I. ANNOUNCEMENT OF DIVISION STAFF OFFICERS: Major VICTOR B. SHEMVELL, O-383553, General Staff Corps, this headquarters, is announced as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 vice Lieutenant Colonel JAROSLAV FOLI JR., O-21193, relieved.

2. Lieutenant Colonel EDWARD M. TAYLOR, O-11388, Field Artillery, this headquarters, is announced as Acting Inspector General vice Captain BRUCE D. MOORE, JR., O-1010272, relieved.

II. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer:

Captain DEMETRIUS G. TRAGGIS (O-439283), Medical Corps, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 4 February 1945. Captain Traggis, on duty at an infantry battalion aid station during the attack on Lupao volunteered without hesitation to go to the aid of a wounded soldier and administer medical attention. Crawling across open terrain raked by enemy tank and small arms fire, Captain Traggis reached the exposed position in which the wounded man lay and administered first aid and two units of plasma, despite continued intense enemy fire. He remained with his patient until he felt the wounded man was ready to be moved, and then called up a litter squad and helped evacuate the man to the aid station. The coolness, calmness, and devotion to duty displayed by Captain Traggis was an inspiration to his men and reflected credit upon himself and the Medical Department of the United States Army. III. BRONZE STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec II, Bul 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Corporal EDDIE L. BATES (14030213), Medical Department, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 4 February 1945. Corporal (then Private First Class) Bates, on duty with a litter squad of an infantry battalion aid station, volunteered to go to the aid of a wounded man who lay in front of the friendly positions. Crawling out with the rest of the litter squad,

Corporal Bates succeeded in reaching the wounded man and although under constant enemy tank and small arms fire, assisted in placing the wounded man on a litter, and retraced his way, still under intense enemy fire, to the aid station where the wounded man was rendered proper medical attention. Private First Class PERRY P. BURDETTE (34892470), Medical Department, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 February 1945. Private Burdette volunteered to go to the aid of a wounded man who lay in an exposed position in front of the front lines. In the face of heavy enemy machine gun and small arms fire, Private Burdette crawled out to the fallen man, aided in placing him on a litter and then retraced his way across open terrain still raked by enemy fire, back to the battalion aid station where medical aid was administered the wounded man. Private First Class Burdette's actions served as an inspiration to the other members of the litter squad. Home Address: Mrs. Lucy M. Burdette (Mother), Iva, South Carolina.

Sergeant WARNER J. HOHMAN (30179335), Medical Department, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. Sergeant (then Corporal) Hohman, assistant litter bearer section leader, volunteered to take his squad and go to the aid of a wounded man who lay in an exposed position under intense enemy tank and small arms fire. Despite continuous heavy enemy fire, Sergeant Hohman and his squad reached the wounded man, placed him on a litter and carried him back over the exposed route to the battalion aid station. First Sergeant GUY MITCHELL (6553203), Field Artillery, United States Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces on Luzon, Philippine Islands, during the period from 11 January to 21 February 1945. Private First Class EDWARD RUBAC (38078134), Medical Department, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 February 1945. Private Rubac proceeded with a litter squad over mined fields, and through enemy machine gun and mortar fire to the aid of a wounded soldier who lay in a position exposed to hostile observation and fire. This heroic action by Private First Class Rubac, without regard for personal danger, aided materially in the saving of the wounded man's life and served as an inspiration to the other members of the litter squad. Private First Class PETER STYCZYSZYN (5002360), Medical Department, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4

February 1945. Private Styczyszyn, on duty with a litter squad of an infantry battalion aid station, volunteered to go to the aid of a wounded man who lay in an exposed position in front of friendly lines. Crawling out with the rest of the litter squad, he succeeded in reaching the wounded man and although under constant enemy tank and small arm fire, assisted in placing the wounded man on a litter, then retraced his way, still under enemy fire, to the aid station where the wounded man was rendered medical attention. Private First Class Styczyszyn's actions served as an inspiration to the infantry troops in the forward positions. Home Address: Mrs. Wanda Styczyszyn (wife), 336-41st Street, Brooklyn, New York.

Private First Class JACK A. TOOTHMAN (15090929), Medical Department, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. Private Toothman, member of a litter squad, volunteered to go to the aid of a wounded man who lay in an exposed position in front of friendly lines. Crawling out with the rest of the litter squad, although under constant enemy small arms and tank fire, he succeeded in reaching the wounded man, placed him on a litter and then retraced his way, still under intense enemy fire, to the battalion aid station where medical aid was rendered the wounded man. Private First Class Toothman's heroic actions were an inspiration to the other members of the litter squad and to the infantry troops in the forward positions. Home Address: Mrs. Thelma I. R. I. SILVER STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

Staff Sergeant RUSSELL C. GETCHELL, JR. (11014395), Cavalry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Santa Maria, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 25 January 1945. Staff Sergeant Getchell, leader of a 3 man patrol, located a combat patrol of 25 Japanese soldiers armed with machine guns, mortars, and demolitions approaching Santa Maria. Sending one man back for reinforcements Sergeant Getchell moved to within 10 yards of the enemy and with the third member of his patrol, opened fire with his rifle, killing 2 Japanese carrying a machine gun and then, while withdrawing, kept the enemy confused as to his strength by fire and movement until reinforcements arrived. Through his prompt action and sound tactical judgment Staff Sergeant Getchell prevented an enemy force, superior both in number and arms to his patrol, from entering and raiding the town of Santa Maria. Second Lieutenant GEORGE K. GRANT (O-1315927), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces on Luzon, Philippine Islands. During the night of 29 January 1945 near the town of Pimienta, a large enemy armored force attempted to break through a road-block established by our forces. Throughout the action which lasted until the following morning, Lieutenant Grant constantly went from man to man among the members of his platoon, checking their positions and administering first aid to the wounded. When reinforcements arrived he personally placed them in positions where devastating fire could be brought against the enemy. Second Lieutenant Grant's superior leadership and devotion to duty was an inspiration to his entire platoon and aided materially in the final destruction of the Japanese force. II. BRONZE STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec II, Bul 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Corporal ALVIN E. EHRENN (32456608), Air Corps, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Umingan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 31 January 1945. Corporal Ehrenmann, radio operator with a support aircraft party attached to an infantry unit, voluntarily remained in his vehicle assisting in the control of friendly aircraft striking at the enemy held town of Umingan. This heroic service rendered

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by Corporal Ehrmann while under continuous enemy artillery and automatic weapons fire, was of great value and contributed materially to the success of the mission. Sergeant ROGER C. FREDRICH (36800945), Air Corps, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 23 January 1945. Sergeant Fredrich, radio operator with a support aircraft party, drove forward to a vantage point on the edge of San Manuel from which friendly aircraft could be controlled for a close support air strike on nearby villages. During his trip forward, while there, and while returning, he was under heavy enemy automatic weapons and sniper fire, but voluntarily remained at his post so that contact could be maintained with our aircraft. Technical Sergeant CLIFFORD C. JOHNSON (37268134), Air Corps, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 19 January 1945. Technical Sergeant (then Staff Sergeant) Johnson, radio operator with a support aircraft party attached to an infantry unit, moved forward with the leading elements of an infantry battalion to a vantage point on the front lines where, while subjected to heavy enemy fire, he remained at his post as radio operator and assisted in the control of friendly aircraft engaged in a strike on San Manuel. Such action was a voluntary one on the part of Technical Sergeant Johnson and contributed materially to the success of the aerial strike on San Manuel. Home Address: Mrs. Clifford C. 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I. ANNOUNCEMENT OF DIVISION STAFF OFFICER: Major ROBERT J. SPEAKS, O-387034, General Staff Corps, Headquarters, is announced as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 vice Lieutenant Colonel VICTOR L. JOHNSON, JR., O-22013, relieved.

II. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918) a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, posthumously to the following named enlisted man:

Sergeant STEWART A. TURNWALL (37115101), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 3 February and 6 February 1945. On 3 February 1945 Sergeant Turnwall led a litter squad through intense enemy machine gun and small arms fire to the rescue of a wounded soldier, administered first aid and successfully evacuated him to a position of safety. On 6 February 1945 the advance of our forces was temporarily halted by a fence along which the enemy was laying fierce machine gun and 47mm tank fire. One of our soldiers leaped the fence, was wounded, and lay in front of enemy positions calling for help. Without hesitation and with utter disregard for personal safety, Sergeant Turnwall volunteered to go to the aid of the wounded man. He safely crossed the fence but was struck and killed by the intense enemy fire while striving to reach the side of the wounded soldier. Sergeant Turnwall's heroic action, coolness under fire and calm leadership, served as an inspiration to his men and to the infantry men nearby, reflecting credit upon himself and the Medical Department of the United States Army. III. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918) a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Private First Class LEON A. BARRETT (0951321) Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 23 January 1945. Private Barrett volunteered to make his way beyond the friendly lines to an exposed position where a number of men were wounded and trapped by intense enemy small arms fire. Safely reaching the men, and while still under enemy fire, Private Barrett administered first aid to them. Inspired by his actions, a litter squad made its way to the position and organized and directed by Private Barrett, succeeded in evacuating the wounded men despite the intense enemy fire resulting in one casualty sustaining another wound. Private First Class Barrett's actions were an

Staff Sergeant Anderberg assumed the duties of Battalion S-2 when the S-2 was killed in action. Throughout the remainder of the battle for Lupao, Sergeant Anderberg kept his Battalion Commander constantly apprised of the enemy situation with reports complete in every detail. In all phases of his work he displayed superior initiative and ability. The devotion to duty and outstanding effort displayed by Staff Sergeant Anderberg contributed materially to the success of his battalion. I. RESCISSON OF GENERAL ORDERS: Section II, General Orders No. 43, this headquarters, dated 3 March 1945, awarding an Oak-Leaf Cluster to the Silver Star medal to Technical Sergeant Hubert A. Santo (39302090), Infantry, United States Army, is revoked.

II. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1913 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, posthumously to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Captain WILLIAM D. BAKER (0-370798), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 29 January 1945. Captain Baker, while under direct enemy machine gun and 47mm tank fire, directed an artillery barrage against an enemy counter-attack consisting of twenty tanks and 110 infantrymen approaching within 200 yards of his position. Due to his skillful use of the artillery 10 tanks were put out of action before reaching our lines. The great courage, initiative and unselfish devotion to duty exhibited by Captain Baker aided materially in the repulse of the counter-attack without loss of ground to our forces. Staff Sergeant NICHOLAS J. FRANZIONE (7070999), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 2 February 1945. When his squad was pinned down in an open rice paddy by intense machine gun and rifle fire Sergeant Franzione, without regard for personal safety, crawled forward to eliminate the enemy machine gun. Hit almost immediately in the arm and leg by sniper fire, he continued across 35 yards of open terrain to a point 25 yards from the machine gun position. By this time the Japanese had brought a heavy concentration of fire to bear on his position in an attempt to stop his advance. From his precarious position Sergeant Franzione threw 2 hand grenades which knocked out the enemy machine gun and permitted his squad to withdraw. Sergeant Franzione was mortally wounded as he threw the second grenade and died before aid could reach him. The unselfish devotion to duty and courageous action exhibited by Staff Sergeant Franzione was an inspiration to his men and a credit to the military service for which he gave his life. Sergeant JOHN A. MARTIN (39171460), Cavalry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces in the vicinity of Pinangatalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 8 February 1945. Sergeant Martin, with utter disregard for his own personal safety exposed himself to heavy enemy machine gun and rifle fire in order to reach a position where he could bring flanking fire to bear upon a numerically superior enemy force engaged in combat with a friendly patrol. Reaching his objective Sergeant Martin killed 8 of the enemy before he was himself mortally wounded. Sergeant Martin's courageous action

denied the enemy use of commanding ground from which our forces would have been subjected to the full brunt of the enemy fire power, and aided materially in the final complete destruction of the enemy force. Next of Kin: Mrs. Florence Martin (wife), 203 Belmont, North Seattle, Washington.

Private First Class BENJAMIN MARTINEZ, JR. (39698633), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 January 1945. During the attack on San Manuel, Private Martinez' company, in the face of a furious enemy counter-attack composed of several tanks and 2 platoons of infantrymen, was forced to withdraw to more tenable positions. Private Martinez, automatic rifleman, voluntarily stayed in position and covered the withdrawal of his platoon by his accurate fire which disrupted the Japanese attack and killed several of their number. While thus drawing tank and rifle fire away from his platoon, Private Martinez was killed by enemy rifle fire. The gallant action and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Martinez was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service for which he gave his life. Technical Sergeant HUBERT A. SANTO (39302090), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Philippine Islands, on 24 January 1945. Technical Sergeant Santo was placing the members of his platoon in position under fire. When a squad leader and automatic rifle team were caught in a pocket bracketed by mortar fire he calmly, and without regard for his own personal safety, exposed himself to draw the enemy fire and permit the withdrawal of his men to a more tenable position. In so doing, Sergeant Santo was seriously wounded by enemy mortar fragments. While the enemy was engaged in firing at Sergeant Santo the automatic rifle team withdrew without casualty to themselves and were then able to take up more favorable emplacements to secure the platoon's position. Technical Sergeant Santo's voluntary exposure to enemy fire for the sake of his comrades was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. AWARDEE OF THE SILVER STAR

SILVER STAR--By direction of the President, under provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Pub 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant HERBERT C. GENTRY (0-405390), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Piamenta, Luzon, Philippine Islands. On the night of 29 January 1945 a large enemy armored column attempted to break through a road-block established by our forces. First Lieutenant Gentry, anti-tank platoon leader, directed the movement of his anti-tank gun to a location where flanking fire could be brought to bear upon the enemy and, in the face of enemy rifle, machine gun, artillery and tank fire, made three trips across an open field carrying badly needed ammunition to his gun crew. The coolness and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by First Lieutenant Gentry aided materially in repulsing and destroying the enemy armored column and was a source of inspiration to the men of his platoon. Private First Class OSWALD E. HAZELTON (6982727), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 24 January to 28 January 1945. On numerous occasions during the battle of San Manuel Private Hazelton displayed a high degree of courage by repeatedly volunteering for hazardous tasks not in line with his normal duty as company runner. On 24 January he strung wire to a mortar observation post under heavy enemy fire and several times during the succeeding two days went to the aid of wounded men and removed them to a place of safety. On 28 January Private Hazelton helped to move and man a machine gun during an enemy tank attack on our positions. When gun and gunner were knocked out by enemy fire Private First Class Hazelton, although suffering from shock, returned to his command post to report the loss of the gun before he collapsed from exhaustion and shock. Private First Class EDWARD H. HORLIVY (37155250), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands. On 24 January 1945 during the attack on San Manuel, the infantry company of which Private Horlivy was a member, was counter-attacked by a strong Japanese force employing tanks supported by foot troops. When part of the company was forced to withdraw before the ferocity of the attack, Private Horlivy, machine gunner, held his position in order to give covering fire for the withdrawal. Although directly in line of an approaching enemy tank, Private First Class Horlivy held his ground, firing into the tank and the supporting foot troops until his position was overrun and he himself wounded. During a fiercely resisted attack on San Manuel Private First Class Mouser, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, commandeered an abandoned truck and evacuated several seriously wounded comrades in the face of continuous enemy machine gun and rifle fire. Returning to the front he administered sorely needed medical aid to other wounded men, disregarding his own wounds which he had received while performing these deeds. The courageous actions of Private First Class Mouser, far exceeding the normal demands of his duty, contributed greatly to the morale of our forces and was an inspiration to all who witnessed his deeds. First Lieutenant JAY V. RUSSELL (O-1288624), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces on Luzon, Philippine Islands, during the period 3 to 13 February 1945. Lieutenant Russell on several occasions led patrols deep into enemy territory, gaining valuable information as to the enemy's strength and dispositions. Although outnumbered on each occasion of contact with the enemy, Lieutenant Russell by able control of his men, clear thinking and sound tactical judgment constantly outmaneuvered and outfought a fanatical foe and was mainly responsible for his unit inflicting losses on the enemy in the amount of 37 killed. The gallant leadership and exemplary example set by First Lieutenant Russell was at all times a constant inspiration to his men. Home Address: Mrs. Jay Russell (Mother), Mineral Wells, Texas.

Private First Class FLOYD L. SANNER (37567905), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 7 February 1945. Private Sanner, gunner on a self-propelled 105mm howitzer, courageously refused to abandon his vehicle when it was struck by a steady stream of armor piercing shells from a well-concealed enemy tank at point-blank range, killing the driver, 4 members of the crew, and seriously wounding a fifth. Although in grave danger from continuous enemy fire Private Sanner crawled over the bodies of his dead comrades and by a heroic effort managed to extricate the dead driver's feet strapped to the controls and, in spite of his lack of experience as a driver, managed to reverse the gears and maneuver the vehicle into a covered position. Private First Class Sanner's courageous and gallant action in refusing to abandon his wounded comrades and vehicle in the face of almost certain death reflect great credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. First Lieutenant JOE E. STARNES (O-1268643), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 January 1945. Lieutenant Starnes, machine gun platoon leader, while directing fire for his platoon during the attack on San Manuel was forced to move one of his guns in order to provide covering fire for an advance mortar observer. Assisting in moving the weapon, he was severely burned

by contact with the weapon, hot from firing. Ignoring his pain, he led his squad to the new position and then courageously exposed himself to draw the enemy mortar fire in order to direct the line of fire from his machine gun. Even though a mortar shell landed within three feet of the gun, wounding one of the crew, Lieutenant Starns continued to maintain his exposed position and direct the return fire until instructed to withdraw. Although in grave danger from the continuing enemy fire, Private Toon refused to jump to safety and remained at his post to assist the other remaining crew member in his efforts to back the M7 to a covered position. SILVER STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

corporal JOHN A. BELLEROSE (31269377), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 25 January 1945. Corporal (then Private First Class) Bellerose was a member of a self-propelled 105mm howitzer, attacking San Manuel in support of an infantry company. When the mount was knocked out by fire from a concealed gun of large calibre, it was necessary the crew evacuate immediately due to the imminent danger of exploding ammunition which was then afire. Corporal Bellerose had succeeded in reaching a position of safety when he heard a call for help emanating from the burning mount. Though himself suffering from concussion, a sprained ankle, and a burned hand, he returned to the mount and rescued a helplessly wounded comrade, thereby saving his life. Upon rejoining his squad, it was disclosed that Private Iversen had been wounded, which knowledge had been kept to himself in order that he might not be evacuated to the rear. Using a minimum of ammunition his crew knocked out 3 enemy tanks, two machine gun nests and gave badly needed support to the infantry troops. II. SILVER STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

