I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 3 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Major HARRY L. SNAVELY, 0341099, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Zambales and Bataan, Philippine Islands, from 29 January to 5 February 1945. On 29 January, Major Snavely's battalion was ordered to spearhead the regiment's advance in the amphibious Zambales-Bataan operation. He evolved a simple, flexible and effective plan of initial action which he executed vigorously. When he found that expected motor transportation was not available for his 3-Day inland movement, he ordered a forced foot march, swept through Southern Zambales, and reached the regimental objective, 16 miles from the beach in less than seven hours. In subsequent action in Zig-Zag Pass, Major Snavely was ordered to move to the assault of the enemy's main position, a rough plateau accessible only over the most difficult terrain and strongly defended. Before ordering the advance of his troops, Major Snavely made a hazardous, personal reconnaissance deep into the enemy defenses. He then returned and led two companies forward, leaving two on the road. Although the elements of his battalion were necessarily spread out, he maintained control of them at all times. When his companies came under concentrated artillery fire, his expert control and selfless action enabled him to maintain the unity of his forces. Seeing that their position was untenable, he withdrew his companies, reconstituted his line and maintained contact with the enemy flank which he had developed. At no time did Major Snavely evince any consideration for his personal safety. His calm display of courage and initiative under intense enemy fire inspired the highest confidence and respect among his men. Home address: Mrs. Harry L. Private First Class BRADLEY E. BOTTS, 35842316, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action in the vicinity of Lascon, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 22 June 1945. On this day, Private Botts was a member of a six-man intelligence and reconnaissance patrol sent to investigate several Japanese houses on the flank of the leading rifle company. Two houses

were searched and the men had surrounded the third when they were fired upon by Japs from the house and a nearby foxhole. The patrol immediately returned the fire, killing the Jap in the foxhole. As the patrol roved forward, Private Botts saw another Jap underneath the house, and knowing the need for prisoners, immediately ran after him. The enemy soldier did not have a rifle, but carried two grenades. Private Botts tackled him and fought with him until two of his comrades came to his aid. Private Botts' courageous devotion to duty reflects high credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mis. Laura E. Botts (wife), Paw Paw, Illinois.

Captain (then First Lieutenant) LEWIS F. STEARNS, 0476381, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Jaro, Leyte, Philippine Islands, on 30 October 1944. On this day, a rifle company was leading the battalion advance through enemy territory. The enemy, from well concealed positions on a high ridge overlooking our route of advance, opened fire with artillery, mortars, machine guns, and small arms. The intensity of the hostile fire caused many casualties and made the position untenable. When the regimental commander was seriously wounded by a mortar shell fragment, Captain Stearns personally carried him through a heavy mortar barrage to a point where litter bearers could evacuate him. He then returned to the battle area and directed and supervised the evacuation of the wounded, the withdrawal of a badly disabled tank, and the orderly maneuver of his platoon. To accomplish this he moved about constantly with complete disregard for enemy artillery, mortar, and small arms fire in order to more effectively coordinate his covering fire. Captain Stearns left the scene of action only after the last of his men had reached safety. The high personal valor displayed by Captain Stearns inspired his men at a time when heroic example and strong leadership were urgently needed. First Lieutenant ROBERT N. STINSMAN, 02037100, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Mandog, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 8 June 1945. The company had dug in after taking its objective the previous night. At dawn the enemy launched a coordinated attack against the section of the perimeter defended by Lieutenant Stinsman's platoon. In the furious fire fight that developed, Lieutenant Stinsman shouted encouragement to his men and directed the mortar and machine gun fire. When six men were wounded, he rushed alone to the weakened sector and fired all available weapons until the enemy was repulsed. Throughout the bitter engagement, Lieutenant Stinsman directed accurate 60mm mortar fire, knowing that the mortar was firing only an approximate 50 yards from the enemy. Lieutenant Stinsman's quick thinking and courage under fire were major factors in stopping the enemy attack, and won the respect and admiration of the entire company. Home address: Mr. M. L. Lieutenant Colonel (then Major) JAMES J. STOVALL, 0362509, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Mandog, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 11 June 1945. As commander of an infantry battalion, Colonel Stovall distinguished himself in action while leading his unit in the midst of the three pronged drive against an enemy stronghold near Mandog. He successfully directed his unit across difficult mountainous terrain in a wide envelopment of the enemy's rear. After fighting three days under trying conditions along mountainous, rain-forest trails, blocked by strongly defended pillboxes, Colonel Stovall personally led elements of his command to seize Maag Hill, a dominating ridge approximately 450 feet high, honeycombed with trenches and cave pillboxes. As several enemy machine gun and 20mm positions entrenched on the steep reverse slope rendered artillery and air support ineffective, Colonel Stovall directed the hand carry and emplacement of a 37mm anti-tank gun, which neutralized the pillboxes by direct fire. Because of his outstanding leadership and personal example of courage while under intense rocket fire, he was directly responsible for the successful seizure of this difficult objective. Colonel Stovall's heroic actions exemplify the best traditions of the military service. Home address: Mrs. Mary Stovall (wife), 1526 Shirley Street, Columbia, South Carolina.

Major JAMES Y. WILSON, 0362295, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Mandog, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, from 13 June to 24 June 1945. Major Wilson assumed command of an infantry battalion during an attack against a Japanese strongpoint near Mandog, and directed the operation to a successful conclusion. He planned, coordinated, and directed heavy concentrations of air bombs, artillery, mortar, and tank fire to knock out a determined enemy force entrenched on dominating terrain. Under his personal leadership, his unit rapidly advanced and seized all key terrain features in his zone of action, which completely disorganized Jap defenses in the Mandog area. On 23 June, while under harassing small arms and mortar fire, Major Wilson led his battalion on an azimuth bearing through thick abaca fields to an assembly area near the Tamogan River, 2000 yards north of the only bridge crossing. After two night attempts had failed because of the steepness of the gorge, he led a surprise crossing of the river on 24 June 1945. This rendered untenable the enemy defenses of the vital Tamogan River bridge, and insured the advance of friendly forces in that area. II. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bull. 3, ID, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

First Sergeant CHESTER BARGLSKY, 6838110, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Mandog, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 13 June 1945. An infantry company was advancing toward high ground northwest of Mandog, when the Japanese blew up a shack containing bombs and high explosives. The terrific explosion that followed wounded twenty-eight men. Sergeant Barglsky immediately moved forward and helped to evacuate the wounded. The equipment of these men was collected and placed near the trail to be taken out by a carrying party. Before it could be taken out, the Japanese opened fire with heavy machine guns and rifles. Orders were given to withdraw because of the heavy casualties and because of high cliffs on the right flank. Sergeant Barglsky realized that this equipment, which included three Browning Automatic Rifles and three Thompson Sub-Machine Guns, would greatly aid the Japanese if it were captured. With utter disregard for his personal safety, Sergeant Barglsky made several trips and exposed himself to this heavy enemy fire in order to get the equipment behind friendly lines. Sergeant Barglsky's clear thinking, initiative and gallantry is worthy of the highest traditions of the military service. Private EARL L. CASEY, 36839734, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Davao, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 17 May 1945. On this day, Private Casey, a runner, was advancing with a rifle company on a hill two and one-half miles northwest of Davao. When a man was wounded, he voluntarily ran forward under heavy enemy sniper and machine gun fire and helped evacuate him to safety. During this act, Private Casey was severely wounded in the back and chest. Private Casey's heroic actions, above the call of duty, reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Private First Class ALFRED J. CRIBARI, 16131475, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Panacan, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 30 May 1945. In the vicinity of Panacan, while performing his duties as a messenger, Private Cribari received information of an unknown number of enemy in the immediate area. Stopping two vehicles, he organized a patrol and led it to the area where the enemy had been reported. Upon arrival, he was the first to spot the Japs who were busily engaged in placing land mines and digging gun positions in preparation for a road block or ambush. Flanking their position, the patrol caught the enemy by surprise. Private Cribari opened fire, killing one and wounding two others, thus frustrating the enemy's attempt to hamper our main supply route. On 3 July, Lieutenant Gonyea led a reconnaissance patrol of two officers and seven enlisted men into the enemy occupied Sarangani Bay Area. He observed the enemy dispositions and collected valuable information for a future amphibious operation to seize the area. The enemy was known to be armed with rifles and machine guns. Lieutenant Gonyea organized and trained the guerrillas in this area, and at the risk of his life, he boldly reconnoitered for the most suitable landing beach and best avenue of approach to

the task force objective. His fearless and aggressive leadership in the operations of his patrol contributed materially to the success of a Division Task Force landing on 12 July and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Captain WARREN M. McNAMARA, 01295408, Infantry, United States Army. Lieutenant Colonel WALTER C. RATHBONE, 08100, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Leyte, Mindoro and Mindanao, Philippine Islands, from 28 November 1944 to 10 July 1945. As division rear echelon commandant at Carigara, Leyte, from about 6 December 1944 to 21 January 1945, Colonel Rathbone helped organize the division reception point, and by his continued interest, enabled it to fulfill its mission of providing for the welfare of casual military personnel rejoining their units after hospitalization. Colonel Rathbone has been especially vigilant in the investigation of pilferage of army supplies. Without other officer personnel in his section, he personally made a relentless search into all phases of supply channels, and submitted his recommendations to higher headquarters. These were also approved by commanders of a naval task force, and became the basis for their directives in their determination to prevent pilferage in their command. Not content with making routine investigations in the rear echelon areas, Colonel Rathbone made frequent trips to the front, and was many times exposed to small arms fire. On the night of 2 June 1945, he volunteered to drive a chaplain several miles over a road known to be under observation and fire of enemy snipers so that he might render the last rites to a dying catholic soldier. Knowing that driving under blackout would be too slow and that the soldier might die before the chaplain could arrive, he turned on bright lights to make greater speed, although he knew that he would almost certainly draw effective sniper fire. Colonel Rathbone's high sense of duty and personal courage are in full accord with the highest traditions of the military service. Home address: Lieutenant Marie H. AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bull. 3, 7D, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Technician Fifth Grade (then Private) BOBEY L. ALBRIGHT, 35227191, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations at Leyte, Philippine Islands, on 20 October 1944. During the beach landing at San Pedro Bay, Leyte, Corporal Albright was aboard an LCVP which was hit by an enemy mortar shell. The barge sank immediately, leaving several wounded in the water. As mortar and machine gun fire continued, Corporal Albright remained with the wreckage and relieved the wounded of their equipment. Seeing a wounded man unconscious in the water and in imminent danger of drowning, he placed a life belt on him and kept the man afloat until a rescue ship arrived. During all this time the men were under constant machine gun and mortar fire and several times were washed under by surf caused by other boats. Corporal Albright then went back to check the area. Seeing that all had been saved, he returned to the rescue ship and administered first aid to the wounded until they could be taken aboard a ship better equipped to handle battle casualties. Corporal Albright's undaunted courage in the face of heavy enemy fire reflects high credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. Jessie Albright (mother), Waterloo, Indiana.

