
Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer:

PERRY H GRAVES, 0417497, Captain, (formerly) Field Artillery. For gallantry in action. On ** April 1943 near *****, Tunisia Captain Graves artillery observer and liaison officer accompanied the Commanding Officer *** Infantry to the front line position. Here Captain Graves found that the best observation post offered an excellent view of the enemy positions but afforded no cover for himself. Realizing the danger, Captain Graves selected a more covered position for his radio operator but without regard for his personal safety occupied the observation post he had selected. Under heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire Captain Graves occupied this post until he was wounded and his radio operator killed. It was due to Captain Graves courageous and tireless efforts that his battalion was able to give such continuous and effective artillery support to the *** Infantry. I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named enlisted men:

✓ JOSEPH J MILLER, 32057683, Staff Sergeant, Medical Detachment, *** Infantry. For gallantry in action. On the *** of April 1943 at ** ***, Tunisia, Sergeant Miller, section leader, led a litter squad forward to evacuate casualties from the forward slope of a hill occupied by our troops. He was informed that it was impossible to get the casualties out because of intense enemy machine gun fire which was covering all approaches. Ordering his squad to remain under cover, Sergeant Miller alone crawled forward five hundred yards under direct enemy observation and fire. He reached his objective only to discover that the casualties were dead. It was at this time that the enemy machine guns found the range and opened fire on Sergeant Miller, severely wounding him through both legs. Waving his would-be rescuers back, he dragged himself to cover where he applied first aid and remained until dark when he was evacuated. Residence: Lowell, Massachusetts.

✓ ANGELO J BATTIATO, 32057537, Technician Fourth Grade, Medical Detachment, *** Infantry. For gallantry in action. On the *** of August 1943 in the town of ***, Sicily, Sergeant Battiato, with the aid of another soldier, volunteered to bring much needed medical supplies to the forward observation post of an assault company in response to an urgent call from the Battalion Surgeon. The supply route passed through the town of ***, which, at the time, was being heavily shelled by enemy artillery. With complete disregard for his own safety, Sergeant Battiato led a mule loaded with blood plasma, bandage, and other supplies, through this artillery barrage. Completing the first trip and undaunted by the constant shelling, he returned for another load. In the return trip through the town, he was severely wounded by a shellburst which killed his comrade. His courage and devotion to duty as displayed by this gallant action reflects the true tradition of the United States Army and is an inspiration to all who served with him. Residence: Newark, New Jersey.

✓ JULIUS COLLINS, 18129582, Technician Fifth Grade, medical Detachment, *** Infantry. For gallantry in action. On the *** March 1943 at *****, Tunisia, while withdrawing with his platoon to a point of shelter, Technician Fifth Grade Collins' attention was drawn to a soldier, wounded in the back and leg, lying in an open field exposed to mortar and machine gun fire. With complete disregard for his own safety, Corporal Collins proceeded to the assistance of that soldier and despite concentrated enemy fire, managed to remove him to a sector of comparative safety, where life-saving first aid was administered and the soldier evacuated to the rear. On the same night, in the same front line sector, Corporal Collins gave further proof of his devotion to duty when, without regard to his personal safety, he administered first aid to the wounded Battalion Commander and supervised, and assisted in, his removal to a safe area. His heroism was an inspiration to every member of this command, and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the Service. Residence: Boswell, Oklahoma.

II - AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, a Soldier's medal is awarded to the following named enlisted man:

BENJAMIN O SPARKMAN, 34050585, Technician Fifth Grade, (then Private First Class), Medical Detachment, *** Infantry. For heroism not in actual conflict with the enemy. On the *** April 1943 at *****, Tunisia, Technician Fifth Grade Sparkman noticed a seriously wounded soldier lying in a mine field. The soldier's leg had been blown off and he was bleeding profusely. Though this mine field was heavily mined and laden with booby traps, Corporal Sparkman unhesitatingly ran with utter disregard for his personal safety, proceeded to the assistance of the wounded soldier. He applied first aid and remained with the soldier for two hours ascertaining before leaving that he was out of danger. He retraced his steps through the mine field, working with gauze bandage through which he brought litter bearers to the wounded man and directed his safe removal. Corporal Sparkman's heroism and devotion to duty was an inspiration to every member of his organization and was directly responsible for saving the wounded soldier's life. I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men:

ROBERT J. SATING, 0373138, Captain, Medical Corps, AUS, for gallantry in action, on ****, **** day of February 1943, 1 1/2 miles south of ****, Tunisia. Captain Sating became the only available surgeon due to casualties among neighboring medical personnel. For two days and two nights he attended the wounded of his own and neighboring American units, as well as those of a British Armoured Brigade. In order to reduce lines of litter evacuation, he caused his aid station to be placed in the Battalion Area and although subjected to constant hostile shell fire, he remained at his post without relief, rendered surgical attention and directed the evacuation of casualties without any regard for his personal safety. Residence: Cleveland Heights, Ohio.

WILLIAM A. WILKES, 0354214, Captain, *** Field Artillery Battalion. For gallantry in action. On the ****, of March, 1943, in the vicinity of ** ****, Tunisia, Captain Wilkes voluntarily moved his aid station from a protected position in the rear to a forward area which was exposed to enemy shell fire and air attack in order to be able to give prompt medical assistance to the firing batteries. With utter disregard for his personal safety, he proceeded on many occasions to battery positions which were being shelled or bombed, frequently while enemy planes were still overhead, thereby exposing himself to strafing attacks. His continuous concern for the welfare of the men and his conspicuous gallantry and courage in the face of danger were an inspiration to all men of the battalion and was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Lincolnton, Georgia.

HOWARD V WATTS JR, 01290857, 1st Lieutenant, Service Company, *** Infantry, for gallantry in action at *** *****, French Morocco, on * November 1942. Lt. Watts, with a party of seven men, left the transport USS ***** in a Higgins boat at 0130 and was taken along the hostile coast at **** **** in search of identifying landmarks

features which marked the proposed landing of the First Battalion, *** Infantry. Eluding enemy craft at the mouth of river, ***, the party made its way South along the coast about a mile off shore. When opposite the proposed beach, Lt. Watts and his men transferred to two rubber boats and paddled noiselessly in to within 200 yards of shore where they slit and sunk their boats and swam through the remaining surf in groups of two with their beach equipment. Arriving at 0350, Lt. Watts and his party, armed with only two hand grenades and a trench knife each, reconnoitered inland and ascertained the location of their landing. Then returning to the beach they set up the infra red lights and blue flashlights, which constituted the beach marking equipment and provided the guides which accounted for a successful Battalion landing at 0500. By his display of calm courage, determination, and leadership, Lt Watts spurred his men on the successful completion of their vital mission and exhibited a devotion to duty which reflects great credit on both himself and the service. Residence: Houston, Texas.

HARRY L. FOWLER, 6947310, Technical Sergeant, (then Sergeant), Cannon Company, *** Infantry, for gallantry in action on ** December 1942. While attached to the *** Armored Regiment in the vicinity of **** and ****, Sergeant Fowler section leader in charge of a half track mounting a 75mm Howitzer, participated in an attack on an enemy held hill across a two (2) mile valley. The Armored vehicles, all light tanks except this one-half track, came under heavy artillery fire, however, Sergeant Fowler's track continued the attack until hit by three (3) shells, destroying the Howitzer and setting the vehicle on fire. The crew abandoned the vehicle, coming under immediate machine gun fire. Sergeant Fowler coolly reorganized his men and led them to safety with the loss of only one man. Again on **, February 1943, when the company was attached to the ****th Combat Team at ****, Tunisia, the half tracks covered the withdrawal when the enemy attacked in strong force. Despite the fact of the enemy's superior number of tanks, Sergeant Fowler and his crew remained in position and fired point blank until the track was again hit and destroyed. When the enemy had broken through at several points and capture was imminent, orders were given for small groups to work their way through the lines to safety. Sergeant Fowler led a group of nine (9) men and after two (2) days maneuvering in enemy territory reached friendly forces. His personal courage, tactful initiative and outstanding leadership against overwhelming odds were an inspiration to the men under him and a credit to the service. Residence: Berkeley Spring, West Virginia.

II - AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded, Posthumously, to the following named enlisted men:

✓ THEODORE J. BOROWSKI, 36124565, Private First Class, **** Infantry, "For gallantry in action" at ***, French Morocco, on *November 1942. Pfc. Borowski was a member of a detachment entrusted with the dangerous and extremely important mission of identifying landmark features and marking the beach for the proposed landing of the First Battalion, *** Infantry. Pfc. Borowski

and the detachment left the transport USS ****, in a Higgins boat at 0130 and were taken along the hostile coast at ****. Eluding enemy craft at the mouth of the river, ***, the party made its way south along the coast about a mile off shore. When opposite the proposed beach, all members transferred to two rubber boats and paddled noiselessly to within 200 yards of shore where they slit and sunk their boats and swam through the remaining surf in groups of two, with their beach lighting equipment. Arriving at 0350, the small group, armed only with two hand grenades and a trench knife each, reconnoitered inland in territory known to have French coastal defense installations, and ascertained the location of their landing. Then, returning to the beach, they set up the infra-red lights and blue flashlights, which constituted the beach marking equipment and provided the guides which enabled the battalion to land successfully at 0500. Pfc. Borowski's courage and devotion to duty reflected great credit upon himself and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Pfc. Borowski subsequently was killed in action in the Battle for Sicily. Residence: St. Clair, Michigan.

PETER J. KALCIEK, 36124361, Private, Infantry, U.S. Army. For gallantry in action, on the night of the **** of April 1943, at ****, Tunisia, North Africa. During an enemy attack on our positions on the **** of April 1943, Germany "M", which was on the right flank exhausted their mortar ammunition and Private Kalciek volunteered to drive a 1/2 ton truck and trailer under heavy enemy shellfire with the needed ammunition to relieve the situation. While behind the defending Company, Private Kalciek was wounded by hand grenades and small arms fire from a small enemy detachment which had penetrated our lines. His truck and trailer were set on fire and Private Kalciek, disregarding his fatal wounds, succeeded in getting most of the ammunition out of the trailer before collapsing. He died later, not knowing he was instrumental in repelling the enemy attack by getting us vitally needed mortar ammunition on time. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

By his skillful maneuvering of his men and his aggressive action, he succeeded in driving the enemy forces from the hill. Immediately establishing an observation post, he reorganized his squad and ordered them to prepare for a counter-attack. While doing this the enemy laid down a heavy artillery, mortar, nebelwerfer barrage. Spt. Hiatt was wounded in the face, hand and arm by shrapnel and ricochet machine gun bullets but refused to be evacuated until all his men were safely dug in and all threats of an enemy counter-attack dispelled.

The leading vehicles of the convoy were hit by enemy artillery fire and mines, killing four and severely wounding eight of the enlisted men riding in the front vehicles. Major Roller was called and went forward to the area being subjected to heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire, to administer medical aid to the eight wounded soldiers. During the course of this outstanding devotion to duty, Major Roller lost several of his own medical personnel as the result of German "S" mines. Notwithstanding this, he continued on to the completion of his tasks throughout the night. Major Roller, on this occasion and on countless others, demonstrated such gallantry and disregard for self in the performance of hazardous missions that his courage and devotion to duty are a constant inspiration to the officers and men of this Regiment. Corporal Greydenus however, requested that he be allowed to stay with the observer. He was killed by mortar fire while transmitting his commands to his battery. Corporal Greydenus' untiring efforts, disregard for his own personal safety, devotion to duty, were in the finest traditions of the military service and were an inspiration to those who knew him. 