Captain HENRY S. HIRST (O-419882), Medical Corps, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Villegas, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 27 January 1945. Captain Hirst, serving as an Infantry Battalion Surgeon, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, in the face of heavy enemy fire, went 1500 yards beyond his Battalion Aid Station to render medical treatment to the numerous casualties of a trapped rifle company, who were exposed to intense enemy cross fire. He deliberately exposed himself to intense fire in order to render aid to the wounded and supervise their evacuation. By his actions, Captain Hirst saved the lives of several wounded soldiers and greatly inspired all who witnessed his gallantry. Technical Sergeant GERALD D. WARD (7033900), Infantry United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Pimienta, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. Technical Sergeant Ward, anti-tank platoon sergeant, with complete disregard for his own personal safety and on his own initiative, while exposed to heavy enemy rifle, machine gun, and artillery fire, left his position in order to secure a prime mover to remove an anti-tank gun from a road block, which was in danger of being captured by the enemy. He drove directly through the criss-cross of heavy friendly and enemy fire, and successfully removed the anti-tank gun to a more secure position. Technical Sergeant Ward, through his coolness under intense fire, and heroic actions, prevented the anti-tank gun from falling into the hands of the enemy. Home Address: Mrs. Carol C. AWARDS OF THE SILVER STAR

SILVER STAR:--By direction of the president, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Technician Fifth Grade LOUIS M. CANALE, (7025687), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Umingan, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 2 February 1945. Technician Fifth Grade Canale, a member of a Field Artillery Forward Observer's Party, in company with an attacking infantry unit advanced across open fields in the face of intense machine gun, rifle and mortar fire from a well entrenched and determined enemy. This fire and the supporting tanks continually disrupted the wire communication lines over which essential fire missions were being sent. Technician Fifth Grade Canale, with complete disregard for his personal safety, repeatedly crossed the fire swept field to trace and repair broken wires. His courage and devotion to duty was an inspiration to the other members of the party, and contributed materially to the success of the mission. Home Address: Miss Virginia Canale, (Sister), 336 Ladson Street, Pittsburg, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class HAZZIE B. EAGLE JR., (39209479), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 27 January 1945. Private First Class Eagle was serving as radio operator, working with a rifle platoon leader, during the attack on San Manuel. The platoon's advance was halted by several machine guns and snipers, dug in around enemy tank positions. Recognizing that mortar fire was needed to neutralize the enemy machine guns, he crawled forward with machine gun bullets flying inches over his head, to reach a shallow hole only 20 yards from the enemy positions. Lying in the hole, which was too small to give him adequate cover, Private First Class Eagle registered the mortars in on the target, neutralizing the machine gun positions and permitting the platoon to advance and secure the ground. Technician Fifth Grade CLIFFORD S. HENDRICKSON, (37563162), Cavalry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces on 31 January 1945 in the vicinity of Lupao, and on 3 February 1945 in the vicinity of Munoz, Luzon, Philippine Islands. As a member of a reconnaissance patrol deep in enemy territory he rushed to the aid of a soldier who was cut off from the patrol by enemy action. Exposing himself to almost point blank fire from the enemy, he successfully neutralized their fire long enough for his companion to escape, then covered the withdrawal of the patrol after eight of the enemy were killed. On another patrol in enemy territory he discovered several enemy soldiers concealed in the grass. Realizing the patrol was in danger of being ambushed, he notified the patrol leader then opened fire on the foe, killing one of them. Technician Fifth Grade Hendrickson's courageous conduct in battle was in accordance with the highest standards of military tradition. Private First Class FRANCIS J. LILLA, (37568445), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. Private First Class Lilla occupied an unfinished anti-tank rocket grenade launching position in a strongpoint located in the forward area of his company's defense sector, when confronted by the spearhead of an assaulting enemy tank column. Realizing the potential power of this threat and being determined to exercise the fullest destructive effect of his weapon, he fearlessly held his fire until one tank was between 10 and 20 yards from him. Even though his position was not dug in completely, he stood his ground in the face of the rapidly approaching tanks with their machine gun and 47mm gun fire. His great courage and marked display of fire discipline caused the destruction of one tank and its evacuating crew. This act slowed the enemy armored assault sufficiently to give elements to his rear time in which to shift key weapons to positions most aptly sighted to crush the Japanese counterattack. 1st Lieutenant HENRY J. MOLNAR, (01171289), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 and 29 January 1945. First Lieutenant Molnar, performing the duties of artillery forward observer, stationed himself in close proximity to the enemy positions to observe enemy movements and advise the infantry commander of the proper time to call for normal barrage. When it became necessary, he unhesitatingly adjusted artillery fire close enough to endanger himself with fragmentation. During the entire period at his station, he adjusted fire and made accurate observations of enemy movements and reports of battle progress while being exposed to enemy fire. His courage, intrepidity of behavior and disregard for personal safety are exemplary of the highest military traditions and a credit to the military service. Private First Class HUBERT M. MOORE, (38434935), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 27 January 1945. Private First Class Moore, a communications truck driver volunteered to serve as a litterbearer to assist in the evacuation of casualties. Arriving at the lines, it was discovered that a member of the fighting unit was lying in a defile in front of our lines with seriously wounded legs. Ignoring the fact that enemy gunfire was so intense in that area, that our lines had to be withdrawn, he voluntarily crawled out to assist the wounded man. As he was dragging his wounded comrade to safety, Private First Class Moore was hit by machine gun fire in the shoulder. Ignoring his own wound, he continued his task until the soldier with the wounded legs was evacuated to a place of safety. Private First Class Moore's courageous action beyond the call of his assigned duties, was an inspiration to all who witnessed it. Home Address: Mrs. Betty J. He removed the wounded officer to a position where medical attention was available. Many times that morning, under constant enemy fire, he moved in and out of the various positions occupied by his platoon, to carry out instructions of his platoon leader and to assist in organizing the defenses in that sector. Private First Class Nielsen's courage in the face of heavy enemy fire was an inspiration to all who witnessed his acts. On his return from his second trip he was told that the advance of the Second Platoon of his company was being held up by enemy machine gun fire, which had the platoon's machine gun crew pinned down. Volunteering to do what others considered impossible, he contacted the friendly machine gun crews and under fire from the enemy machine guns, led them to positions from which they could bring fire to bear on the enemy machine gun positions. Private IGNACIO E. GONZALES, (156281), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 22 January 1945. Private Gonzales, runner in an infantry platoon, volunteered to accompany a patrol to establish communications between the company's base camp and a platoon attempting to take an enemy observation post on a hill. After finding the platoon, Private Gonzales volunteered to carry the sound-power-wire forward to the platoon Command Post, a task made difficult by the fact that the enemy opened fire with machine guns, rifles and knee mortars at every attempt to advance. Disregarding the heavy gun fire sweeping the area he was to traverse, Private Gonzales was hit by enemy machine gun fire while gallantly pressing forward to reach his objective. Without aid from anyone, he returned to his original position for medical aid, and promptly volunteered to attempt to complete his mission, however, he was ordered back to the rear for further medical treatment. Seven days later, he died in the hospital from wounds received in this action. His courage in volunteering to brave dangerous enemy fire the second time, despite the fact that he was seriously wounded, was a salutary example of the highest degree of gallantry. Staff Sergeant Kalcik, squad leader in an infantry platoon, located an enemy field piece preparing to fire into the positions of his unit, which was located at an important road junction. He called for mortar and anti-tank fire, and immediately occupied a position from which to observe and direct this fire. Noticing that fire brought to bear on the enemy field piece did not prove to be effective, Staff Sergeant Kalcik, with complete disregard for his own safety, fired four rounds of bazooka fire at the enemy gun position before he was killed by a shell which exploded in the position he was occupying. Fire initiated by him later disabled the enemy gun, permitting the platoon to achieve its objective. Staff Sergeant Kalcik's gallant action served as an inspiration to all who observed it, and was in accordance with the highest standards of the military service. AWARDS OF THE BRONZE STAR

