awarded to the following:

WILLIAM J. DUNCAN, 38700213, Staff Sergeant, L.F., Company K, 378th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 19 December 1944, in the vicinity of Busdorf, Germany. On 19 December 1944, Staff Sergeant DUNCAN while operating a bazooka in a rifle platoon volunteered to expose himself

to murderous enemy fire in an attempt to break out an enemy MG position. Not being able to get another volunteer readily, Staff Sergeant DUNCAN moved out alone to an exposed position. Under extremely difficult conditions caused by the enemy heavy mortars and MG fire and the lack of room to operate under cover, Staff Sergeant DUNCAN loaded and operated his Bazooka alone, fired three rounds into the enemy position, destroyed the enemy gun, forcing the enemy to abandon their position. Staff Sergeant DUNCAN'S cool and courageous actions in volunteering and carrying out a mission which offered only a small chance for a safe completion, reflects great credit on himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Georgia.

DAVID G. HOWE, 01009616, Second Lieutenant, Inf, Company K, 378th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 17 December 1944, in the vicinity of Ensdorf, Germany. On 17 December 1944, Second Lieutenant David G. Howe, (then Technical Sergeant, acting platoon leader), was inspecting the positions held by one of his squads when machine gun fire from a friendly unit on the right flank pinned them down. Seeing the need for immediate action to save the situation, Second Lieutenant Howe, in spite of the machine gun fire and a heavy barrage of enemy mortar and artillery fire, dashed across 75 yards of open ground under direct observation of enemy riflemen to contact the unit and inform them of the situation. Second Lieutenant Howe was successful in stopping the machine gunners who were intent on wiping out Second Lieutenant Howe's squad, mistaking them for the enemy. Second Lieutenant Howe's daring and courageous exploit in the face of certain death was directly responsible for the saving of seven men's lives and his actions reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Georgia.

RALEIGH O. MOIVISTI, 01001771, First Lieutenant, Inf, Company A, 379th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 11 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lautzen, Germany. On 11 April 1945, First Lieutenant O. Moivisti, then executive officer of Company A, 379th Infantry Regiment, was in command of the two reserve platoons and Company headquarters during the attack on Lautzen, Germany, in the Lehr rocket. The two attacking platoons, 360 yards ahead of the rest, had partially succeeded in taking their objective when they reported a terrible, almost crushing counterattack and called for immediate aid and supplies in order to prevent being completely cut off. First Lieutenant Moivisti immediately formulated and put into effect a frontal plan to break through the attacking German forces by making use of every available man in his command. Leading his men in an attack, he succeeded in driving a wedge through their lines and establishing the contact necessary when a ferocious littering. With the successful junction of all forces in Company A, the entire reattack was smashed utterly and completely enabling our attack to continue. The instant, brilliant and decisive plans and action shown by First Lieutenant Moivisti under the circumstances demonstrated remarkable leadership and heroism of the highest order and exemplifies the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Italy.

WILLIAM S. MULIZ, 30349327, Private First Class, Inf, Company B, 379th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action, in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 3 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lautzen, Germany. An enemy machine gun, covering the only avenue of approach to

Second Platoon of Company B had to the team. Despite the murderous fire coming from the well dug-in and well-protected positions which were in the advance of his Company, Private First Class HOLZ, without orders and with concern for his safety and welfare, crawled up 200 yards over exposed position, within a few yards of where the enemy machine gun nest was located. With deadly accuracy he threw two hand grenades knocking out the machine gun killing five and captured four Germans. Because of Private First Class HOLZ's very courageous act, and initiative, Company B was able to continue its drive deeper into Germany. His gallant intrepid actions in eliminating an enemy strong point are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on Private First Class HOLZ. Entered military service from Ohio.

BAD LAMM L. MILLINGEN, Jr., 0497293, Captain, FA, Headquarters 359th Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action in connection with his duty as a platoon leader, from 14 November 1944 to 19 December 1944, in the vicinity of Fort Jeanne D'Arc, France. Captain MILLINGEN, without regard to his own safety went forward with the leading elements and directed fire on enemy positions which were holding up the advance of the Second Battalion. After reaching the objective in rear of Fort Jeanne D'Arc, the battalion was almost out of ammunition and was badly disorganized with only about one-third of the Battalion reaching the objective. An enemy counter attack was expected and was in progress when Captain MILLINGEN finally was able to relay fire missions over an infantry radio which he had expertly repaired. Through Captain MILLINGEN's skillful handling of this artillery fire, the enemy counter attack was broken up and the enemy driven back. Captain MILLINGEN's staunch, unwavering devotion to duty reflects distinct credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from California.

ALVIN COLDING, 1-191415, Corporal, LF, Company A, 373th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, from 11 November 1944 to 2 March 1945 in France and Germany. In the crossing of the Moselle River at Tillyville, France, Corporal COLDING acted as liaison man for his company in platoon. During the bitter fighting for the bridgehead, Corporal COLDING, without regard for his own safety, made a thorough reconnaissance and directed a machine gun section into position immediately in front of their position, thus enabling them to deliver effective supporting fire for the assault troops. Later in the attack on Fort D'Ullange, Corporal COLDING repeatedly exposed himself to enemy sniper fire and machine gun fire while carrying messages from his platoon leader to the deployed sections. During the final attack the platoon leader was wounded and had to be evacuated. Corporal COLDING, again without regard for his personal safety, assumed command of his platoon and accepted all necessary duties until the platoon movement was able to be forwarded and assume command. The great determination and care, the devotion to duty displayed by Corporal COLDING reflects distinct credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from New York.

WILLIE J. BURKE, 01323843, First Lieutenant, LF, Company H, 373th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, from 11 November 1944 to 25 November 1944 and from 25 March 1945 to 13 April 1945 in France and Germany. In the vicinity of Monerstroff, France, while

leading his section into that town, First Lieutenant HUGHES was severely wounded in the hand and leg, and several of his men were also wounded. Despite his own pain First Lieutenant HUGHES led his men forward into position, saw to the evacuation of the wounded, and set up his guns to assist the attack. Only after all these measures were taken did First Lieutenant HUGHES succumb to his wounds and was evacuated. In the fighting in the Ieper Pocket, First Lieutenant HUGHES daringly fought the most forward positions from which to direct with fire in support of the rifle elements. The constant, faithful devotion to duty, characteristic of First Lieutenant HUGHES' service is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on him. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

III. AWARD OF GOLD STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, under the provisions of DA GOO-45, as amended, and Per. D, Sec IV, Weekly Information Bulletin No. 38, HQ, Second Army, 22 September 1945, The Gold Star Medal is awarded posthumously to the following:

FIONNAN J. CALING, 12226442, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 26 October 1944, in France. While in action in the vicinity of Hesdin, France, Private First Class CALING gave the life of a comrade by pushing him to safety. As a result of this, PFCNT CALING, Private First Class CALING was hit by a heavy mortor shell. Such heroism and selflessness for his comrades is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New York.

IV. AWARD OF GOLD STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of DA GOO-45, as amended, and Per. D, Sec IV, Weekly Information Bulletin No. 38, HQ, Second Army, 22 September 1945, The Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following:

EDWARD R. MILITIO, 31082331, Technician Fifth Grade, INF, Company B, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 9 April 1945, in the vicinity of Koenigswinter, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade MILITIO, a member of an assault, at great personal risk, traveled through open fire swept terrain to knock out an enemy machine gun that if left till daylight would wipe out the entire squad. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

FRANCIS L. CLARK, 37317612, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company B, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 22 November 1944, in the vicinity of Paderborn, Germany. After being informed that twenty-one of his platoon had been captured or taken a section of high ground overlooking the town of Paderborn, Germany, he volunteered to lead the remaining members of his platoon in rescue of the wounded men and salvaging equipment that were captured by the enemy. Under a hell of every heavy artillery and small arms fire, Staff Sergeant Clark fought alone until he came upon one of his mates who was left for dead. With the aid of the gun of which he was commander, Staff Sergeant Clark successfully transported his comrade approximately 1000 yards to the rear area, at the same time he covered one of the heavy .50 caliber machine guns used by the Germans who was wounded. Entered military service from North Dakota.

HOWARD L. HILLYER, 35332676, Sergeant, INF, Company E, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Koenen, Germany. On 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Koenen Germany, Sergeant HILLYER, in the face of the enemy fire, left his protected position to help administer first aid to two men from his squad when they were wounded. Sergeant HILLYER had to approach the wounded in the face of machine gun and sniper fire. Sergeant HILLYER treated the men until the medics arrived. All of this was done at great personal risk. He had to crawl some fifty yards over flat open country to reach these men. This deed reflects the highest tradition of the military service and reflects great credit on Sergeant HILLYER. Entered military service from Ohio.

GORDON S. HILLIS, 3383903, Private First Class, INF, Company E, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lippburg, Germany. Private First Class HILLIS was serving as a radio operator and was attached to a rifle platoon of Company E which had been assigned the mission "clearing out" small village and the surrounding area near Lippburg, Germany. Communications were especially important during this operation and every effort was to be made to accomplish it. Private First Class HILLIS was moving with the platoon leader when they began receiving heavy small arms and mortar fire. From his position he found that his radio would not work satisfactorily without regard to his own safety, he began crawling to a better location which was also an exposed position, where he set up a radio and continued to operate it under the enemy fire. This contributed greatly to the success of the mission and the killing of fifteen enemy, capturing thirty-six. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

EDWARD J. SZEWICZUK, 10134150, Corporal, FA, Battery B, 359th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Koenen, Germany. Corporal SZEWICZUK was attached to an infantry rifle company which was pinned down in a railroad pass by enemy small arms, machine guns, mortar and direct fire. Setting up his radio, the corporal was unable to contact fire directions due to the presence of metal in the vicinity so he crawled with the radio on his back, up to the lip of the pass in order to gain more height with his aerial. In this position he exposed himself to the enemy fire also placed himself in direct observation of an enemy machine gun which had worked to our rear. Through Corporal SZEWICZUK's efforts the company was relieved. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

FREDERICK F. PLOCHKE, 2924694, First Sergeant, INF, Headquarters & Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in the vicinity of Sonnen, Germany. During the night of 12 April 1945, the supply convoy of 1st Battalion was closely following the attacking Germans. Due to the heavy artillery barrage the enemy laid on our supply lines, the convoy was forced to halt. At this time, an ammunition truck was hit and set fire endangering all nearby vehicles. First Sergeant PLOCHKE volunteered, with complete disregard for his own safety to drive the trucks near the burning ammunition truck to safety. As a result of this action, none of the other trucks in the convoy were damaged and the badly needed supplies arrived at the front intact. Entered military service from California.

