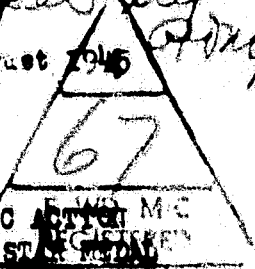

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Soldier's Medal is awarded to Sergeant Alfred J. Libby, 31005418, Company C, 15th Armored Infantry Battalion for heroism at Torquay, Devonshire, England, on 30 May 1944. Sergeant Libby, during a bombing raid at Torquay, Devonshire, England, upon seeing a nearby building (The Bay Court Hotel) hit by a bomb, and while the raid was still in progress, voluntarily, and at great risk to his life, left the safety of his shelter, entered into the basement of the building where several occupants of the hotel were trapped by wreckage, and in peril of his life both from falling debris and asphyxiation by gas escaping from a broken gas pipe, assisted to safety three persons by lifting each of them through a small hole in the ceiling and a fourth by removing a section of the wall so as to permit the removal of the person from the gas-filled basement. The voluntary act of Sergeant Libby performed at great risk to his own life and with complete disregard for his own safety reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States.

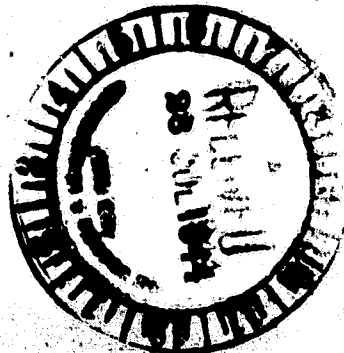

1. AWARD OF SILVER STAR: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to EUGENE A. REGNIER, 08295, Brigadier General, United States Army for gallantry in action during the advance between Fougieres, France and Sees, France 2 August 1944 to 15 August 1944. Throughout the advance General Regnier was always to the front, frequently with his reconnaissance and constantly under fire from enemy tanks, 88mm automatic weapons and small arms. He led his Combat Command with utter disregard for his personal safety and by his energy, foresight and high professional skill insured the successful accomplishment of its mission. In the vicinity of Chateau Gontier he manned the gun of his command tank and fought through enemy opposition with his men. Again at Argentan while exposed to direct short range enemy fire, his coolness and courage were major factors in insuring the continued advance of the Combat Command. The gallantry and leadership of General Regnier are in the best traditions of the service.

2. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

MICHAEL D. ROY, 01311819, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 8 August 1944. Lieutenant Roy, without hesitation and with complete disregard for his own life in the face of heavy enemy machine gun and sniper fire, succeeded in tying a cable to an enemy tank, which was blocking the route of attack, enabling other tanks to pull it clear. Lieutenant Roy's action was instrumental in the accomplishment of the assigned mission and the continuation of the advance.

FURMAN D. DUVALL, 34435709, Private First Class, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 17 August 1944. Private First Class Duvall of his own volition exposed himself to heavy enemy rifle and sniper fire to cross a river in a rowboat, enter into an open field and effect the rescue of a wounded member of his platoon. His heroic action and disregard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

GEORGE H. PRICE, 33149127, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 17 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Price of his own volition exposed himself to heavy enemy rifle and sniper fire to cross a river in a rowboat, enter into an open field and effect the rescue of a wounded member of his platoon. His heroic action and disregard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

JOHN J. MC CAFFERTY, 058488, Captain, Cavalry, United States Army for heroic service in France on 12 August 1944. Captain McCafferty, with complete disregard for his own safety, at all times under enemy fire, rescued a fellow officer from a burning tank which had been knocked out by German Mark IV Tiger tanks. His heroic action and disregard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

FRANCIS J. BAUM, 01010840, Captain, Cavalry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France. On the morning of 10 August 1944 Captain Baum's company was attacked by superior enemy forces. He led his company which had become disorganized into the attack and by his inspired leadership, drove the enemy into retreat, turning imminent defeat into victory. This officer showed marked disregard for his personal safety by driving about his command in a one quarter ton truck while subjected to heavy enemy fire. The action of Captain Baum reflects the highest credit on the military forces of the United States.

STANLEY J. LEVINSKI, 6833412, Private, United States Army for heroic action in France on 13 August 1944. Private Levinski against overwhelming enemy opposition and in face of intense fire from enemy antitank and machine guns, entered a burning tank which was in immediate danger of exploding from heavy caliber ammunition therein and rescued a fellow soldier who was seriously wounded. His heroic action and disregard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

LEWIS W. GODDARD, 37150534, Private First Class, United States Army for heroic action in France. On 13 August 1944 while the company was preparing to attack, the enemy from concealed positions opened fire. Most of the tank crews being dismounted had to seek cover for personal safety. Private First Class Goddard, whose tank was one of those farthest forward, rushed immediately to his tank, despite the fact that it was under enemy fire, and attempted to bring it to the rear where it could be employed against the enemy. He brought the tank to the rear several hundred yards until it was hit by a 88mm shell and had to be abandoned. All of this was done at his own volition and at great risk to his own life.

SHINLEY SOBER, 36175089, Technician Fourth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 6 August 1944. Technician Fourth Grade Sober drove his tank upon a bridge where it was hit by a shell from a German 88mm gun. The tank burst into flame and the ammunition in it exploded. Technician Fourth Grade Sober at risk of his life from the exploding ammunition and enemy fire, heroically and gallantly rescued three members of his crew from the flames of the burning tank.

ROBERT E. MC BRIDE, 34090015, Private First Class, United States Army for gallantry in action in France against the enemy on 10 August 1944. Private First Class McBride, then acting as Scout for his Battery, voluntarily, and of his own initiative, gallantly, and at great risk to his own life, while under heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire, drove back down his Battery column, past two burning M7 Motor Carriage, Self-propelled 105mm Howitzers in which the ammunition was exploding, and directed the remaining drivers of vehicles in the column through the fire toward their destination. Private First Class McBride by his personal initiative and outstanding conduct greatly assisted his Commanding Officer in continuing the advance.

HERBERT R. ALEXANDER, 0465905, First Lieutenant, FA, United States Army for gallantry in action in France against the enemy on 10 August 1944. When two M7 Motor Carriage, Self-propelled 105mm Howitzers were hit and destroyed by enemy artillery fire, and the entire Battery in serious danger of destruction, Lieutenant Alexander, gallantly, and at great risk of his life, endeavored to find a route for the Battery away from the highway, and persisted in his gallant attempt in the face of heavy artillery and small arms fire until ordered to desist. The determination of this officer to find a way for the Battery to reach its objective was an inspiration to the men, and a substantial factor in accomplishing its immediate reorganization.

JOHN E. MILLETT JR, 01177913, First Lieutenant, FA, United States Army for gallantry in action in France against the enemy on 10 August 1944. Lieutenant Millett gallantly and at great risk of his life from heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire, reorganized and lead the men and vehicles of his Battery through heavy enemy fire to their objective after the Battery and column had become disorganized as a result of the burning destruction and explosion of two M7 Motor Carriage, Self-propelled 105mm Howitzers which were hit by enemy artillery fire.

DALBERT C. LA FLEUR, 34029535, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France against the enemy on 10 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade LaFleur, a half-track driver, voluntarily, and with complete disregard for his own safety, in the face of enemy artillery and small arms fire, drove an M7 Motor Carriage Self-propelled 105mm Howitzer to pass on the roadway two similar vehicles which were burning and exploding, after having been hit by enemy artillery fire.