BRONZE STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec II, Bul 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Captain GEORGE W. BOLTON, JR., (01165225), Field Artillery, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Pimiento, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 29 January 1945. Captain Bolton, acting as an artillery liaison officer with an infantry battalion, without regard for his own safety, exposed himself beyond the ordinary call of duty to artillery and small arms fire in order to ascertain the disposition of our own troops. While in a centrally located area that was under constant artillery and machine gun fire, he directed accurate artillery fire on the enemy tank and artillery column in a confined area between elements of our own troops. The clear thinking, devotion to duty and skillful direction exhibited by Captain Bolton was an inspiration to his associates and contributed materially to the destruction of the enemy. By his skillful leadership and courage in exposing himself to danger, beyond the normal demands of his duty, the patrol led by Staff Sergeant Crivier, along with another relief patrol, succeeded in breaking up the road block and permitting the successful evacuation of nine wounded men, saving the life of one of them and the limbs of two others. Staff Sergeant Crivier's actions further insured a continued flow of supplies to the men fighting in the mountains. Despite the fact that it was beyond the normal demands of his duty as a mail orderly, Technician Fifth Grade Sherod volunteered to accompany a patrol to break up an enemy road block that had cut the company's supply lines through the mountains and had ambushed a litter party carrying nine wounded men. When the road block was reached, Technician Fifth Grade Sherod distinguished himself by exposing himself to draw fire away from the litter party and permit them to move to positions of safety. This patrol, augmented by another, succeeded in wiping out the road block. The litter party was able to evacuate its wounded men, thereby saving the life of one man and the limbs of two others. Technician Fifth Grade Sherod's actions further insured a continued flow of supplies to the men fighting in the mountains. First Lieutenant Snyder, serving as an infantry battalion supply officer, established and maintained dumps of ammunition and supplies on the north edge of the village of San Manuel, less than two hundred yards behind the front lines of his battalion, during the battle for that village. In order to meet the large, constant and urgent supply needs of his assaulting battalion, First Lieutenant Snyder was forced to place his installations at a nearby location offering no cover from enemy fire. Here he was constantly exposed to grazing, deliberately aimed sniper and machine gun fire coming from Japanese positions three hundred to five hundred yards away. Sporadic enemy mortar, and artillery fire burst in the vicinity of his supply and ammunition dump. Despite the fact that he was exposed to this fire and in one instance was on the verge of being over-run by an enemy tank charge, he calmly and energetically prepared supplies for immediate use and pushed ammunition, weapons, food, and water to the front lines of his battalion. By his disregard for his personal safety, his initiative, energy, and timely action, First Lieutenant Snyder contributed materially to the victory of our forces in the battle for the village of San Manuel. Private First Class JAMES J. A combat patrol, of which Private First Class Tomm was a member, was forced to retire from its positions near San Manuel due to heavy enemy fire. Private First Class Tomm was one of the crew on a machine gun which laid down a base of fire to cover the withdrawal of the patrol across an open field. When the withdrawal had apparently been completed it was found that several wounded men had been left behind. Without regard for his personal safety, he voluntarily dashed across the open field for about seventy five yards and carried one of the wounded men back to safety. Private First Class Tomm's inspiring courage motivated several other soldiers to return to aid the wounded, all of whom were then quickly evacuated. Captain (then First Lieutenant) Cook, in command of an infantry company, was seriously wounded during a critical period of action. With complete disregard for his wound and own personal safety in the face of intense fire, he refused medical attention or evacuation and remained in an open and exposed position in order to direct the movements of his company. Captain Cook, through his superb leadership, undaunted courage, and unselfish devotion to duty, was able to maneuver his company into a position which enabled them to seize their objective. Throughout the entire engagement and until the time he was ordered to an aid station, Captain Cook displayed outstanding gallantry and sound tactical judgement which served as an inspiration to his entire command and was in accordance with the highest standards of military tradition. Sergeant JOHN J. GARCIA, (18000939), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 February 1945. When a squad of men from his company was pinned down and facing annihilation from two enemy machine guns and one 47mm gun, Sergeant Garcia realizing the precarious situation, dashed 100 yards across open terrain through heavy enemy fire to warn the exposed squad and remained with them to help cover a slow withdrawal to a position of safety. Throughout the following day he voluntarily made numerous trips across open terrain raked by enemy fire, to evacuate the many casualties suffered by the company and was seriously wounded the same day while directing the operations of his temporarily disorganized squad in the face of an attack by two enemy tanks. Sergeant Garcia's gallantry in action and utter disregard for personal safety in performing acts beyond his normal duties are exemplary of the highest military tradition and a credit to the military service. Badly shaken and in the face of great danger from small arms fire, he deliberately exposed himself with utter disregard for his own personal safety, to efficiently direct bazooka and small arms fire which resulted in the destruction of three enemy tanks and 15 enemy soldiers killed. OK I. RESCISSON OF GENERAL ORDERS: Section II, General Orders No. 85, this headquarters, dated 30 March 1945; pertaining to award of Silver Star Medal to Private First Class JAMES H. READ, (31358745), Infantry, United States Army, is rescinded.

II. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class DAMACIO P. ANDRADE, (18102840), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese Forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 27 January 1945. Private First Class Andrade, SCR 300 Radio operator, during a strong enemy armored and infantry counterattack which pinned down and threatened complete defeat of his unit, moved ahead of the front lines with an artillery forward observer to relay vital radio messages. Along his route of advance he was subjected to heavy mortar, machine gun and sniper fire which was causing heavy casualties to his company. Private First Class Andrade's gallant action and utter disregard for personal safety in performing acts above and beyond his normal duties, by transmitting clear and concise fire orders from an unavoidable exposed position until he was killed, contributed materially in stemming the enemy armored assault and are exemplary of the highest military traditions and a credit to the military service. First Sergeant CLAUDE F. BUNCE, (6580860), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. During an attack of an infantry company against three enemy medium tanks and an undetermined number of riflemen, one of the assault platoons having lost it's platoon leader became badly disorganized and scattered when one of the enemy tanks suddenly broke from cover and escaped through their lines. The leaderless platoon was so badly shaken that an orderly withdrawal could not be made. With total disregard for personal safety and in spite of all warnings of the executive officer, First Sergeant Bunce took charge of the platoon and repeatedly exposed himself to withering 47mm and machine gun fire and succeeded in rallying all of the platoon except one squad. In his attempt to withdraw the isolated squad, he was mortally wounded by a direct hit from an enemy shell, dying before aid could reach him. First Sergeant Bunce's gallant action and unselfish devotion to duty greatly inspired the men of his company throughout the remainder of the battle and was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. With utter disregard for personal safety, above the requirements of his duty as a rifleman, Private First Class Read rushed across fire swept open terrain and recovered the wounded man. Through his gallant action and undaunted courage he was responsible for saving a life, which reflected credit upon himself and was in accordance with the highest standards of the military service. Lieutenant Colonel BEVERLY A. ARMISTEAD, (0230440), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Jose, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 February 1945. When informed of enemy activity in the vicinity of his battalion area, Lieutenant Colonel Armistead organized and voluntarily led a patrol against the enemy. During the encounter, he displayed outstanding leadership and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, constantly exposed himself to enemy fire in order to control the movements of his patrol and observe those of the enemy. Lieutenant Colonel Armistead's gallant actions and sound tactical judgment in the elimination of the enemy infiltration unit greatly inspired the members of his command and all who witnessed his act. AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR

BRONZE STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec II, Bul 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Private First Class JOHN J. FERRENCE, (37664377), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement against the Japanese forces at Putian, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 14 March 1945. Private First Class Ferrence, member of a mortar platoon, supporting the advance of an infantry unit, was in a slit trench with another soldier while the platoon was under a heavy concentration of enemy artillery fire. A shell burst approximately 12 yards from their position causing the other soldier to become temporarily shocked, whereupon he endangered his life by trying to leave the trench. Private First Class Ferrence, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, caught him and lay upon his body in an attempt to shield and quiet him. As the shelling continued, a wounded Filipino dove into his trench. Once again he disregarded his personal safety and crawled 20 yards for first aid equipment and returned to aid the wounded man. I. SILVER STAR--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division to the following named officer and enlisted man:

First Lieutenant ROBERT A. HUDSON, JR., (01297041), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 February 1945 and 5 February 1945. During the attack against the town of Lupao, two platoons of an infantry company moving across a flat open field were suddenly pinned down by intense fire from enemy field pieces, one 77mm anti-tank gun, 6 machine guns, mortar and small arms fire when within 100 yards of the enemy position. Though given the order to withdraw, movement was impossible due to devastating enemy fire. First Lieutenant Hudson, realizing the precarious situation confronting the two platoons, deliberately exposed himself by standing up; disregarding personal safety and enemy fire, he courageously directed artillery and mortar fire, laying down an effective smoke screen enabling his platoons to withdraw to safety. On 5 February, the company attacked the enemy position once more over the same open ground and again were hampered by heavy machine gun fire. Moving to a position where he could observe the enemy guns, First Lieutenant Hudson again disregarded personal safety in order to direct artillery and mortar fire on the positions, and during the ensuing action was mortally wounded by concentrated enemy machine gun fire. First Lieutenant Hudson's gallant and courageous action, at the cost of his life, was a great inspiration to his company during the remainder of the battle and was in accordance with the highest standards of military tradition. Technician Fifth Grade FRIEDRICH H. PROMANN, (32301025), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 6 February 1945. When his company was pinned down on an open road by heavy 47mm and machine gun fire from 6 tanks, suffering heavy casualties Technician Fifth Grade Promann, company artificer, volunteered to accompany litter bearers to rescue the wounded who lay exposed to point-blank tank gun fire which covered the area. Disregarding personal safety and performing duties above and beyond that of his assigned position, Technician Fifth Grade Promann crawled out in front of enemy tanks four times, each time dragging back a wounded man to the shelter of a ditch where litter bearers could reach them. On his fifth attempt he was killed by an enemy 47mm shell. Technician Fifth Grade Promann's gallant actions and unselfish devotion to duty are exemplary of the highest military tradition and a credit to the military service. Staff Sergeant LUTHER H. KISER, (7082904), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February, 5 February and 3 February 1945. Staff Sergeant Kiser, (then Private First Class), rifleman in an infantry platoon during heavy enemy action which pinned down his entire platoon in an open rice field 50 yards from enemy defenses, displayed outstanding leadership and sound tactical judgement by taking command of his squad when both squad and assistant squad leaders became casualties. In the face of grave danger and disregard for personal safety, Staff Sergeant Kiser moved to a position where he could direct mortar and machine gun fire upon enemy positions, thus eliminating them with effective fire. The positions being eliminated, he reorganized his leaderless squad and with an automatic rifle, covered their withdrawal to safety through enemy rifle fire. The following day when his platoon was ordered to cover the withdrawal of another company, he deliberately exposed himself in front of our lines and shouted orders to the pinned down men, thereby bringing enemy fire to bear on himself and allowing them to withdraw safely. During this action, he discovered the position of an enemy tank and remained in his precarious position to direct M-7 fire upon it until the tank was hit and withdrew. On 8 February 1945, when an enemy counterattack led by 3 tanks and supporting riflemen attempted to break through the thin perimeter manned by his platoon, Staff Sergeant Kiser held his position though seriously wounded, until ordered to an aid station by his platoon leader. Staff Sergeant Kiser's repeated gallantry and disregard for personal safety was instrumental in aiding his company to repulse and defeat the enemy garrison at Lupao. Home Address: Mr. Luther S. Corporal LEWIS W. LeGRAND, JR., (33256717), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. During a fierce enemy counterattack on an infantry company, in which every available man and weapon was needed to meet the demands of the situation, Corporal LeGrand, an artillery clerk, volunteered to operate an unmanned rocket launcher, a weapon with which he was entirely unfamiliar. He took position in the local security for a 37mm gun and in the ensuing fight aided in knocking out an attacking enemy tank. Corporal LeGrand's willingness to man this weapon and his voluntary participation as a rifleman, both of which were above and beyond the normal province of his duty, aided in repelling the enemy attack and served as a great inspiration to all who witnessed his actions. Private First Class GEORGE L. SOUTHERD, (7030063), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 March 1945. While attacking a heavily defended Japanese position, consisting of well emplaced machine guns and dug-in riflemen; three members of an infantry company caught in the combined fire of enemy weapons were pinned down, making all attempts of rescue impossible. Sensing the precarious situation which confronted these men, Private First Class Southard, with disregard for personal safety, stood erect in full view of the enemy and fired his automatic rifle into their position until withdrawal was successfully completed. Private First Class Southard's gallant action above and beyond that of his normal position is exemplary of the highest military tradition and a credit to the military service. Technician Third Grade EDWARD F. WITBRODT, (6916215), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Pinangatalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 February 1945. Technician Third Grade Witbrodt, aid man to a group reinforcing a security patrol who had contacted an undetermined number of enemy troops, was summoned to aid three men who had been wounded. One of the wounded lay in an exposed position 150 yards away in an open rice paddy which was constantly being swept by enemy rifle and machine gun fire. Completely aware of the dangers involved, Technician Third Grade Witbrodt displayed superior courage by disregarding personal safety in traversing the open terrain under intense enemy fire to reach the wounded man to administer direfully needed medical aid. Unable to save this man's life, he returned across the same route to his former location to attend two more wounded men. Technician Third Grade Witbrodt's valiant and courageous actions and devotion to duty reflected credit upon himself and the Medical Department of the United States Army. direct hit from an enemy tank which also inflicted heavy casualties among the crew forcing them all to abandon it. With utter disregard for personal safety, Private First Class Brown elected to remain with the mount and deliberately exposed himself to enemy fire by attempting to back it to safety at the same time warding off the Japanese tank with a .50 caliber machine gun until he ran out of ammunition. Two more shells hit the mount wounding Private First Class Brown and forcing him to abandon it, but in a position where another crewman moved it to safety. I. ANNOUNCEMENT OF DIVISION STAFF OFFICERS: Extracted.

II. SILVER STAR:--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class EARL M. BALLARD, (16041142), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near San Jose, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 10 February 1945 and near Lumboy, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 27 February 1945. Private First Class Ballard, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, while under intense fire of enemy mortars, machine guns and rifles, remained by his mortar, in an open position, and continuously fired on the enemy for a period of three hours. Although injured by fragments of a mortar shell which landed about 10 yards from his position, wounding several men of his section, Private First Class Ballard continued to fire with greater effort. When his ammunition ran low he made his way to a road, while under intense enemy fire, and returned with ammunition. On 27 February 1945, Private First Class Ballard voluntarily accompanied an attacking company, as forward observer on an extremely hazardous mission near Lumboy. Again he disregarded personal safety by continuously exposing himself to heavy fire in order to direct mortar fire on enemy positions. During this engagement he was killed by an enemy rifleman. Private First Class Ballard's gallant actions and outstanding devotion above and beyond the call of duty, his coolness under fire, and his superb leadership aided immeasurably in the success of his unit. Staff Sergeant AUSTIN D. BRYANT, (20932435), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 22 January 1945. Staff Sergeant Bryant, in charge of a patrol of Intelligence and Reconnaissance men and six guerrillas, had successfully completed a mission reconnoitering the rear of a company attacking a ridge. Returning down the ridge to their base camp, they encountered an enemy ambush, through which they fought to reach the Arberedo River. There they met a supply train going up the ridge and several casualties heading to the rear. Here Staff Sergeant Bryant assigned part of his patrol to protect the returning casualties and disregarding dangers involved, volunteered to lead the supply train up the ridge. Halfway up the trail another aid party with litter cases was met, and at the same time both parties were fired on by the enemy mortars, machine guns and rifles. At this point Staff Sergeant Bryant disregarding personal safety, led the attack downhill in order to evacuate the wounded and during the firefight he and his small patrol accounted for 1 enemy officer and three enemy soldiers killed. Through his aggressiveness, courageous leadership and gallant action, all casualties and relief

parties reached their destinations safely. Staff Sergeant Bryant was killed in a subsequent engagement against the enemy. Next of Kin: Mr. Edell R. Bryant, (Brother) 160 W. 12th Street, Coquille, Oregon.

