Learning that a number of wounded men were lying in an exposed position subject to intense and accurate sniper and automatic weapons fire, Technician Fourth Grade PLANEY, with disregard for his own personal safety, volunteered to lead his litter squad in an attempt to reach and evacuate the wounded. Leading the squad to the side of the wounded men, he administered first aid and directed the preparation of the wounded for evacuation. On the return trip, the squad was brought under sniper fire, but carried on in spite of it. In carrying the patients through this accurate sniper fire, two more men were wounded, but the casualties were brought to the safety of the Aid Station. Technician Fourth Grade PLANEY's heroic actions and devotion to duty, above and beyond the call of duty, were an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Technician Fourth Grade RICHARDS continued to drive until two enemy tanks, three machine guns and a field piece were knocked out. This aggressive and timely action was done in the face of sporadic 47mm and machine gun fire from revetted tanks and the deliberately aimed fire of rifles and mortars. Results of fire from his mount, which virtually closed with an emplaced fortress, permitted an infantry company to advance to more tenable positions. Technician Fourth Grade RICHARDS' heroic actions and devotion to duty were an inspiration to the assaulting infantry and played a paramount part in the eventual victory over the enemy in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, (Bul 43, D. 1918), the Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

First Sergeant (then Technical Sergeant) LEO O. MAHEUX, 11014654, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Rosaldo, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 10 February 1945. A patrol of which First Sergeant MAHEUX was a member was given the mission of reconnoitering a hill. As they approached their objective, they were sighted and fired upon by a large force of the enemy which pinned them to the ground. Although he was in full view of the enemy from his advantageous position on the high ground of the objective hill, and receiving heavy enemy fire from both front and flank, First Sergeant MAHEUX, with complete disregard to his own personal safety, maneuvered through the lines of enemy fire to a point overlooking an advancing enemy column. With remarkable coolness and accuracy he maintained a withering fire of such proportion that it broke the advance of the enemy, causing them to scatter in all directions. First Sergeant MAHEUX's gallant actions aided materially in the subsequent attack upon the objective as well as reflecting credit on himself and the military service. Sergeant (then Private First Class) RICHARD M. A platoon of which Sergeant WERNER was a B.R man was pinned down by 47mm and machine gun fire so intense that it caused many casualties to his platoon. With complete disregard for his own personal safety he crawled across 25 yards of open ground under intense fire to bring a wounded scout to safety. Locating another wounded soldier about 35 yards away lying directly in the line of fire of an enemy tank, he again advanced beyond the front lines and dragged him to safety. Although an ever increasing volume of enemy fire was being concentrated on any moving object, he then guided litter bearers to several other wounded soldiers he had located. Sergeant WERNER's gallant actions, above and beyond the call of duty, were instrumental in saving the lives of several wounded soldiers and were an inspiration to all who observed him. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR (Posthumous).-- By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, (Bul 3, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Private GILBERT WOLFF, 32953799, Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Laete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 22 March 1945. In spite of the fact that a previous attempt to reach four seriously wounded men, whom the enemy had ambushed well within their lines, had failed, Private WOLFF, company aid-man, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, crawled forward 90 yards through the dense jungle to where the men lay. Three days later when the company had finally succeeded in eliminating the enemy strong points and had reached the ridge line where the men had been ambushed, it was found that Private WOLFF had succeeded in dragging all four men into a bomb crater and had attended their wounds. He was bandaging the wounds of the last man when he was hit by sniper fire and killed. Private WOLFF's gallant actions and devotion to duty in the face of certain death were an inspiration to all and reflected credit on himself and the military service. First Lieutenant RUSSELL L. CHRISTENSEN, 01307197, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Santa Maria, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 25 January 1945. As leader of a patrol sent out to destroy an enemy unit advancing upon the town, First Lieutenant CHRISTENSEN organized and led an attack which routed an enemy force of superior numbers with heavy casualties. As he was leading his men toward the enemy position, he was shot through the right arm, and, although his arm was rendered useless to him at the time, he continued to lead his men in the assault. As a result of this action, the success of which was directly attributable to First Lieutenant CHRISTENSEN's actions, a strong enemy patrol was stopped and the town of Santa Maria was saved from possible enemy attack. First Lieutenant CHRISTENSEN's gallant actions were an inspiration to his men reflecting credit upon himself and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Private First Class CHARLES D. HOLSINGER, 1617633, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Maringalu, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 28 February 1945. During a night attack upon his company's

positions, the enemy infiltrated into the six-man strongpoint of which Private First Class HOLSINGER was a member. After killing two men, wounding one, and forcing one to withdraw, the enemy occupied the four positions to his left and concentrated rifle fire and grenades upon him. Although he was now alone, with no thought of retreat he coolly returned fire and directed assault mortar fire on the enemy not more than 5 yards from his position. He held his position for one hour until joined by another soldier carrying hand grenades. At dawn, he assisted in clearing the enemy from the positions they had taken. Private First Class HOLSINGER's gallant actions in the face of grave danger, which limited the enemy's infiltration and enabled his platoon to hold its ground, were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Sergeant JOHN D. MACK, 32972314, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. While his company was suffering heavy casualties from a powerful enemy armored assault, Sergeant MACK occupied a position among front line elements of the defense sector. Rapid grazing machine gun fire from close range together with an undetermined number of enemy riflemen supported the attack of two tanks that directed their efforts specifically toward his zone. As these armored vehicles slowly approached, they sprayed his sector with machine gun and 47mm fire. With complete disregard to his own personal safety, Sergeant MACK with another man moved across 75 yards of open ground to a position where he could most effectively place bazooka fire on the tanks. From this location and in the path of the same enemy assault fire, he fired 15 bazooka rounds at the enemy's armored vehicles, stopping 2 tanks and thus enabling 37mm anti-tank guns to complete their destruction. Sergeant MACK's gallant actions and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all who witnessed them and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress 9 July 1918, (Jul 43, D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant LEWIS MIOVICH, 13030441, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 19 April 1945. A friendly