SAMUEL FURISH, 13148154, Private First Class, INF, Headquarters Company, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lippstadt, Germany. On the morning of 4 April 1945, the combat scouts of 379th Infantry Regiment crossed the Lippe River at 0200 attacking Schmidtschen Farm, German, five hours ahead of advance rifle battalions. Private First Class FURISH was charged with securing out a possible route through the swamp and broken wire fences and leading the unit onto the objective. Without flinching, Private First Class FURISH led the Combat Scouts across the Lippe River, over 70 yards of swamp, fences and exposed terrain so rapidly that the objective was reached and fourteen enemy guards captured before they had time to warn theirarrison. Entered military service from Washington, D. C.

MILDRED DAVID, 37203532, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company G, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 15 November 1944, in the vicinity of Gravelotte, France. Staff Sergeant DAVID led his squad in the attack of a strongly fortified bunker. Upon approaching the bunker, the squad was held up by fierce enemy small arms fire. Staff Sergeant DAVID rallied his men for a final rush, personally leading them over the top of barbed wire entanglements in the full view of enemy gunners. This bold maneuver so confused the enemy that the bunker was quickly captured and the enemy guns were put into operation against the enemy. Entered military service from Kansas.

EDWARD MCDOLPH, 36976110, Private First Class, INF, Company E, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Apelbeck, Germany. Private First Class MCDOLPH observed enemy soldiers attempting to load into a tank. He advanced and opened fire with his bazooka and killed them down while the bazooka was fired his squad dove in with him. Loaded on rocks. Private First Class MCDOLPH then advanced a min and without regard for his own safety, aimed an exposed position from which he could bring more intensive fire upon the enemy, while his mate fired his bazooka and hacked out the tank. In this action five enemy were killed and six taken prisoners. Entered military service from Illinois.

DAVID NAVARRO, 36561246, Private First Class, INF, Company G, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 7 April 1945, in the vicinity of Froystadt, Germany. Private First Class NAVARRO, crawled across a 50 yard open space to reach his wounded platoon leader, rendered first aid, and brought him back to safety under continuous sniper fire, the result of which saved a man's life. This deed reflected the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on him. Entered military service from Texas.

LOUIS F. J. MINACCIO, 42177020, Private First Class, INF, Company G, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 7 April 1945, in the vicinity of Froystadt, Germany. Because of machine gun nest pinned down his patrol, Private First Class MINACCIO volunteered to flank the enemy. After crawling to within 25 yards of the enemy machine gun, he threw a hand grenade into the nest destroying it and killing one of the crew and killing another with his rifle. Private First Class MINACCIO's intrepid, courageous service reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from New York.

LOUIS S. DE GAULLE, 31237244, First Sergeant, INF, Company C, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 6 April 1945, in the vicinity of Linnecke, Germany. De Gaulle's men forward relentlessly after the platoon leader became a casualty. First Sergeant De Gaulle (then Technical Sergeant) secured the posted left flank of the company and drove off several enemy counter attacks on his position while under direct and well observed enemy artillery and mortar fire. His absolute devotion to duty is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

WILLIAM COOPER, 32938223, Private First Class, INF, Headquarters Company, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 13 April 1945, in the vicinity of Weisweiler, Germany. Private First Class Cooper and another soldier with utter disregard for their own personal safety during a furious artillery barrage picked up a severely wounded comrade and carried him nearly 60 yards to the shelter of a school house. Although the barrage increased in intensity, the outstanding courage of Private First Class Cooper reflects everlasting credit upon himself and the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New York.

ORLANDO J. CARLUCCIO, 31203985, Sergeant, INF, Company C, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 13 April to 16 April 1945, in the vicinity of Gusecke, Germany. On 15 April 1945 when his company was held up by enemy fire Sergeant Carluccio took cover in an enemy foxhole and opened fire on the enemy's left flank, killing three, wounding four and forcing four others into submission, thus, enabling his company to advance and accomplish their mission. Sergeant Carluccio's heroic and skillful performance exemplifies high traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on him. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

WILFRED W. EAST, 19105903, Technical Sergeant, INF, Company L, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 11 April 1945, in the vicinity of Koenigswinter, Germany. While under enemy artillery and intense small arms fire Technical Sergeant East worked his way around the enemy lines and captured two horse drawn vehicles of ammunition and seven prisoners. While behind the lines he observed several strong points. He then worked his way back to his platoon and directed them over the strong points that he had observed. In doing so his platoon was able to push forward and to capture thirteen more prisoners. Entered military service from Ohio.

CHARLES L. MURKIN, 36613767, Sergeant, INF, Company C, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Bonnern, Germany. Sergeant Murkin and his squad were held up by fire from a house directly in their path. Realizing the peril of the position and the danger involved he volunteered to undertake the task of clearing the house himself. Successfully negotiating the open area, he reached a window of the house. He threw a grenade, killing one enemy and causing two to surrender. Sergeant Murkin's outstanding action and achievement reflect great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

LESLIE R. FOILD, 01295357, First Lieutenant, INF, Company M, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 April 1945, in the Lahr Pocket. First Lieutenant FOILD participated in clearing a wooded section of machine gun and capturing thirty prisoners. First Lieutenant FOILD's courage and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

EDWARD A. FAYLIK, 31287674, Private First Class, INF, Company F, 373rd Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 19 October 1944 to 10 March 1945, in France and Germany. Private First Class FAYLIK has always done an excellent job in his capacity as rifleman. He has participated in many attacks and patrols and his application of his well-earned knowledge of conducting himself on the field of action has kept him from ever being wounded. His services have always been dependable and his manner of carrying out his assigned orders and duties has always been excellent. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

LEONARD J. MCNELL, 31184326, Private First Class, INF, Company E, 373rd Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 4 April 1945 to 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Dortmund, Germany. During the period 4 April 1945 to 10 April 1945, Private First Class MCNELL and three other soldiers served as a reconnaissance patrol, reportedly reconnoitering under cover of darkness the area to be attacked on the following day. On 9 April 1945, Private First Class MCNELL and his comrades, during the course of one intelligence patrol, reached a point less than thousand yards ahead of the most advanced friendly lines. The invaluable information on enemy developments and entrenchments gained by the intelligence patrol in its daring missions throughout this period of constant patrols contributed greatly to the success achieved by Company E, reflecting great credit on Private First Class MCNELL and on the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

FRANCIS W. ALLMAN, 30934938, sergeant, INF, Company K, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of Berlin, Germany. In the course of an attack, Sergeant ALLMAN's squad leader was killed and he immediately assumed command of the now isolated squad and reorganized it and led the men through the enemy fire back to the platoon's position. He maintained communication with the company by transmitting the platoon to the right for a objective. Sergeant ALLMAN's leadership and great personal courage reflect great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

CHARLES I. FLAMMUS, 39929760, Private First Class, INF, Company G, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 13 November 1944 to 1 April 1945, in France and Germany. On 8 December 1944, in Pfullendorf, Germany, when a platoon of Company G was cut off from the rest of the company, Private First Class FLAMMUS and another two volunteers for the job of taking ammunition and returning to the platoon which was under a constant and heavy fire. With this determination and spirit, the platoon survived and escaped from the pocket.

On 11 March 1945, Private First Class FLAMMUS and a crew of ten captured an enemy artillery piece and about 50 prisoners. Private First Class

FLEMING's great personal courage reflects great credit upon himself and on the military service. Entered military service from Utah.

ROY L. MACHINERICK, 33941166, Technician Fifth Grade, ID, 1st Battalion Medical Section, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations, on 12 April 1945, in the vicinity of Solde, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade MACHINERICK was a litter squad leader attached to Company C in an attack on a hill north of Solde, Germany. Direct fire from two 105mm guns and 20mm guns was pinning the men down, and as the company moved up forward, two soldiers in one lead platoon were hit. Private First Class MACHINERICK, realizing the need of immediate medical aid, rushed alone to the attacking elements under murderous fire to attend the wounded. Once enemy fire halted the advance, but disregarding personal safety he carried the soldiers, one at a time, to a windmill some 300 yards away where evacuation was feasible. Technician Fifth Grade MACHINERICK's heroic action and devotion to duty reflects distinct credit upon him and exemplifies the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

JUANITA CHAVEZ, 38011096, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 24 December 1944, in Weuleben, Germany. Running on a hot wire while his platoon was withdrawing, Private First Class CHAVEZ observed four enemy soldiers following close behind the platoon. Moving to a new position, Private First Class CHAVEZ directed a terrific stream of fire from his gun on the ramp, killing all the enemy and insuring the platoon's safe withdrawal. His initiative and devotion to duty reflects distinct credit on Private First Class CHAVEZ. Entered military service from New Mexico.