Technician Fourth Grade BERT L. AMES, 39400984, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Catalunan, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 24 May 1945. On this day, during the attack on a strongly fortified and fiercely defended enemy position, Sergeant Ames accompanied the battalion commander forward in the capacity of a radio operator. Although his personal safety was impaired by the considerable weight of an SCR-500 radio, which hampered his movements under enemy fire, he calmly and efficiently transmitted the orders and requests of the battalion commander. During the course of the assault, he reportedly entered an area subject to enemy mortar and machine gun fire and was twice pinned to the ground. He continued, however, to operate the radio and deliver promptly to the commander whatever information he could gather. Sergeant Ames' coolness under fire and his dependable and intelligent performance under difficult and dangerous conditions proved invaluable in the control of the battalion. Even under these conditions, the forward elements were kept supplied, due in great part to Sergeant Tootle's untiring effort through long hours. I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Technical Sergeant JAMES H. CIMMIYOTTI, 36125955, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Zig-Zag Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. On this day, the positions occupied by an infantry company, of which Sergeant Cimmiyotti was a member, were subjected to a heavy Jap artillery barrage. Because a very large number of its men were being killed or wounded, the company was ordered to withdraw to safer positions. Sergeant Cimmiyotti volunteered to remain behind under the unrelenting artillery fire to administer first aid, improvise litters and to assist in the evacuation of his wounded comrades. Sergeant Cimmiyotti was the last man to leave the area, carrying with him two automatic weapons, as well as his own equipment to prevent their falling into the hands of the enemy. Sergeant Cimmiyotti's courageous actions were a source of inspiration to both officers and men of his company and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. Mildred Cimmiyotti (mother), Kimberly, Oregon.

Technical Sergeant HERBERT M. HANSON, 37112536, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, and Leyte, Mindoro, and Mindanao, Philippine Islands, from 22 April 1944 to 17 June 1945. During this period, Sergeant Hanson was a member of an anti-tank company in an infantry regiment. As a section leader during the Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea campaign, he often led combat and reconnaissance patrols, carrying them out quickly and efficiently. His initiative and ingenuity greatly aided his platoon leader in setting up ambushes which resulted in killing a large number of the enemy without casualties to his platoon. Due to the illness of his platoon leader during the Mindanao campaign, Sergeant Hanson willingly assumed the command and added responsibilities over short periods of time. On one occasion, during the absence of his platoon leader, his platoon was given the mission of defending a bridge on a vital supply route. His skillful emplacement of his automatic weapons, clearing of fields of fire, construction of wire entanglements and speed of execution brought praise from higher headquarters.

to his platoon and company. On 2 June 1945, Sergeant Hanson was in command of one half of his platoon guarding a carrying party with supplies for an infantry battalion. As the party was crossing open terrain, enemy machine gun and rifle fire wounded three members of the party. Sergeant Hanson skillfully withdrew his guards to positions from which they could deliver a base of fire which enabled the rapid evacuation of the wounded. Sergeant Hanson's quick thinking, outstanding leadership and disregard for personal safety were undoubtedly instrumental in saving the lives of the seriously wounded men. Staff Sergeant PHILIP D. ROCHE, JR., 130 3621, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at the Mainit River, Philippine Islands, on 28 October 1944. On this day, a company of infantry made a flank envelopment of the enemy left flank which was then situated on the west bank of the Mainit River, one and one-fourth miles northwest of Alangalang, Leyte, Philippine Islands. The enemy covered the bridge and Highway #2 with heavy machine gun and mortar fire. The company moved 500 yards northeast of the highway, forded the river, and assaulted the enemy defending the bridge. Sergeant Roche, squad leader of an infantry platoon, led his men in the 500-yard assault in a manner deserving the highest tribute. He observed a mortar position as it fired a round at our troops and destroyed it with his rifle by charging the position. He directed his men to fire into camouflaged spider holes occupied by the enemy with utter disregard for the heavy enemy sniper and machine gun fire. He continued to lead his men until the last position was over-run and destroyed. Sergeant Roche's gallant leadership, born of long training and steadfast devotion to duty, spurred the entire platoon to advance rapidly and vigorously. This advance totally destroyed the well entrenched Japs and captured the bridge, thereby allowing a general advance the following day. Home address: Mr. Philip D. II. SOLDIER'S MEDAL.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 2 July 1926 (Bull. 8, D, 1926), a Soldier's Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

First Sergeant JAMES A. SMITH, 6931086, Infantry, United States Army. For heroism at the Simuay River near Fort Pikit, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 19 April 1945. On this day, Sergeant Smith's company was in an advance movement. When men of the company reached the Simuay river, they waded across in a single file linked together by holding to one another. As the men pushed their way across the swift, two hundred foot wide, waist deep river, the file was broken. The swift water and the deep sandbottom immediately caused one man loaded with two packs, and another who was carrying a radio, to lose their footing and go down into the water. Sergeant Smith saw the men in trouble and immediately, without regard for personal safety, rushed to the men and one by one conducted them to a brush covered log that was lodged in the middle of the river. He then assisted each man to the shore. During this incident, Sergeant Smith's rifle was lost but he was able, through his quick acting, to save all other equipment.

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Sergeant Smith's brave and courageous act performed in the swift and treacherous river during the hours of darkness was directly responsible for saving the lives of these two men, and was an inspiration to all the members of his organization. III. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bull. 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Private First Class EDWARD DYKSTRA, 37587809, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Mindanao, Philippine Islands, from 17 April to 8 June 1945. During this period, Private Dykstra, serving in the capacity of runner and guard, accompanied his commanding officer forward on numerous occasions to join the leading elements. He frequently became engaged in fire fights with the enemy in his aggressive determination to reach the command group's objective. On one occasion, he remained in an exposed position to protect the left flank of the command group until ordered to withdraw. On still another occasion, near the Davao River bridge, he was forced to carry messages through enemy small arms, automatic weapons and artillery fire. Private Dykstra's personal bravery and devotion to duty at all times was a credit to the military service and an inspiration to all with whom he served. Home address: Mr. Theo Dykstra (father), 928 Alton Street, Redlands, California.

Private First Class DELBERT A. HAYES, 38230478, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Corregidor, Philippine Islands, on 16 February 1945. On this day, Private Hayes was in command of an anti-tank squad making the assault when the jeep towing his gun hit a large mine and was destroyed. The driver was killed and three of his squad, including the gunner, were wounded. Private Hayes reorganized the squad and disengaged the gun from the jeep. This was accomplished under concentrated machine gun fire. Private Hayes then guided the gun, which was moved by hand, through the mine field to an exposed position. As soon as the gun was set up, it became the target of a machine gun. Private Hayes elected to act as gunner with the assistance of two men of his squad. He opened fire and in a very short time, destroyed the enemy machine gun. Private Hayes' initiative and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Technician Fourth Grade RALPH O. IVESTER, 34199879, Field Artillery, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, and Leyte and Mindanao, Philippine Islands, from 22 April 1944 to 30 June 1945. Corporal HARRY L. KLINE, JR., 35742121, Infantry, United States Army. Corporal Kline was a member of an anti-tank squad making an assault on the beach. Upon reaching the beach, the prime mover of the gun hit a mine, was destroyed and started burning. Without regard for his own personal safety and under concentrated machine gun fire, Corporal Kline salvaged what ammunition he could from the burning wreckage and helped pull the gun by hand through the mine field. The gun was placed in position in an area subjected to heavy fire. Corporal Kline aided in setting up the gun and directed its fire toward the enemy positions, silencing their fire. Corporal Kline's extreme courage and devotion to duty brought credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. Mary M. Kline (wife), Rural Free Delivery, Route #2, West Chicago, Illinois.

Captain RAYMOND G. ORSINGER, 0502951, Dental Corps, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Pastrana, Leyte, Philippine Islands, on 27 October 1944. During the attack of an infantry battalion against strong enemy positions defending Pastrana, intense sniper fire resulted in numerous casualties. Approximately fifty wounded men were brought to the aid station in a three hour period, making it necessary to move the station to within 100 yards of the front lines. Captain Orsinger, who was attached to the battalion, realized the urgency of caring for these men and, working under the most hazardous conditions, gave efficient first aid and administered plasma to a large number of the wounded. By so assisting the battalion surgeon, he facilitated the rapid evacuation of badly wounded men and greatly increased their chances for recovery. Captain Orsinger's excellent work under such hazardous and trying conditions reflects high credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mr. William R. Staff Sergeant WILLARD H. REED, 35038423, Field Artillery, United States Army. I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

Sergeant WILMER L. HALLOCK, 36615323, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Leyte, Philippine Islands, on 24 November 1944. Sergeant Hallock was a member of a daring fourteen-man assault which sought to probe enemy defenses which had repulsed the efforts of their company for five days. Sergeant Hallock had advanced thirty yards under rifle and machine gun fire to a point where another rifleman was delivering fire upon an enemy position which had been raking the ridge with heavy fire from automatic weapons. Here they returned fire upon the enemy until the other soldier was seriously wounded. Then word was passed to them that the order had been given to withdraw. Sergeant Hallock dragged the wounded man through the heavy enemy fire for twenty yards to a covered position where he could be given medical attention. Their progress was slow, and they made excellent targets for the enemy. The men were under a hail of fire for approximately fifteen minutes. The courage of Sergeant Hallock, and complete disregard for his own safety, was an inspiration to every man in the company and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Captain JOHN E. WARD, 02034999, Chemical Warfare Service, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Davao, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on 2, 3 and 5 May 1945. During the night of 2-3 May Captain Ward, with the leading elements of the infantry assault units, entered the City of Davao and operated throughout the night and following day with the leading patrols, investigating reported enemy chemical mines and chemical activities. Although being under enemy artillery, automatic weapons, mortar and small arms fire, plus house to house sniper fire, Captain Ward, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, successfully carried out his mission. On 5 May Captain Ward again went forward to investigate a report of chemical mines along Davao Gulf.