force, of which Staff Sergeant MIOVICH was a member, was attacked by a superior number of enemy from their advantageously higher positions. Staff Sergeant MIOVICH on his own initiative, exposed himself to heavy enemy rifle and machine gun fire in order to divert the enemy's attention from his fellow soldiers. Rising to full stature, he fired his rifle into an enemy machine gun position. Seeing three wounded men lying helpless in their foxholes, Staff Sergeant MIOVICH fearlessly ran through enemy fire to the aid of the wounded men and dragged them one by one to positions of safety. After 75 yards, the zone of advance narrowed to a 15 foot wide saddle precipitous on both sides, the crossing of which necessarily silhouetted the attackers against the skyline. With disregard for his personal safety, he stepped out in front of his men and waved boldly and called loudly for his men to follow him. The attacking force reformed and continued the assault behind him. Technician Fifth Grade PETER MALASKI, JR., 13010631, Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Umingan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 1 February 1945. In order to allow tanks to successfully complete their mission in direct support of the infantry attacking Umingan, it was mandatory to clear the main road of hostile mines and demolitions. Technician Fifth Grade MALASKI, with complete disregard for his personal safety and in the face of enemy machine gun and rifle fire, checked the road with a mine detector. Though open terrain afforded excellent fields of fire for the Japanese forces, Technician Fifth Grade MALASKI of necessity unarmed due to the high sensitivity of the electric mine detector, meticulously cleared the road for a distance of five hundred yards. SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress 9 July 1918, (Bul 43, P, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant MURICE H. WIN, 19017144, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balote Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 25 April 1945. Staff Sergeant WIN was squad leader of an infantry company which had reached and was securing the highest peak of a steep ridge when it was discovered that an estimated 30 enemy, heavily armed and supported by two machine guns were concealed in a series of ingeniously contrived caves a few feet below the crest of the forward slope of the hill. By employing a device of his own invention for suspending grenades on the end of a string to prevent the enemy's throwing them back, Staff Sergeant WIN succeeded in clearing one cave by killing six of its occupants. While again exposing himself to the intense enemy fire in order to reduce a similar position, he was severely wounded. Through Staff Sergeant WIN's gallant actions, brilliant ingenuity and fearless adherence to duty, his comrades were inspired to push forward and clear the remaining caves, killing the entire enemy force. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Corporal (then Private First Class) FRANCIS J. ROY, 31069963, Field Artillery, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 30 March 1945. Corporal ROY, a wireman with a forward observer's party, after an infantry company he was accompanying pushed back by a sudden enemy counterattack leaving vitally needed telephone and wire communication behind, with utter disregard for his own personal safety and on his own initiative, crossed open terrain under heavy enemy machine gun fire coming from three positions, picked up the telephone and wire communication and carried it back to safety of friendly lines. Corporal ROY's gallant actions, above and beyond the call of duty were an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. Private First Class ROBERT W. RYAN, 20616966, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 30 March 1945. Private First Class RYAN was serving as ammunition carrier when an infantry company was attempting a flanking movement of a well camouflaged enemy position on a hill. The enemy suddenly opened fire causing many casualties to our force. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, Private First Class RYAN, on his own initiative and in full view of two enemy machine gun positions, dragged a wounded comrade a distance of 30 yards to a place of safety. He then returned twice more to help rescue more wounded men. Although an aid man who was accompanying him was wounded and forced to return, Private First Class RYAN alone continued with the rescue of the wounded until it was dark. Private First Class RYAN's gallant actions, coolness under fire and personal bravery were an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. When the advance was resumed, he personally moved forward with the leading elements and remained with them until the strongpoint was reduced. Captain YATES' gallant actions, coolness and calmness under enemy fire and superior leadership were an inspiration to his entire company and in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. WARD OF THE SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Captain PAUL C. MILTENBERGER, 0436236, Medical Corps, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 23 April 1945. When a platoon sergeant was wounded on the forward slope of a knoll which was under attack by friendly forces, Captain MILTENBERGER, who was administering treatment immediately behind the firing line, on his own initiative, with complete disregard for his own personal safety in the face of intense enemy rifle, machine gun and mortar fire, went to the wounded man and with the aid of an assistant, dragged him to a point of slightly better cover where he administered first aid and blood plasma. Then, under the continuing sporadic mortar fire, he and his assistant carried the wounded man 800 yards over extremely precipitous terrain to the battalion aid station from which the wounded man was evacuated. Captain MILTENBERGER's gallant action and devotion to duty in saving the life of a wounded man was an inspiration to all who witnessed him, reflecting great credit upon himself and the military service. Second Lieutenant WILLIAM A. O'CALLAGHAN, 02023759, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Pantabangan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 13 February 1945. When 20 enemy attacked a platoon of reconnaissance troops along a ridge with fixed bayonet, two of them closed in on Second Lieutenant O'CALLAGHAN, one making a bayonet thrust which missed him. With utter disregard for his own personal safety, he held his position and effectively diverted the remainder of the enemy with his intense rifle fire to allow his patrol to safely withdraw before he gave ground. The information gained on the patrol enabled the platoon leader to plan an intelligent attack which resulted in 20 more of the enemy being killed. At a time when enemy pressure was again threatening, the platoon leader was wounded by enemy mortar fragments. Second Lieutenant O'CALLAGHAN then organized a successful withdrawal in the face of heavy enemy mortar, rifle and machine gun fire and brought the platoon out without further casualties. Second Lieutenant O'CALLAGHAN's gallant actions, devotion to duty and coolness under fire was an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Technician Third Grade GORGONIO P. QUIMBA, 33319081, Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Tacloban, Leyte, and Pantabangan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, 25 October 1944 and 14 April 1945. On 25 October 1944 during repeated bombing and strafing attacks on the dock area at Tacloban, Leyte, Technician Third Grade QUIMBA exposed himself repeatedly above and beyond the call of duty in order to render first aid to many casualties caused by these almost ceaseless attacks. During one such attack, he continued to aid the wounded, giving treatment despite the fact that he was suffering from multiple wounds of the face and chest received from bomb fragments and refused evacuation until all casualties had been treated. On 14 April 1945, while he was supervising the construction details of a civilian hospital on Luzon, four enemy planes attacked dropping eight bombs in and around the town, causing many casualties. Despite the danger of further attacks, he immediately rendered first aid to the wounded, preventing further loss of life, directing the collection of the casualties, and aiding in organizing the evacuation. Technician Third Grade QUIMBA's gallant actions and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all who witnessed them, reflecting credit on himself and the military service. Staff Sergeant LUTHER RODEN, 14027651, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 31 March 1945. Staff Sergeant RODEN, a machine gun squad leader, when the enemy attacked the positions of a mortar section in the dark of night, calmly analyzed the situation, holding their fire until a favorable moment and directed it upon the enemy. While exposed to intense enemy fire and shell fragments from our own mortars, he adjusted fire to within 25 yards of his own position causing confusion within the enemy ranks. At this time he ordered his machine guns to fire which resulted in complete routing of the enemy. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Sergeant ROBERT C. GILMAN, 31303697, Armored, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 20 April 1945. Sergeant GILMAN, a tank commander, was ordered to the front line CP with his tank to give support to infantry units operating there. Due to rain the roads were so slippery that a bulldozer had to push the tank over one of departure. Sergeant GILMAN, finding the tank immobilized because of these conditions, dismounted under heavy sniper, machine gun and mortar fire to return to his CP for the aid of an armored bulldozer. Under constant enemy fire, he succeeded in connecting tow cables to the bulldozer and the immovable tank. Sergeant GILMAN's gallant actions saved a valuable tank and were in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. Private First Class JAMES HOGAN, JR., 38495439, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 3 April 1945. While an infantry company was improving defensive positions on a ridge, the enemy suddenly opened fire with 90mm mortars, mortally wounding one and seriously wounding two other soldiers. Private First Class Hogan, serving as ammunition carrier on his own initiative and while exposed to enemy fire, rendered first aid and bandaged the 3 wounded soldiers. Seeing other wounded riflemen lying nearby, he left his fox-hole and while under fire of the enemy, dressed the wounds of 9 more men. He then went 20 yards behind a ridge and brought up a machine gun to replace the gun that had been destroyed. With the help of some other men, he removed the wounded soldiers to safety. Private First Class HOGAN's gallant actions and devotion to duty saved the lives of several wounded men, inspiring all who witnessed him in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. Sergeant IESTER O. JOHNSON, 36821527, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Lumboy, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 11 February 1945. When an artillery officer was wounded while attempting to set up an observation post, Sergeant JOHNSON, seeing that the wounded officer still lay in the path of an enemy machine gun, unhesitatingly and with disregard to his own personal safety moved to the wounded officers

side, dressed his wound and carried him to a better covered position. Once there, he and another man further treated the officer and improvised a litter on which they carried him to a nearby road where two attempts to cross were met by fierce enemy machine gun and rifle fire. Disregarding the hail of enemy bullets, Sergeant JOHNSON placed the wounded officer on his back and struggled across the road to a point of safety where he ordered a litter from the nearest aid station and evacuated the wounded officer. Sergeant JOHNSON's gallant action in saving the life of a wounded officer was an inspiration to all who witnessed it, reflecting credit on himself and the military service. A frontal attack being the only alternative after a flanking movement had failed, the patrol began to advance cautiously when it was pinned down under the fire of two machine guns, wounding a platoon sergeant. Private First Class MARK, on his own initiative and with full knowledge of the danger involved, volunteered to go to the aid of the wounded man who lay under the cross-fire of the enemy machine guns. Skillfully maneuvering between rocks and jumping across open areas, exposed all the while to intense machine gun, rifle and grenade fire, he reached the casualty and returned to report that the man was dead, also reporting information as to disposition of enemy positions so as mortar fire could be brought on the enemy. Private First Class MARK's gallant actions, above and beyond his normal duties, were an inspiration to all who witnessed them and were in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Pub 3, 'D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant ROY C. CHARRETTE, 39231396, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Digdig, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 6 March 1945. Staff Sergeant CHARRETTE, leading two squads to clean up a strong enemy pocket of resistance, personally took the lead and advanced down into a draw where his force was pinned down by sniper fire from camouflaged positions supporting a large enemy cave. Because of the dangerous rifle fire, his demolition team hesitated to go forward to destroy the cave. Without benefit of covering fire, he crawled 25 yards exposed to continuous sniper fire to a position near the cave. Two enemy riflemen rushed him from the cave, but before they could fire he killed both of them. He then threw a pole charge into the cave killing two more of the enemy and destroying large amounts of food and ammunition. Staff Sergeant CHARRETTE's gallant actions, above and beyond the call of duty, reflected great credit on himself and the military service. Home Address: Mr. John R. Private First Class JOSE P. CORDOVA, 38352563, Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. Attacking a strong enemy position, the assault companies of Private First Class CORDOVA's battalion suffered many casualties. Throughout the entire day he ranged over the entire battalion front, treating the wounded. Several times he crossed 75 yards or more of flat open ground swept by heavy enemy machine gun and 47mm fire to reach wounded men in exposed positions applying tourniquets and splints. Despite the dangers involved, he continued treating the wounded until he himself was seriously wounded and left for dead on the battlefield. Regaining consciousness later, he applied a tourniquet to his own shattered arm, and crawled back to his unit's line. Private First Class CORDOVA's gallant actions, unselfish courage, his high devotion to duty at the risk of his own life and his calm efficiency under fire, saved the lives of several wounded soldiers, reflecting great credit on himself and the military service. Lieutenant Colonel (then Major) CYRUS J. During this period Lieutenant Colonel DREW made many reconnaissance trips to the front and reconnoitered routes of approach and the location of enemy positions. On 6 February he went to a company area where the fighting was the most intense