BATTLE HONORS

As authorized by Executive Order 9396 (Section I, Bulletin 22, WD, 1943), superseding Executive Order No. 9075 (Section III, Bulletin 11, WD, 1942), under the provisions of Section IV, Circular No. 333, War Department 1943 and as approved by the Commanding General First United States Army 16 August 1944 the following organization is cited for extraordinary heroism and outstanding performance of duty in action from 20 June 1944 to 1 July 1944 in France. The citation reads as follows:

The 2nd Platoon, Company "C", 899th Tank-Destroyer Battalion is cited for extraordinary gallantry in action comprising a series of occasions on which they destroyed enemy guns blocking the advance of the 2nd Battalion, 47th Infantry, to Cherbourg and Groville. When the 2nd Battalion was under artillery fire at crossroad Le Motel, 22 June 1944, smoke was placed on a 77mm gun firing directly down the road at 300 yards range, and a tank-destroyer moving into the road, quickly put the enemy gun out of action. The following day at Hoe de Tot a well concealed 88mm gun firing on the Battalion was silenced when a tank-destroyer moved around a blind corner, took position at 150 yards range, and, after the enemy gun had fired once and wrecked the tank-destroyer's track, ended the duel with fire that destroyed the gun and made casualties of its crew. During street-fighting in Cherbourg on 25 June the 2nd Platoon helped put five 20mm guns and one 47mm gun out of action. On two occasions the only tactics available again required a tank-destroyer to sweep suddenly around a corner, firing while moving, in full exposure to the enemy gun, which in each instance was hit before it could respond with accurate fire. On 1 July a 77mm enemy gun was prevented from delaying the 2nd Battalion's advance on the Groville fortifications longer than was required by a 2nd Platoon tank-destroyer to approach a stone wall protecting the gun and demolish the position. In Groville itself another crew subjected themselves to heavy mortar fire to reduce three strong-points, and, after damage from a mine had halted their tank-destroyer in an exposed position, remained at the gun and continued to fire throughout ensuing action. In all these engagements the crews of the 2nd Platoon, by their unhesitating subordination of personal safety to swift accomplishment of successive dangerous missions, won the admiration of all those to whom they set their inspiring example of gallantry.

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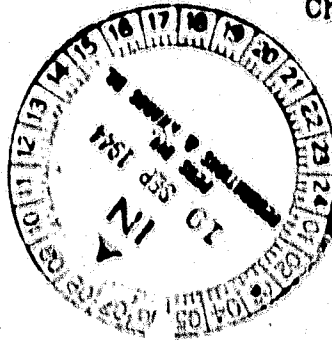

BATTLE HONORS

As authorized by Executive Order 9396 (Section I, Bulletin 22, WD, 1943), superseding Executive Order No. 9075 (Section III, Bulletin 11, WD, 1942), under the provisions of Section IV, Circular No. 333, War Department 1943 and as approved by the Commanding General First United States Army 16 August 1944 the following organization is cited for extraordinary heroism and outstanding performance of duty in action from 22 June 1944 to 30 June 1944 in France. The citation reads as follows:

CITATION OF THE 3RD BATTALION, 47TH INFANTRY

For the swiftness of its advance, and the heavy opposition overcome in terrain favoring defense, during its drives on Cherbourg and the Hague Peninsula 22 - 30 June 1944, the 3rd Battalion, 47th Infantry, is cited for outstanding performance of duty in combat. At 1400, 22 June 1944, the battalion attacked from high ground seven (7) miles southwest of Cherbourg, and by the following day had taken a hill 1000 yards northwest of Bois du Font du Roc, overrunning enroute five (5) entrenched and wire protected strongpoints armed heavily with artillery, machine guns, and rifles. Throughout hours of darkness the battalion, then a mile forward of units operating in adjacent territory, repulsed counterattacks which cost the enemy 63 dead and the next morning continued the attack towards Cherbourg, reaching its outskirts over four enemy strongpoints and capturing many prisoners and much materiel. On 26 June, an attack was launched from Rue de la Folle on Cherbourg's perimeter and the troops advanced from house to house under continuous, heavy enemy fire. Having moved to an assembly area near Nicolle on 29 June, the 3rd Battalion advanced again and took fortifications of thick concrete, wire, and anti-personnel mines south-east of Gruchy; then reported this success against the strongpoint to the north-west on the following day, and thus ended the two-day action on the Hague Peninsula. In this swift, unbroken series of successes against strongpoints over a nine (9) day period, while the 3rd Battalion lost 28 killed and 145 wounded, they killed 314 and captured 2161 of the enemy, and added a glorious page to the history of American fighting men.