Private First Class DANIE CHAVEZ, (39156274), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 1, January 1945. Private First Class Chavez, assistant squad leader with the mission of protecting a portion of the left flank of his companies advance on San Manuel, was forced to operate in full view of the powerful enemy garrison. During the ensuing action two members of his squad were killed and one seriously wounded when investigating a native shack held under full view of an enemy observation post. Although warned against attempting to evacuate the wounded man, Private First Class Chavez fearlessly exposed himself to continued enemy shelling and started to carry the wounded man to safety when both were hit by an enemy 81mm mortar shell and killed instantly. Private First Class Chavez' voluntary and gallant act above and beyond the province of his assigned responsibilities, reflected credit upon himself and was in keeping with the highest standards of military tradition. Private First Class JACK B. COHN, (32923274), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Putlan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 16 March 1945. During operations to reduce a heavily armed pocket of resistance, Private First Class Cohn was serving as a rifleman in a combat patrol advancing against the enemy located in a steep sided, heavily wooded draw. The enemy cleverly entrenched in approximately 11 supporting pill-boxes denied two regiments the use of a vital supply route. The attack on the position resulted in the destruction of two pill-boxes and five additional located. Due to the positions of the enemy fortresses, the platoon leader ordered the patrol to advance. At this point Private First Class Cohn volunteered to take position as lead scout and for a distance of 50 yards he led the way by destroying three pill-boxes by grenades. Upon encountering the fourth he was killed by enemy gunners, but paved the way for the rest of the platoon to over-run the remaining enemy positions. Through his undaunted courage, voluntary and daring actions, Private First Class Cohn contributed materially in the reduction of a well defended strongpoint, thus opening a vital supply route for use by attacking regiments. Private McGuire, ammunition bearer, volunteered to accompany a combat reconnaissance patrol, seeking to gain a foothold in San Manuel, in order to lay wire for an 81mm mortar observation post. When the patrol reached the outskirts of the village it was ambushed by machine gun and rifle fire from at least two machine guns and a platoon of riflemen. The patrol was pinned to the ground making maneuver impossible, but finally withdrew under cover of an 81mm mortar.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Technician Fourth Grade CARL L. BUNN, (15012331), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Binalonan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 17 January 1945. Technician Fourth Grade Bunn, member of the battalion commander's communication section during a sudden enemy attack from the rear, realizing the necessity for radio communication left his covered position and returned to his vehicle which was exposed to heavy tank fire. With utter disregard for his own personal safety, Technician Fourth Grade Bunn continued to send vital information to friendly artillery when he was mortally wounded by a shell exploding over his vehicle, which also burst his gasoline tank, showering him with burning gas. Unable to seek adequate cover or medical attention because of his wounds, he continued to send messages until he died at his radio. The outstanding gallantry, fearless action and devotion above and beyond the call of duty and at the cost of his life are exemplary of the highest military traditions and a credit to the military service. Staff Sergeant LEON E. HOBBY, (14028346), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 23 January 1945. A reconnaissance patrol of which Staff Sergeant Hobby was a member, attempted to gain vital information concerning the powerful enemy garrison and establish a foothold on the town of San Manuel. When the patrol reached the outskirts of the village it was ambushed by machine gun and rifle fire from at least two machine guns and a platoon of riflemen. The patrol was pinned to the ground making maneuver impossible, but finally withdrew under cover of an 81mm mortar barrage. Staff Sergeant Hobby noticing an officer who had been wounded and lay helpless, volunteered with three others to evacuate him by improvising a litter, and disregarding personal safety helped carry it across 75 yards of open ground covered by intense enemy fire. Twenty yards from cover a machine gun raked the entire party wounding the officer once again, killing one litter bearer and mortally wounding Staff Sergeant Hobby who continued to carry the officer to safety. Staff Sergeant Hobby died 10 minutes later. The gallant and voluntary act of Staff Sergeant Hobby in performing duties above and beyond those of his regularly assigned position by going to the aid of a wounded officer, was a great inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and a credit to the military service. Sergeant JOHN A. PEPPER, (18109337), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. During an attack of an infantry company against three enemy tanks and an undetermined number of riflemen, one of the assault platoons, having lost its leader, became badly disorganized when one of the enemy tanks suddenly broke from cover and escaped through their lines. In an attempt to reorganize them, the company First Sergeant was mortally wounded and lay exposed to machine gun fire continuously spraying the area. Fully cognizant of the dangers involved and with disregard for personal safety, Sergeant Pepper without hesitation left his place of safety and crawled 25 yards across open rice paddies to the wounded man's side and while attempting to drag him to cover was killed by a direct hit from a 47mm shell. Sergeant Pepper's gallant action and unselfish devotion to duty greatly inspired all who witnessed his act and was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. While acting as Liaison officer with an infantry battalion Captain Baker went forward to a leading assault company prior to an attack on a heavily defended hill. At this time the leading elements of the company were pinned down in an exposed position by enemy mortars, machine guns and rifle fire. The forthcoming artillery assault necessitated extremely close-in support for which Captain Baker voluntarily moved to the most forward position, disregarding personal safety in order to deliver the most effective fire possible. When the first salvo of the artillery battalion concentration was fired, one battery fell short among friendly troops. This disrupted Captain Baker's communications and badly shook him, but he immediately exposed himself to enemy fire and subsequent short artillery rounds and ran to his radio to adjust the short battery and then continued to deliver effective fire on the enemy. Captain Baker's gallant actions, quick thinking and coolness under extenuating circumstances, minimized the extent of casualties and contributed greatly to the success of the battalion's attack. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918) a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Private First Class CHARLES L. CLARK, (39621456), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 March 1945. In an attempt to dislodge the enemy consisting of six machine guns and a platoon of well dug-in and camouflaged riflemen from a heavily defended knoll a platoon was pinned to the ground by enemy fire wounding a non-commissioned officer. Private First Class Clark, on his own initiative and with complete disregard for personal safety, while in full view and under direct enemy fire, crawled approximately 30 yards in an attempt to rescue the wounded man. During his advance bullets grazed his pack and head but he continued till wounded in the body. Although not able to rescue the wounded man, Private First Class Clark's gallant actions, above and beyond the call of duty, greatly inspired all who observed it and was in keeping with the highest standards of military tradition. On 15 March while on a direct fire mission with infantry troops, the enemy opened fire from a well concealed flank position and wounded three men in a nearby M-7 mount. Lying exposed to fire, one man was more seriously wounded and was finally carried to protection behind a bulldozer where Lieutenant Davis was shielding himself. Displaying exceptional courage after being wounded himself, Lieutenant Davis placed his body in a position to shield the wounded man from sniper fire and with the aid of another officer succeeded in carrying him across 100 yards of open terrain to safety. The gallant and courageous act of First Lieutenant Davis reflected credit upon himself and was in keeping with the highest military tradition and a credit to the military service. Technician Fifth Grade J. B. DOLSON, (34185788), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 February 1945. During the initial attack on the town of

Lupao, Technician Fifth Grade Dodson, aid man attached to a machine gun platoon, was called forward to attend to the wounded. The companies being pinned down in open rice fields by 47mm, mortar and machine gun fire made it necessary for Technician Fifth Grade Dodson to work entirely exposed, during which time shrapnel pierced his clothing several times and seriously wounded him in the arm. With great courage and disregarding further dangers involved, he stopped long enough to bandage his own wound then returned to aid the others and remained with them until all had been evacuated to safety. The fearless actions and coolness under fire displayed by Technician Fifth Grade Dodson greatly inspired the nearby assaulting infantrymen, reflecting credit upon himself and the Medical Department of the United States Army. Second Lieutenant JOSH M. DRAKE, T.R., (01319268), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lubao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 6 February 1945. When a bazooka gunner from his platoon was wounded while attempting to destroy a well camouflaged enemy tank, Second Lieutenant Drake, seeing that aidmen could not reach him without endangering their lives, disregarded his own personal safety and dashed 30 yards directly through the lane of tank fire and carried the wounded man to safety. Taking two phosphorous grenades, he then crawled through intense enemy fire to a point 10 yards from the tank and marked its location for our tanks which succeeded in destroying it. Later the same day when a wounded man lay exposed on an open road, Second Lieutenant Drake, without hesitation and once again disregarding personal safety and dangers involved, went to his aid and began to carry him to safety when a burst of a 47mm shell blew off his left hand, three fingers from his right and seriously wounding him in the leg. In spite of his terrible wounds he succeeded in getting the wounded man to safety. Second Lieutenant Drake's undaunted courage and outstanding gallantry in performing duties above and beyond those of his assigned position was a great inspiration to his entire company and are exemplary of the highest military tradition and a credit to the military service. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918) a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant ROBERT A. EDENFIELD, (01288877), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, from 5 February 1945 to 8 February 1945. First Lieutenant Edenfield, company commander of an infantry company, was given the mission of relieving Company 600 and continuing the assault on strong enemy positions at the town of Lupao. On 6 February he led his attacking force against well organized and dug-in enemy tank and machine gun emplacements which were covered by heavily armed supporting troops. Although his company suffered severe casualties among officers and enlisted men, First Lieutenant Edenfield continued to press the attack, repeatedly exposing himself to intense enemy fire in order to successfully maneuver his badly depleted company against the enemy and complete his mission. At 1000 hours, 6 February 1945, his company reached its objective after having destroyed three enemy tanks, 6 machine guns, three 47mm guns and 200 enemy soldiers. The success of Company 600 against the fanatical resistance of the Japanese forces was due to the outstanding leadership, sound tactical judgment and gallantry displayed by First Lieutenant Edenfield and was exemplary of the highest traditions of the military service. Staff Sergeant CHARLES R. TOLIN, (39156425), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near San Isidro, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 6 February 1945. Staff Sergeant Tolin's platoon with the mission of securing high ground in order to protect the right flank of an attacking battalion, was pinned to the ground from three sides by enemy machine gun, mortar and 47mm gun and sniper fire when attempting to reach the summit of a hill. Due to the intensity of the fire, it was impossible for the platoon to dig in. Realizing the possibility of defeat and annihilation, Staff Sergeant Tolin voluntarily and with disregard for personal safety, moved through an area which afforded no cover

or com pliment and advanced in the face of enemy fire, destroying a machine gun nest he accounted for 6 enemy killed. For three hours he covered the platoon's flank allowing them to dig in. Staff Sergeant Tolin's gallant act, undaunted courage and fearless devotion to duty above and beyond that of his assigned position, enabled his platoon to retain a foothold on a strategic position and minimized the extent of casualties. While in this position he was attacked by an enemy machine gun and was hit four times. Although painfully wounded, he disregarded personal safety, returned to his gun and thwarted all attempts of an enemy attack on his battery position. The courageous act of Private First Class Wanderer greatly inspired all members of his organization and was in keeping with the highest standards of military tradition. Staff Sergeant MURUS V. COX, (38076986), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near San Jose, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 10 February 1945. Staff Sergeant Cox, squad leader of a mortar section in support of a rifle platoon advancing against strong enemy positions was forced into flooded ground which made it impossible for his men to dig in, thus exposing them to intense enemy fire. Noticing the dangerous situation which faced his section, Staff Sergeant Cox rallied his men and laid down a terrific mortar barrage against the enemy which would normally require a platoon of mortars. During the engagement, enemy shells landed approximately 10 yards from their position wounding him and 11 others in his section. With utter disregard for personal safety, Staff Sergeant Cox remained in his vulnerable position and continued to fire on the enemy positions. The superb leadership, courage, coolness under fire and devotion to duty displayed by Staff Sergeant Cox inspired the men of his section to fight with greater effort against the determined enemy. Technician Fourth Grade FRANCIS W. On a very dark moonless night and in enemy territory reconnoitered only by a small reconnaissance patrol, Technician Fourth Grade Dalton operating a D-7 dozer started and completed a 3 mile road, making