and the greatest difficulty in locating the enemy positions was being experienced. He accompanied the Company Commander on a reconnaissance in front of the lines to insure the success of the operations. He located an enemy tank in a bamboo thicket and personally directed the assault that destroyed it. Lieutenant Colonel DREW's gallant actions, devotion to duty was an inspiration to all and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Finding it impossible for him to effectively lead his force through the tropical grass and rain forest up a steep bank, Lieutenant RAY left his platoon in position under the leadership of a platoon sergeant and worked his way down a draw around the enemy block and succeeded in reaching the endangered platoon in time to reorganize the remaining men. SILVER STAR--Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class JOHN A. KOUHOUT, (3123436), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Dalete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 8 May 1945. Private First Class Kouhout, as acting squad leader during an attack, placed his machine gun in position and was beginning to deliver a covering fire under which friendly riflemen could advance, when a sniper wounded two men of his squad. He called immediately for aid men and a litter for one of the men who had been seriously wounded, but because of the intensity of the enemy fire, the aid men were unable to reach the gun position. Seeing that the wounded man needed immediate attention, he called to the aid men to throw him their aid packs and, ignoring the heavy fire, proceeded calmly to dress the wound himself. Having administered first aid, he noticed that one of the men was losing blood rapidly and had to be evacuated. Still under the intense enemy fire, he dragged the wounded man to a position where the aid men could reach him. Private First Class Kouhout's gallant actions and coolness under fire were responsible for saving the life of a wounded man, reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. Corporal GARLAND F. PHILLIPS, (35765103), Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Dalete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 13 May 1945. Corporal Phillips was assistant squad leader of a squad under fire from enemy 77mm artillery fire. After the first shell, the assigned driver of a truck loaded with demolitions abandoned his truck in the area. Corporal Phillips, realizing what a direct hit on the truck would do, with disregard for his own personal safety voluntarily and upon his own initiative drove the truck through an enemy artillery concentration. Further realizing that the least error in the dark while driving on the narrow, wet, slippery combat road would mean a crash taking him to his death. Corporal Phillips' gallant actions and quick thinking protected the lives of his comrades, was an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Private First Class JAMES J. TOWN, (31358550), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Puncan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 22 February 1945. Private First Class Town was a rifleman of a patrol sent out to establish a trail block and cut communication lines. After accomplishing this mission they began to dig in, but were interrupted by a sudden burst of enemy grazing machine gun fire, wounding two men and forcing the patrol to withdraw. Among the patrol's seriously wounded was its radio operator, whose radio, had been abandoned in the withdrawal. Private First Class Town, without benefit of cover, ran 20 yards through rapid machine gun, rifle and mortar fire, picked up the radio and returned to the patrol. Private First Class Town's gallantry and quick thinking made it possible to give information as to the disposition of the enemy to higher headquarters and to bring stretcher parties to evacuate the wounded. Technician Fourth Grade YOUNG M. L. Technician Fourth Grade Young, a cook, with another soldier, was in the bed of a truck serving the noon meal to members of a construction gang when an enemy group opened fire with hand grenades, rifles and machine guns. A hand grenade landed in the truck wounding him in the leg and mortally wounding the other soldier. Rather than withdraw to the security of a defiladed position which was only 20 feet away and abandon his wounded comrade, he remained and, in the face of strong enemy fire, coolly returned fire first with the wounded man's weapon then his own. During a lull in the enemy fire, he assisted in carrying the wounded man to safety. Technician Fourth Grade Young's gallant action and coolness under fire were an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR--Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, (Pub 43, D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class Boatright operated a bulldozer opening a main supply route on a road where soil characteristics prevented mine detection. Realizing that mines in the road had damaged two tanks, after the road had been subjected to normal methods of mine detection, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, he bravely and courageously continued to operate his bulldozer. The explosion of a mine rendered the bulldozer unserviceable and injured Private First Class Boatright. Private First Class Boatright's gallant actions and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Sergeant (then Corporal) Cherry, acting machine gun squad leader, on his own initiative and in the face of heavy enemy rifle, machine gun and mortar fire, went to the gun position. Finding that the gun was temporarily out of action, he alternately worked on the stoppage and fired his rifle at the advancing enemy. He succeeded in putting the machine gun back into action in time to repulse several of the enemy who had taken advantage of the pause, and were working up the trail toward the perimeter. Sergeant Cherry's gallant actions and devotion to duty, undoubtedly prevented a break-through of the perimeter, and was an inspiration to all, reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. When the tank's ammunition was expended, he again drove into the enemy fire in order to assist the tank back up the steep incline. Bullets from the enemy machine guns and rifles passed through the ventilator hatch and vision slit of the bulldozer, wounding him and also hitting a vital part of the dozer engine. When repairs were being made he received first aid treatment for his wound and immediately returned to his bulldozer and succeeded in pulling the tank to a place of cover. Sergeant Dalton's gallant actions, far above and beyond the call of duty, were an inspiration to all who witnessed them and were in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1913 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), and Letter, AG 200.6, Subject: "Awards of Filipino Personnel", Headquarters Sixth Army, dated 1 June 1945, a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

Major HUGOSING R. FAUSTO, First Guerrilla Regiment, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Cauco, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 13 April 1945. Major Fausto, led a patrol of 20 men to investigate results of the fight the night before. Enemy snipers posted themselves along a wooded creek and hills flanking the trail and while the patrol was passing through the area, ambushed them from all sides. After an aggressive advance in the face of heavy sniper fire, he and 2 members of his patrol found themselves far ahead of the rest of the men. Approaching a large log laid across the trail, he observed 2 snipers. Major Fausto, directing his men to cover him, boldly moved forward alone firing his carbine and killed the 2 snipers. Continuing, they observed 3 snipers fleeing across a ridge. As his men were firing, Major Fausto fearlessly dashed forward alone and killed the fleeing enemy. At this point 11 other men joined his group. An attempt was made to send six of the newly arrived men along the right flank of a small dense forest that lay ahead, but murderous enemy automatic rifle fire forced them back. Deploying his men, he moved to the front of his group and led the advance into the dense forest. He and his men suddenly became pinned down by enemy automatic weapons firing upon them at a distance of 25 yards. Major Fausto, while in giving orders to the rest of the patrol to maneuver to the left flank, again exposed himself to enemy fire. After an exchange of fire for about 30 minutes, the enemy was seen retreating into the adjacent thick woods. Immediately he ordered his men to assault, with himself at the head and succeeded in clearing the area of enemy snipers. Major Fausto's gallant actions were an inspiration to his men and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home Address: Rizal, Luzon, Philippine Islands.