PHILLIP N. CHACON, 01171943, Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in France against the enemy on 10 August 1944. Lieutenant Chacon gallantly interposed his Liaison plane between planes bombing and strafing friendly infantry, using his plane as a screen to prevent further firing upon and bombing of the infantry troops. Lieutenant Chacon's gallant conduct reflects great credit upon himself and upon the armed forces of the United States.

OWEN H. KANGAS, 37281776, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France against the enemy on 10 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Kangas, a half-track driver, voluntarily, and with complete disregard for his own safety, in the face of enemy artillery and small arms fire, drove an M7 Motor Carriage Self-propelled 105mm Howitzer to pass on the roadway two similar vehicles which were burning and exploding, after having been hit by enemy artillery fire.


LEO F. STEVENS, 6938880, Private, United States Army. For gallantry in action in France on 10 August 1944. After medical personnel attempting to evacuate the wounded were shot by enemy sniper fire, Private Stevens gallantly and without regard for his own safety, arose to a standing position and walked forward to draw fire and ascertain the position of the sniper. By this gallant act Pvt Stevens was able to destroy the sniper. Pvt Stevens then crawled to a crossroad and retrieved the medical vehicle, a one quarter ton truck, cargo, for use in evacuating the wounded, while under fire from enemy artillery and small arms.

GEORGE BRODSKY, 32189469, Private, United States Army. For gallantry in action in France on 10 August 1944. Private Brodsky discovered an enemy tank well concealed in a hedgerow. He gallantly and at great risk to his life from enemy fire, climbed upon the turret of a friendly tank and, without cover, attracted the tank commanders attention and then, still without cover, directed the tanks fire until the enemy tank was destroyed. On another occasion the same day, while friendly troops were pinned down by fire from an enemy tank Private Brodsky gallantly and without regard for his own safety crawled and ran across open terrain while under fire to a position from which he dropped a hand grenade into the open turret of the enemy tank thereby removing its fire as a hazard. Private Brodsky performed his scouting missions in an exceptionally fine manner and was personally responsible for the destruction of numerous enemy vehicles.

ERWIN H. BECKER, 37167785, Staff Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France. Staff Sergeant Becker gallantly and without regard for his personal safety, attacked a superior enemy force and position with his light tank, and by his vigorous offensive attack overran and disbursed the enemy position which included an enemy command post, and captured twenty vehicles containing ammunition and various types of enemy Ordnance equipment. Staff Sergeant Becker's heroic achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States.

HAROLD M. SCHIERING, 01012466, Captain, Infantry, United States Army for extraordinary heroism in France on 22 August 1944. Captain Schiering with complete disregard for his own safety and at extreme risk of his life went forward on two occasions to tanks which were in flames as a result of enemy fire and rescued members of the tank crews. In the performance of these heroic acts Captain Schiering was under continuous enemy fire in an exposed position. While removing burning clothing from the men his own clothing was pierced by an enemy bullet. By his gallant conduct and his example of courage and leadership in battle Captain Schiering reflected great credit on himself and the armed forces of the United States.

RALPH P. CROSSEN, 31073096, Technician Fourth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. Technician Fourth Grade Crossen with complete disregard for his own safety obtained a machine gun from an abandoned vehicle and set it up on a ground mount in order to protect wounded personnel from enemy snipers. He remained with the wounded for several hours until an evacuation vehicle arrived and after the wounded were placed in the vehicle he placed himself in the rear of the vehicle in order to protect the wounded from enemy fire and remained thusly until the aid station had been reached. His heroic action and disregard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

PAUL E. TAYLOR, 37605914, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. Private Taylor was assigned the mission of protecting friendly wounded from enemy fire. For this purpose Private Taylor mounted on a ground mount a machine gun taken from a disabled tank. Upon a continuation of enemy fire from artillery, automatic weapons and small arms, directed at the wounded in his care, Private Taylor gallantly and without regard for his own safety ran to a disabled tank in order to fire a 75mm tank gun into the enemy position. Private Taylor gallantly guarded the wounded for several hours without regard for his own safety and then assisted in their evacuation.

JOHN J. QUARTARONE, 31068415, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 16 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Quartarone even though wounded in the arm and leg, concealed his wounds from other personnel and volunteered without hesitation to drive his vehicle into woods to evacuate wounded personnel therein. He made three trips into the woods through crossfire of enemy machine gun and rifle fire and evacuated all of the wounded. This action

made possible the more rapid execution of an artillery mission on the enemy position which resulted in the capture of numerous enemy personnel. The action of Technician Fifth Grade Quartarone reflects the highest credit on the military forces of the United States.


RICHARD B. ROSNER, 37168175, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 16 August 1944. The company of which Sergeant Rosner was a member was assigned the mission of taking an enemy strong point. The disposition and extent of the enemy opposition was not completely known. The company was forced to withdraw before the enemy upon its first attack. Sergeant Rosner immediately reorganized his platoon and gallantly launched a second attack upon the enemy position. During this attack Sergeant Rosner, at great peril to his own life, abandoned cover in order to draw fire and obtain knowledge of the disposition of the enemy. Sergeant Rosner's gallant and heroic leadership resulted in the enemy being decisively defeated within a short period of time and the immediate continued advance of his unit.

LEWIS W. OLIVER, 34242169, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 12 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Oliver while alone in a parked halftrack was attacked by approximately twenty five enemy fighter-bomber planes. Technician Fifth Grade Oliver gallantly and with utter disregard for his own personal safety manned a 50 caliber machine gun immediately upon being attacked by the planes bombing and strafing and throughout the attack returned fire while all the planes in turn attacked him. His intrepid courage in the face of explosions from the bombs falling near the vehicle and a rain of machine gun fire was an inspiration to the members of the command and reflects great credit upon himself and upon the military service of the United States.

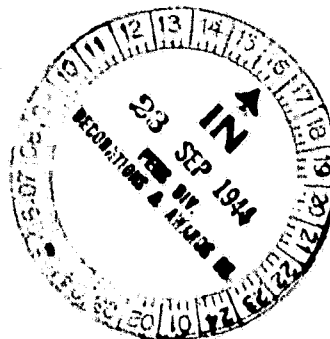

HUGH J. RIDOLFI, 37137881, Technician Third Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 12 August 1944. When a column of vehicles evacuating wounded men to a hospital was strafed and bombed by a group of enemy planes for a period of approximately eighteen minutes, Technician Third Grade Ridolfi, with complete disregard for his own safety, continued giving first aid to the wounded, at one time protecting with his own body the body of a wounded comrade. His courage, coolness, efficiency and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States.

HARRY E. MILLER, 36316445, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 12 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Miller was performing his military mission in a column evacuating casualties to a hospital when the column was attacked by approximately twenty five enemy fighter-bombers. Technician Fifth Grade Miller gallantly and with utter disregard for his personal safety, after having himself been wounded, continued to minister to the wounded being evacuated and to administer first aid to personnel operating the column throughout a continuous bombing and strafing at the hands of the enemy and thereafter under intermittent sniper fire. The courage, coolness, efficiency and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States.