JOHN A. FIDLER, 32653483, Technician Fifth Grade, GM, Company C, 340th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Westhofen, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade FIDLER, assistant squad leader, with four of his squad successfully removed demolition and anti-personnel charges from a bridge crossing spanning the Ruhr River, saving an important source of water for the city of Berlin and preserving an important communications link. Technician Fifth Grade FIDLER's heroic coolness in action under enemy fire, excellent observation and machine gun fire, reflects great credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

WILLIAM A. KOBEL, 36507931, Sergeant, GM, Company C, 340th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Westhofen, Germany. Sergeant KOBEL with four of his squad successfully removed demolition and anti-personnel charges from a dam and roadway spanning the Ruhr River, saving an important communications link. Sergeant KOBEL's heroic coolness in leading his squad in action under enemy fire, excellent observation and machine gun fire, reflects great credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

CARL K. MARSH, 7415038, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 7 April 1945, in the Ruhr Valley, Germany.

Private First Class DAWGL's squad was fired upon by a well-concealed enemy position, and with no thought for his personal safety he crawled forward to within 50 yards of the emplacement, killing two and seriously wounding one of the enemy with his rifle. Later during the day while his squad was on a call to arms to locate friendly fire, they were fired upon by the enemy. Private First Class DAWGL's account on deadly rifle fire eliminated the two enemy soldiers and won a third, survivor. His courageous and outstanding action reflects credit to Private First Class DAWGL and to the military service. Entered military service from New York.

EDWARD G. LAMONT, 01260202, First Lieutenant, INF, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 11 December 1944 to 5 April 1945, in Germany. During the attack in Strelitzheim, Germany with his platoon pinned down by automatic weapons fire on water front, First Lieutenant LAMONT ran across the channel in the direction of the enemy held houses up in his men to reinforce him. He was severely wounded in this action but the enemy was defeated. During the Lehr Operation in the attack near Ostendorf, Germany, he repeated exposed himself to twice and assist his men in the attack. First Lieutenant LAMONT'S intrepid leadership and high courage reflects great credit on him and exemplifies the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

LESTER BLUM, 36139246, Technician Third Grade, MD, Medical Detachment, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 9 November 1944, in France. Technician Third Grade BLUM crossed the Iselle River in charge of a litter team. That noon time, brought in several casualties, intermittently at night they kept on receiving casualties. The following morning, Technician Third Grade BLUM went across the river, at the enemy twice, conversed with them and safely returned. In each time when he crossed the river to receive casualties. His fearless action reflects a great credit to Technician Third Grade BLUM and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

HAROLD W. GRIMES, JR., 19105592, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company F, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 2 April 1945, in Augusterdorf, Germany. When the enemy fire had put all other men in his machine gun squad out of action, Staff Sergeant GRIMES, seized the gun from the wounded gunner and fired it with great concentration in adjacent buildings. As his company advanced in assault, he also advanced, carrying with him an aid kit supply of ammunition. He continued the fight himself, giving reliable and accurate supporting fire to his company for six hours. His valuable fire support was responsible for inflicting heavy casualties upon the enemy. His fortitude, perseverance, and high personal courage reflect distinct credit on Staff Sergeant GRIMES. Entered military service from Kentucky.

RAY V. DIAZO, 42179512, Private First Class, INF, Company H, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 2 April 1945, in the vicinity of Culinhausen,

Company. Private First Class DiAGO as a member of a patrol observed a strongly organized point defended by thirty-four Germans. Exposing himself to direct fire, he rushed the enemy troops who, using hand grenades and well-placed small arms fire caused the enemy to surrender. Private First Class DiAGO's initiative and daring reflect great credit upon the military service and shall enter military service from New York.

WILSON C. CHRISTIAN, 35413971, Private First Class, INF, Company A, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 12 November 1944 to 26 April 1945, in France and Germany. On 12 November 1944 in the vicinity of Bertrancourt, France, Private First Class Christian, a cook, volunteered to cross the village with the force of his, to supervise the distribution of rations to Company A, which held the town of Bertrancourt 700 yards from the river. On braving intense mortar fire he made three round trips from the cook to the town carrying much needed supplies. His action contributed greatly to the successful repulsion of a counter attack which followed shortly afterwards. Private First Class Christian's great service to duty and heroic conduct reflect greatly upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

RICHARD G. MABODA, 36633057, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company A, 578th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 8 April 1945, in the vicinity of Neum, Germany. After another soldier, Staff Sergeant Maboda moved ahead of the platoon, fired machine fire from an enemy strong point, in an attempt to destroy the position. When Captain's initiative on the part of Staff Sergeant Maboda forced the German garrison unit to surrender and permitted the attacking forces to capture its port of Neum and the city of Hamm. Staff Sergeant Maboda's heroic determined effort reflects distinct credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

JOHN H. CHAPMAN, 0519362, First Lieutenant, INF, Company E, 576th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 and 15 November 1944, in the vicinity of Fort Jouffroy, France. First Lieutenant Chapman's courageous actions on 14 November 1944 made it possible to maintain an important supply route, "The" mainly Red Cross, for the wounded, badly needed supplies to his men and the enemy indicated area. During this period of time First Lieutenant Chapman exposed himself daily many times on numerous occasions in order to more successfully carry out his assigned task. Entered military service from Texas.

THOMAS A. O'CALLAHAN, 36633073, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company A, 576th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 6 April 1945, in the vicinity of Hamm, Germany. When a heavy machine gun strong point was delaying the advance of a unit of his company, Staff Sergeant O'Callahan lead his squad across an open street armored with a 50 cal. machine gun, placed them on the flanks of the machine gun position. Fearing with this additional threat, the enemy crew were forced to surrender, and the entire platoon moved forward on its mission. The gallant and decisive action on the part of Staff Sergeant O'Callahan exemplifies his great courage and the high traditions of our military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

WILLIAM W. CULLISON, 3749307, Technical Sergeant, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 18 November 1944, at Fort Gombet, France. When his platoon leader was killed in the withering fire from the fort, Technical Sergeant CULLISON struck to his forward position 200 yards in front of the fort and continued to communicate the situation to his company commander. Technical Sergeant CULLISON adjusted the fire from supporting artillery and took destroyer fire, skillfully directing the laying of a smoke screen under cover of which the platoon retraced its steps to safety. Technical Sergeant CULLISON's steadfast devotion to duty exemplifies the high traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on him. Entered military service from Kansas.

JACK D. GOODMAN, 35731919, Private First Class, AD, Medical Detachment, 375th Infantry Regt, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations, on 27 March 1945, in the vicinity of Oberlassel, Germany. Private First Class GOODMAN, upon learning that a German civilian had been hit by mortar fire, drove a jeep out to the area to help evacuate her. The enemy had only three in a friendly barrage, pinning the entire group to the ground. Despite the formidable danger and without consideration for his personal safety, he continued with his work, even though he had received a concussion, committed himself to his right leg. Private First Class GOODMAN did not allow himself to be evacuated until all of the other patients had been treated and removed from the danger area. His cool actions helped to save the lives of many non-combatant military service personnel. Virginia.

Sergeant LYNN, seeing his platoon leader fall wounded and another squad leader killed by enemy fire, unhesitatingly rushed forward through a gnatlet of fire and carried the platoon leader to safety, returning shortly after to recover the body of the squad leader. On 12 April 1945, while outposted at a bridge in Lutzen, Germany, Sergeant LYNN was mortally wounded while repelling an attack by enemy troops attempting to infiltrate our position. His complete devotion to duty typifies the highest tradition of the military service and reflects lasting honor on Sergeant LYNN. Entered military service 1941 Rhode Island.

JAMES A. EATON, 38255293, Staff Sergeant, PIF, Company E, 377th Infantry, for heroic gallantry in connection with military operations against the enemy on 8 November 1944 in the vicinity of Hannebeis Woods, France. Staff Sergeant Eaton, acting as forward observer for his mortar squad which was in support of an attacking battalion worked his way forward with a courage to an observation post in front of the rifle troops. During the attack the battalion was forced to withdraw but he and his comrades were unaware of this and continued to hold their position. After a fierce fight Staff Sergeant Eaton was mortally wounded. His high personal courage and gallant devotion to duty exemplify the high traditions of the military service and reflect credit upon himself, his unit and military service from New York.

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

ORIGINAL ORDER

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of an GOM-45, as amended, and Section I, Weekly Information Bulletin Number 40, Headquarters Second Army, 6 October 1945, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following:

JOHN J. LASKOWSKI, 36604144, Technical Sergeant, ID, Medical Detachment, 37th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of Wittenheim, Germany. A litter squad led by Technical Sergeant LASKOWSKI was evacuating a casualty under fire from enemy forward positions when a concentration of mortar fire hit in their immediate vicinity. Technical Sergeant LASKOWSKI and all other members of his squad were wounded, one very seriously in the throat. Technical Sergeant LASKOWSKI, himself wounded and bleeding, rendered his immediate first aid, thereby saving his life. He then reorganized his squad and evacuated all casualties, returning to receive medical attention for himself until all other casualties were in the aid station. His courage, devotion to duty, leadership and courage typifies the highest traditions of the military service and reflects lasting honor on Technical Sergeant LASKOWSKI. Entered military service from Illinois.

JONATHAN MCNAUL, 32617437, Technician Fourth Grade, EM, Battery C, 359th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 3 December 1944 and 5 March 1945. On 3 December 1944, a surprise crossing of the Saar River at Saarbruecken was made and the west end of the bridge secured. The enemy counter attacked and communications were lost. Technician Fourth Grade MCNAUL volunteered to set up communications with the supporting 155 self-propelled gun in order to reinforce the company's fire power. Disregarding his own personal safety, Technician Fourth Grade MCNAUL maintained communications with his higher headquarters until the bridge head was firmly secured. Entered military service from New York.

JOHN D. MILLS, 36623601, Staff Sergeant, LHF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 November 1944, in the vicinity of Bertrange, France. Staff Sergeant MILLS volunteered for a carrying party which made the trip across the flooded Moselle River taking badly needed supplies to Company A, which was isolated in the town of Bertrange, France. The courageous initiative of Staff Sergeant MILLS under the heavy artillery fire encountered in the hazardous crossings was an inspiration to his comrades and reflects great credit on himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

ROY W. SHAFER, 34727755, Private First Class, CL, Company C, 320th Engineer Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Westhofen, Germany.