PEACHEY, (20935929), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 20 January 1945. Private First Class Peachey, leader of a three man reconnaissance patrol on a mission to investigate unknown enemy activities across flat, open rice paddies, was forced to advance across a thousand yards of open flat terrain to a suitable spot where he could set up an observation post. While Private First Class Peachey mounted the site to observe, the other two men moved to the flanks to provide security. By means of skillful and determined observation, the patrol located three enemy machine gun nests, a Japanese observation post and the exact location of a platoon of riflemen. Skillfully utilizing every means of cover available, they returned to their battalion and reported their findings. Private First Class Peachey with his two companions immediately volunteered to accompany a patrol that was going out to the area they had previously reconnoitered. The information secured by Private First Class Peachey was of great value in the subsequent attack on San Manuel. Private First Class Peachey's devotion to duty was an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home Address: Mr. Joseph M. Corporal GLENN D. Sergeant Schneider's heroic sacrifice of his own personal comfort and welfare were an inspiration to all who knew him and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Private First Class JAMES J. The next morning Private Upshaw volunteered to return through enemy held territory to bring reinforcements and medical aid which were instrumental in the saving of the lives of the wounded. Private Upshaw's coolness under fire and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR--Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men.

Private First Class ADAM J. SUDZUK, (42004076), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. Private First Class Sudzuk was an Aid Man when his company suffered heavy casualties, including two of the company's three medical aid-men. Private First Class Sudzuk, the remaining aid man, labored unceasingly throughout the rest of the day. In order to reach wounded men and treat them as soon as possible, with utter disregard to his own personal safety he crossed the open ground between the platoons under heavy enemy fire rather than spend time going back to the rear and working his way up under cover. In one case when a litter team were wounded and the patient in the litter was wounded a second time in an exposed position less than 50 yards from the enemy's positions, he ran across 35 yards of open ground and administered first aid to all three of the men, even though two enemy tanks and their supporting machine guns were directing fire on the spot. After helping to pull the three men out of the line of fire, he continued to care for the wounded of the entire company until all casualties were evacuated from the field. Private First Class Sudzuk's gallant actions saved the lives of many wounded soldiers and were an inspiration to all who observed him, reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. Technician Third Grade (then Technician Fourth Grade) JACK N. TRIMMER, (35233760), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel and Puncan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 25 January and 24 February 1945. During an attack, an enemy 47mm projectile injured a rifleman who was lying helpless in a position fully exposed to the fierce enemy fire. Technician Third Grade Trimmer, with disregard for his own personal safety, exposed himself to the vicious fire and ran across 30 yards of open ground to help the wounded man. Continually exposed to fire, he carried him back to a covered position where he immediately administered first aid. A few minutes later another soldier became seriously shocked from the concussion of high explosive enemy shells. Temporarily out of his mind, the man started to run into the impact area. Again, Technician Third Grade Trimmer left cover to rescue the shocked

soldier. Braving intense enemy fire, he rushed out and brought the soldier back to safety where he could care for him. On 24 February an M-7 was attacked by an enemy suicide group of unknown strength which had infiltrated to the defensive perimeter. The enemy initiated a "banzai" attack attempting to get to the mounts and destroy them with demolitions. They supported their attack with furious close-in rifle fire and grenade barrages. During this attack, four soldiers were wounded, including Technician Third Grade Trimmer. Disregarding the pain of his own wounds, he made his way through the barrage of hand grenades and heavy small arms fire from foxhole to foxhole, giving aid to each wounded man in turn. Only after all of the wounded had been cared for did he allow his own wounds to be treated. Technician Third Grade Trimmer's gallant actions were in inspiration to all, reflecting credit upon himself and the Medical Department of the United States Army. SILVER STAR—Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul. 3, D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men.