ORVILLE D. SEVERSON, 01311822, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France between 7 August 1944 and 13 August 1944. Second Lieutenant Severson during this period was in command of the reconnaissance platoon performing reconnaissance for his Combat Command. Despite the fact that he had no armor, Second Lieutenant Severson gallantly and completely performed his mission under heavy enemy fire from enemy machine gun nests, anti-tank guns, and tanks. In the face of heavy machine gun fire and with utter disregard for his life he repeatedly attacked enemy vehicles destroying seven, killing many of the enemy and taking numerous prisoners against an enemy well concealed in established positions. Second Lieutenant Severson's fighting spirit, gallant leadership and intrepid courage was a large factor in the successful completion of the mission and worthy of the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

ONORIO A. CEDRONE, 32258851, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 11 August 1944. Sergeant Codrone was leading a combat column when his vehicle was attacked by enemy rifle fire. He dismounted and demolished an enemy truck with a hand grenade and then in the face of enemy rifle fire and with disregard for his own safety ran to a radio vehicle to inform his commanding officer of the enemy action. His heroic action was an inspiration to his entire organization.

ROBERT W. CONGER, 01015595, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 11 August 1944. In the face of heavy enemy fire, Second Lieutenant Conger dismounted from his knocked out tank and with complete disregard for his personal safety ran from tank to tank and succeeded in consolidating the position his platoon was holding, thus enabling the company to reach its objective. His leadership and heroic action reflect the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.


ARTHUR J. PATTERSON, 0452962, First Lieutenant, Signal Corps, United States Army for gallant conduct and superior performance of duty as Division Wire Officer during the period 25 July 1944 to 20 August 1944. Although his duties caused him to be knowingly exposed to enemy gun fire during this period, Lieutenant Patterson performed his duties without hesitation. This officer has been listed as missing in action since 20 August 1944. The performance of duties by Lieutenant Patterson in the face of enemy fire without regard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

8. AWARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is posthumously awarded to ROBERT E. BURNS, 20109830, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 20 August 1944. Private Burns, although his duties were that of driving a vehicle for the purpose of reconnoitering possible wire routes, readily engaged the enemy, even though they were known to be superior in number and arms, with his only weapon, a .30 caliber Carbine. Private Burns' heroic action and disregard for his own safety reflect the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

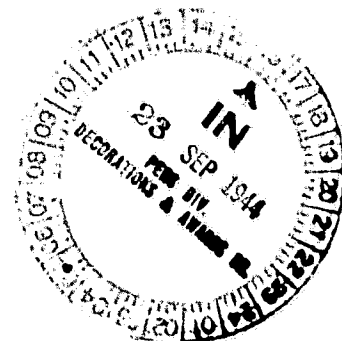



EDWARD J. GRAF, 35026167, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 14 August 1944. When his Troop in bivouac was surrounded by an enemy force, Sergeant Graf armed with a rocket launcher and carbine grenade launcher crawled along a hedge row until he was within twenty yards of the enemy and destroyed one enemy vehicle and routed the crew of an enemy tank. His fire so disconcerted the enemy force that they fled from the scene without firing any of the eighty eight millimeter guns with which they were armed. All of this was done under enemy fire from two sides and at great risk of his own life. By his calm disregard for personal danger and his ability to act quickly and aggressively under fire, Sergeant Graf saved many of his comrade's lives. His courage, calmness, judgement and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

JAMES G. RUSH, 0448310, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 16 August 1944. When the battery commanded by First Lieutenant Rush was attacked in column by an enemy force of twelve tanks and approximately two hundred infantrymen, he immediately proceeded to ride up and down the battery column ordering his men into position, giving orders and encouragement. Twice the vehicle in which he was riding was disabled by enemy fire but each time First Lieutenant Rush took another and continued his work. After the battery was in position, First Lieutenant Rush advanced into the woods to direct fire on the retreating enemy. His prompt, efficient and courageous actions reflect the highest traditions of the armed forces.

LEROY W. ENSIGN, 35287960, Private First Class, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 31 August 1944. When the infantry platoon in which Private First Class Ensign was serving as a platoon first aid man suffered casualties as a result of enemy artillery fire, Private First Class Ensign, disregarding his own safety, in spite of enemy artillery, machine gun and small arms fire, roved uncensuringly about the terrain processing the area for wounded and giving them first aid. In this action Private First Class Ensign was struck by shrapnel and suffered a compound fracture of the right arm. In spite of this disablement he continued his search for the wounded, submitting himself to first aid only after being relieved by the arrival of an ambulance. The courage and self sacrifice of Private First Class Ensign are in the highest traditions of the Medical Corps and the Army of the United States.

7. AWARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is posthumously awarded to LESLEY D. MONTS, SR, 17114472, Private First Class, United States Army for extraordinary heroism in action in France on 9 August 1944. Private First Class Monts was serving as a machine gunner when his scout section was ambushed by an enemy tank and enemy infantry. Disregarding his own

safety in the face of intense enemy fire, Private First Class Monte commenced firing with his machine gun and fired continuously until killed by an enemy heavy caliber shell. His aggressiveness, determination and courage were in keeping with the best traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

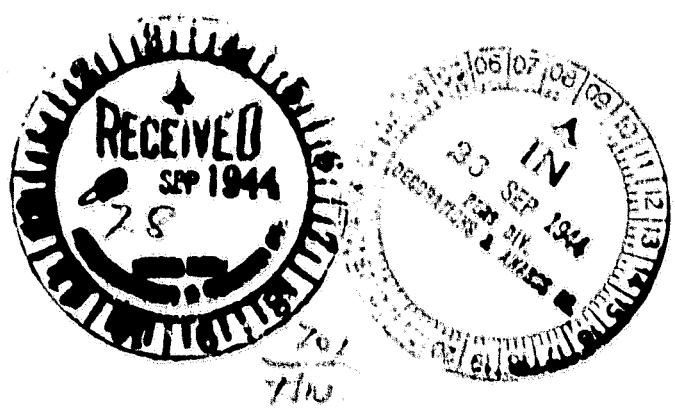

When the advance guard of the Combat Command was attacked by heavy fire from concealed 88mm and machine guns, Lieutenant Colonel Bartel dismounted at great risk to his own life and personally supervised the evacuation of men and vehicles to a position of safety. He retained command until seriously wounded by shell fragments and refused medical aid until the enlisted men who were casualties had been treated. The action of Lieutenant Colonel Bartel reflect the highest traditions of the military service. ✓

GLEN L. FOOTE, 0450438, Major, Cavalry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. When a light tank reconnaissance force was brought under fire by an enemy strong point, consisting of Mark V and VI tanks, knocking out three light tanks two of which were burning, Major Foote at great risk to his own life from enemy small arms fire made his way to the scene of the incident and directed the evacuation of the men who had escaped from the burning tanks. The calmness, cool leadership and initiative displayed by Major Foote reflect the highest traditions of the military service. ✓

JOHN KAJFAS, 01013021, First Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 12 August 1944. First Lieutenant Kajfas, with great gallantry and with the utmost disregard for his own personal safety, led his platoon in an advance against superior enemy forces, and strong enemy positions. By his coolness under fire and by his intelligent and intrepid leadership, he destroyed a tank and many enemy vehicles and guns. When his commanding officer was confronted with four such tanks he gallantly pulled to his side to engage this superior force. In this engagement First Lieutenant Kajfas was seriously wounded. His conduct is worth of the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

LIONEL B. SCOTT, 01012261, First Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 23 August 1944. First Lieutenant Scott's tank was hit and set on fire by enemy artillery while he was engaged in a reconnaissance mission. Lieutenant Scott gallantly continued to fire his tank gun until his armor was dismounted. He then, without regard for his own safety in the face of enemy artillery opposition, continued the reconnaissance mission dismounted until completed. The reconnaissance was completed, First Lieutenant Scott led a force to a position from which the enemy could be successfully engaged. His intrepid direction and gallant and heroic leadership is an inspiration to the command, and reflects the highest tradition of the armed forces.