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Private First Class SHAFARD, with four other engineers, successfully removed demolition and anti-personnel charges from a dam on roadway spanning the Lehr River, saving an important source of water for the city of Dortmund and preserving an important communications link. Private First Class SHAFARD'S heroic coolness while acting under enemy artillery fire, excellent observation and planning in fire, reflects great credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Tennessee.

JAMES L. SHIFFY, 33936956, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of St. Barbara, Germany. Staff Sergeant SHIFFY volunteered to be first scout during the attack on St. Barbara, Germany. Knowing the town was strongly held by the enemy, he placed himself at twice the normal distance to the front in order to give added protection to his comrades. Although subjected to heavy rifle and machine gun fire, he inspired the men of his company by coolly returning the heavy fire and choosing proper routes of advance. The vigorous and fearless leadership displayed by Staff Sergeant SHIFFY reflects distinct credit on himself and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

JOHN SCHILLERHORN, 341111, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 November 1944, in the vicinity of Fort Cambrai, France. When the advance of Staff Sergeant SCHILLERHORN'S platoon was temporarily stopped by heavy mortar and small arms fire which caused heavy casualties, he took command of his platoon. From a shell in the ground he observed an enemy sniper and quickly silenced him. After this he noticed several more snipers in an unoccupied position. Forming his squad he led them against the enemy combatants who were wounded in the action and remaining until the objective was taken. Staff Sergeant SCHILLERHORN'S courageous leadership and superb courage reflected great credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

FREDERICK F. SANFORD, 31409383, Sergeant, INF, Company G, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 13 October 1944 to 10 April 1945, in France and Germany. On 13 October 1944, near Anicheim, France, Sergeant SANFORD led his squad in attacking Forest Wern in the face of heavy enemy fire. Their aggressive action and courage was instrumental in breaking down enemy resistance. On 1 April 1945, near the Reichswald, Germany, when the tank column's advance was stopped, Sergeant SANFORD and 4 other men went out in the face of enemy fire and succeeded in capturing an enemy 40mm gun and about thirty prisoners. Sergeant SANFORD'S great personal courage and leadership on those occasions during this entire period reflect distinct credit on himself and the military service. Entered military service from Connecticut.

EDWARD W. SPENCER, 37209356, Sergeant, INF, Company K, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 21 January 1945, in Eschrautern-Roden, Germany. During an extremely heavy enemy counter attack, Sergeant SPENCER took over the command of his squad when the squad leader was killed; he succeeded in reorganizing the men, who were still inexperienced reinforcements. While retreating, his unit was flushed out and stunned by falling masonry which trapped the squad. Recrossing the fire line in from the debris, he crossed the fire-swept area in an exceedingly大胆, resolute manner to aid in the rescue work.

During the rescue operations he killed five enemy endeavoring to hinder the operation. Once the squad was free Sergeant Shumard again organized the men and continued to repulse the counter attack. His staunch leadership and resolute devotion to duty reflect great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Kansas.

ARMED L. SWINWOOD, 33940106, Technician Fifth Grade, INF, Headquarters Company 3rd Battalion, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 3 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarlautern-Hohen, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Swinwood and four fellow limermen under enemy observation, small arms fire, artillery and mortar fire, completed the wire lines across the Saar River and extended them to observation posts inside the town. Radio communications were jammed with traffic and the dangerous job of sustaining wire communications was very essential in the battalion and regiment carrying out their missions. At this time the enemy fire was so heavy that our troops were at a standstill under cover. Nevertheless, Technician Fifth Grade Swinwood and his fellow limermen worked feverishly, almost suicidally, in attempting to sustain man's contact with our elements all day and night. They made several crossings of the Saar ridge, which was the hardest hit spot of the area being open to observation and fire. Technician Fifth Grade Swinwood's courage and unswerving devotion to duty reflects great credit upon him and on the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

ARMED F. JANKOWSKI, 36169174, sergeant, INF, Company A, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Koenig, Germany. During the attack on Koenig, Germany, the attacking rifleman of Company A became pinned down. He did not move without being fired on by the entire company being bombarded by heavy enemy fire. Nearly everyone stayed under cover in trenches or lay prone in the ground. Sergeant Jankowski, with his section leader, another squad leader and two machine gunners made the hull in the advance by climbing up a steep railroad cut and of necessity in full view of the enemy, put up a machine gun and started a counteroffensive. Through the excellent overlaid fire of the machine gunners, the riflemen immediately advanced on the enemy positions taking approximately 35 prisoners, three 20-mm anti tank and continuing on to take their objectives. Entered military service from Michigan.

JAMES E. MICHALL, 34433295, sergeant, INF, Company K, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 5 April 1945, in the vicinity of Lilsbach, Germany. Sergeant Michall by his courage in the face of fire reflects great credit on himself and on the military service. Entered the military service from North Carolina.

ALVIN G. MILLER, 35797713, Technician Fifth Grade, MED, Medical Detachment, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 31 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarlautern, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Miller and another litter bearer advanced through heavy enemy small arms fire to reach a casualty in a forward observation post which was isolated by the enemy. In executing the wounded man, fierce enemy fire drove the litter bearers and their litter into the cover of a railroad. While reconnoitering a safe route of evacuation

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The other litter bearer was seriously wounded. Technician Fifth Grade MILLAMY ran through the burning building fire to return with the needed aid to evacuate the other patient. His fearless action reflects great credit on Technician Fifth Grade MILLAMY and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military medical corps. Awarded military service from Headquarters.

2. Captain W. B. MILLI, 5014205, Staff Sergeant, USA, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, 10th Service Battalion in connection with military operations against the enemy from 10 November 1944 to 17 December 1944, in France. On 10 December 1944, during an attack in the vicinity of [redacted] [redacted], he drove two 50-pounds enemy mines, and opened surprise fire on his company. His movement within quickly led to small group of men to his position. During this time he was able to hold off the Germans until the mine fields were filled, thus preventing the Germans from attacking. After the capture of [redacted] on 10 December 1944, to 17 December 1944, he continued to hold off the Germans, and as a result became, and still is, one of the best of his troops who successfully participated in the successful defense of [redacted] against the Germans. Captain W. B. MILLI, USA, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, 10th Service Battalion, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for his gallantry and special skill in the field of combat, and his great leadership qualities.

Sgt. M. K. WILSON, 25 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Wilson, Company H, 377th Infantry, 92nd Division, was severely wounded in combat with military operations against the Germans at Lauterbach, in the vicinity of Frankfurt, Germany. During the early morning hours, December 18, 1944, while stationed in a ruined building, he was hit by a hand grenade which exploded upon being discharged. He was hit in the left arm, shoulder and chest. After being hit, he refused medical treatment, preferring to continue his mission. His refusal to receive medical aid resulted in the loss of his right arm and the loss of his life. He died in the hospital at Frankfurt, Germany, December 20, 1944.

JOHN H. McCOLLUM, BAPTIST, 20 years old, Company A, 177th Infantry, 44th Division, serving in the National Guard; a recruit in August, 1918, at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, and has not been overseas. In April, 1919, he was promoted to the rank of corporal. He is a member of the First Baptist Church, Washington, D. C., where he is a deacon. His wife, Mrs. John H. McCollum, is a widow, residing at 1220 14th Street, N.W., Washington, D. C., and has two children, a son, John H. McCollum, Jr., 10 years old, and a daughter, Mary, 7 years old.

lead tank of an infantry-tank column, he led his squad in capturing 40 of the enemy who had forced the column to stop and were causing heavy casualties. Sergeant McQuillan's personal courage under fire contributed greatly to his company's success. His heroic achievement reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Washington, D. C.

LAWRENCE WHITFIELD, 35315696, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company G, 370th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 8 & 9 April 1945, in the vicinity of Mühldorf am Inn, Germany. Staff Sergeant Whitfield dashed into a burning building full of self propelled "88's", saved the lives of three of his comrades, and then for eliminating a sniper who was harassing the advance of his platoon. Staff Sergeant Whitfield's intrepid, courageous service reflects great credit on himself and on the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

CHARLES W. BOYD, 16142279, Sergeant, INF, Company H, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 1 & 2 November 1944, in the vicinity of Weizsäcker-Liebenau, Germany. Sergeant Boyd, a heavy machine gun, Sergeant Boyd was painfully wounded when the face and chest were hit by a hand grenade weapon and the ammunition box attached to his weapon had exploded the magazine. Through exertion, he continued to select his gun, which was in support of Company H, finally succumbing the second exerting casualties. The intrepid devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Boyd reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

R. H. HILL, 3659484, Technical Sergeant, LR, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 20 January 1945, at Berlgutern, Germany. When a technical sergeant of his platoon came under an intensive artillery barrage, he, without regard for his own safety, moved from position to position repositioning his men. During the counter attack that followed he directed his fire to break up the attack. Still under intense fire, Technical Sergeant Hill led a group to the rear over 100 yds of exposed road for vital supplies. After his return he learned of a squad which was temporarily lost, and he stepped him to locate, rearm and lead the squad back to the front. Technical Sergeant Hill's resolute devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from California.