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Without thought for his own personal safety he dug up one of the mines, brought it to the command post, where he had sufficient tools with which to work, and disarmed it. These displays of personal courage and coolness on the part of Captain Ward in executing particularly hazardous missions were instrumental in making possible the rapid advance of our troops and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Technician Fifth Grade AUGUST S. FIIHR, 37384094, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Malinta Hill, Corregidor, Philippine Islands, on 21 February 1945. A platoon of an infantry company was deployed, guarding a road block. About 100 feet above their positions, the enemy had concealed in a tunnel a great quantity of explosives and motor fuel. At 2140 that night, the Japs detonated this dump. The explosion started an avalanche of rock and debris, covering our positions. Corporal Fiihr, on his own initiative, crawled through an area where rocks were still falling, dug out the SCR-300 radio, and kept contact with the battalion throughout the night. As a result of his efforts, litters and medical supplies were brought up at the first opportunity. When help arrived, he assisted in the evacuation of the wounded. Unknown to others, Corporal Fiihr had himself been injured during the action, and as he was leaving the position, he collapsed. Sergeant (then Private First Class) EUGLID C. MILLIARD, 31044531, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Malinta Hill, Corregidor, Philippine Islands, on 16 February 1945. On this day, Sergeant Milliard was a member of a six-man road block on the lower level on the south side of Malinta hill. At 1130, an enemy machine gun opened fire on their position from a cave one hundred yards to their right flank. An enemy mortar simultaneously began zeroing in on the position. The outpost immediately laid effective fire from an automatic rifle, their only automatic weapon, upon the cave which temporarily silenced the machine gun. Suddenly a large group of Japs approached the road block under cover of the mortar barrage. While the automatic rifleman still covered the cave, the others opened fire with rifles and hurled grenades against the attacking Japs, driving them back with heavy casualties. The Japs realizing that their only chance of success was to silence the automatic weapon, launched four successive attacks on the flanks of the outpost. Although one man had been wounded and the others badly shaken by the enemy mortar fire, the

men repulsed attack after attack until 1630, when the enemy machine gun was permanently silenced. When the engagement was over, twenty-two Japs were found lying in the surrounding area. Sergeant Milliard's heroic action in this incident reflects great credit upon himself and serves as an inspiration to those who were with him. Private First Class LEO W. BINKLEY, 36469991, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Corregidor, Philippine Islands, on 21 February 1945. Private Binkley's platoon was on an offensive road block on the south side of Malinta Hill when the enemy detonated a huge store of explosives and motor fuel in a tunnel approximately one hundred feet above the position. The terrific explosion started a landslide of rock and debris, and large volumes of fire rolled from the mouth of the tunnel, engulfing the whole area. Private Binkley exposed himself to fire and falling rock and went to the assistance of his injured comrades, who had been partially buried by the avalanche. Using his bare hands, he uncovered the injured men and removed them to safety. When he returned to his post at the road block, Private Binkley was called upon to help another soldier who had been thrown below the cliff and was buried to the waist. With only his bleeding hands he quickly uncovered the injured man and then went for equipment to lift him from the ledge. He found a wire cable, lowered it to a soldier who secured it to the injured man, and then pulled him to safety. Private Binkley's actions were a credit to himself and the military service. Shortly after placing the gun his vehicle struck a mine, throwing him to the ground. Although severely cut on the face and suffering from a fractured arm, Private Hendee administered first aid to other members of the gun squad who were injured in the explosion. Private Hendee's gallant action under heavy enemy machine gun and rifle fire, without regard for his personal comfort and safety, gained him the admiration of his officers and comrades. He then joined the other squad and helped pull the gun by hand through the mine field, which at the time was under machine gun fire. He then placed his gun into action and engaged the enemy with accurate well-aimed fire. Sergeant Miseta's heroic actions, performed without orders, has brought added credit to himself and to his organization. Private First Class JOHN R. SMITH, 37743675, Infantry, United States Army. About 100 feet above their position the Japs had concealed a huge store of explosives and motor fuel in a tunnel. When the enemy detonated the munition dump there followed a terrific explosion which started a landslide of rock and debris, and large volumes of fire burst over the entire area. Private Smith was knocked unconscious when a large rock struck his head. Recovering consciousness within a few minutes, he returned to his post of duty. Realizing that many men had been buried by the landslide, he immediately started digging the injured men from the rocks and debris in which they were buried. During this rescue, another explosion occurred showering the area with rocks, but Private Smith continued to evacuate the injured men. Private Smith returned to his post of duty and continued to guard all night, in spite of his serious head injury which was later found to be a fracture. After administering effective first aid, they began the laborious trip back up the hill. Because of their burden they were unable to cover their own advance with rifle fire. 

I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class ANTHONY J. KRASUSKI, 16108612, Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Ula, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 6 June 1945. An infantry company advancing through enemy held territory encountered a number of enemy emplacements. Heavy and accurate automatic weapons and rifle fire from the enemy caused several casualties in Private Krasuski's platoon, three of whom were seriously wounded. Private Krasuski, a voluntary member of this platoon to which he was not attached, attempted to administer aid to the wounded, but was repulsed by automatic weapons fire. Undaunted, he secured the services of a mortar observer and assisted him in covering the area with a protective smoke screen. He then led a litter squad along a concealed route to the casualties, administered first aid, and organized their evacuation. Although a sniper's bullet struck his helmet and caused a second injury to one of the patients, Private Krasuski remained at his post until all the casualties had been removed to safety. His calm bravery throughout the action was a credit to himself and in keeping with the high standards of the medical service. Sergeant HUBERT A. THORNTON, 38508358, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Talomo River, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 22 May 1945. Sergeant Thornton and twelve other men were given the mission of protecting two tanks in an attempt to recover the body of a missing man near an enemy pillbox. As they approached, heavy machine gun and rifle fire caused three casualties and forced one tank and most of the men to withdraw. Sergeant Thornton and one other man remained behind with the other tank. Upon seeing the body of the missing man, Sergeant Thornton ran forward through the heavy enemy fire, picked up the body, and returned with it to the tank.

R E S T R I C T E D

As the vehicle withdrew, he accompanied it to protect it from enemy suicide demolition men until it had reached safety with the body of the dead man. Sergeant Thornton's fidelity to duty and determination to fulfill his mission regardless of personal danger is in accordance with the best traditions of the military service. Brigadier General KENNETH F. CRAMER, 0166429, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Bancal, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 7 May 1945. General Cramer inspected forward elements of an infantry regiment who were attacking heavily fortified enemy positions approximately 1200 yards northwest of Bancal. The attackers were opposed by intense mortar, machine gun, and rifle fire. General Cramer worked his way up to a position close to an 81mm mortar observation party directing fire from positions in an open field. At that point in the battle an enemy machine gun sprayed the area occupied by the observers, killing one man and seriously wounding an officer. Seeing the wounded officer crawling towards his position and realizing that he could not reach cover unaided, General Cramer, without considering his personal safety, left his covered position and ran through the fire swept area to the wounded officer. Despite the hostile fire, which was increasing in intensity, General Cramer assisted the wounded officer over fifty yards of exposed ground until he reached a position of safety where he received first aid. General Cramer's gallant and selfless action, performed at the risk of his life, was an inspiration to all the officers and men present and reflects the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Private Boyd was with the leading elements of an infantry company advancing up a road near Panacan when the unit was pinned down by heavy enemy rifle, machine gun, and 20mm weapon fire. Under this heavy fire the company withdrew. It was found then that one scout was missing. Private Boyd immediately volunteered to return and find him. He crawled forward but was forced to withdraw before he could locate the wounded soldier. Again he went forward through intense sniper fire, and this time he found the scout. Finding him dead, Private Boyd removed his personal belongings, since it was impossible to drag him back. Later he led a litter squad up to try to evacuate the body, crawling ahead of the litter team to draw the enemy fire. Again, heavy fire forced the men to withdraw without accomplishing their mission. Private Boyd's heroic action in risking his life three times was an inspiration to all the members of his organization and exemplifies the highest traditions of the soldier. The enemy fire was so intense that he made three attempts before he could reach the casualty to bring him to safety. Private Foreman's actions were inspired by his heroic determination to help a wounded comrade. His courageous deed saved the life of the member of his platoon, and reflects high credit upon himself. Exposing himself still further, he dragged the wounded man approximately twenty bullet-swept yards to a position from which he could be evacuated safely. Private First Class ALBERT POWIS, JR., 151019C5, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Mandog, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 9 June 1945. An infantry company was advancing along a road with the mission of destroying an enemy strong point, when the leading elements were held up by a strong enemy force defending the area. Heavy enemy machine gun fire covering the road prevented the ground troops from advancing. Tanks were then called forward to knock out the Japanese machine gun positions. When they appeared, the enemy fire increased in intensity. One man was wounded in the leg and fell on the right side of the road. Private Powis, who was across the road, saw the incident. Despite the heavy enemy fire sweeping the road, he ran across to the man and bandaged his wounds, and remained with him until a company aid man was able to come forward. Private Powis' quick thinking and daring action under heavy enemy fire reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Staff Sergeant ANDREW S. PRZYBYSZ, 36731372, Infantry, United States Army. An infantry company attacked enemy positions along the Mintal Highway. The company advanced approximately 700 yards beyond the nearest supporting company when enemy machine guns and mortars from hidden positions opened fire against the attackers, causing four casualties. Unable to find any point from which he could observe and adjust his 81mm mortar fire, Sergeant Przybyss, mortar section leader, requested that one of the attached tank destroyers be sent forward. Disregarding the heavy enemy fire, he moved forward in the tank destroyer, located the enemy positions, and then voluntarily exposed himself to accurately direct his mortar fire. His rapid and accurate adjustments quickly silenced the enemy mortar and enabled his company to move forward. Sergeant Przybyss' quick thinking and daring action served as an inspiration to every man in his organization and was in keeping with the best traditions of the military service. During the barrage, fifteen men were wounded by shrapnel. Seeing that medical attention was necessary, Private Ruggieri volunteered to return to the aid station and guide litter bearers to the wounded men. Private Ruggieri moved stealthily for 600 yards under intermittent sniper fire, hacking a trail as he went, so as to enable a swift return of the litter bearers. 