Private First Class JOSEPH S. PEZZULO, (6982236), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupao, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. Private First Class Pezzulo, rifleman, was a member of a platoon which was forced to withdraw in the face of furious enemy tank, mortar and machine gun fire wounding several men. Private First Class Pezzulo, with disregard to his own personal safety, immediately volunteered to return across an open field to rescue the wounded men. It was necessary to cross approximately 75 yards of flat, open terrain, across which at least four enemy machine guns were firing. In addition, about six rounds of mortar fire fell in the area. Private First Class Pezzulo made numerous trips across this open terrain under furious enemy fire and assisted in the evacuation of eight wounded men when the other litter bearer was killed. Single handed, he then dragged the wounded man the remaining 50 yards to cover. Private First Class Pezzulo's gallant actions were instrumental in saving the lives of several wounded soldiers, reflecting credit on himself and the military service. Staff Sergeant WAYNE A. STARR, (37567853), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 25 March 1945. An enemy infiltration platoon, heavily armed, succeeded in penetrating the lines of an infantry battalion and established two trail blocks cutting off two platoons of an infantry company from supply and communication with the battalion. All during the night under covering fire from a light machine gun, the enemy dug strong positions along a jungle trail only 35 yards away from one of the friendly platoons. At daylight, approximately a squad of enemy riflemen moved forward with bayonets and hand grenades. Rapid, sporadic bursts from the two light machine guns and one heavy machine gun supported their advance. The enemy fire was so intense that friendly forces could not reach out to obtain rations only a few feet away. In the course of the action four men were wounded. Staff Sergeant Starr, with disregard to his own personal safety, stood straight up in his dug in position and opened up on the assaulting enemy with his rifle. While bursts from the three enemy machine guns sprayed the area, he alone laid down enough covering fire to permit his four comrades to withdraw to the rear of the perimeter for medical aid. His continued fire stopped the assaulting force, and he personally killed six out of a total of seven attacking enemy. Staff Sergeant Starr's gallant actions enabling four wounded men to get prompt medical attention reflected credit upon himself and the military service. Private First Class JAMES B. REDFEARN, JR., (34659307), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Diggig, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 10 March 1945. Private First Class Redfearn, First Machine Gunner, volunteered to accompany a patrol of another infantry company on reconnaissance. The patrol proceeded along a narrow obstructed trail that followed a precipitous ridge covered with dense jungle growth, and led to a tall grassy knoll, there taking up observation posts. After one hour of waiting, Private First Class Redfearn spotted an enemy soldier close by and, with a well aimed shot, killed him. Almost immediately the patrol heard the enemy moving into ambush positions on three sides only 15 to 25 yards away. An enemy knee mortar, two light machine guns firing grazing bursts, rifle and grenade fire hit the patrol. After 20 to 30 minutes of holding and returning the enemy fire with futile rifle shots into the jungle growth, the patrol was forced to withdraw leapfrogging back a few yards at a time. Unaided, Private First Class Redfearn fought a rear guard action with the enemy who pursuing the patrol, maintained their close contact and kept up their fire until the patrol reached a clearing leading to the infantry company position. The sergeant in charge of the patrol returned for orders, leaving Private First Class Redfearn in charge. Under constant fire, with disregard to his own personal safety, he successfully led the seven men stand against an enemy force numerically superior in weapons and men until finally the enemy withdrew. Although weakened from lack of food and water, he volunteered to provide security for a litter party which had to evacuate a wounded man who was near death from loss of blood. In order to evacuate the wounded man, the only feasible route lead through 600 yards of dense jungle down an extremely steep hill. The trail was not wide enough to allow passage for the litter; therefore, with a machete, he helped hack out a new trail. After three hours of grueling work, he led the litter party to the highway where the casualty was successfully evacuated. Private First Class Redfearn's gallant actions and devotion to duty were instrumental in saving the life of the wounded man, reflecting credit upon himself and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR—Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Major BENJAMIN P. FOLK, JR., (0419788), Medical Corps, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lumboc, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 14 February 1945. Major (then Captain) Folk, was notified that an artillery party sent the previous afternoon to join an infantry unit had taken the wrong trail and been ambushed by an enemy strongpoint. The six man party sustained heavy casualties, one of whom was shot in the chest. This man had suffered much through the night and although very weak, was still alive when the two survivors who had reported the trap had left him. Major Folk, knowing that the enemy were heavily dug in and that aid men were supposed to go in after the casualty, felt that by his own attention he might be able to save the life of the seriously wounded soldier. With utter disregard to his own personal safety, he volunteered to lead the rescue party which consisted of several litter bearers and two riflemen for protection, and proceeded to the scene of the ambush. During the ensuing perilous journey, the rescue party was under intense rifle and grenade fire having to fight their way to the wounded man. He worked on the wounded man for many hours under enemy fire, administering medical attention. It was necessary for him and his party to fight their way back to the battalion command post. Major Folk arrived at the command post with his entire party after being gone eight hours, bringing in the seriously wounded man. Captain Folk's gallant action, above and beyond the call of duty, saved the life of a seriously wounded soldier reflecting credit on himself and the military service. Home Address: Mr. Benjamin F. Staff Sergeant JOHN J. MARANCIK, (12014248), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. Staff Sergeant (then Sergeant) Marancik, squad leader, when the enemy started a coordinated attack with 20 tanks and from 80 to 100 supporting riflemen, left his covered position and in the face of rapid rifle and grazing machine gun fire from pill boxes and assaulting tanks, he moved on his own initiative across 75 yards of open exposed ground to an advance position where he engaged three threatening tanks. He knocked one out and hit two others with a rocket launcher, slowing them down enough to be destroyed by adjacent anti-mechanized weapons. Staff Sergeant Marancik's gallant actions and devotion to duty above the responsibilities prescribed for a rifle squad leader were instrumental in crushing the enemy armored assault, inspiring all who witnessed his acts and were in