WARREN E. HARVEY, 0453471, Captain, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 21 August 1944. The commanding officer of the advance guard being seriously wounded, Captain Harvey immediately and gallantly assumed command and leadership of the advance guard and quickly restored order to the command. Throughout the remainder of the day and without regard for his personal safety Captain Harvey exposed himself to fire from large and small caliber enemy arms in order to direct the command. Captain Harvey's aggressive and astute tactical leadership was a substantial factor in overcoming superior enemy forces consisting of Mark V tanks, 89mm anti tank guns, medium mortars and small arms fire. His gallant conduct and aggressive and courageous leadership reflects great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States.

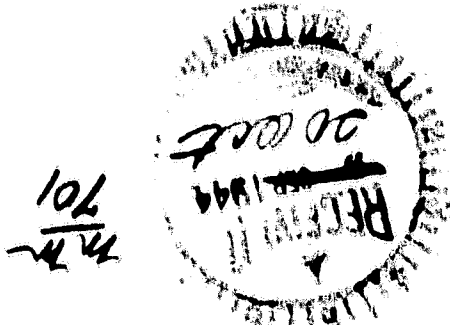

14. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

JAMES M. SIMMONS, 39159475, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 4 September 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Simmons was resting beside the vehicle which he drives near the command post of a road block. At the sound of running men, Technician Fifth Grade Simmons with utter disregard for his personal safety ran to the center of the road in front of the road block and commenced firing his submachine gun at the approaching enemy consisting of approximately fifteen men, killing two and wounding several and routing the remainder, thus saving possible damage to the road block and the nearby important bridge.

CHARLES PERLMAN, 01101162, Captain, Corps of Engineers, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 10 September 1944. Captain Perlman without regard for his own safety proceeded alone and under heavy machine gun and artillery fire to a bridge over the Alzette River in order to sever the cords to a high explosive with which the enemy was attempting to blow the bridge. The gallant action of Captain Perlman reflects the highest traditions of the military service.

JUNE R. MC CLOUD, 35206649, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 3 August 1944, 17 August 1944 and 20 August 1944. On one occasion Sergeant McCloud advanced under fire to silence a machine gun nest with grenades. On another occasion when his platoon was pinned down by enemy fire from machine guns and small arms Sergeant McCloud stood up and silenced two machine guns with grenades. On still another occasion Sergeant McCloud voluntarily manned a half track and drove it to safety amid the close bursting of several shells from enemy 88mm guns. At all times Sergeant McCloud has shown complete disregard for his own life. His actions are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

DONALD J. DIEBOLD, 36735597, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 7 August 1944. Private Diebold, voluntarily and without regard for his own safety led a platoon of tanks dismounted through scattered trees to a position from which the tanks were able to put out of action a 20mm gun and then under intense enemy machine gun fire he led the tanks into a town to a position from which they were able to put the machine guns out of action. As a result of this action the tank platoon was enabled to take the town from the enemy. His courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces.

DONALD HEARL, 0315739, Captain, Cavalry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 September 1944. Captain Hearl exposing himself to enemy mortar, artillery and small arms fire went forward in his one quarter ton vehicle to within five feet of two tanks which had been hit and were burning, in order to rescue the wounded from the tanks. His courageous and heroic action saved five men, one vehicle and insured the continued advance of the main body by his reporting of enemy positions as they fired at the tanks from which he was trying to rescue the crews. The gallantry and leadership displayed by Captain Hearl reflect the highest traditions of the military service.


ROBERT D. DOOLITTLE, 01310420, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 September 1944. Second Lieutenant Doolittle was riding in a one quarter ton truck behind the leading tank when the enemy opened fire and knocked out the lead tank. He pulled to the side of the road and while dismounting was wounded by small arms fire. He remained by his vehicle and radioed as much information as he had at that time to his commander. He then made a foot reconnaissance and returned to his vehicle in the face of enemy fire to radio additional information back at which time he was again wounded. Second Lieutenant Doolittle remained by his vehicle until support elements arrived in order to orient the support. Only then did he allow himself to be evacuated. The devotion to duty of Second Lieutenant Doolittle reflects the highest traditions of the military service.

WALTER J. MIGUT, 33083348, Staff Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 September 1944. The half track vehicle in which Staff Sergeant Migut and his squad was riding was hit by fire from 89mm and 20mm guns and Staff Sergeant Migut was thrown from the vehicle into a roadside ditch. Staff Sergeant Migut at great risk to his life under intense enemy fire left the safety of the ditch and made several trips into the then burning half track to extricate the wounded men. The actions of Staff Sergeant Migut are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

JOHN L. COUTU, 20111994, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 September 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Coutu of his own volition advanced in the face of intense enemy machine gun fire and exploding ammunition in two burning tanks at great risk to his life in order to drag two wounded men from an exposed position to a place of safety. During this advance he had to engage in hand to hand fight with two of the enemy, killing one with his bayonet and routing the other. The action of Technician Fifth Grade Coutu is in the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

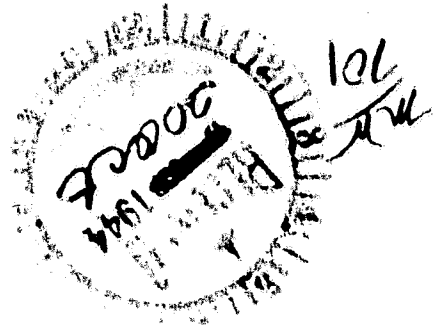

15. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

WILLIAM H. BURTON JR, 0366028, Major, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 24 August 1944. When one of the platoons of Major Burton's command was subjected to intense fire from enemy machine guns protected by infantrymen, which killed four men instantly, wounding others and pinning the remainder of the platoon to the ground, he, with complete disregard for his own safety, returned to his one quarter ton truck which had a radio and organized an assault force which destroyed the enemy position. Major Burton was wounded during the above action but only after the enemy had been destroyed did he accept medical treatment.

JACOB BRUMBELOW, 38089695, Private First Class, United States Army for gallantry in France on 13 August 1944. Private First Class Brumbelow, while under heavy enemy fire ran across one hundred yards of flat open terrain and by means of a winch on a half track, pulled two half tracks from craters and drove them to a defiladed position in the rear. This act was performed at great risk to his life and resulted in the saving of the two vehicles from destruction by enemy fire.

DONALD H. COULTER, 01310406, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 10 September 1944. When the advance of our forces was held up by enemy tanks in defiladed positions Second Lieutenant Coulter with two enlisted men went forward at great risk to his life and succeeded in driving the tanks from their positions with five rounds fired from an anti tank Rocket Launcher. The tanks thus driven into the open became targets for air support and artillery fire and the advance was enabled to continue.

ARTHUR L. BADING, 38090259, Staff Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 7 August 1944. In an advance across a bridge, the platoon of which Staff Sergeant Bading is a member was fired upon by enemy machine guns and 37mm guns which killed two men and wounded another. Staff Sergeant Bading who had reached a position of safety on the far side, returned to the bridge at great risk to his own life, under constant enemy machine gun fire and removed the wounded men from the direct fire in which he was lying. The action of Staff Sergeant Bading is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

ALFRED M. MAFFEI, 20111596, Sergeant (then Corporal) United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 18 August 1944. Corporal Maffei gallantly attacked seven German Mark V Panther tanks with his anti tank Rocket Launcher, crippling and destroying three, and then, while still under heavy fire from enemy guns, automatic weapons and small arms, without regard for his own life and safety, ran over two hundred yards to an empty half track which was then within seventy-five yards of a burning German tank and still under fire, and saved the vehicle for his unit.