I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Rec'd No 99 - Aug 10, 1945
* Staff Sergeant JOSEPH P. BARON, 36329316, Medical Department,

United States Army. For gallantry in action near Talomo, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 22 May 1945. While attached to a battalion aid station of an infantry regiment, Sergeant Baron led a squad of litter bearers forward up a small knoll to evacuate a seriously wounded infantryman lying near an enemy occupied pillbox. Since the area was open to enemy view, two medium tanks were ordered forward to give covering fire while Sergeant Baron and his litter squad crossed the open stretch of ground. As the tanks moved forward, another soldier was seriously wounded in the abdomen. One litter bearer quickly reached the man and administered first aid under enemy fire so intense that bullets ripped through his pack as he worked. Sergeant Baron exposed himself to the direct enemy machine gun fire as he moved forward with a litter in a gallant attempt to reach the wounded man by the pillbox. His errand of mercy was cut short when he was only a few yards from the wounded man. He was struck in the chest by several enemy machine gun bullets and killed instantly. Sergeant Baron's heroic devotion to duty and supreme sacrifice will continue to inspire the men who witnessed his action. II. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Captain RICHARD J. BAKER, O437744, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Leyte, Philippine Islands from 21 to 29 October 1944. Captain Baker, commander of a rifle company, displayed outstanding leadership combined with ingenuity and resourcefulness

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during the entire Loyte operation. Although his company was repeatedly under mortar, machine gun and rifle fire, Captain Baker remained with the forward elements, directing their fire, controlling the company's position and supervising the evacuation of the wounded. By his calm disregard for enemy fire and inspiring the aggressive actions of his men, he brought about continuous success for his organization. Captain Baker's heroic leadership was in accord with the highest traditions of the military service. Home address: Mrs. Jean L. Baker (wife), 4510 Liberty Heights, Baltimore, Maryland.

Lieutenant Colonel CHESTER A. DAHLEN, 019020, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Zig-Zag Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 3 and 4 February 1945. On 3 February, a regimental combat team was committed to action in Zig-Zag Pass. It became necessary to plan operation on the ground, fitting the flexible general plan to the developing characteristics of an enemy defense the character of which was initially indistinct. Having brilliantly assisted in the execution of the well-planned earlier stages of the Zambales campaign, Colonel Dahlen, executive officer of the combat team, recognized the necessity for first-hand knowledge and on-the-spot control of the situation in the Pass. From the earliest hour of the action, he remained far closer to the front than his duties demanded. Never interfering with the activities of battalion commanders, he nevertheless maintained a complete knowledge and control of the situation, aiding those officers and the regimental commander in shaping the drive which deeply pierced the enemy stronghold and seized the advantage which ended in victory. His decisions were quick, aggressive, and sound. His personal intrepidity and complete self-possession in the face of hazardous sniper fire and the continuous deadly hail of shrapnel were an inspiration and a steadying influence through nerve-racking hours. He remained in this position until he was painfully wounded in the thigh by a shell fragment the following morning. Suffering pain and loss of blood, he exchanged quips and smiles with those about him, refused medical aid until assured the aid-man was not more urgently needed elsewhere, and would not leave the field until certain his presence was no longer necessary. Colonel Dahlen's cheerfulness and apparent unconcern for his wound were as much an inspiration to his officers and men as had been his previous importurbability and courage. Private First Class BERNARD SCHNELLER, 39726386, Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Matina, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 1 June 1945. At approximately 1530, leading elements of an infantry company were assaulting a strongly defended hill near Matina, and were halted by cross-fire from three enemy machine guns and numerous Japanese riflemen. Seeing a wounded soldier lying helpless in open terrain, Private Schneller immediately proceeded to his aid. With complete disregard for his personal safety he crawled forward 25 yards under aimed enemy fire, with little cover and concealment, to the side of the wounded man. As supporting fire was not available, Private Schneller was forced to fire his carbine with his right hand to cover himself and the wounded soldier while administering aid

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with his left hand. Still firing his carbine, he dragged his comrade back to a point where litter bearers could evacuate him. Private Schneller's indomitable courage, self-sacrificing conduct and gallantry under fire earned for him the respect and admiration of his officers and fellow soldiers. Technical Sergeant WILLIAM E. WIRCHICOFSKI, 32010278, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Bancal, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 4 May 1945. On that day, elements of an infantry company drove an unknown number of Japs from a strong defensive position consisting of four heavily fortified pillboxes and a communication and fire trench, 100 yards in length, located one-half mile north of Bancal. At approximately 1815, while the captured positions were being consolidated by the company, the enemy launched a fierce counter-attack, placing the entire company under heavy and accurate rifle, machine gun, mortar and grenade fire. In the opening moments of the counter-attack, the section leader and the gunner of the only available 60mm mortar squad were seriously wounded. The mortar squad, having lost its leader and the gunner, was disorganized and unable to function in the face of the fierce Jap fire. Sergeant Wirchicofski, platoon sergeant and acting weapons platoon leader, with utter disregard for his own safety, immediately directed and assisted the carrying of the two stricken men to safety. He then reorganized the mortar squad and directed it to a covered position from which fire could be placed effectively on the enemy. From an open and dangerous position while exposed to intense enemy rifle and machine gun fire, he calmly and skillfully directed accurate and effective mortar fire on the enemy until the Jap counter-attack was repulsed. The effectiveness of the mortar fire directed by Sergeant Wirchicofski contributed in large measure to the repulse of the Jap counterattack, thereby enabling the company to hold its hard-earned ground. Sergeant Wirchicofski's gallant devotion to duty and skillful leadership under heavy fire was an inspiration to all and a distinct credit to himself and the military service. SILVER STAR (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER).--By direction of the President, in addition to the Silver Star awarded to Private First Class Carlton Alcott, Jr., by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, as published in General Orders No. 13, Headquarters 24th Infantry Division, dated 8 July 1944, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to him by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918). The citation is as follows:

Private First Class CARLTON ALCOTT, JR., 34037541, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Mandog Hill, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 5 June 1945. Private Alcott was a member of an assault platoon which was attacking a well fortified enemy position.

Heavy enemy machine gun, mortar, and rifle fire from nearby trenches and pillboxes pinned down the platoon and badly wounded an automatic rifleman. Private Alcott, the platoon runner, immediately picked up the fallen man's weapon and opened fire against the enemy emplacements enabling the platoon to withdraw. As he withdrew he exposed himself to the heavy enemy machine gun cross fire to recover the wounded man who was lying approximately 25 yards from one of the enemy machine guns. Private Alcott's gallant action was an inspiration to the men of his unit, and his rescue of his wounded comrade at the risk of his own life is worthy of the highest military traditions. IV. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bull. 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Malinta Hill, Corregidor, Philippine Islands on 17 February 1945. On this day, the command post of an infantry company was set up on the crest of Malinta Hill, overlooking a small ridged valley infested with Japs. At approximately 1600 hours, a squad of men was sent 500 yards down the hill to contact an observation post and put in communication lines. While enroute, the squad was subjected to heavy enemy rifle fire and grenades. Two men were wounded and four killed. When news of this reached the commanding officer, he promptly took another squad of men to evacuate the wounded. This squad also drew heavy enemy fire and as a result, the commanding officer was killed and one rifleman wounded. The following named enlisted men and six comrades, with utter disregard for their own personal safety, volunteered to go down and bring back the wounded men of the two squads. Proceeding through the intense hostile fire, they reached the wounded men, placed them on litters, and evacuated them to safety. This was accomplished without covering fire of any kind as each man had to be utilized as a litter bearer. The gallantry of these men was an inspiration to all and reflects great credit upon themselves and the military service:

During the bitter fight that ensued, a Jap soldier detonated a large quantity of bombs and dynamite stored in a shack. The terrific explosion wounded 28 men. Private Schall, under observation of the enemy, quickly moved to the wounded men and administered first aid. Before the wounded could be evacuated enemy rifles and machine guns opened fire, wounding another man in both legs. The company was then ordered to withdraw its left flank to a better position, which would leave the wounded man completely exposed. Private Schall realized this. Knowing well the danger involved, he administered first aid to the wounded man, removed his poncho from his pack and dragged him to safety through the heavy enemy fire. II, Bull. 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Malinta Hill, Corregidor, Philippine Islands on 17 February 1945. On that day the command post of an infantry company was set up on the crest of Malinta Hill, overlooking a small ridged valley infested with Japs. At approximately 1600 hours, a squad of men was sent 500 yards down the hill to contact an observation post and put in communication lines. While enroute, the squad was subjected to heavy enemy rifle fire and grenades. Two men were wounded and four killed. When news of this reached the commanding officer, he promptly took another squad of men to evacuate the wounded. This squad also drew heavy enemy fire and as a result, the commanding officer was killed and one rifleman wounded. The following named enlisted men and two comrades, with utter disregard for their own safety, volunteered to go down and bring back the wounded men of the two squads. They proceeded through the intense hostile fire, reached the wounded men, placed them on litters and evacuated them to safety. This was accomplished without covering fire of any kind, as each man had to be utilized as a litter bearer. The gallantry of these men was an inspiration to all and reflects high credit upon themselves and the military service:

Private First Class **HOLLAND M. CREED**, 37730070, Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Calinan, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 19 June 1945. At approximately 1430, Private Creed was driving his company commander in a jeep along a dusty, unused sideroad near the front in search of two long-overdue ambulances. Visibility was extremely limited due to the dust as well as the heavy undergrowth along both sides of the road. Private Creed's vehicle was directly behind another jeep when they suddenly encountered an enemy ambush. Heavy machine gun fire burst from the undergrowth ahead, and several bullets struck Private Creed's vehicle. One bullet punctured the radiator. The occupants of the leading vehicle took cover behind their jeep, afraid to expose themselves by moving. A plan of escape was formulated which called for the two men behind the leading jeep to crawl to the small ditch beside the road and withdraw a short distance. Private Creed was then to drive his vehicle backward, pick up the men and continue down the road to safety. After the men had withdrawn a short distance, Private Creed slipped into the damaged jeep in the face of the enemy fire, not knowing if the motor would start. Then it did, he raced the vehicle down the road, picked up the other men, and completed the successful withdrawal. The courage and resourcefulness exhibited by Private Creed in this critical situation was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home address: Mrs. H. M. Four shells exploded among the members of the defense platoon wounding six men. On the call for an aid man, Sergeant Peyton left his position, ran to the aid station, picked up two litters and went to the area where the wounded lay. Here he immediately took charge of the situation and supervised the evacuation of the wounded. When two more litters were needed, he made a second trip to the aid station for them. Sergeant Peyton's actions were instrumental in saving the lives of four of the more seriously wounded. His cool supervision of the evacuation under sporadic enemy artillery fire was an inspiration to all and is in accord with the highest traditions of the military service. 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

I. SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

First Lieutenant HERBERT D. ERP, JR., O1175700, Field Artillery, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Davao City, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 7 May 1945. At that time Lieutenant Erp served as a field artillery forward observer in support of an infantry company with the mission of assaulting and taking a hill approximately 2000 yards north of Davao. In moving to the objective it was necessary to cross 400 yards of open terrain clearly in view of the enemy. On reaching the open area the infantry company immediately came under heavy enemy mortar and machine gun fire. Lieutenant Erp immediately moved up to a forward position to observe the area from which the fire was coming. In doing this, it was necessary for him to move into an exposed area which had received several rounds of mortar fire and where the company had already suffered several casualties. Despite this, Lieutenant Erp set up his observation post and in a short time had placed effective artillery fire on the enemy. Lieutenant Erp maintained his position despite heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire covering our entire front. In addition to silencing the enemy guns to the front, Lieutenant Erp spotted large artillery pieces firing from across the Davao River approximately 3000 yards away. Switching his fire he immediately placed it upon the enemy guns and silenced them. Accomplishing his last mission, he again directed fire on the first objective placing a preparation that enabled the infantry to advance and take the position. By his quick thinking, aggressiveness and fearless action in the face of heavy enemy fire, he saved many lives and enabled the infantrymen to accomplish their mission. On 24 July 1945, near Baguio, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, Lieutenant Erp was killed by a mine while leading a battery security patrol. Lieutenant Erp's outstanding courage and devotion to duty beyond the call of his normal duties for which he so gallantly gave his life will always serve as an inspiration to all who served with him. Technician Fifth Grade KENNETH S. SEITNER, 35224272, Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Zig-Zag Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 5 February 1945. Two infantry companies, after heavy fighting, drove the enemy from a well-defended ridge. As they started to dig in for the night they came under intense, directly observed, enemy artillery fire. The medical section, of which Corporal Seitner was a member, went forward into the shelled area to administer aid to the wounded. The Jap fire was accurate and the casualty density was very heavy. With utter disregard for the enemy fire, Corporal Seitner gave first aid treatment and evacuated wounded, continuing his heroic efforts in face of imminent death, knowingly and with utter disregard for his own personal safety, until he was struck by an artillery shell and killed instantly. Corporal Seitner's gallant and self-sacrificing conduct was worthy of the highest tradition of the medical service. Next of kin: Mrs. Lillian L. II. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

Technician Fifth Grade J. W. PALMER, 38099169, Field Artillery, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Tamogan, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 24 June 1945. Corporal Palmer volunteered to go forward with an artillery forward observer's party. During an arduous cross country march, the infantry column which Corporal Palmer was accompanying, was suddenly bombed and strafed. One five-hundred pound bomb burst ten feet from Corporal Palmer, the terrific blast temporarily stunning him and severely rupturing both ear drums. Upon recovering his senses, Corporal Palmer, in spite of the fact the planes might return, set out to obtain medical aid for his two wounded comrades, and by his initiative and forethought, contributed materially to the fact that both men lived. Later that day, Corporal Palmer was told he need not remain in his position by the artillery radio to relay fire commands; yet so great was his desire to assist his comrades in any possible manner that he remained directly exposed to enemy fire at his position during two heavy Jap mortar barrages and one strong counter-attack, all of which caused heavy casualties in his immediate vicinity. Such courage and devotion above and beyond the call of duty reflect great credit upon himself and are a gallant addition to the annals of the armed forces. Home address: Mr. Frank N. Second Lieutenant LAWRENCE C. TAYLOR, 0788649, Air Corps, United States Army. For gallantry in action while participating in an aerial flight near Davao, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 25 June 1945. Lieutenant Taylor, transport pilot flying a C-47 courier plane, landed on Libby Airfield near Davao. Learning that another plane scheduled to make a ration drop to an isolated infantry battalion was hopelessly overdue, he volunteered to make the flight fully aware of the fact that he would be flying over hostile territory through a heavy overcast and that the time required would necessitate his returning to his Leyte

base at night. After a prolonged search, Lieutenant Taylor located the battalion's position. To make a successful drop he was forced to fly through a narrow pass flanked by enemy-held hills on each side. Because of the narrow, razorback ridge occupied by the ground troops, an accurate drop required dangerously low flying. Lieutenant Taylor swept over the area, making six successful drops. As he approached the area for his seventh and final drop, enemy .50 calibre machine guns opened fire from both sides of the narrow corridor. The wings, fuselage, and tail of the ship were riddled with bullets and the plane's radio and radar were destroyed. In spite of this fire, Lieutenant Taylor continued on his course and successfully dropped the last of the rations. It was later learned that 81% of all rations dropped were recovered. Lieutenant Taylor's gallant conduct in volunteering for and accomplishing a hazardous mission reflected great credit to himself and was in keeping with the best traditions of the military service. On this day, Lieutenant Clark, leading an infantry platoon, was advancing along a ridge approximately 1200 yards northeast of Mandog Hill. At 0630 the platoon was suddenly pinned down by intensive enemy machine gun fire. In the fire fight that followed, one man at the head of the column was wounded and cut off from the remainder of the platoon. Lieutenant Clark immediately ordered his men to return the enemy fire. Disregarding his personal safety, he crawled forward under the enemy fire and pulled the wounded man to safety. By his outstanding leadership and cool deliberate command, the platoon was able to withdraw with no further casualties. An infantry company attacked enemy held positions 600 yards north of Bancal. Upon reaching a point 25 yards from its objective, the leading squad was stopped by intense fire from enemy anti-aircraft guns, machine guns and heavy mortars. Under cover of this barrage, the Japs began a determined counter-attack. Discovering the enemy's move, Private Howard, the squad's first scout, took immediate action. Rising from his covered position, he shot and killed two Japs and continued to fire until he had dispersed the remainder. Private Howard's alert and aggressive action not only stopped the Japanese counter-attack, but relieved the enemy pressure from his squad enabling it to maneuver into position to join the rest of the company in a successful assault against the enemy strong point. Private First Class ARLO M. JACOBSON, 37598901, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 8 June 1945. At 1030 hours, an infantry unit was advancing upon strong enemy positions along a trail 1000 yards east of Mandog Hill. The platoon of which Private Jacobson was a member was pinned down by cross fire from enemy pillboxes, and three men were wounded. Private Jacobson crawled forward to the front of the platoon and administered aid to the three wounded men under enemy fire so intense that he was forced to work from a prone position. After all three had received aid, he crawled back to his own lines dragging one of the wounded to safety. Private Jacobson's voluntary action under heavy enemy fire was an inspiration to the men of his organization, and instilled confidence in them that they would be treated wherever they fell wounded. During the course of the assault, the company was subjected to an enemy barrage of 90mm mortar and 40mm anti-aircraft fire, interspersed with heavy machine gun fire at close range. Fifteen men sustained wounds by this action and prompt medical attention was necessary. Private Monroe volunteered to return to the aid station and guide litter squads to the scene of action. Through dense underbrush, where visibility was limited and progress was slow, Private Monroe crawled and ran 600 yards to his destination. Though continually harassed by enemy snipers, he hacked a trail with his machete to facilitate the rapid movement of the litter team. Through Private Monroe's swift and determined action the casualties were safely and promptly evacuated. Private Monroe's willingness to undertake this hazardous mission of mercy is a credit to himself and the service. Technician Fifth Grade **NEAL PRENTICE**, 39020019, Corps of Engineers, United States Army. During operations in the Mandog area, Corporal Prentice with three other men from his company volunteered to cross the Davao River in an engineer half boat to attach a cable to the far shore to facilitate the crossing of an infantry platoon. When the men reached the middle of the stream they came under intense enemy machine gun and rifle fire which riddled the boat and wounded Corporal Prentice in the head, back and leg. His outstanding performance of duty in this instance was an inspiration to the men of his organization and was in the best traditions of the military service. Home address: Mrs. Emma M. After successfully accomplishing this, he proceeded to supervise the treatment and evacuation of the wounded from the still untenable area. Lieutenant Symanski was one of the last to leave the area. On this day, Lieutenant Williams was acting in the capacity of platoon leader of an infantry company. The company was given a mission to take a hill in the vicinity of Mandog. During the advance towards the objective, the company was in the act of crossing a deep ravine when the leading elements, reaching the opposite side, were pinned down by enemy machine gun and mortar fire.

Lieutenant Williams, realizing the gravity of the situation, immediately deployed the platoon to meet the threat from the rear. With disregard for his personal safety and exposing himself to enemy machine gun fire, he maneuvered his men in such a way as to destroy the enemy. Being without an aid man, Lieutenant Williams administered first aid to the wounded and directed their evacuation. Lieutenant Williams led his platoon across the ravine and was given the mission to flank the enemy. Once again he demonstrated excellent leadership and courage under fire. He flanked and destroyed the enemy enabling the company to continue and accomplish its mission. Word came to the aid station that a Filipino civilian had been seriously wounded. Sergeant Laehr immediately volunteered to go to the aid of the wounded man. He organized a litter squad and proceeded down the dark street through continuous shell fire and facing an additional danger of his own men mistaking the party for enemy as they had to move about three hundred yards outside of the perimeter. When Sergeant Laehr reached the Filipino he found that the man was dead. Sergeant Laehr's initiative and courage in the face of such great hazards reflect much credit on himself and the military service. I. SILVER STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1913 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officers:

Captain RICHARD J. COLLOPY, 01292306, Cavalry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Libby Drome, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 7 May 1945. Captain Collopy was leading two platoons through flat terrain on a dismounted reconnaissance patrol in the Libby Drome Area, when the patrol was ambushed. After advancing well into the trap, the men came under heavy mortar, automatic weapon, and rifle fire from dug-in positions and well concealed pillboxes. Captain Collopy immediately exposed himself to the enemy fire as he went forward on foot to the leading vehicle to calm his men and direct their return fire. As the heavy enemy fire continued, he coolly gave orders to each vehicle and did not leave the exposed area until the last had fought its way to safety. Captain Collopy's courage under fire and his devotion to his men were an inspiration to all, and reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Captain ARTHUR J. RICHARDSON, JR., 0417865, Medical Corps, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Olongapo, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 4 February 1945. During the late afternoon, the enemy directed sporadic, but extremely accurate mortar and artillery fire upon the positions of the leading elements of an infantry battalion at Zig Zag Pass. Beginning at approximately 1645 and lasting one half hour, this fire increased in intensity as the men were digging in. Sixty to seventy casualties occurred and these could not be taken care of by the battalion medical section. When news reached him of the heavy casualty rate, Captain Richardson immediately left the safety of the collecting station, and set forward with all available ambulances and medical supplies. As he reached the battalion aid station, the barrage intensified, killing and wounding still more men. Captain Richardson calmly directed the emergency medical treatment to the wounded, giving his personal attention to the more seriously wounded. When he saw that there were not enough medical soldiers he pressed other men into immediate service as litter bearers. Several times he helped to place wounded men on litters and carry them to the waiting ambulances, where he instructed the drivers to which hospitals they were to be

taken. During all this activity, enemy mortar and artillery shells continued to fall in the area, and there was also a sharp skirmish taking place at the right flank. Only at dark, when he was satisfied that all casualties had been removed, did Captain Richardson return to his normal post of duty behind the lines. The following morning of 5 February 1945, he assisted the battalion surgeon in the treatment of those men who were emotionally shaken from the day before. Again, his service was entirely voluntary. At approximately 1100, without warning, another intense enemy mortar barrage fell on the area, killing and wounding many. Captain Richardson immediately went to work and rallied his men to render immediate and much needed aid to the wounded. Here again, it was his cool efficiency and heroic leadership which prevented greater suffering and loss of life. Captain Richardson's actions were an inspiration to those around him, and worthy of the highest traditions of the medical service. Home address: Mrs. A. J. The platoon set out through open terrain covered by jagged stumps and partially burned logs. When they had almost reached the bodies, several enemy machine guns opened fire from well-concealed positions commanding the area. One man was killed and another fell seriously wounded, and lay exposed to further enemy fire. As the platoon withdrew under the heavy enemy fire, Sergeant Blackwell and one other man remained in the area. Under continuing fire he administered first aid to the wounded man and evacuated him. I. SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bill. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officers:

First Lieutenant JOHN A. SCHWENGELS, O1031443, Cavalry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Digos, Mindanao, Philippine Islands from 26 April to 12 June 1945. On 26 April 1945, Lieutenant Schwengels was leading a convoy along a mined road through rugged terrain near Digos when his vehicle struck an enemy mine. Five men were wounded, including Lieutenant Schwengels. Despite face wounds and shock, he continued to lead the convoy and successfully completed his mission. On 17 May 1945, he led a twenty-five man patrol through Bayabas and Eden. His patrol encountered numerous snipers concealed in the undergrowth and was once pinned down by enemy machine gun fire. After withdrawing his men and reorganizing, Lieutenant Schwengels led an attack which knocked out the enemy guns. He then led his patrol deeper into enemy territory, by-passing numerous patrols. The men had to cut their way through thick undergrowth, which limited visibility to a few yards, ford swift mountain streams and climb tortuous ravines. Despite these difficulties, the men completed their mission. Near Sasa Air-Drome on 22 May 1945, Lieutenant Schwengels' platoon was ambushed by an undetermined number of the enemy hidden in abaca thickets, and the lead half-track was disabled by enemy rocket fire. He skillfully withdrew his platoon and fought off the attack until artillery shells could be placed on the area. After the barrage, he led his men forward to recover the vehicle. Heavy fire from enemy snipers and pillboxes wounded one man. Despite the enemy fire, Lieutenant Schwengels directed his men in evacuating the wounded man and towing the vehicle to safety. On 12 June 1945, he led a dismounted patrol from Wangan to the Palomo River to look for a crossing. Although good visibility favored the enemy, he reached the river unobserved and found the crossing. The patrol remained on the river bank overnight within earshot of the enemy.

Returning to Wangan, his patrol was caught in a skirmish between our infantry and the Japs. He took advantage of cover and concealment and led his men through and around to safety. Lieutenant Schwengels' outstanding leadership and personal bravery reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mr. John Schwengels (father), Clinton, Wisconsin.

General to read 1st OLC citation by G.O. 27, 1 April 46

Captain GEORGE B. SHUTT, 01010066, Cavalry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Talomo, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 14 May 1945. Captain Shutt, riding a one-quarter ton truck, led three tanks toward a battalion command post prior to attacking a strong enemy position defended by an undetermined number of Japs. As the tanks approached the command post along a steep trail lined on both sides with heavy abaca, they drew mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire from a ravine to the left of the trail, which also endangered the lives of infantrymen assembled nearby. Captain Shutt immediately dismounted, halted the tanks, and while fully exposed to the heavy enemy fire directed them by hand signals as they backed down a narrow trail to a covered position. He then crawled back to the command post. After obtaining necessary information, he scanned the area for the best possible tank approaches and firing positions. Returning through heavy enemy mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire, he directed his tanks forward to blast four enemy pillboxes and several communication trenches. These were situated on high ground, were well camouflaged, and controlled the surrounding area. The infantry then drove forward through the silenced positions and reestablished contact with a company which had been isolated for thirty hours. Captain Shutt's outstanding leadership and gallant action in the face of intense enemy fire greatly inspired the men around him. Home address: Mrs. Frances S. II. SILVER STAR (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER).—By direction of the President, in addition to the Silver Star awarded to Staff Sergeant Joseph P. Baron, by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, as published in General Orders No. 27, Headquarters 24th Infantry Division, dated 20 May 1945, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is posthumously awarded to him by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918). The citation is as follows:

Staff Sergeant JOSEPH P. BARON, 36329316, Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Talomo, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 22 May 1945. While attached to a battalion aid station of an infantry regiment, Sergeant Baron led a squad of litter bearers forward up a small knoll to evacuate a seriously wounded infantryman lying near an enemy occupied pillbox. Since the area was open to enemy view, two medium tanks were ordered forward to give covering fire while Sergeant Baron and his litter squad crossed the open stretch of ground. As the tanks moved forward, another soldier was seriously wounded in the abdomen.

One litter bearer quickly reached the man and administered first aid under enemy fire so intense that bullets ripped through his pack as he worked. Sergeant Baron exposed himself to the direct enemy machine gun fire as he moved forward with a litter in a gallant attempt to reach the wounded man by the pillbox. His errand of mercy was cut short when he was only a few yards from the wounded man. He was struck in the chest by several enemy machine gun bullets and killed instantly. Sergeant Baron's heroic devotion to duty and supreme sacrifice will continue to inspire the men who witnessed his action. Private Lawrence's squad was given the mission of determining the strength and location of the enemy's left flank, and obtaining all pertinent information concerning enemy positions. The squad was stopped by extremely heavy fire from two enemy machine guns concealed in pillboxes, and an unknown number of enemy riflemen. Private Lawrence voluntarily crawled to within approximately fifteen yards of the enemy pillboxes to determine how they could be destroyed.

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Enemy fire then became so intense that the squad had to withdraw. Private Lawrence remained behind to cover the withdrawal with fire from his sub-machine gun, and did not leave until all members of his squad had reached safety. Private Lawrence's heroic actions under enemy fire were an inspiration to all the members of his platoon, and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. Ruth F. As he worked in his exposed position under the burning sun, a sudden burst of enemy machine gun fire wounded his patient a second time and tore holes through Corporal Malin's jacket. With utter disregard for his own safety, he dragged the wounded man through the heavy enemy fire to safety. From this covered position he continued to administer first aid to the suffering man. This completed, he crawled under fire through an exposed area and gave aid to a second wounded man. Corporal Malin's heroic devotion to duty reflects worthy credit upon himself and the military service. Sergeant EARNEST H. TAYLOR, 34426530, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Mandog Hill, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 10 June 1945. While advancing on heavily fortified enemy positions northeast of Mandog Hill, the platoon of which Sergeant Taylor was a member was caught in a cross fire of enemy machine guns. During this action one man was killed and two others were wounded. In the course of an ordered withdrawal, Sergeant Taylor saw that another soldier had been wounded and lay exposed to enemy fire. Sergeant Taylor unhesitatingly exposed himself to enemy fire and crawled back and pulled the wounded man to safety. Sergeant Taylor's devotion to duty and eagerness to save the life of his comrade at the sacrifice of his own safety, are worthy of the highest traditions of the military service. Lieutenant King, co-pilot of a C-47 courier plane, landed on Libby Airfield near Davao. Learning that another plane scheduled to make a ration drop to an isolated infantry battalion was hopelessly overdue, and that because of this the battalion faced the prospect of going without food for more than twenty-four hours, Lieutenant King, and the plane's pilot volunteered to fly the mission.

R E S T R I C T E D

They offered to do this, fully realizing that they would be flying over hostile territory through a heavy overcast and that the time required would necessitate their returning to their Leyte base at night. After a prolonged search the battalion's position was found. To make a successful drop the plane was forced to fly through a narrow pass flanked by enemy held hills on each side. Because of the narrow, razorback ridge occupied by the ground troops, an accurate drop required dangerously low flying. The plane swept over the area making six successful drops. As the big transport approached the area for the seventh and final drop, enemy .50 calibre machine guns opened fire from both sides of the narrow corridor. The wings, fuselage, and tail of the ship were riddled with bullets and the plane's radio and motor were destroyed. In spite of this fire the final drop was successfully made. It was later learned that 81% of all rations dropped were recovered. Lieutenant King's voluntary undertaking and accomplishment of a hazardous mission was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home address: Mr. Harry P. Major (then Captain) LEAD F. VAN DUSEN, 0375040, Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight over Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 25 June 1945. Captain Van Dusen volunteered to accompany a C-47 cargo plane scheduled to make an air drop of food and ammunition to isolated battalion engaged with the enemy. Realizing that the enemy held the hills to either side of the dropping area and that the slow, low-flying C-47 would make a target that would be difficult to miss, he boldly directed the plane on its mission. The scheduled drop was successfully accomplished, although the plane was hit by enemy .50 calibre fire many times. Captain Van Dusen's meritorious determination to accomplish his mission of dropping vital supplies in spite of hazards which would ordinarily justify abandonment of the mission is a credit to himself and the military service. 

I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Technician Third Grade KEITH A. FALCON, 18150198, Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Tagapan, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 7 May 1945. At approximately 1630 hours, an enemy attack was made on one of the outposts of an infantry battalion which had set up a perimeter defense two miles north of Tagapan, Mindanao. During the attack, five men were seriously wounded. Sergeant Falcon, accompanied by one other man, immediately ran from the aid station in the perimeter to the open area where the wounded lay. Disregarding the heavy enemy rifle fire, he administered first aid to one wounded soldier and carried him to safety. Returning, Sergeant Falcon's comrade was seriously wounded in the arm. After administering first aid, Sergeant Falcon directed the man on his way back to the aid station. He then proceeded alone to the other wounded man, who was lying beside the road in direct line of enemy fire, and administered aid. He remained in his exposed position with the wounded man until all five casualties had been removed to safety. Only then did he return to the safety of the perimeter. Sergeant Falcon's selfless devotion to duty and great personal courage reflect the highest degree of credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. T. H. II. SILVER STAR (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER).--By direction of the President, in addition to the Silver Star awarded to Staff Sergeant Andrew Koassechony, by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, as published in General Orders No. 1, Headquarters, 24th Infantry Division, 3 January 1945, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to him by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD, 1918). The citation is as follows:

R E S T R I C T E D

Staff Sergeant ANDREW KOASSECHONY, 38270984, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action in the vicinity of Tamogan, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 24 June 1945. Sergeant Koassechony was leading a squad in the first platoon of an infantry company advancing toward what was believed to be a strong enemy position. As the company moved forward, with one platoon on each side of the road and the main body approximately fifty yards to the rear, heavy enemy machine gun and rifle fire burst from the right of the road from a dense abaca thicket approximately fifty yards distant. Before the men could take cover, one man fell wounded. Sergeant Koassechony located the source of fire, and began crawling up the ditch alongside the road, in an attempt to reach a position opposite the enemy machine gun. As he crawled, the Japanese defenders threw several hand grenades which burst nearby. Despite the danger, he continued to work himself forward until he reached a point approximately twenty yards from the gun position. Sergeant Koassechony spotted the Jap gunner and killed him with three rounds from his M-1 rifle. Using the same tactics, he neutralized the enemy positions one by one and enabled the remainder of the platoon to push forward and overrun the position. Sergeant Koassechony was credited with killing six of the eight Japanese who were found dead. The platoon also captured one enemy machine gun, one knee mortar and six rifles. Sergeant Koassechony's voluntary and gallant actions undoubtedly saved the lives of others, and enabled the company to move forward and accomplish its mission with a minimum of delay. Sergeant Koassechony's gallantry and unselfish devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Technician Third Grade KEITH A. FALCON, 18150198, Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Mintal, Mindanao, Philippine Islands from 6 May to 26 May 1945. During the continued attacks of an infantry battalion in the Mintal Sector, Mindanao, Sergeant Falcon, attached to the regimental aid station, repeatedly volunteered his services with complete disregard for his personal safety. On the afternoon of 9 May 1945, Sergeant Falcon unhesitatingly went to the aid of wounded men, and administered first aid under extremely heavy enemy mortar fire. His heroic actions undoubtedly saved the lives of several men, who otherwise might not have received prompt medical treatment. Sergeant Falcon's outstanding courage and selfless devotion to duty served as an inspiration to the members of his detachment, and reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, ED, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division to the following named enlisted man:

Technician Fifth Grade LOUIS S. CHAMBERS, 32250218, Field Artillery, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 18 May 1945. Corporal Chambers was the non-commissioned officer in charge of a truck carrying three men who were to man an artillery observation post for the night. At approximately 1730 hours on the little-traveled road, the truck rounded a turn and encountered an enemy road block. In the uncertain light of dusk, Corporal Chambers saw that fire from several automatic weapons had forced a jeep off the road. Its occupants had taken cover in the ditch alongside and had returned fire against the concealed positions of the enemy until they had exhausted their ammunition. After skillfully deploying his men, Corporal Chambers leaped to the 50-caliber machine gun mounted on the truck and opened fire. Despite his exposed position, and the fact that he was unable to see an enemy who might have been concealed in the jungle growth bordering the road, he remained at his gun until he had silenced the enemy weapons with his fire. The stranded vehicle and its occupants were then withdrawn to safety. Corporal Chambers' utter disregard for his personal safety under enemy fire was an inspiration to the men of his unit, and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Staff Sergeant HAROLD B. BARG, 16062453, Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Tanahmerah Bay, Dutch New Guinea, and Leyte and Mindoro, Philippine Islands from 22 April 1944 to 15 April 1945. Private First Class CALVIN W. HOEPFER, 20947652, Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on Mindanao, Philippine Islands from 18 April to 30 June 1945. From his arrival, throughout the operation, his heroism and ability were a source of inspiration to the members of his organization. On the morning of 19 May 1945, Private Hoepfer, a wireman, went out to lay a forward line to a field artillery battalion in position at the north end of an airdrome. The shortest route lay along a narrow, jungle-bordered road which had not been cleared of the enemy. While Private Hoepfer was making an overhead tie, an enemy machine gun opened fire on him. Disregarding the bullets that whistled around him, he continued with his work until the line was in operation. On 21 May 1945, Private Hoepfer was a member of a wire crew sent out to lay a wire line along the Davao-Panacan road, where almost all traffic was by convoy due to the constant danger of ambush and attack by Bangalore torpedoes. As the men worked in the hot sun, Private Hoepfer saw Japs in the brush near the edge of the road. While the wire corporal manned the 30 caliber machine gun, Private Hoepfer opened fire with his sub-machine gun and killed three of the enemy. Private Hoepfer's alertness and devotion to duty were outstanding, and reflect worthy credit upon himself and the military service. Technical Sergeant LEWIS A. HUNT, 37222102, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on Mandog Hill, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 13 June 1945. Sergeant Hunt's company was leading an attack up a ravine toward a hill some 200 yards from a point where a terrific explosion had disorganized another company and caused several casualties. Despite the limited visibility caused by an overcast sky, Sergeant Hunt moved his platoon forward with the immediate objective of attacking the right flank of the hill and securing the area to permit the evacuation of the casualties. After moving approximately 50 yards, intense enemy machine gun and 25mm fire stopped the platoon. Sergeant Hunt, realizing that he must hold the ground, skillfully directed the return fire of his three squads and silenced the Jap 25mm gun and its two flanking machine guns. Two men were wounded in this action but were removed to safety under Sergeant Hunt's personal direction. The platoon fought on to cover the evacuation of the remainder of the casualties. Then, with ammunition running low, Sergeant Hunt organized the orderly withdrawal of his platoon after the last wounded man had been removed from danger. Sergeant Hunt's courage and skillful leadership were an inspiration to the men of his organization and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Technical Sergeant GEORGE R. JENKINS, 6957099, Infantry, United States Army. During a lull in the attack, nine Japanese soldiers opened fire on the rear guard with rifles and one machine gun. Private Parkinson quickly deployed his squad, and despite the fact that an overcast sky limited visibility, advanced toward the Japs, knocked the machine gun out of action and personally accounted for three of the enemy. Private Parkinson's quick thinking and courageous action undoubtedly prevented casualties. His devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. I. SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bull 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Staff Sergeant DORSEY T. SWANSON, 36301869, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 19 June 1945. Sergeant Swanson's company was advancing up a narrow road under full observation of the enemy, to capture and secure a vital road junction near Calinan. As the lead elements reached the objective, the main body was stopped temporarily by intense enemy mortar and machine gun fire, coming from concealed enemy positions in the dense undergrowth. Sergeant Swanson repeatedly exposed himself to the heavy enemy fire in order to locate the positions. He found one and immediately moved forward to within twenty feet of it, opened fire with his sub-machine gun and threw several grenades. One machine gun was silenced and part of its crew were killed and the others were wounded. Sergeant Swanson continued to seek out enemy positions, fully exposed to the continuous enemy fire. Approximately fifteen minutes later, a tank moved up and drew heavy enemy fire. Again Sergeant Swanson exposed himself to establish wire communications with the tank commander. This enabled him to direct effectively its fire and movement. He then pointed out the remaining enemy positions, rallied his element and personally led a renewed attack against the enemy positions, enabling the infantry company to reorganize. Sergeant Swanson's heroic actions were largely responsible for the success of the company's mission. His courage and leadership under enemy fire were an inspiration to his men, and a credit to himself and the military service. The task of bringing 110-B wire across the stream presented great hazards since a third of the 300 foot bridge was shattered and only a series of narrow planks afforded passage across the gap. With full realization of the situation, the two men volunteered to carry the line across knowing that they would present excellent targets for enemy fire. They carried the reel over the shattered bridge under enemy fire and established the vital communication line. The heroic devotion to duty of Private Knust and Private Nielson reflects distinct credit upon themselves and the military service.



On two occasions, while helping to spot enemy personnel, guns, and bivouac areas, the plane from which Sergeant Hubert was observing was fired upon; once by two or more enemy 25mm anti-aircraft guns, and once by an enemy 40mm gun. Sergeant Hubert did not falter in his assignment, but continued with his mission of surveillance against a stubborn and determined enemy. One of the first shells to explode in the area seriously wounded an officer, who fell to the ground bleeding profusely. Sergeant Smith, a radio operator who was then engaged in adjusting radio equipment in a trailer nearby, immediately ran across open ground under the heavy artillery fire to aid the wounded officer. After the Medical Officer had arrived, Sergeant Smith ran 100 yards to the Battalion aid station for a leg splint and returned over the dangerous course during the period of the most intensive enemy shelling. 



Lieutenant Colonel (then Major) GEORGE D. FILLETS, 0387946, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Hubason, Leyte, Philippine Islands on 11 December 1944. During a bitter assault against a well-armed, numerically superior enemy force holding well-entrenched positions on the forward slope of a hill, Colonel Fillets led a combat patrol forward, after a preparatory mortar and artillery barrage. Due to the open terrain and the fact that it was a hot, clear day, enemy observation was excellent. After a bitter battle which lasted the greater part of the day, Colonel Fillets' patrol reached the crest of the hill at approximately 1530 hours, only to find a well-armed enemy strongly entrenched on the reverse slope of the hill. A heavy machine gun was brought to the top, and set up to deliver harassing fire on the well-concealed enemy which pinned them down momentarily. Colonel Fillets, taking advantage of the covering fire, called to his men to follow him and charged the enemy positions hurling grenades. He personally killed at least three Japs, and enabled the patrol to overrun the positions and clear the area of Japs. A count of enemy dead showed that seventy-eight Japs had been killed. Major Fillets' aggressive action at a crucial moment enabled his unit to accomplish its mission and gain a strategic position of great value. I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1916 (Dull. 43, D, 1916), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named officers:

Second Lieutenant (then Technical Sergeant) LOUIS FERNANDEZ, 02023938, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Davao City, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 1 May 1945. Lieutenant Fernandez' platoon was leading the advance of an infantry company in its assault against enemy strongpoints and positions on Hill 550. These were situated in a heavily wooded area overlooking Davao City, and the route of approach lay through deep mud caused by recent rains. Although the weather was clear, affording the enemy the advantage of excellent visibility, Lieutenant Fernandez, acting as platoon leader, moved one squad to within 50 yards of the gun positions before being detected. Under intense covering fire from his three Browning automatic riflemen, he closed in with his squad, killing seven of the enemy and routing the others. As the squad overran the position, heavy rifle and machine gun fire poured in from concealed positions on the right flank. Lieutenant Fernandez immediately took over the flank protection of his platoon, and ran up the hill firing on the hidden positions. He killed three of the enemy and forced the remainder to flee. The company then swept through to gain its objective without suffering undue casualties, and to capture four six-inch enemy naval guns in addition to securing the high ground overlooking Davao City. Lieutenant Fernandez' outstanding leadership and great personal courage were an inspiration to his men and reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. * Lieutenant Colonel CHESTER A. DAHLER, 019020, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Leyte, Philippine Islands on 29 October 1944. When his Regimental Commander was seriously wounded in action, Colonel Dahler promptly assumed command of the regiment at a time when the leading combat elements were heavily engaged with enemy forces in rice fields and coconut groves northwest of Jaro. Knowing the value of personal reconnaissance, Colonel Dahler, with utter disregard for his personal safety, went forward under enemy fire to the front lines. As a result of his first hand information, the regiment, under his direction, continued to move forward in its