First Lieutenant EDWARD F. NEWBERGER, (01017099), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, during the period 9 to 12 April and 3 to 11 May 1945. When ground patrols were unable to determine the exact location of enemy positions, First Lieutenant Newberger on two different occasions made reconnaissance plane flights to secure information necessary for the employment of tanks in the Balete Pass Area. On many occasions he was compelled to direct the building of roads up steep inclines to get his tanks into firing positions. In most cases, this was accomplished by using an armored bulldozer. The bulldozer was also used to push the tanks into position when the grades were too steep to ascend under their own power. He found it necessary to clear his field of fire against enemy strong points by blasting large trees with high explosive and armor piercing ammunition. To complete his mission, he frequently exposed himself to enemy fire without regard for his own personal safety. Lieutenant Newberger's gallant actions were an inspiration to all who witnessed them and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home Address: Mrs. Jean H. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Staff Sergeant JAMES R. GODDARD, (39024121), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Putland, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 10 March 1945. Staff Sergeant Goddard, Squad Leader, a member of a platoon with the mission of securing a steep hill, moved out and up the face of the steep hill. There was no opposition until the platoon reached a point 75 yards from the crest where an estimated squad of enemy rifleman dug in and reinforced with a knee mortar squad opened fire as the first elements of the squad showed above the crest. The platoon hastily built up a fire line on the forward slope of the hill. The rapid and intense rate of fire from the enemy positions prevented the platoon from advancing further. Knee mortar fire began to adjust in on the position of the friendly force. At this time a 47mm field piece, 600 yards to the rear which had perfect observation of the whole hill slope from its bottom to the crest, opened with direct fire on the platoon. One man was seriously wounded. The platoon leader ordered his men to pull left across the face of the hill to the nearest cover and concealment. As the withdrawal began, Staff Sergeant Goddard noticed that the seriously wounded man had been left dangerously exposed where he had fallen. While the platoon proceeded in its withdrawal he remained and took cover in a slight gully, holding his ground and calling for help to evacuate the casualty. With utter disregard to his own personal safety, Staff Sergeant Goddard, with the help of another soldier who made his way back, carried the wounded man through intense small arm, knee mortar and direct artillery fire over 100 yards to safety. Staff Sergeant Goddard's gallant actions saved the life of a wounded soldier, reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. Corporal (then Private First Class) DeVito, Assistant Squad Leader, was a member of the platoon on the right of the company front. After leaving the line of departure, they were pinned down by continuous enemy machine gun fire. The First Squad, of which he was a member, was ordered to flank the area to the front and destroy the enemy machine guns. During this action the first squad and the attached light machine gun section received intense enemy machine gun fire causing many casualties. With utter disregard to his own personal safety, Corporal DeVito moved forward approximately 50 yards across open terrain in the face of heavy concentrated machine gun and 47mm gun fire to assist in the removing of a seriously wounded soldier. After removing the wounded man to a position where his wounds could be treated, he directed litter bearers in the rescue of the other wounded men, covering them with rifle fire. During this action, Corporal DeVito knocked out one tank at point-blank range with a rifle grenade. Although three tanks soon began to concentrate fire on him, he held his position and returned fire until the last wounded man had been removed to a place of safety. Corporal DeVito's gallant actions, above and beyond the call of duty, were instrumental in saving the lives of several wounded soldiers, reflecting credit on himself and the military service. At this time, three M-4 tanks were brought up to about 35 yards in front of the company front lines in an effort to locate and knock out the enemy tanks. They at once took up the fire fight and succeeded in destroying one 47mm gun and disabling one enemy tank. Continuing enemy fire hit two of our tanks, causing one to catch fire and disabling the other. The remaining effective tank could not maneuver and fire, to cover the withdrawal of the disabled tank. Upon receiving word that the tanks could not maintain their position and were going to pull out, Technical Sergeant Latta volunteered to leave his covered position and attempt to lay down a smoke screen cover for them. Collecting all the smoke grenades he could carry, with utter disregard to his own personal safety, he dashed forward across fifty yards of open terrain to a position in front of the tanks, which were still receiving enemy fire. He then threw enough grenades to create an effective smoke screen and enable the tanks to withdraw without further damage. Technical Sergeant Latta's gallant actions, above and beyond the call of duty, saved two tanks and their crews from destruction and were in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. Technician Fourth Grade CECIL L. Technician Fourth Grade Brashier, tank driver, in traveling over a narrow road with very steep grades and many sharp curves made a left turn on a curve that was less than a right angle on a downgrade slope. A cliff on the right side of the road dropped away precipitously to a valley 300 feet below. Finding his tank unable to negotiate the curve, he stopped the tank and attempted to shift into reverse, but the tank continued creeping forward and required both hands to hold back the two laterals. With the prospect of the tank plunging over the cliff, the remainder of the crew, powerless to assist Technician Fourth Grade Brashier, dismounted. Disregarding personal safety, Technician Fourth Grade Brashier voluntarily remained at the controls until another tank could be brought up and hooked to the rear of his tank to withdraw it to safety. During the fifteen minutes required to complete the operation, Technician Fourth Grade Brashier's tank continued inching forward until approximately five feet of its length was suspended over the edge of the cliff. Technician Fourth Grade Brashier's heroic deeds saved the tank and were an inspiration to all who witnessed them and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. At this point the remainder of the crew dismounted while Technician Fifth Grade Bridges voluntarily and with disregard for his personal safety, elected to remain in the driver's seat and keep the brakes locked to prevent the tank from falling about 75 feet and being put out of action. Technician Fifth Grade Bridges remained in the tank forty-five minutes, under severe strain holding the brakes until another tank could be utilized to recover the