LEONARD A. SMITH, 34502070, Private First Class, INF, Company V, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, 30 December 1944, in Kravuttern, Germany. Private First Class Smith, subjected to heavy mortar and artillery fire and in full view of the enemy, expertly exposed to heavy observation, Private First Class Smith volunteered to bring up demolition charges to the front lines. While completing his mission, Private First Class Smith was wounded by mortar fire. In spite of his pain, he carried his demolition charge forward. Upon discovery that another charge had been dropped alone the way, he returned, still under fire, and picked up the charge and brought it up to the line. Private First Class Smith's devotion to duty reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

WILHELM D. SULFREDI, 32778655, Private First Class, INF, Company 4, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 January 1945, in Buerlauburn-Hodden, Germany. After Private First Class SULFREDI's squad had crossed a wide street under fire of the enemy, he discovered one of the squad lying in the middle of the street, wounded, and still being fired on. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, Private First Class SULFREDI returned to the point under deadly fire. He seized his comrade and dragged him to safety, saving his life. Private First Class SULFREDI's actions reflect great credit upon him and on the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

ALFRED LUMELLA, 36310321, Technical Sergeant, INF, Company H, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 November 1944, at Fort Gambetta, France. Technical Sergeant LUMELLA, while leading his machine gun squad through the arduous hell of a static weapons line, was severely wounded but continued to pour the fire of his weapons into the flanks of the fortress. He remained to be evacuated until his men were safely removed to a sheltered position. There he had covered the withdrawal of the rifle company he was supporting. Technical Sergeant LUMELLA displayed courageous leadership and outstanding ability that reflect credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

JOSEPH W. FALKEN, 31417412, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company I, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 November 1944, at Miviers-les-Metz, France. Staff Sergeant FALKEN, from his defense position on the slope, recognized that a patrol was moving up to his position. He waited until the patrol had passed close by and then fired hand grenades at them. His fire was seen by the enemy and in retaliation, staff Sergeant FALKEN and his comrade were wounded. Quickly seizing his comrade's gun, he opened fire, killing three Germans and wounding two. Staff Sergeant FALKEN's resolute devotion to duty and great credit upon him and exemplifies the traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Mass. chautts.

LEON A. GUNDY, 35773235, Private, MD, Medical Detachment, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 April 1945, in the vicinity of Vellinxhausen, Germany. On 4 April 1945, in association with the forward aid station at the Lippe River bridgehead, Private Leon A. GUNDY of 379th Serial, Medical Detachment Company I, located two seriously wounded in the station. Voices were cut off from the aid station, so the patient was sent back for those men to be moved by litter. During the difficult and dangerous road, Private GUNDY equipped a litter and went with improvised litters in front of after the patients. Despite German anti-air fire from the points on the road, he got through to the wounded and successfully evacuated the three most seriously wounded casualties over the same dangerous roads. His intrepidity and bravery under fire were particularly for bringing these men to treatment in time to help them. Entered military service from West Virginia.

FRANKLIN C. GIFFORD, 02011000, Second Lieutenant, Company A, 709th Field Artillery, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Kremberg, Germany. Second Lieutenant GIFFORD (then staff sergeant) was ordered to break through German lines to reach the 70th division. Making this mission, he and his squad

captured more than 100 prisoners and destroyed one Tiger tank. When his tank commander was wounded, he was placed in command of the platoon and has been in command ever since, giving more than adequate his and protection to the safety of infantry in his supporting. Entered military service from New York.

ALFRED P. MC NELLY, 44001111, Private First Class, On, Company G, 177th Infantry Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Westhofen, Germany. Private First Class MC NELLY, with most of his squad successfully making demolition in anti-personnel charges from a German road bridge spanning the Ruhr River, driving an important source of water for the city of Dusseldorf, and receiving an important communications link. Private First Class MC NELLY's heroic coolness while acting under enemy artillery fire, excellent leadership and coolness under fire, reflects great credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

GLEN A. OULMAN, 32337771, Private First Class, INF, Company H, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 20 January 1945, in Beekbergen-ierchen, Germany. His machine gun and cement wall completely surrounded, Private First Class OULMAN volunteered to bring up ammunition. Upon leaving the wall he was killed across the length of the wall by the blast of a mortar shell. Although unarmed, he determinedly followed the enemy to make an attempt. His courageous action caused five more enemy to surrender. Returning to his position with the ammunition, he thus enabled his squad to repel all enemy attacks. Private First Class OULMAN's great discipline, courage and coolness under fire reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

EDWARD HANNAH, 0512741, First Lieutenant, On, Company C, 320th Infantry Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 6 December 1944, in the vicinity of Steinhagen, Germany. After a strong enemy position held up the advance of the 320th Infantry Battalion, First Lieutenant HANNAH's platoon, he planned and carried out the destruction of the position. Personally leading a squad on his shoulders, pinning down, circling the position, executing captures, and with sufficient time decisions in the use of explosives to destroy the strongly constructed bunker, First Lieutenant HANNAH insured the success of his mission, and at price of his own life, an impossibly large civilian building was destroyed. Entered military service from Alabama.

CHILO KIRKLAND, 37042145, Sergeant, INF, Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 18 October 1944 to 7 April 1945, in the vicinity of Germany. While his battalion was establishing the initial positions in the area around in Metz, France, he observed enemy observation post and small arms fire to deliver vital information to the forward elements of his unit, which delivered several charges, after two previous attempts had failed. Finally, succeeded in delivering vitally needed ammunition and supplies by riding his bicycle road. With nightfall, darkness, he and his crew captured more than 30 prisoners who had been suppressed by the forward elements of the 377th Infantry. The brilliant vehicle and rear elements, First Lieutenant KIRKLAND's unusual devotion to duty, reflects great credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Missouri.

BILLY S. MC INNES, 34903922, Private First Class, I.M., Company F, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 18 October 1944 to 19 November 1944, and 10 April 1945 to 16 April 1945, in France and Germany. On 1 April 1945, Private First Class MC INNES crawled through a wooded area to about 100 yards of an enemy tank to a place of observation and with the information he secured, our tanks opened fire and forced the enemy tank to withdraw. About an hour later, while he and two comrades were holding lines in a ravine, Germany, they discovered and killed 20 enemy who were attempting to retreat over lines. His initiative and devotion to duty reflect great credit on Private First Class MC INNES. Entered military service from New York.

DALE W. POWERS, 37426346, Technician Second Lieutenant, I.M., Company K, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 8 November 1944, in the vicinity of Leinburg-Linsitz, France. When the pilot of a plane was wounded, Technical Second Lieutenant POWERS expertly commanded the plane until the officer returned to the cockpit. The following morning he led the plane to the height of the sky; pilot, and organized a successful landing in the position. Technical Second Lieutenant POWERS exemplary leadership in combat actions reflects great credit upon him. He exemplifies the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

CHARLES MC DONALD, 37860310, Private First Class, I.M., Company K, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 January 1945, in Ober-Guttenbach, Germany. When fired on by two machine guns while a member of a patrol in an occupied house, Private First Class MC DONALD dashed forward to silence the machine gunners, eliminating one enemy rifleman. Then, after receiving three rounds of bazooka fire on the house, he cover of the position skillfully, darting in and out among the windows and doors of the entire house of fire, causing the surrender. Private First Class MC DONALD'S courageous devotion to duty exemplifies great credit on him and the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

CHARLES G. PETERS, 36001476, Private First Class, I.M., Company L, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Berlin-Wittenberg, Germany. Private First Class PETERS had suffered two casualties from a concealed sniper. With complete disregard for his own safety, he crawled his way through the rubble past the sniper. In doing this he was initially seen in the retreat as previously anticipated on his mission. He succeeded in killing the sniper, and causing another to surrender to him. Private First Class PETERS resolute devotion to duty reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

EDWARD A. PLECH, 36262120, Technician Fifth Grade, TD, Battalion Detachment, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations, on 18 November 1944, in the vicinity of Oberleuburg, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade PLECH rode his jeep through the enemy fire and ministered first aid to a seriously stricken com. He determined

effort to save his wounded comrade's life, Technician Fifth Grade, PISCM performed his work in face of heavy enemy fire. When more casualties were sustained from the continuing enemy fire, he gave aid to comrades of his own company and to casualties of other units in the vicinity, reportedly crossing the steep terrain to reach wounded men. Technician Fifth Grade PISCM's cool courage and medical skill have saved many lives and contributed greatly to his Company's accomplishments in combat. His fearless action reflects distinct credit on himself and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

LEON L. HULZ, 37208550, Staff Sergeant, Inf, Company F, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 8 & 9 November 1944 in the vicinity of Maizières-les-Metz, France. Staff Sergeant HULZ volunteered to move beyond the lines of friendly troops to an abandoned factory well within the enemy lines. With utter disregard for his own safety, Staff Sergeant HULZ was able to bring in a veritable rain of mortar shells on enemy positions forcing them to withdraw. The next day he took the place of a forward observer who had been wounded and from an exposed position reported his performance of the previous day. In evidence of devotion to duty reflect his high in the military service and himself. Entered military service from Kansas.

WILLIAM F. MUSCH, 36175587, Sergeant, Inf, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 13 December 1944, in the vicinity of Bruchsal, Germany. Sergeant MUSCH was painfully wounded by shrapnel and sent back to the aid station. Returning to his company's position, which in his absence had changed, Sergeant MUSCH crawled through友 fire and found himself surrounded by four enemy ones. Opened fire, Sergeant MUSCH cleared them off and, without pause and forcing the remaining two to surrender. His courageous action exemplifies the high traditions of the military service and reflect distinct credit on Sergeant MUSCH. Entered military service from Arkansas.

PATRICK T. O'LEARY, 32054142, Private First Class, Inf, Company E, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in the vicinity of Bruchsal, Germany. During an attack on an enemy airfield, Private First Class O'LEARY's platoon became separated from the rest of the company. Late that night Private First Class O'LEARY volunteered to lead a patrol from the company CP through enemy held territory to contact the first platoon. Taking his patrol through 2000 yards of hostile territory, he located the platoon and directed their safe return through

JOHN H. JOHNSON, 3511813, Private First Class, Inf, Company E, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 13 April 1945, in the vicinity of Bruchsal, Germany. During an attack on an enemy airfield, Private First Class JOHNSON's platoon became separated from the rest of the company. Late that night he volunteered to lead a patrol from the company CP through enemy held territory to contact the first platoon. Taking his patrol through 2000 yards of hostile territory, he located the platoon and directed their safe return through

enemy fire to the company area. Entered military service from Ohio.