ARTHUR H. GIBBLE, 33149244, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 10 September 1944. When the advance of our forces was held up by enemy tanks in defiladed positions Private Gibble went forward at great risk to his life with an officer and another enlisted man and succeeded in driving the tanks from their positions with five rounds fired from an anti tank Rocket Launcher. The tanks thus driven into the open became targets for air support and artillery fire and the advance was enabled to continue.

ZIGMOND YANOSKI, 31053462, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 6 September 1944. Sergeant Yanoski, while leading his squad in an attack, exposed himself in order to locate the enemy position and after locating it he advanced with complete disregard for his own safety and destroyed the position with grenades. In further action he located an enemy anti tank gun which was firing on tanks in his column and destroyed the gun and crew with a rifle grenade. His courage and aggressiveness was an inspiration to the members of his squad and an important factor in the completion of the mission.

HAROLD MC ANULTY, 33705217, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 6 September 1944. When the advance of the column was halted by a well constructed road block supported by enemy fire, Private McAnulty with complete disregard for his own safety, advanced under fire and located an enemy anti tank gun and an observation point from which mortar fire could be directed. His actions were responsible for the eventual destruction of the anti tank gun and the routing of the forces which were supporting the road block.

HOWARD E. BOYER, 0218550, Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 16 and 17 August 1944. During an attack Lieutenant Colonel Boyer led leading elements of his command under heavy enemy artillery, machine gun and small arms fire with complete disregard for his personal safety. The gallantry displayed by Lieutenant Colonel Boyer was an inspiration to his command and contributed immeasurably to the defeat of the enemy and the completion of the mission. His actions reflect the best traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

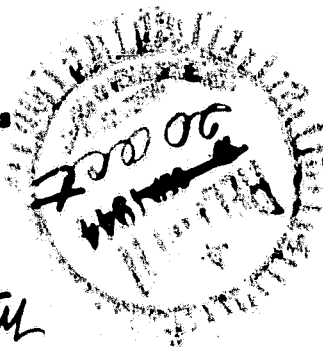

JOHN T. COLE, 05256, Colonel, Cavalry, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. When it became necessary for the column commanded by Colonel Cole to cross a ford, Colonel Cole advanced on foot in spite of enemy machine gun and artillery fire and personally led each vehicle across the ford, refusing to leave until every man and vehicle had safely made the crossing. His disregard for his personal safety was an inspiration to his entire command and upholds the highest traditions of the military service.

ALEX C. ZARCHY, 0305388, Major, Medical Corps, United States Army for gallantry in action in France during the period 1 August 1944 to 7 September 1944. Through his unselfish and tireless efforts Major Zarchy has on innumerable occasions distinguished himself in performing tasks beyond the call of duty. On one occasion upon being called on for ambulances for friendly troops, he volunteered to lead the ambulances and led them by the only available route which was through enemy territory to the other column. He successfully accomplished his mission and was the first American to travel the twenty odd miles required to reach the friendly column. His devotion to duty and disregard for personal safety reflect the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

THOMAS W. GROSE, 01103189, First Lieutenant, Corps of Engineers, United States Army for gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 10 September 1944. A light tank covering the advance of the combat command along the axis of a narrow roadway on the edge of a precipice was knocked out by enemy anti tank fire. The crew evacuated the tank in the center of the roadway. First Lieutenant Grose upon observing that the tank was burning and realizing that if it was allowed to burn it would delay the advance of the column, promptly and without regard for his own safety entered the tank and by throwing out burning belts of thirty caliber ammunition, succeeded in putting the fire out. He then backed the tank to the edge of the precipice where it could have easily been tilted over had it started burning again. The gallant action of First Lieutenant Grose reflects the highest traditions of the military service.

17. AWARD OF OAK LEAF CLUSTER TO SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, an Oak Leaf Cluster to the Silver Star Medal is awarded to ALFRED M. MUFFEL, 20111593, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 10 September 1944. When the advance of our forces was held up by enemy tanks in defiladed positions, Sergeant Muffel went forward at great risk of his life with an officer and another enlisted man and succeeded in driving the tanks from their positions with five rounds fired from an anti tank Rocket Launcher. The tanks thus driven into the open became targets for air support and artillery fire and the advance was enabled to continue.

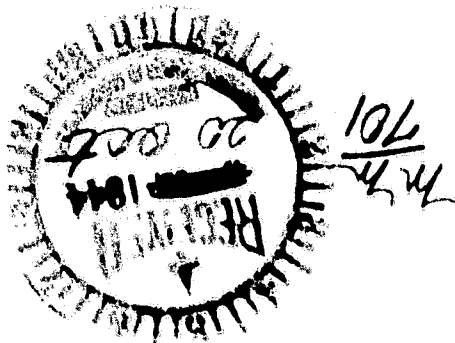

17. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is posthumously awarded to the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

KENT FAY, 0286301, Lieutenant Colonel, Cavalry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 30 August 1944. The unit commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Fay was making reconnaissance along the route of advance of the 5th Armored Division which was making a rapid advance to pass a specific objective before nightfall. His column was encountering small groups of the enemy which were endangering the successful performance of his unit's mission. Lieutenant Colonel Fay with full knowledge of the danger and peril attendant gallantly assumed the position of lead vehicle in his reconnaissance column and by his leadership expedited the movement and inspired his unit to a rapid, careful and successful reconnaissance of the route until an area was reached in which artillery might be expected. Fully recognizing the dangers existing he gallantly pressed forward in the accomplishment of his mission, still in the position of lead vehicle when enemy artillery opened fire upon his vehicle, causing his death. The leadership of Lieutenant Colonel Fay was an inspiration to his unit and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

THOMAS K. BROWN, 01169011, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 21 August 1944. When a force of half tracks was ordered out to destroy a pocket of enemy resistance First Lieutenant Brown volunteered to take the tank of which he was commander, with the force. Since the crew assigned to the tank was not present he organized a crew out of personnel present and drove the tank himself. Upon coming under enemy small arms fire, First Lieutenant Brown while endeavoring to close the hatch of the tank was fatally wounded by an enemy shell.

RAYMOND J. MCKINNEY, 35208741, Staff Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. Sergeant McKinney, though seriously wounded when his vehicle received a direct hit from enemy 75mm gun fire on a reconnaissance mission, attempted to get from his vehicle the equipment necessary to set up a thirty caliber machine gun ground mount to further harass and damage the enemy. His courage and devotion to duty in spite of serious wounds reflect great credit upon Sergeant McKinney, his unit and the United States Army.

IVAN A. J. KNAPP, 42090604, Private, United States Army for extraordinary heroism in action in Luxembourg on 10 September 1944. Private Knapp was riding on the leading tank of a column which was taken under surprise tank and small arms fire by the enemy and the tank on which he was riding was hit and destroyed by anti tank shell. Private Knapp jumped to the ground and placed himself in front of a general officer who was alone in a one quarter ton vehicle which was being backed to the shelter of a nearby building. In performing this gallant act, Private Knapp was fatally wounded. His courage and self sacrifice are in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.


GLENN C. JOHNSON, 36311456, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Johnson with full knowledge that the area was under fire from German 88mm guns, automatic weapons and small arms, gallantly and without regard for his personal safety entered into the performance of his medical mission in full view of the enemy in order to evacuate the wounded men lying in the area. Technician Fifth Grade Johnson was fatally wounded by enemy artillery fire. His intrepid courage was an inspiration to the command and in the highest tradition of the armed forces.