possible the installation of an important and necessary block between San Quintin and Umingan which cut the northern evacuation route of the Japanese forces from Umingan.. Although informed of the extreme dangers involved, he insisted on operating the dozer unaided. Technician Fourth Grade Dalton's courage, coolness and devotion to duty greatly inspired all who witnessed his act which reflected credit upon himself and the military service. Private First Class JOSEPH DUDZENSKI, (37702481), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 23 January 1945. Private First Class Dudzenaki, automatic rifleman, operating with a small combat patrol charged with the mission of covering the evacuation of several wounded, aggressively and voluntarily advanced 100 yards ahead of his group in the face of grazing enemy small arms fire to a point offering the best observation. When a considerable proportion of other weapons were forced to withdraw due to lack of ammunition, he continued practically single handed to cover the litter bearers operating to his rear, and in the face of grave danger maintained his position until all wounded had been removed to safety. Private First Class Dudzenaki's actions were an inspiration to all who observed, and a credit to the military service. Staff Sergeant ROBERT G. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec II, Bul 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Sergeant WENDELL L. HARDISON, (11014471), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. During the attack on the town of Lupao, two platoons of an infantry company were pinned down by three concealed tanks, machine guns and supporting riflemen. The platoon had suffered severe casualties but all attempts of evacuation were impossible. After three desperate attempts were made to rescue another wounded man who lay exposed beyond the other casualties, resulting in one man being killed and two seriously wounded, Sergeant Hardison with disregard for his own safety, left his covered position behind a dyke and moved forward through intense fire brought to bear on him, to aid the wounded man. While carrying him back, a burst from a 47mm shell once again hit the wounded man but Sergeant Hardison succeeded in dragging him to a point where medical aid could be given. The heroic actions and exceptional devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Hardison greatly inspired all the members of his organization. First Lieutenant HUGH S. LEWIS, (01304085), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement against the Japanese forces at San Isidro, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 6 February 1945. Pinned down on an intermediate objective by heavy enemy tank and machine gun fire during an attack on a hill northeast of San Isidro, First Lieutenant Lewis, after instructing his men to hold the captured ground, crawled to a position in full view of enemy machine gun and mortar fire to observe and direct artillery fire upon the enemy. The well directed artillery stopped an enemy tank and destroyed two machine gun positions which had caused severe casualties and threatened to over-run his position. Due to the excellent judgement and speedy action of First Lieutenant Lewis under hazardous conditions, his platoon was able to seize commanding ground and secured the flank which paved the way for an infantry battalion's successful attack and eventual capture of the town of San Isidro. Technical Sergeant LAWRENCE M. MOORE, (6921158), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 January 1945. Technical Sergeant (then Staff Sergeant) Moore, rifle squad leader during an attack on a powerful entrenched enemy occupying positions in cover of a deep sided irrigation ditch, realizing the precarious situation which confronted two men suddenly wounded and cut off by steady enemy mortar and heavy machine gun fire, disregarded dangers involved and moved forward to their assistance. Upon reaching them, he took an

automatic rifle and crawled to a position giving observation down the lane of enemy fire and engaged the concealed heavy machine gun. The extreme courage, bold and aggressive action of Technical Sergeant Moore, made possible the safe evacuation of the wounded men and the regrouping of riflemen from an untenable position. Technician Fifth Grade CHARLES P. As a member of a liaison party during an attack on strong enemy positions, Technician Fifth Grade Moran, disregarding personal safety volunteered to install and service communication lines that were constantly being disrupted through action of the engaged forces. With great courage he worked unceasingly in places exposed to heavy enemy fire from all types of weapons to maintain communications which aided materially in the destruction of the enemy. Technical Sergeant WILLIAM F. After three days of heavy fighting against the determined enemy garrison, the #¹¹ Infantry found itself faced with an all out enemy armored counter-attack which struck the front line in the center of town. The intense and steady fighting against 20 assaulting tanks and supporting infantrymen necessitated a constant and extensive supply of ammunition. Staff Sergeant Moyle, ammunition and pioneer sergeant, located in a position near the battalion ammunition dump which was without defilade from enemy fire because of the flat terrain and approximately 300 yards from the front line, disregarded the safety of his foxhole and moved about organizing and maintaining a steady flow of ammunition to the front. During this time he worked unceasingly and of necessity without the security of his weapon and although wounded, continued to work fearlessly throughout the night. The outstanding leadership and energetic actions of Staff Sergeant Moyle were a valuable contribution in the routing of the Japanese counter-attack and ultimate securing of the town of San Manuel. SILVER STAR (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER)--Posthumous Award

By direction of the President, in addition to the Silver Star awarded to First Lieutenant Lawrence H. King, (0411854), as published in General Orders No. 47, Headquarters USAFISPA, 22 February 1943, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is posthumously awarded to him by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918).

First Lieutenant LAWRENCE H. KING, (0411854), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Umingan and Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 31 January 1945 and 1 February 1945. On the afternoon of 31 January 1945, the First Battalion, 606 Infantry, was assigned the mission of making a forced march from Caridad to the vicinity of Masili-Sil and there set up a road block on the main supply road from Umingan to San Jose, both of which were held by strong enemy forces. There was no information possible on routes for the march, and no time to make an extended reconnaissance. First Lieutenant King, Battalion 2-2, personally assumed the task of locating a route across the difficult and trackless terrain. He worked entirely at night while continually being hampered by numerous enemy patrols, successfully selected a marked route which enabled his battalion to cover the sixteen miles to its objective without being detected. The following morning although fatigued by his night's operation, he voluntarily led a patrol toward Umingan in order to secure information as to enemy positions and during a fire-fight against an enemy patrol he accounted for one of the enemy dead. Later the same day he once again disregarded personal safety by volunteering to lead a patrol south toward Lupao to verify Japanese tank activity. After successfully working their way through the town, the patrol was fired upon by a concealed machine gun which mortally wounded First Lieutenant King who ordered his men to leave him and seek safety. The gallant actions and devotion to duty displayed by First Lieutenant King was a priceless example and inspiration to the entire battalion during the forthcoming battles for Luzon, Umingan. Islands, on 6 February 1945. Private First Class Hall, machine gunner supporting a rifle platoon establishing a strong point on a bull-dozer road which had bypassed a strong enemy position, displayed outstanding gallantry and devotion to duty during an attempted enemy break-through, spearheaded by eight Japanese tanks and supporting riflemen. During the fierce encounter in which three tanks were destroyed, the platoon leader seeing the supply of anti-tank ammunition exhausted, ordered a withdrawal. Private First Class Hall volunteered to stay behind and cover the withdrawal, which he did successfully. When his ammunition was exhausted, he destroyed his gun, leaving it useless to the advancing enemy, and attempted to infiltrate through the enemy which had completely encircled him. Private First Class Hall was killed in the attempt by enemy machine gun fire; the outstanding gallantry, fearless action and devotion above and beyond the call of duty at the cost of his life are exemplary of the highest military traditions and a credit to the military service. Staff Sergeant RICHARD L. JONES, (6953917), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 5 February 1945. While reconnoitering a heavily wooded deep draw on the left flank of an infantry company during the attack on the town of Lupao, one platoon with a machine gun section attached led the advance and was met by devastating machine gun and small arms fire supported by 47mm fire from three enemy tanks. During the action a scout was seriously wounded and repeated attempts to aid him had failed due to the heavy fire. Staff Sergeant Jones, machine gun section leader, seeing ten Japanese riflemen converging on the wounded man, borrowed an automatic rifle and crawled twenty-five yards through open ground to the side of the wounded man with bullets spattering around ~~around~~ him. With his automatic weapon he tried to engage the enemy single handedly and at the same time drag his comrade to safety. After being wounded several times he fearlessly continued his attempts of rescue until he was killed by a burst of machine gun fire. The gallant actions and unselfish devotion to duty performed by Staff Sergeant Jones at the cost of his life are exemplary of the highest military traditions and a credit to the military service. SOLDIER'S MEDAL--Award