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attack despite the change in command. On 31 October 1944, Colonel Dahlen's regiment, advancing north west from Jaro toward Carigara, suddenly encountered bitter enemy resistance near Glagsam. Colonel Dahlen, who was then well forward with his leading elements, fearlessly exposed himself to enemy light artillery, mortar, and machine gun fire, to plan and supervise personally the execution of a coordinated attack which was accomplished against determined enemy forces aided in their defense by perfect weather and visibility. The resulting destruction of large numbers of the enemy enabled the regiment to advance rapidly on the division objective. Colonel Dahlen's outstanding leadership, energy, and gallant conduct under enemy fire were an inspiration to the officers and enlisted men of his regiment, and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Technician Fourth Grade HAROLD T. CLAYPOOL, 35411379, Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near the Talomo River in the vicinity of Malapos, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 20 June 1945. Sergeant Claypool, a radio operator, was a member of an artillery forward observer party assigned to an assault company of infantry which was ordered to cross the Talomo River. The company completed the crossing and moved forward in column along a trail through extremely rough and wooded terrain where visibility was limited to 15 or 20 feet. The unit encountered an enemy ambush, and was split by intense fire from rifles and machine guns concealed in the dense undergrowth. The rear half of the company was forced to withdraw across the river, while the forward elements, of which Sergeant Claypool's party was a part, advanced beyond the enemy ambush by crawling approximately 400 yards. During this advance, Sergeant Claypool aided the forward observer in keeping the party together, although enemy machine gun bullets penetrated the radio pack on his back. When the dense jungle terrain and confusion caused some members of the party to lose their way, he crawled back approximately 20 yards through enemy fire to guide them forward. This enabled the forward observer to deliver urgently needed fire directions to the supporting artillery. Sergeant Claypool's courageous actions and cool presence of mind reflects high credit upon himself and the military service. Private First Class JAMES N. KNOX, 38084771, Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Leyte, Philippine Islands, from 20 October to 23 November 1944. Private Knox was attached as an aid man and litter bearer to a battalion that was isolated for a period of 18 days. Many times, under heavy enemy fire, Private Knox was called upon to administer emergency first aid to the wounded men. On one

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occasion, during a strong Japanese attack on the perimeter, Private Knox left his foxhole and ran forward to assist a man who had been wounded and was trying to crawl away from an attacking Japanese. Private Knox with utter disregard for his personal safety often made the rounds to the various positions in the perimeter to care for the wounded men and afford them as much comfort as possible. Private Knox has always been a reliable and efficient man in the performance of his duties. His initiative and courage in the presence of great hazards reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. Nannie E. Knox (mother), Box 205, Bridgeport, Texas.

Sergeant GEORGE M. KOLETSAR, 39091745, Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 5 May 1945. At approximately 1400 hours, a number of Japanese six-inch artillery shells landed in the Regimental Command Post area situated in rugged terrain. Four shells exploded, and wounded several men. On the call for an aid man, Sergeant Kolesar ran from the aid station with his medical equipment to the area where the wounded men lay bleeding in the hot sun. Seeing one man's leg severed, he immediately applied a tourniquet and stopped the flow of blood. As intermittent artillery fire continued to fall around him, he administered first aid to two other men and helped to evacuate them to a nearby Portable Surgical Hospital. Sergeant Kolesar's courage and devotion to duty are a credit to himself, and are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Second Lieutenant ALFRED E. VAN DERHOOF, 02022902, Infantry, United States Army. Lieutenant Van Derhoof was a member of an infantry company advancing through heavy jungle growth toward high ground near Mandog, Mindanao. At a point where the route lay through flat terrain, bordered on the right by a high hill and on the left by the Davao River Valley, the column came under enemy sniper fire, rendered more dangerous by the excellent visibility which prevailed. With the aid of his scouts, Lieutenant Van Derhoof calmly directed his men through the danger zone. After the platoon had cleared the steep cliffs, the Japs detonated a large quantity of bombs and high explosives. The terrific explosion that followed injured every man in the platoon, including Lieutenant Van Derhoof. Despite shock and wounds, he personally checked each man's injuries and helped to administer first aid. Not until all his men had been removed to safety did he have his own wounds treated. He left the area with the last carrying party, acting as one of the guards. Lieutenant Van Derhoof's courageous actions and example of courage under fire were an inspiration to every member of his command and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Private First Class EARL E. WEDLSORF, 37116386, Infantry, United States Army. At approximately 1500 hours, an infantry battalion was moving rapidly up a mountain trail. As the lead elements entered an abaca grove, two squads were deployed as skirmishers. As they started through the thicket where visibility was extremely limited, the enemy opened fire with rifles and machine guns from well camouflaged positions along previously prepared interlocking lanes of fire. Private Wendelsdorf's outstanding leadership and initiative are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. I. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Cull. 43, D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Sergeant (then Private First Class) EUGENE E. HAUGE, 37481982, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action in the vicinity of Calinan, Davao Province, Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 17 June 1945. During the advance of an infantry company in the direction of Calinan, the point, while moving through heavy undergrowth, came under enemy fire and one man was wounded. The withdrawing squad temporarily was forced to leave him behind. Efforts to reach the wounded man were unsuccessful until Sergeant Hauge volunteered to crawl up alone and attempt a rescue. While the platoon maintained covering fire, Sergeant Hauge, taking full advantage of the natural cover as well as the limited visibility due to the cloudy day, crawled through the brush under searching enemy fire and reached the fallen man, only to find him dead. He then crawled forward and retrieved the casualty's automatic rifle to prevent it falling into the hands of the enemy. A patrol later found that Sergeant Hauge had crawled to within fifteen feet of an enemy machine gun in his effort to aid a wounded comrade. Sergeant Hauge's courage and willingness to risk his own life for another were a source of great inspiration to the members of the company, and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. At approximately 0200 hours he heard cries of distress coming from the water beyond the end of the deck, and upon investigating, he discovered two men floundering in the water. One man was approximately 200 yards from the deck

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while the other was somewhat closer. Sergeant Houser immediately went to the aid of the man nearest him, and then, after obtaining a life preserver, swam to the other man and held his head above the water until a rescue boat arrived to pick them up. Technician Fourth Grade JOHN J. ROBERTS, 32982679, Infantry, United States Army. For heroism at Mindanao, Philippine Islands on 29 July 1945. On that afternoon, in the vicinity of Davao Gulf, a soldier swimming approximately 75 yards off shore was caught in a swift cross current of water, caused by the racing engines of a nearby LSM. Sergeant Roberts, hearing the man's cries of distress, immediately dashed into the water and swam to the aid of the helpless man. Unable to make any progress against the dangerous current he elected to remain with the drowning man and kept him afloat until a raft could be brought from the shore. Sergeant Roberts' prompt and courageous action resulted in saving the life of a fellow soldier, and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Home address: Corporal Mary K. Chaplain Hawthorne immediately took command of the chaotic situation, and for more than one hour, under constant mortar and machine gun fire, administered morphine, rendered first aid, and organized and assisted in the evacuation of the wounded. With no thought of his personal safety, Chaplain Hawthorne remained in the area until the last wounded man had been carried to safety. Technician Fifth Grade RAIPH A. DOCKHAM, (20902794), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Binalonan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 19 January 1945. Technician Fifth Grade Dockham volunteered to drive his jeep through point-blank fire of both enemy and friendly armor in order to rescue a wounded soldier. Though forced to abandon his vehicle before reaching the wounded man, he continued on foot and succeeded in moving the man to safety. By his timely action, without regard for his own personal safety, Technician Fifth Grade Dockham brought the wounded man to where he could be given the medical treatment necessary to save his life. 

Private JIM W. LINDLEY (6587333), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands. On 23 January 1945, Private Lindley was a member of a combat patrol whose mission was to secure and hold a position on the edge of San Manuel. When the patrol ran into heavy enemy machine gun and sniper fire, two of the leading members were wounded and the rest pinned down. Private Lindley, with utter disregard for his own safety, ran forward under intense sniper fire and rescued one of the wounded men who was unable to save himself. He then returned to his post and helped the patrol secure its position. The courage and initiative displayed by Private Lindley was an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions. Private First Class HARRY E. LUBKE (37568078), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands. Suffering from loss of blood and too weak to operate his own automatic rifle, Private Lubke refused to be evacuated and instead secured a lighter weapon and continued the fight until his company's position was secured. The great courage and devotion to duty demonstrated by Private First Class Lubke was an inspiration to the rest of the men in his company. I. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Sergeant ELWYN D. ANDERSON (20935006), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 January 1945. Sergeant Anderson, having tended the wounded in his own sector of an infantry company's lines, volunteered to cross an open area covered by intense enemy fire to aid a wounded man, despite the fact he knew another aid man had just lost his life in the same area. Sergeant Anderson reached the wounded man, dressed his wounds, and was assisting in removing him to cover when he was himself knocked down by concussion from a mortar shell and had to be evacuated. Lieutenant Colonel CHARLES CANTRELL (C-22682), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Umingan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 1 February 1945. Colonel Cantrell, without regard for his own personal safety, on his own initiative, and beyond his normal line of duty, exposed himself to intense enemy machine gun and rifle fire while successfully evacuating a wounded man who had lain in a ditch for over one half hour without medical treatment. Colonel Cantrell further exposed himself to enemy fire in order to direct accurate and effective artillery fire on the enemy positions. Through his gallant actions and coolness under fire, Lieutenant Colonel Cantrell was an inspiration to all who observed him. Staff Sergeant RANDOLPH W. THOMPSON (39128259), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Binalonan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 19 January 1945. When the infantry company of which he was a member was pinned down by heavy enemy rifle and machine gun fire, one of the scouts was severely wounded while attempting to move out of the line of fire. Staff Sergeant (then Sergeant) Thompson, alone and unaided, braved direct machine gun fire, to reach the wounded man. Staff Sergeant Thompson then crawled, dragging the wounded man with him, to a place of safety where skilled medical aid was administered saving the man's life. This courageous action by Staff Sergeant Thompson contributed greatly to the morale of our forces and was an inspiration to all. Home Address: Mrs. Ernestine E. Private First Class GEORGE T. WORLAND (20934918), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 25 January 1945. the wounded man and dragged him to the shelter of a ruins where prompt medical attention resulted in the saving of his life. Private First Class Worland was himself wounded just as he reached the door of the ruins but his courageous action had contributed greatly to the morale of all concerned. While the enemy were engaged in firing at Sergeant Santo the automatic rifle team withdrew without casualties to themselves and were then able to take up more favorable emplacements to secure the platoon's position.