RALPH N. CLARE, 33786737, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. Technician Fifth Grade Clare with full knowledge that the area was under fire from German 88mm guns, automatic weapons and small arms, gallantly and without regard for his personal safety entered into the performance of his medical mission in full view of the enemy in order to evacuate the wounded men lying in the area. Technician Fifth Grade Clare was fatally wounded by enemy artillery fire. His intrepid courage was an inspiration to the command and in the highest tradition of the armed forces.

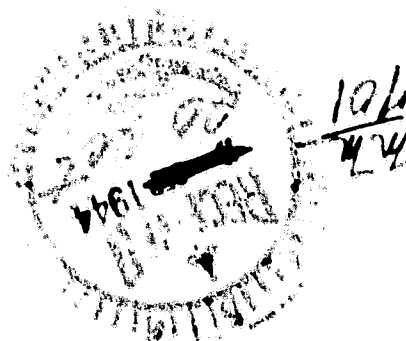



Captain Crafts was continually at the front and often far in advance of his own troops. His disregard for his own safety and leadership in battle was an inspiration to his unit and is worthy of the highest traditions of the armed forces.

WILLIAM H. GUINN, 39174395, Staff Sergeant, United States Army for superior performance of duty and gallantry in action from 2 August 1944 to 29 September 1944. On one occasion he advanced directly into heavy enemy machine gun fire to destroy the position with grenades and on another occasion he destroyed four enemy anti tank rocket launcher positions. His action in battle has been outstanding at all times and his disregard for his own safety reflects the highest traditions of the military forces.

WILLIAM S. MARTIN, O1177898, Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 and 2 September 1944. When the combat command column was halted by enemy artillery fire which destroyed two of the leading tanks, Second Lieutenant Martin volunteered to advance in spite of exploding ammunition in the burning tanks and enemy artillery fire, at great risk to his life, for the purpose of directing artillery fire on the enemy. The effectiveness of the fire thus directed caused the enemy to abandon the position and enabled the column to move forward on its mission.

DE SALES HARRISON JR, O1181900, Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. When the battalion of which Second Lieutenant Harrison is a member came under heavy enemy artillery fire, he moved forward with utter disregard for his personal safety and in spite of enemy artillery and machine gun fire to a position from which he could direct return fire on the enemy. Second Lieutenant Harrison was wounded while moving to the position but he continued to adjust the artillery fire until seriously wounded by an enemy artillery burst. His action is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

ALEXANDER D. FRASER, O1169112, First Lieutenant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 and 2 September 1944. When the combat command column was halted by enemy artillery fire which destroyed two of the leading tanks, First Lieutenant Fraser volunteered to advance in spite of exploding ammunition in the burning tanks and enemy artillery fire, at great risk to his life, for the purpose of directing artillery fire on the enemy. The effectiveness of the fire thus directed caused the enemy to abandon the position and enabled the column to move forward on its mission.


WILLIAM L. HENTSCHELL, 01169150, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 1 and 2 September 1944. When the combat command column was halted by enemy artillery fire which destroyed two of the landing tanks, First Lieutenant Hentschell, at great risk to his life from exploding ammunition in the burning tanks and enemy artillery fire, drove his one quarter ton vehicle well beyond the landing vehicle in the column in order to relay commands from a forward observer by radio to the artillery battalion. The effectiveness of the fire thus directed caused the enemy to abandon the position and enabled the column to move forward on its mission.

BRUCE W. KELLY, 0383087, Major (then Captain), Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. While under heavy enemy fire Major Kelly, without regard for his personal safety, moved into an open field in full view of the enemy to a position from which he could successfully direct fire upon the enemy observation post. His heroic action was instrumental in the safe displacement of all units in the vicinity.

SAMUEL H. WALL, 0344197, Captain, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. After a gasoline and ammunition convoy had been directly hit and four loaded trucks were in flames, Captain Wall organized and, without regard for his personal safety, personally led a detail which succeeded in bringing four loaded trucks to a position of safety and evacuating several wounded men. Throughout this entire operation gasoline and ammunition was burning and exploding.

First Lieutenant Quinn, without regard for his own safety, advanced in the face of heavy enemy fire from artillery, tanks and small arms and directed return fire upon the enemy. His heroic action was instrumental in insuring the safety of an entire combat command.

RAYMOND E. WOOD, 36172183, Corporal, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 September 1944. After his company withdrew from a bridgehead, Corporal Wood volunteered to return to the bridgehead for the purpose of evacuating wounded. When informed of the location of a wounded man, Corporal Wood, at extreme risk of his life, advanced in spite of heavy enemy fire and remained at the side of the wounded man until three volunteer litter bearers came up to assist in the evacuation. The gallantry displayed by Corporal Wood is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.


HERSCHEL G. DUPREE, 34033704, Staff Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 September 1944. While Staff Sergeant Dupree and his crew were performing their duties of laying wire, they were attacked by an unknown number of enemy troops with machine guns and small arms, whose fire pierced the gasoline tank making escape in their vehicle impossible. Staff Sergeant Dupree voluntarily, and in spite of slight wounds suffered during the attack, ran across an open field to a ditch approximately one hundred yards distant drawing the fire of the enemy and enabling the rest of the crew to escape by a less exposed route.

 * L. T. COLLIER, 17052913, ~~Technician Fifth Grade~~, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 29 August 1944. When his column was fired on by enemy anti tank guns forcing the column to withdraw, Technician Fifth Grade Collier, voluntarily and at great risk to his life, advanced to an exposed position from which he directed mortar fire on the enemy anti tank gun positions. During this action he was fired on by the anti tank guns and enemy machine guns and wounded by shrapnel. The anti tank guns were routed by the mortar fire thus directed and the column was enabled to advance on its mission.

8. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

HERBERT M. SCHULKIND, 01169327, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. While acting as a forward observer, the enemy launched a counter attack against the unit with which First Lieutenant Schulkind was observing. First Lieutenant Schulkind, in spite of enemy fire and danger from exploding ammunition in a nearby burning half track, took a position under direct observation of the enemy and directed artillery fire on them. So effective was the combined tank and artillery fire directed that the enemy counter attack was completely routed. The action of First Lieutenant Schulkind reflects the highest traditions of the military service.

ROBERT F. MILLER, 01167546, Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 17 September 1944. Second Lieutenant Miller went forward to a hill with two tank destroyers to observe fire on the enemy who were attempting to retake the hill. During the entire night, even after others had abandoned the hill, Second Lieutenant Miller, without regard for his personal safety, remained on the hill fighting off numerous attacks with direct fire. His courageous action resulted in holding the position and inflicting heavy casualties upon the enemy. The action of Second Lieutenant Miller reflects the highest traditions of the military service.

JOHN J. DRENNER, 6894134, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. While under heavy artillery and anti-tank fire, Sergeant Drenner moved his self propelled howitzer to the only position from which direct fire could be brought upon the enemy anti-tank gun, in spite of the danger of exploding ammunition in a burning ammunition carrier within ten yards of the position and from enemy artillery and small arms fire. By his courageous action the enemy anti-tank gun was knocked out. The superior qualities of leadership and courage displayed by Sergeant Drenner reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

OTTO E. SHIELDS, 34153767, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. When enemy artillery fire scored a direct hit on a Quartermaster gasoline truck which immediately burst into flame, Technician Fifth Grade Shields and another enlisted man, without regard for their personal safety, made their way through the flames and succeeded in dragging the driver from the vehicle. The exceptional courage of Technician Fifth Grade Shields is worthy of the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

GRANT A. THOMPSON, 33071779, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. When enemy artillery fire scored a direct hit on a Quartermaster gasoline truck which immediately burst into flame, Technician Fifth Grade Thompson and another enlisted man, without regard for their personal safety, made their way through the flames and succeeded in dragging the driver from the vehicle. The exceptional courage of Technician Fifth Grade Thompson is worthy of the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.