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 2 July 1926 (Bul 8, WD, 1926), a Soldier's medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Sergeant CHESTER SMITH, (39011086), Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for heroism near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 8 April 1945. While driving up a forty-five degree grade mountain supply road, the brakes of his two and one-half ton truck became inoperable. Realizing that there were about ten civilians on the narrow road behind him, who undoubtedly would have been killed or seriously injured by a run-away truck, Sergeant Smith elected to remain at the wheel of the vehicle which he could have abandoned and jumped to safety, and successfully guided it past the persons, bringing the truck to a halt by backing sharply into the cliff and turning it over on the side of the road. Since there was a five hundred foot drop on the other side of the road, he narrowly escaped certain death by his quick decision and cool thinking. His devotion to duty in the protection of his equipment and respect for the lives of others at the risk of his own, reflects the highest standards of the military service, and are a tribute to Sergeant Smith. Sergeant WOODWARD BELL, (14042584), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Lumboy, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 20 January 1945. During an attack on Japanese hill positions near Lumboy, a platoon of infantry forced to cross a deep ravine choked with jungle growth, were ambushed by the enemy armed with two light machine guns, eight heavy machine guns, two knee mortars and supporting riflemen and pinned down in the thick undergrowth making observation and maneuver impossible. Sergeant Bell, assistant squad leader, realizing the situation which confronted the platoon, although wounded, disregarded his personal safety and moved forward to a position which afforded better observation and engaged the enemy single handedly, thereby diverting enemy fire upon himself and deliberately presented them a target for fire until the rest of his platoon withdrew to safety. Sergeant Bell's gallantry and utter disregard for safety in the face of intense enemy fire was exemplary of the highest standards of military tradition and a credit to the military service. Sergeant JOHN R. CROCKS, (33736179), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Lumboy, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 20 February 1945. During an attack on a Japanese position on a hill near Lumboy, a platoon of infantry, forced to cross a deep ravine choked with jungle growth, were ambushed by the enemy armed with two light machine guns, two heavy machine guns, two knee mortars and supporting riflemen and pinned down in the thick undergrowth making observation and maneuver impossible. Sergeant (then Private First Class) Crocks a rifleman, realizing the situation which confronted the platoon, although wounded in the head, disregarded personal safety and moved forward to a position which afforded better observation and engaged the enemy single handedly, thereby diverting enemy fire to himself and deliberately presented them a target for fire until the rest of the platoon withdrew to safety. Sergeant Crocks' gallantry and utter disregard for safety in the face of intense enemy fire was exemplary of the highest standards of military tradition and a credit to the military service. Private First Class CURTIS L. EKSTROM, (39340166), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Pantabangan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 26 February 1945. Private First Class Ekstrom, aid man attached to the Regimental Reconnaissance Platoon during an attack on an enemy road block, seeing the aid man of Company 300 cut down by intense enemy fire while attempting to reach four wounded men lying on a grassy ridge in full view of a strong enemy position located on the opposite ridge, voluntarily left his position to go to their aid. Disregarding the dangers involved he crawled 50 yards in the face of concentrated enemy fire brought to bear upon him, and calmly administered first aid and remained at the side of the wounded men until evacuation to safety was possible. The fearless actions and coolness under fire displayed by Private First Class Ekstrom reflected credit upon himself and the medical Department of the United States Army. *Staff Sergeant CHESTER F. GRAFF, (37567676), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. After three days of fighting against the determined enemy garrison at San Manuel, Company E, 300 Infantry located in a vulnerable salient near the center of town, found itself faced with an all out enemy armored counter-attack employing about 20 tanks and 100 supporting riflemen. Although his platoon was forced to withdraw to a more tenable position, Staff Sergeant Graff elected to stand fast and fight beside an anti-tank rifle grenadier whose position was later surrounded. Through his utter disregard for personal safety by protecting him with rifle fire and hand grenades, the grenadier was able to destroy two enemy tanks and kill three accompanying riflemen. The voluntary and courageous action of Staff Sergeant Graff in the face of machine gun and 47mm gun fire from assaulting tanks, contributed materially in slowing down the enemy counter-attack sufficiently to give rear elements time to regroup and successfully crush the entire assault. SILVER STAR--Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant ROBERT R. HOLMES, (39607702), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 January 1945. When his company's foothold on the stronghold of San Manuel was seriously threatened by a strong enemy tank and infantry counter-attack which caused considerable disorganization due to heavy casualties, Staff Sergeant Holmes, directing mortar fire on spotted centers of resistance, seeing a critically located machine gun whose crew had been knocked out, immediately took over the weapon and engaged the approaching enemy infantry in the face of heavy assault fire single handedly. After appointing a new machine gun crew and reorganizing his platoon for the night, his position was once again attacked by an enemy tank which he destroyed with bazooka fire. The gallant actions, extreme courage and outstanding leadership displayed by Staff Sergeant Holmes when his company was threatened with defeat was an important factor in maintaining the vital foothold on the town. Technical Sergeant CHARLES H. LA RIVIERE, (20943971), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 23 January 1945. A reinforced patrol of which Technical Sergeant La Riviere volunteered to accompany as an observer for an 81mm mortar section, attempted to gain vital information concerning the powerful enemy garrison and establish a foothold on the town of San Manuel. When the patrol reached the outskirts of the village, it was ambushed by machine gun and rifle fire from at least two machine guns and a platoon of infantry and pinned down making maneuver impossible. Technical Sergeant La Riviere, realizing the situation which confronted the patrol, exposed himself to destructive enemy fire and crawled within 30 yards of the enemy, laying communication wire as he went and directed 200 rounds of mortar fire in rapid succession on the enemy, pinning them to the ground thus enabling his patrol to withdraw with their casualties. As the withdrawal continued he directed 300 more rounds on the enemy, inflicting heavy casualties upon them which was later learned through captured enemy documents. Technical Sergeant La Riviere's voluntary and courageous actions and coolness under fire, though hampered by limited observation and forced to completely expose himself in order to direct accurate and effective fire on the enemy, was an important factor in enabling the patrol to return with information vital for the proposed attack on the town by our forces. Staff Sergeant WILLIAM B. NETTLES, (34214563), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 12 April 1945. Staff Sergeant Nettles, squad leader of a platoon attacking an enemy road block, seeing his lead scout caught in the lane of enemy machine

gun cross fire and fall seriously wounded, with utter disregard for personal safety while in full view and under direct enemy fire, crawled 25 yards along a road to the side of the wounded man, administered first aid and dragged him to a position of safety. The daring and courageous act of Staff Sergeant Nettles was responsible for saving the limb of the wounded man and was in keeping with the highest standards of military tradition and a credit to the military service. Technician Fifth Grade JOHN R. MICICH, (42002622), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Binalonan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 17 and 18 January 1945. During an enemy counter-attack at dusk after the swift occupation of the town of Binalonan, Technician Fifth Grade Micich, company aid man, after establishing first aid facilities in a covered pill box, risked his life through scattered enemy tank and deliberate converging sniper fire in an open street intersection to drag a seriously wounded 225 pound casualty to safety. Later in the evening when an enemy mortar shell made a direct hit on a group of vehicles near his aid station wounding seven more men, he quickly and efficiently administered first aid and placed them in a position of safety and of necessity dressed each of the wounded separately in the open street where light was sufficient to accomplish his tasks, disregarding sniper fire which hit the dirt around him as he worked. Technician Fifth Grade Micich's fearless and courageous actions and devotion above and beyond the call of duty, was responsible for the successful treatment and evacuation of nine wounded which reflected great credit upon himself and the Medical Department of the United States Army. Corporal LAWRENCE L. WELCH, (38224383), Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 27 and 28 January 1945. Corporal Welch, member of a forward observers party during a desperate enemy counter-attack, volunteered to repair and replace damaged telephone line between a deployed infantry company and the artillery liaison observer at the infantry command post. Despite the heavy enemy tank, mortar, machine gun and rifle fire and the close proximity of friendly artillery, he worked unceasingly in exposed positions in order to maintain communications which aided materially in halting the enemy counter-attack. The gallant actions of Corporal Welch were a great inspiration to all who observed them and was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. WUCHER, (32004600), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. When a strong enemy counter-attack of 12 tanks, supported by assaulting infantrymen, grazing machine gun fire and mortar barrages had caused a serious shortage of ammunition at several company outposts, Technician Fifth Grade Wucher, radio operator, realizing the desperate situation, volunteered to serve as an ammunition bearer. For several hours he repeatedly carried ammunition across 300 yards of flat terrain covered with burning rubble and across straight open streets paralleling the direction of rapid machine gun and 47mm fire. Technician Fifth Grade Wucher's courageous actions and disregard for personal safety were instrumental in aiding his battalion to repulse and destroy the attacking force. WALTER, (18043829), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. The assault platoon of which Private First Class Walter, a bazooka gunner, was a member, having been pinned down for several hours, was suddenly attacked by an enemy medium tank and 10 supporting riflemen, throwing the platoon into confusion and temporary disorganization. Although he had only one round left in his rocket launcher, the remainder of which were destroyed through enemy action, Private First Class Walters courageously remained in his position until the tank was within 30 yards, at which time he made a direct hit setting it on fire. The courageous and unflinching actions of Private First Class Walters saved his platoon from suffering many casualties and greatly inspired them to rally and kill the crew and supporting riflemen.