JOHN KELLY, 36357456, Sergeant, I.F., Company E, 378th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 12 December 1944, in the vicinity of Landau, Germany. Sergeant Kelly volunteered to operate the radio at a relay station on the Saar River. Heavy artillery fire falling in the area caused the men of the unit to be seriously wounded and the serial numberant Kelly's radio to go out. In spite of the intense enemy fire, Sergeant Kelly exposed himself to the flying shrapnel to give first aid to the wounded men. Even though it was pitch dark and artillery fire continued to come in, Sergeant Kelly was able to repair his radio and operate his station until code was established. Sergeant Kelly's courage and resourcefulness under the most difficult conditions of intense enemy, heavy enemy fire and darkness reflect great credit upon him both during the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

SILVIO J. GAO, 36184819, Private First Class, I.F., distinguished Company, 3rd Battalion, 376th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 13 December 1944, in the vicinity of Landau, Germany. Private First Class Gao was operating a supply boat on the Saar River, carrying supply parties with supplies for troops in the town of Landau. When the town was subjected to concentrated enemy artillery fire, two men in Private First Class Gao's boat were killed, and others wounded. In spite of the danger to himself, Private First Class Gao quickly returned the wounded men to shore in immediate evacuation. He is highly recommended to cross the small-swept river, transporting supply parties. Private Gao's gallantry, heroism under heavy enemy fire is in keeping with the high traditions in the military service and reflects great credit upon him. Entered the military service from Michigan.

ROBERT W. KEMPT, Jr., 0572852, Second Lieutenant, I.F., Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 24 December 1944, at Milsdorf, Germany. Second Lieutenant Kempt saw the company of the first machine gun platoon of Company A as it was suddenly forced to abandon their positions on the Saar River. Lieutenant Kempt, carrying a machine gun post and direct counterbattery fire, crossed the river in the dark. In a illumination on, Germany, on 10 January 1945, he and his platoon had just advanced with defensive positions on the Saar River. At Milsdorf, on fire, and assumed a counter observation post on the right flank of the battalion front from which he directed counter concentrations on the enemy. His initiative and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon him and Lieutenant Kempt and in the military service. Entered the military service from Illinois.

CHARLES J. MARSH, Jr., 34976237, Private First Class, I.F., Company F, 378th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 1 April 1945, in the Lehr Valley, Germany. Private First Class Marsh was the primary liaison link in security on the combat front. The patrols he conducted were extremely hazardous, fire and smoke exposed him to the enemy. On the night of 1 April 1945, the right flank was exposed. Private First Class Marsh, with a machine gun in the lead, moved in his position until about 0100 hours. In this position with his machine gun held in a horizontal position, he was tightly packed to the rear of the patrol. Private First Class Marsh, using relief credit on himself in the military service. Entered military service from Georgia.

JOHN B. STARCHESKI, 53743301, Sergeant, INF, Company G, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 31 March 1945, in the vicinity of Breitenfurt, Germany. In this extremely dangerous zone with his squad he stopped by heavy machine gun fire and Sergeant Starcheski and his squad were sent to knock the guns out. Under a heavy volume of fire he led his squad successfully in capturing one of the guns and then with the other went at it with the loss of only one of his men. Sergeant Starcheski's valiant action killed ten of the enemy and captured four more thus making it possible for the column to advance. Sergeant Starcheski's leadership and gallantry during these reflect great credit on himself and on the military service he has entered.

CHARLES R. WILKINSON, 30432392, Staff Sergeant, FA, Battery B, 920th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 23 December 1944 to 29 December 1944, in the vicinity of Wallerfangen, Germany. Staff Sergeant Wilkinson assisted in establishing a forward observation post on the west bank of the Saar River to direct fire on suitable objectives, including tanks on the east bank. Heavy patrols infiltrated into the town and the town was subjected to artillery and mortar fire. In spite of constant heavy mortar and artillery fire, Staff Sergeant Wilkinson remained at his post in direct artillery liaison, harassing the enemy troops and their supply. His heroic devotion to duty exemplifies the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on himself. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

ROBERT A. WILLE, 16024956, Private First Class, LA, Company E, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 25 December 1944, in the vicinity of Koenigswinter, Germany. While under fire of a flank team, Private First Class Wille advanced to a position that enabled him to fire his machine gun into the enemy position. In this act, however, he forced to leave the place, thus enabling the platoon to move forward and capture the gun. Thirty two prisoners in nearby positions were taken from the enemy.

KENNETH J. NOOL, 53726056, Private First Class, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 25 December 1944, in the vicinity of Breitenfurt, Germany. Private First Class Nool was radio operator for the forward observer of the 81mm mortar platoon. The OP was located in a partially destroyed building. In order to get clear reception, Private First Class Nool moved the radio to the upper part of the building which was exposed to the enemy. Although the entire area was being bombed by heavy aircraft, mortars and small arms fire, he stayed in the exposed position, continuing to radio back the fire orders of the forward observers. His act undoubtedly prevented heavy anti-aircraft fire on the enemy, enabling many comrades to live. Entered military service from Michigan.

EDWARD WITCOMB, 3416293, Corporal, INF, Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 20 December 1944, in the vicinity of Metz, France. During the attack, three tanks of General Wick's unit came under intense enemy artillery fire. Corporal Witcomb, with complete disregard for his personal safety, crawled across the open terrain under the most intense fire and carried the wounded men to a new concealed

position. Corporal TUTOKY'S unselfish and heroic action under intense enemy fire reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

CHARLES H. VILSON, 38430573 Technician Fifth Grade, INF, Company L, 379th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 March 1945, in the vicinity of Uerdin, Germany. During a company night attack, Technician Fifth Grade VILSON, first runner on call for machine gun squad, covered his company's advance. Heavy resistance met the entered and fired the ensuing fire, Technician Fifth Grade VILSON was wounded. He refused evacuation and remained on his post delivering counter fire on the enemy positions until the company's objective was secured. He then was given first aid and evacuated. Technician Fifth Grade VILSON'S distinct courage reflects great credit on himself and on the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

LEONARD H. WILLETT, 35088120 Private First Class, INF, Company G, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 23 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarleuterbach, Germany. Private First Class WILLETT on many occasions was a source of confidence to the men in the squad. On one particular occasion, reported smoke, remains and enemy rifle fire kept the squad alert but there was no way to determine the exact location from which the fire was coming. Private First Class WILLETT volunteered to take up an observation post outside the bunker where he was certain to draw enemy fire to try to locate the source. He stayed at the post directing fire for many hours, entering the pillbox only when visibility became difficult.

WILLIAMS MORTON, 12100360 Private First Class, INF, Company M, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, from 9 November 1944 to 25 January 1945, in France, Germany. Private First Class MORTON, a radio operator for the forward observer of the mortar platoon, on his own initiative, voluntarily took command of a disorganized machine gun squad whose leader was wounded in a heavy hostile mortar barrage at Saarleuterbach, Germany on 19 January 1945. During the attack on Fort Guisbette, France, 16 November 1944, Private First Class MORTON, without regard for his own safety went to the aid of wounded riflemen who was lying in an exposed position. Crawling forward to the casualty, he valiantly removed the man to a place of safety, where he administered first aid. Private First Class MORTON'S exemplary performance of his duties reflects credit upon his self and exemplifies the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Delaware.

OLAND L. LANDFORD, 32940997 Private First Class, MED, Medical Battalion, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations, on 9 April 1945, in the vicinity of Wirschin, Germany. While under direct small arms fire from the enemy, Private First Class LANDFORD moved to aid a wounded comrade. He administered first aid and evacuated the man to safety. His selfless and heroic action exemplify the highest traditions of the military service and reflect distinct credit on Private First Class LANDFORD. Entered military service from New York.

EDWARD C. GILLIS, 31424304, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 577th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 7 April 1945, in the vicinity of Berlin, Germany. Private first class Gillis, as runner for the supporting platoon, was operating a 50 caliber machine gun. With his platoon resistance, the assault platoons had caught in Hitler's shell arm and machine gun fire, he crawled to a more advanced area about 100 yards from where he radioed his platoon's situation. Even though the enemy tanks were operating about 60 yards to his front and friendly artillery was near him, he maintained his position and continued communication. Privy to first class Gillis' devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

LEONARD A. GIBSON, 34375267, Staff Sergeant, CH, Company B, 320th Engineer Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 7 & 8 December 1944, in the vicinity of Lissendorf, Germany. During the night 7-8 December 1944, an attempt was made to construct a floating bridge across the Rhine in the vicinity of Lissendorf, Germany, but artillery and mortar fire was so heavy in the bridge site that very little progress was made. In order to carry supplies to troops in the bridgehead area, Staff Sergeant Gibson assembled all available boats and organized a flotilla. Service to the bridge site to the fire above and evacuation wounded on the return trips. Due to the swiftness of the current and continuous enemy fire which made the operation extremely hazardous, Staff Sergeant Gibson worked through the night during the delivery of ammunition and supplies to troops on the enemy side of the river at Lissendorf. Entered military service from Tennessee.

I. MEDAL OF SILVER STAR: by direction of the President, and under the privilege of an O.D.O.-45, as follows, and Section I, Weekly Information Bulletin, Number 40, "U. S. ARMY", 6 October 1945, the Silver Star is awarded to the following:

JOHN E. LEE, 0152212, Second Lieutenant, Inf., Company H, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 3 November 1944, in the vicinity of Montebourg, France. Second Lieutenant Lee, acting as forward observer for his mortar squad which was in support of an attacking battalion, worked with his company to an observation post in front of the rifle troops. During the attack the battalion was forced to withdraw and his company became one of the last units to hold their position. After five hours, Second Lieutenant Lee was wounded and later captured. His personal courage and gallant devotion to duty exemplify the high traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon him. Entered military service from Ohio.