WILLIAM A. WRIGHT, 34084013, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. While the position of his battery was under heavy enemy artillery fire, Technician Fifth Grade Wright, without regard for his personal safety, rushed to an ammunition truck that had been bracketed by shells and was in immediate danger of being hit and blown up, and drove the truck to a position of safety. The action of Technician Fifth Grade Wright reflects the highest tradition of the military service.


BURNICE D. CARTER, 6370282, First Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 20 September 1944. First Sergeant Carter had been ordered to go in a one quarter ton truck into Germany to locate a tank and maintenance vehicle which had been left behind because the tank had lost a track. In spite of enemy artillery and small arms fire he reached the vehicles where he learned that there were also a large number of vehicles stranded nearby. He reorganized this group of vehicles, formed them in column and led them to safety. His courageous action resulted in the saving of many vehicles and is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

FORREST W. NAYLOR, 35210597, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 14 September 1944. Assigned the task of protecting the unit trains at a ford with the tank which he commanded, Sergeant Naylor, although his tank was disabled earlier in the night by enemy rocket launcher fire, stuck to his post and throughout the night even when enemy infantry troops infiltrated close enough to throw hand grenades at the tank, traversed the turret and continued firing on the enemy. By his calmness under fire, Sergeant Naylor inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy and enabled the supply trucks to accomplish their mission.

ROBERT B. RICAUD, O1169303, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. While acting as a forward artillery observer during a counter attack by enemy tank and infantry troops, First Lieutenant Ricaud, with complete disregard for his own safety directed artillery fire within fifty yards of his own position in order to stop the enemy attack. His gallant conduct is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.



Without regard for his own safety he organized the troops in a strong defense against the enemy and then personally led the troops of automatic weapons in an attack against the enemy forcing them to retreat. The actions of Lieutenant Colonel Kennedy reflect the highest traditions of the military service.

WENDELL H. RUSSELL, 01171341, Captain, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 19 September 1944. During the withdrawal of the battalion along a route under enemy observation and heavy artillery fire, Captain Russell was placed in charge of the evacuation of an M-12 155mm gun and a wrecker being towed by M-30 carriers. During the withdrawal the disabled wrecker was destroyed by a direct hit and another M-12 155mm gun was hit and abandoned. Captain Russell examined the second M-12 gun and finding that it

could move under its own power, personally drove the gun along with the other towed gun evacuating both guns to positions of safety. The initiative and courage displayed by Captain Russell reflect the highest traditions of the military service.


ALBERT K. WILL, 01043545, First Lieutenant, Coast Artillery Corps, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 22 August 1944. When a friendly tank received a direct hit from enemy anti-tank fire and started to burn, First Lieutenant Will led a rescue party forward under enemy shell fire and supervised the evacuation of the crew members. When a one quarter ton vehicle with medical aid men arrived, it received a direct hit from anti-tank fire. First Lieutenant Will returned to his Command Post and brought another one quarter ton truck and evacuated the wounded men from the field of battle. His action is worthy of the high traditions of the United States Army.

ARLIE R. CLAYCOCK, 35250116, Technician Fourth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 16 and 17 September 1944. When the unit with which Technician Fourth Grade Claycock was serving as company aid man came under intense enemy artillery fire causing many casualties and forcing the unit to withdraw, Technician Fourth Grade Claycock remained in the area under constant fire, treating the wounded and supervising their evacuation. On the following day when his unit again moved into the position and was exposed to intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, Technician Fourth Grade Claycock, without regard for his personal safety, moved from wounded men to wounded men giving first aid and moving them to safe positions. The gallant conduct of Technician Fourth Grade Claycock is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

RUSSELL F. BURDEN, 35290117, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 20 August 1944. When a tank destroyer received a direct hit from enemy artillery, seriously wounding three members of the crew, Technician Fifth Grade Burden and another enlisted man advanced under intense enemy machine gun and artillery fire and administered first aid to the wounded men and while attempting to load them on a one quarter ton ambulance a nearby artillery burst rendered Technician Fifth Grade Burden unconscious and wounded the other enlisted man who returned to the platoon command post for additional help. When Technician Fifth Grade Burden regained consciousness, he and the other enlisted man succeeded in evacuating the three wounded crew members to safety. The action of Technician Fifth Grade Burden is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

HARREY J. BEAN, 34386366, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 20 August 1944. When a tank destroyer received a direct hit from enemy artillery, seriously wounding three members of the crew, Private Bean and another enlisted man advanced under intense enemy machine gun and artillery fire and administered first aid to the wounded men and while attempting to load them on a one quarter ton ambulance a nearby artillery burst wounded Private Bean and rendered the other enlisted man unconscious. Private Bean, unable to be of any further assistance, worked his way back on foot to the platoon command post where he secured additional help and the three wounded men were evacuated to safety. The action of Private Bean is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

ALFRED E. AMES, 36400216, Private First Class, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 17 September 1944. Although wounded on the previous night, Private First Class Ames had refused medical evacuation and continued on duty. The tank destroyer platoon leader was forced to leave his vehicle below the crest of a hill to avoid direct enemy observation and proceeded forward on foot to direct fire against the enemy. Private First Class Ames acted as his messenger and, without regard for his own safety, continuously negotiated the distance between the platoon leader and the guns of the platoon and thus enabled the gun crews to lay accurate fire on the enemy positions. During this action Private First Class Ames was again wounded and had to be evacuated. His actions are worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

8. AWARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is posthumously awarded to JOHN KALLIS, 36015718, Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 17 September 1944. When his unit was attacked by enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, Sergeant Kallis advanced on foot, without regard for his own safety, for the purpose of directing fire on the enemy positions. Later on that same day he


left the turret of the tank destroyer which he commanded to fire a machine gun against advancing enemy foot troops. When the machine gun jammed, Sergeant Kulis remained exposed to enemy fire until he had cleared the stoppage and then resumed fire until the attack was repulsed. Subsequently his tank destroyer was hit by enemy mortar fire and Sergeant Kulis was fatally wounded. His gallantry and aggressive leadership reflects the highest traditions of the United States Army.

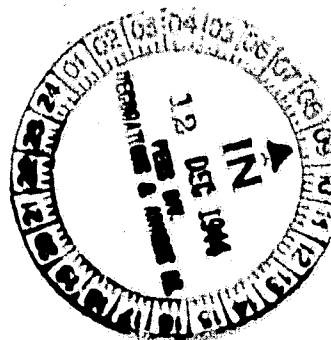

A wheel was knocked off in the second take-off making the landing a difficult feat for even the most experienced pilot. The initiative and courage displayed by First Lieutenant Knight in preserving equipment essential to his battalion's operations are worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

WAYNE B. FOSTER, 0463896, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 15 and 16 September 1944. In reconnoitering the exposed flank of his battery's position, First Lieutenant Foster discovered a series of pillboxes that were directing fire on the battery. Armed with grenades and a machine gun, he led an attacking force which cleaned out the four pillboxes, with no enemy troops seemingly remaining in the vicinity. The next day machine gun fire was resumed from one of the pillboxes, whereupon First Lieutenant Foster mounted an M-7 gun and acting as gunner himself, served fire on the pillbox. Noting the route of flight of the routed enemy troops, he discovered another series of pillboxes which were neutralized. All of this was done at extreme risk of his life from enemy fire, but without loss of men or equipment to the battery. The actions of First Lieutenant Foster are worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

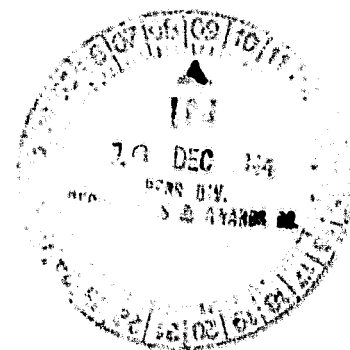

Assigned the mission of holding an isolated road block, the platoon commanded by First Lieutenant Kovatch was attacked by an enemy force of approximately two platoons. He attempted to renewer his platoon so as to trap both enemy platoons but found his forces being enveloped on their left flank. With entire disregard for his own safety, First Lieutenant Kovatch, armed with a machine gun and hand

grenades, advanced under heavy fire to a higher position and engaged the enemy with such effectiveness that they were routed. His actions are worthy of the highest traditions of the armed forces.

ROBERT H. HOFFMAN, 01310445, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. When the enemy attempted to encircle his unit, Second Lieutenant Hoffman ordered two squads of his platoon to engage the enemy while he, with complete disregard for his own safety, infiltrated the enemy lines carrying a telephone and a light machine gun, to direct mortar fire on the enemy. The fire thus directed routed the enemy and drove them into a trap between another platoon and the machine gun. The action of Second Lieutenant Hoffman reflects the highest traditions of the military service.

RAYMOND L. ANDERSON, 33452803, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. Private Anderson and two other aid men on being informed that two wounded men were in a burning building in a town that our forces had evacuated, without regard for their own safety drove an ambulance into the town in the face of enemy machine gun and small arms fire, located and gave first aid to the wounded men and evacuated them in the ambulance to a medical clearing station. The action of Private Anderson is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

TRANSITO E. SANDOVAL, 38103584, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. Private Sandoval and two other aid men on being informed that two wounded men were in a burning building in a town that our forces had evacuated, without regard for their own safety, drove an ambulance into the town in the face of enemy machine gun and small arms fire, located and gave first aid to the wounded men and evacuated them in the ambulance to a medical clearing station. The action of Private Sandoval is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

STEPHEN ZNOJ, 31036166, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. Private Znoj and two other aid men on being informed that two wounded men were in a burning building in a town that our forces had evacuated, without regard for their own safety, drove an ambulance into the town in the face of enemy machine gun and small arms fire, located and gave first aid to the wounded men and evacuated them in the ambulance to a medical clearing station. The action of Private Znoj is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

5. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, a Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following named Officers and Enlisted Men:

ROBERT E. MAC LEOD, 01998370, Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) Cavalry, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 9 August 1944. When the reconnaissance platoon of which he was a member was ambushed by enemy infantry and tank troops, Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) MacLeod voluntarily moved forward in a one quarter ton vehicle with a radio, at great risk to his life for the purpose of directing fire on the enemy. In spite of enemy small arms and tank gun fire directed at his position he directed effective fire on the enemy for a period of approximately twenty minutes and contributed greatly to the reorganization of the ambushed platoon. The action of Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) MacLeod is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

BENJAMIN J. BENITA, 31040998, Technical Sergeant, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 30 August 1944. When the reconnaissance column was halted by enemy artillery and anti-tank fire which destroyed the leading vehicles and killed the commanding officer, the retreat of the leading vehicles was blocked by the vehicles in the rear of the column whose drivers had taken cover in ditches. Technical Sergeant Benita, with complete disregard for his own safety, stood in an exposed position and directed the movement of several vehicles to a position of safety with the result that the other vehicles followed and order was restored to the column. The action of Technical Sergeant Benita is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

BLAN O. T. CLAYTON, 38063923, Corporal, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 8 September 1944. When the advance of the column was halted by an anti-tank gun, the exact location of which was not known, Corporal Clayton deliberately drove a one quarter ton truck in full view of the enemy to draw their fire and reveal the hidden position. He had proceeded only a short distance when the one quarter ton truck was completely destroyed by the enemy gun, seriously wounding Corporal Clayton, but enabling the assault guns of the column to neutralize the anti-tank gun and the advance of the column to continue. The gallantry and self sacrifice of Corporal Clayton is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

KENNETH ASHLAND, 39374955, Technician Fifth Grade, United States Army for gallantry in action in France on 17 August 1944. The reconnaissance platoon leader was in the leading one quarter ton truck when the enemy opened fire with machine guns and small arms. Technician Fifth Grade Ashland who was gunner in the platoon leader's armored car, rushed the armored car to the front of the column, knocking out an enemy vehicle and laying effective machine gun and 37mm gun fire on the enemy. Enemy anti-tank and artillery fire began to fall on the platoon, but Technician Fifth Grade Ashland held his position and continued firing until the platoon leader and dismounted scouts could fall back. The action of Technician Fifth Grade Ashland is worthy of the highest tradition of the military service.


LEORY H. ANDERSON, 0239452, Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, United States Army for gallant conduct and superior performance of duty in Germany from 13 September 1941 to 21 September 1944. During this period the battalion commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Anderson was subjected almost continuously to attacks by a superior enemy force employing artillery, mortars, anti-tank guns, automatic weapons and small arms. Lieutenant Colonel Anderson, without regard for his personal safety, always placed himself in a position to observe action important to the safety of his command and to assure the fulfillment of the holding mission. The actions of Lieutenant Colonel Anderson were an inspiration to his command and worthy of the highest traditions of the United States Army.

THOMAS G. COSTANZO, 42040313, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in Germany on 21 September 1944. Private Costanzo was leading a supply train in a light tank. At a river crossing his tank was hit by an enemy anti-tank rocket launcher, wounding all of the crew except himself, but he remained in position giving protective fire for a group of engineers who were clearing mines in the vicinity and when they had reached the shelter of his tank he returned to the friendly side of the river. He returned shortly in another tank with a crew consisting of one other man and immediately went into firing position. At this point an officer was seriously wounded and the crew of a one quarter ton truck pinned down by enemy fire. Private Costanzo maneuvered the tank in such a manner as to protect the wounded officer and the other men but continued to fire at the enemy until they were routed. His actions are worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.

While advancing with the leading element of the attacking party, Major Gerald was fatally wounded by enemy rifle fire. The action of Major Gerald in leading a force on a dangerous mission when he could have delegated the mission to a subordinate commander without reflecting discredit upon himself is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service.


CHARLES D. RICHARDS, 15114349, Private, United States Army for gallantry in action in Luxembourg on 13 September 1944. While on a reconnaissance patrol Private Richards was proceeding the leading vehicle, a one quarter ton truck, as a dismounted scout when the patrol was brought under enemy fire. Observing that the one quarter ton truck had been hit, Private Richards, at great risk to his own life, returned across open terrain to evacuate one of the wounded passengers of the vehicle. Later he returned to the scene atop an armored car in full view of the enemy to aid in the evacuation of the vehicle and the wounded driver therein. The gallant conduct displayed by Private Richards reflects the highest traditions of the United States Army.

7. AMENDMENT OF GENERAL ORDERS: So much of paragraph 4, General Orders 21, this Headquarters, as pertaining to the award of the Air Medal to certain officers, as reads: "HOWARD L.