ELIAS L. OLENAK, 01100301, Captain, Co., Company G, 520th Infantry Battalion, for gallantry in action against the enemy, during the period 20 November 1944 to 20 January 1945, in the vicinity of Metz, France and Wittenberg, Germany. During this period, Captain Olenak moved continually with the most forward elements of his company, inspiring them to heroic efforts by his cool courage and brilliant leadership. On the afternoon of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of Oberfelsberg, Germany, the enemy, firmly entrenched in Oberfelsberg, were fiercely resisting an advancing infantry. Tanks and antitank guns, urgently needed, were held up by an anti-tank ditch blocking the road leading to Oberfelsberg. Captain Olenak was supervising the construction of a temporary bridge in the road, in full view of the enemy. A few minutes after construction started, the enemy laid a heavy salvo of mortar bombs on the bridge site, forcing the engineers to take cover in the ditch. Captain Olenak, knowing the imperative need for the bridge, called a halt to the center of the road and called upon his men to return. All, who were inspired by the cool courage of their leader, that day proved the most gallant and completed the construction of the bridge. In this and repeated occasions, Captain Olenak's continual courage, leadership and personal example were the constant inspiration which led his officer and men to perform the valiant deeds necessary to accomplish their mission. Entered military service from Virginia.

GORDON N. STONE, 3444343, Private First Class, Inf., Company F, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, 19 April 1945, in Bonn, Germany. Private First Class Stone volunteered to lead two

ther riflemen to a French P. Camp and effect the surrender of the enemy guards. In him, the French officers prisoner, he led his group 1000 yards out of his company's sector and received fire from two enemy guards who were defending a road block approximately 500 yards from the camp. These guards were reinforced by a truck load of enemy riflemen who were driving down the road. He was supported by Private First Class STOM provided such heavy small arms fire that the entire enemy group was forced to flee by vehicle. When they reached the camp, Private First Class STOM overpowered one of the guards and is shot his group to distribute the weapons from the first group of enemy guards. Then the French Pws fled, together with one of the French officers, and division the surrender of the entire garrison, approximately 600 of them. Priv. First Class STOM's aggressive action was responsible for the capture of at least 500 of the enemy and the release of over 3000 French citizens held captive. His initiative and devotion to duty reflects distinct credit on him and the military service. Entered military service from Alaska.

LEWIS C. SMITH, 01107153, Captain, Co., Company A, 320th Inf, 1st Battalion, for gallantry in action against the enemy, from 5 December 1944 to 10 Dec. 1945, in Germany. Captain Smith's cool personal courage and leadership, often in the face of enemy fire, constantly inspired the officers and men of his command to exert themselves to the utmost. His courageous and skillful leadership and superior technical knowledge were exemplified during the assault of the Siegfried Line in the vicinity of Saarbruecken. During the action at Saarbruecken, Company A, under his personally supported assault waves, resulting in killing, wounding or capturing many of the thru to the infantry. His leadership, again displayed while Company A was sent back to task force with during the reduction of the Lehr pocket, including prompt removal of road blocks, and by trapping mines, the bridging construction which materially assisted the infantry in their swift advance and destruction of the enemy. During this entire period, Captain Smith, while exhibiting undying zeal, sure professional skill and inspiring personal courage, caused the greatest silent admiration for which he was later exalted. Only upon cessation of active combat did he seek retreat for himself. Entered military service from Louisiana.

MICHAEL L. SPENCER, 35705219, Sergeant, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, 1st Battalion, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 29 November 1944 and 10 December 1944, in the vicinity of St. Barbara and Brakeltern, Germany. On 29 November 1944 in St. Barbara, Germany, the vehicle which Sergeant Spencer was driving care under the fire of an enemy tank. He jumped from the vehicle and while firing his rifle at the tank's vision slits was hit in the head by shrapnel from a shell fired by the tank. He lost consciousness and when he regained his senses he returned to his company under cover of his own rifle fire. On 10 December 1944 he was again wounded by an enemy grenade. Undaunted by his wounds and consciousness, Sergeant Spencer materialled into a position of local counter attack. His devotion to duty and personal courage reflect great credit on Sergeant Spencer and on the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

ROBERT C. ROSENBLUM, 37446515, Sergeant, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 18 November 1944 and 26 January 1945, at Metz, France, and Brakeltern-Loden, Germany. During the battle for the city of Metz, France, Sergeant Rosenblum rode his jeep under fire, to a building which overlooked the enemy position. With courage

fire he killed three enemy soldiers running machine gun. This enabled a rifle company to continue the advance. During the enemy counter attack at Saarlautern-Hohen, Germany, one machine gun squad was cut off and isolated. When its squad leader was killed, Sergeant MORNAL volunteered to go to its aid. Despite a wound, he worked his way to the billet under intense artillery, mortar and automatic weapons fire. Upon reaching the position, he at once reorganized the squad and established communications with the rest of the company. His action held up the enemy attack with many losses. Sergeant MORNAL's complete disregard for his own personal safety to heroically assist his buddies reflects credit upon him and upon the traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Nebraska.

ALFRED W. KELLY, 339119, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, fought gallantly in action against the enemy, on 8 November 1944, in the vicinity of Buzieres-les-Metz, France. Observing a hole in a fence through which enemy snipers were firing into our positions, Private First Class KELLY and two comrades volunteered to eliminate the opposition. Moving in the face of heavy fire and fire continuously, he was able to kill two and wound a third enemy soldier. Observing two more enemy soldiers escaping through an entrenchment he ran after them, killing both while exposing himself to enemy fire. His devotion to duty and courage still reflects great credit upon his fighting service and upon Private First Class KELLY. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

JULIUS HANLONIZ, 12221028, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company F, 377th Infantry Regiment, fought gallantly in action against the enemy, from 13 October 1944 to 10 April 1945, in France and Germany. In Metz, France, on 20 November 1944, he led a platoon of five sent out to clear a house that was holding up the advance of the platoon. The house defended by five of the enemy, using a machine gun and rifles, was taken only after a room to room, hand-to-hand assault. Five enemy soldiers were taken prisoner. In Frœschweier, Germany, on 10 December 1944, when his squad leader was killed by an enemy artillery barrage, he took over the command of the squad, assisted in the rendering of first aid to the other men who were injured, personally made a trip through open terrain swept by machine gun fire to bring back medical aid on litters, and then helped evacuate the wounded, again crossing 50 yards of open terrain. His leadership, regardless of his cost, will reflect great credit on Staff Sergeant HANLONIZ and on the military service. Entered military service from New York.

LOUIS E. HANK, 36977063; Sergeant, INF, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, fought gallantly in action against the enemy, on 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of St. Vith, Germany. A 105 enemy machine gun position was located by Sergeant Hank, who realized its potential threat to an attack to the position the next day. He left the safety of his foxhole to destroy the position in his initiative. As he entered the position, the machine gun fired on him. He returned this fire, and destroyed the position with a hand grenade killing six of its occupants. The sacrifice and courage of Sergeant Hank are inspiring with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon him. Entered military service from Illinois.

JOHN J. O'LEARY, 01059006, First Lieutenant, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, fought gallantly in action against the enemy, on 20 January 1945,

in the vicinity of Saarlautern-Hohen, Germany. First Lieutenant MORSI demonstrated unusual courage and superior leadership in repelling an enemy counter attack on his platoon when over fifty enemy soldiers dressed in camouflage gear and armed with primitive weapons, flamethrowers and demolitions attacked his platoon between the hours of 0330 and 0600. Notified by the outpost of the infiltration, First Lieutenant MORSI went forward, disregarding his own safety, and personally directed the defense of the outpost. When it became evident that they would have to withdraw, he led his men back successfully through such opposition as encountered. First Lieutenant MORSI's courage and leadership typify the high traditions of the military service and reflect credit upon him. Entered military service from Alabama.

~~John~~ M. LAMBERT, 36978303, Technical Sergeant, INF, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, Parachute Infantry in action against the enemy, on 15 December 1944, in the vicinity of Saarlautern, Germany. During an enemy counter attack, Technical Sergeant LAMBERT exposed himself to enemy machine gun fire to rescue a wounded comrade. He then located an enemy machine gun which was effectively covering the enemy advance, crawled forward under heavy fire to gain a better field of fire, and fired one round from a bazooka at the position. Fire from this enemy machine gun forced Technical Sergeant LAMBERT to an alternate position from which his second round silenced the enemy weapon. Another enemy machine gun, located in a nearby lane, which was also covering the enemy attack was destroyed by his third bazooka round. He then returned to his men and directed their fire in successfully repelling the determined attack. The high courage and leadership of Technical Sergeant LAMBERT which inspired his comrades and materially aided in repelling the enemy counter attack, reflects most credit upon him and is keeping with the high traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Lawrence W. KEMPNER, 444131, First Lieutenant, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, Parachute Infantry in action against the enemy, from 20 November 1944 to 2 December 1944 and on 13 December 1944 in the vicinity of St. Vith and Saarlautern, Germany. On 13 November 1944, First Lieutenant KEMPNER led a twelve man patrol through heavy enemy artillery fire to seize a hill strategic hill in the vicinity of St. Vith, Germany. In the subsequent defense of this position, two of the enemy were killed. First Lieutenant KEMPNER, accompanied by his platoon sergeant, made five patrols behind enemy lines during this infiltration. On 11 December 1944 he directed concentrated fire from his position against the enemy lines. On 13 December 1944, First Lieutenant KEMPNER recommended an immediate attack across the railroad tracks in Saarlautern, Germany, clearing 21 houses and one pillbox and taking 12 prisoners. During this fight he exposed himself on a rooftop and with非凡的勇敢 killed two enemy machine gunners, forcing the gun out of action. The courageous leadership and complete disregard for his personal safety displayed by First Lieutenant KEMPNER reflect great credit on himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Vance L. JOHNSON, 14024503, Private First Class, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, Parachute Infantry in action against the enemy, on 20 January 1945, in Saarlautern-Hohen, Germany. With his outpost machine gun under direct attack from the enemy, Private First Class JOHNSON remained at his post. His fortitude prevented the enemy from infiltration. As a result of his accurate fire twelve enemy soldiers were killed and six wounded. Private First Class JOHNSON's devotion to duty and commendable action reflect credit upon him and the military service. Entered military service from Tennessee.

JOHN H. GILST, 0367879, First Lieutenant, INF, Company H, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 8 November 1944, in the vicinity of Monobois Woods, France. On the night of 8 November 1944, first Lieutenant GILST was ordered to support the battalion attack with his anti machine gun. He went forward under heavy concentration of enemy mortar and artillery fire to reconnoiter for advanced positions, and while moving through the smoke and fire detonated a mine which rendered his rifle foot useless. Disregarding the extreme pain, First Lieutenant GILST crawled his way back through the smoke and fire to warn the following rifle companies of the useless lives. Only after he had contacted the rifle companies did he make his way to the information center, gave valuable information before he was evacuated. First Lieutenant GILST's resourcefulness, leadership, and courage reflect great credit on him and exemplify the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Kentucky.

MARY L. GOHLMAN, 36677740, Sergeant, INF, Company F, 377th Infantry, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of Kehlhausen, Germany. When enemy machine guns were in infiltrating our platoon and had already killed his platoon leader, Sergeant Gohlman made a quick appraisal of the situation and promptly organized a group of men to flank the enemy and so that the platoon could advance. In the assault, with revolvers and rifles, two of the enemy were killed, five were captured, two were forced to flee to positions of safety, and one enemy machine gun was captured. His fearlessness, high combat skill, and gallantry in action reflect great credit on Sergeant Gohlman. Entered military service from Michigan.

ALVIN R. PHILLIPS, 35411334, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 10 April 1945, in the vicinity of Ulzen, Germany. When Company A attacked Ulzen, Germany it was held up by fire from a 20mm gun emplacement. As a member of the gun crew, Staff Sergeant Phillips showed great courage and gallantry when he charged the position across open terrain and killed or wounded the gunner holding the position, permitting the company to continue the attack. Entered military service from Ohio.

FRANCIS B. CALDWELL, 39052443, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company I, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 21 November 1944, at Metz, France. While searching the third floor of an enemy barracks, Staff Sergeant CALDWELL was fired upon and returned the fire, mortally wounding one and killing another enemy soldier who crusied, and officer who fled. He tried to surrender. He engaged eight more enemy soldiers and one officer and the six remaining enemy. His superb courage and coolness under fire typify the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit on him. Entered the military service from California.

MARY G. BOOGARD, 37286767, Technical Sergeant, INF, Company F, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, from 11 October 1944 to 11 December 1944 and from 14 December 1944 to 10 April 1945, in respect to Germany. On 20 November 1944, in Metz, France, as a member of the command of his squad when his squad leader was unable to advance due to heavy enemy fire. After several members of his squad had been wounded by the enemy, in particular himself, Technical Sergeant BOOGARD volunteered

to crawl forward, under direct enemy observation to the enemy position and throw the hand grenades into the concentration. In a, n this bold and fearless action, his comrades were encouraged to follow and resulted in the capture of over 40 prisoners. His resourcefulness and gallantry in action reflect great credit and high moral character throughout. Entered military service from Illinois.

JOHN BLIZZAK, 01315661, first Lieutenant, Inf, Company C, 379th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 12 April 1945, in the Lehr Valley, Germany. For leadership and gallantry in leading Company C through a successful night attack. First Lieutenant Blizzak personally coordinated the movement of the machine gun nests and units in positions, extracting the second platoon from under fire to successfully taking the company's final objective. First Lieutenant Blizzak's courage and utter disregard for his own life is exemplary and is keeping with the high tradition of the military service. Entered military service from New York.

LEWIS BLANK, 32635959, Staff Sergeant, Inf, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 29 November 1944, in December 1944, in the vicinity of St. Mere-Eglise, France. On 29 November 1944, while delivering ammunition to Lt. Sorenson, Company B, in the face of artillery and small arms fire, Staff Sergeant Blank volunteered to move a vehicle, loaded the 37mm gun crew, and with the vehicle moved it to the required position. He remained with the gun and vehicle until both were destroyed by tank fire and he was rendered unconscious by explosion. On 10 December 1944, while delivering supplies to his company in the vicinity of Freulichau, Germany, Staff Sergeant Blank was wounded and his machine gun destroyed. Needless to say when he went forward he delivered the supplies to his company. His courage and loyalty a Staff Sergeant Blank reflect great credit and honor in the military service. Entered military service from New York.

JOHN J. BLOCH, 35516191, Staff Sergeant, Inf, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 14 November 1944, on 10 December 1944, in the vicinity of Bertrange and Metz, France. On 14 November 1944, Staff Sergeant Bloch volunteered to lead carrying party which was taking important supplies across the civilian occupied river, the Moselle River, to Germany which was isolated in Bertrange, France. On 10 December 1944, during the attack on Metz, France, Staff Sergeant Bloch volunteered to make a mine field crossing to a truck, carrying mines in the direction of two enemy machine gun positions, in the direction given of the enemy were killed and sixteen captured. The courage and alert conduct of Staff Sergeant Bloch under fire reflects great credit and typifies the highest traditions in the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

EDWARD J. BONHOMMI, 37724444, Technical Sergeant, Inf, Company B, 377th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action against the enemy, on 10 December 1944, in the vicinity of Brulestein, Germany. During an enemy counter-attack, Technical Sergeant Bonhommi threw a broken telephone wire to an interrupted heavy artillery mortar fire. His rifle destroyed in his hand by shrapnel, he repaired the wire only to be rendered unconscious by the explosion of the shellfire. When Technical Sergeant Bonhommi regained his

senses he repaired the again broken line. During the attack, he continually repaired ruptured wires several times while under heavy fire. The inspiring devotion to duty and heroic action of Technical Sergeant ANGLEY reflects great credit on him and the military service. Entered military service from Kansas.

II. HONORABLE, POSTHUMOUS, OF BORNED STAFF SGT: by direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Section I, Weekly Information Bulletin Number 40, Hq., Second Army, 6 October 1945, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

LIEUTENANT LEWIS PLINKINS, 37210061, Staff Sergeant, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 1 December 1944, in the vicinity of St. Barbara, Germany. His company being halted by fierce machine gun fire supported by tanks, Staff Sergeant PLINKINS immediately led his squad around the left flank and destroyed two machine guns and then led an open assault on the third machine gun position. In the course of the action he was killed but his inspiring and continuous and overwhelming leadership. The high courage and sterling leadership displayed by Staff Sergeant PLINKINS reflects great credit on the military service and upon himself. Entered military service from Kansas.

III. HONORABLE OF BORNED STAFF SGT: by direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Section I, Weekly Information Bulletin Number 40, Hq., Second Army, 6 October 1945, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the full : :

FRANK S. FULLINGHAM, 37286147, Staff Sergeant, Cpl, Company A, 320th Infantry Battalion, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 2 December 1944, in the vicinity of Fulda, Germany. During the advance to the Saar River, the infantry overran a large crater road block which seriously restricted movement of the armor supporting the attack. Staff Sergeant FULLINGHAM, knowing that it was imperative that the road be opened at the earliest possible moment, brought up two squads of engineers and working continuously under shellfire, supervised the filling in of the crater. Within two hours the road was open allowing the armor to move forward to the support of the infantry. Staff Sergeant FULLINGHAM's leadership, courage and devotion to duty in accomplishing his mission reflects great credit on himself and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Minnesota.

IV. HONORABLE OF PAULISH, PVT: by direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Section I, Weekly Information Bulletin Number 40, Hq., Second Army, 6 October 1945, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the full : :

PAULISH, RICHARD K., 33887717, Private, INF, Company K, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 21 January 1945, in Saarlautern-Haagen, Germany. During a heavy enemy counter attack, with ammunition supplies becoming low, Private First Class PAULISH and two comrades volunteered to pack for supplies. Despite a severe artillery and mortar barrage he and his comrades made the 1,000 yard trip. Upon reaching the supply point, Private First Class PAULISH obtained the supplies and returned through that same hail of fire, thus enabling his platoon to repel the enemy attack. Private First Class PAULISH's resolute devotion to duty reflects great credit on him and on the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

BUNNELL K. MILLER, 37289374, Private First Class, INF, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 4 April 1945, in the vicinity of Berwicke, Germany. The 2nd Platoon, Company A, faced the 2nd Battalion in their attack over the Lippe River. Before they could be relieved they were cut off. As there was no other means of communication, Private First Class Miller volunteered to carry vital messages to this platoon. Braving death, fierce rifle and machine gun fire, he reached the platoon leader and there received more messages to be returned. He reportedly crossed the rough, fire covered terrain to deliver the messages that enabled the two units to coordinate their attack and effect the relief of the isolated unit. Entered military service from Illinois.

CARLINO F. LAM, 35410340, Technician Fifth Grade, INF, Company L, 377th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, on 15 November 1944, in the vicinity of Mirecourt-les-Metz, France. Receiving a message from his company that it was running low on ammunition, Technician Fifth Grade Lam started forward with a jerrycan of ammunition, with complete disregard for heavy enemy fire and in full knowledge involved in carrying ammunition and travelling through minefield, he transported the required ammunition to his company's location and completed the shipment. Technician Fifth Grade Lam's devotion to duty and carries the high traditions of the military service and reflects distinct credit upon him. Entered military service from Ohio.

IV. WARD OF THE STATE OF THE UNITED STATES SERVICE UNIT FLAG: Under the provisions of War Department Circular Number 245, dated 23 August 1944, Major is awarded to the Meritarius Service Unit Flag of Service Battery, 30th Field Artillery Battalion for distinguished devotion to duty and superior performance of exceptionally difficult tasks during the period 1 January 1945 to 1 July 1945.