vehicle. Shortly afterwards, an eight man patrol was ordered out to reconnoiter a route to the hills. Private First Class Cook immediately volunteered to accompany this patrol. Nineteen hundred yards away from their battalion, the patrol received grazing fire from two enemy machine guns supported by riflemen in shacks two hundred and fifty yards away. He then remained in position to support the withdrawal of another friendly patrol which was attempting to rescue a wounded man. Private First Class Cook with two other men were able to place enough flanking fire on the enemy to allow the casualty to be evacuated. With disregard to his personal safety, he assisted in carrying the seriously injured man for eighteen hundred yards through sniper fire to safety. Private First Class Cook's heroic actions were an inspiration to all who witnessed them reflecting credit on himself and the military service. While the fire was raging, Technician Fourth Grade Sessler drove a TD-14 bulldozer into the revetment, pushing dirt over the shells and powder to extinguish the fire. This eliminated the possibility of further danger to personnel and damage to the equipment of his battery. During the time of this action, two WP 155mm shells and a number of powder charges exploded. Technician Fourth Grade Sessler's exemplary behavior in the face of imminent danger at the risk of his life is in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR--Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted man:

Staff Sergeant PARLEY HUDDLESTON, N, (34190103), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 14 April 1945. Staff Sergeant Huddleston, assistant patrol leader, was proceeding with his patrol along a supply route when they were fired upon by an enemy force of riflemen supported by a machine gun. In the initial exchange of fire, two men of the patrol were wounded from the enemy machine gun which continued to fire on the patrol. Staff Sergeant Huddleston, seeing that the enemy gun was capable of pinning down the entire patrol, in the face of enemy machine gun and rifle fire, laid aside his M-1 rifle, picked up a BAR, and rising to his full stature, raked the area from which the enemy fire was coming, all the while directing the removal of the wounded men. His gallantry so inspired the other members of the patrol that they moved forward, clearing out the enemy resistance. Staff Sergeant Huddleston's courageous actions reflected credit upon himself and the military service. Home Address: Mr. Sam Huddleston, (Father), Fortus, Tennessee.

Private First Class DONALD L. McDONALD, (37627226), Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 21 April 1945. Private First Class McDonald was aid man with an infantry company which was pinned down by enemy fire thirty-five yards from its objective. Four men who had been wounded were lying in the line of fire from the two mutually supporting machine guns. With utter disregard for his own personal safety, Private First Class McDonald crawled under fierce enemy fire to administer first aid to the wounded men, dragging three of them to points of safety. Following this display of fearlessness, thinking he may have erred in assuming the fourth man to be dead, he returned and removed the other man. Private First Class McDonald's gallant actions were an inspiration to all who witnessed them and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. First Lieutenant ELLIOT J. NICOLSON, (01316777), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 2 April 1945. First Lieutenant Nicolson, Platoon Leader, led a two platoon assault force spearheading the day's attack on a strongly held enemy hill. The assaulting force reduced its defenses with slight loss to themselves. Consolidating their gains, the force prepared to dig in on a narrow ridge flanked by precipitous sides and unavoidably exposed to Japanese artillery fire.

Before positions were completed, an enemy barrage began to land in the area. Completely exposing himself to the artillery fire, with utter disregard to his own personal safety, First Lieutenant Nicolson with only one noncommissioned officer to assist him went from position to position organizing the men into small groups to withdraw. In the new positions, accurate enemy mortar fire destroyed the last heavy machine gun and wounded three of its crew. In the face of the enemy barrage he again organized a withdrawal to previously prepared positions, when he was hit in the back by a small piece of shrapnel. Refusing medical aid, he supervised the withdrawal and assisted in carrying out the wounded. First Lieutenant Nicolson's gallant actions, coolness under fire and his extreme devotion to duty, were an inspiration to his men and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Sergeant HAROLD L. STAFFORD, (19203561), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 24 March 1945. Sergeant (then Private First Class) Stafford was lead scout of a combat patrol, and as it reached its objective, he proceeded to investigate the enemy positions. As he began to advance, the enemy suddenly laid down a withering fire from machine guns and rifle. Simultaneously word came from the rear that an enemy group was working toward the patrol from behind. Although retreat appeared to be the only alternative, with disregard to his own personal safety, Sergeant Stafford refused to leave without making possible the safe withdrawal of two men who had been pinned to the ground by the intense rifle and machine gun fire of the enemy. He succeeded in reloading his M-1 rifle with his left hand, at the same time throwing eight grenades, silencing the enemy machine gun, allowing the withdrawal of the two men. Sergeant Stafford's gallant actions were solely responsible for the safe withdrawal of the entire patrol, reflecting credit on himself and in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR--Posthumous Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, (Bul 43, WD 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant CHESTER F. GRAFF, (37567676), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Manuel, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 28 January 1945. After three days of fighting against the determined enemy garrison at San Manuel, Company E, 300 Infantry, located in a vulnerable salient near the center of town, found itself faced with an all out enemy armored counterattack employing about 20 tanks and 100 supporting riflemen. Although his platoon was forced to withdraw to a more tenable position, Staff Sergeant Graff elected to stand fast and fight beside an anti-tank rifle grenadier whose position was later surrounded. Through Staff Sergeant Graff's utter disregard for personal safety by protecting him with rifle fire and hand grenades, the grenadier was able to destroy two enemy tanks and kill three accompanying riflemen. The voluntary and courageous action of Staff Sergeant Graff in the face of machine gun and 47mm gun fire from assaulting tanks, contributed materially in slowing down the enemy counterattack sufficiently to give rear elements time to regroup and successfully crush the entire assault. Staff Sergeant ARTHUR W. HENWOOD, (37152624), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at San Isidro, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 6 February 1945. While operating as a rifle platoon sergeant with a group charged with the mission of evacuating wounded over exposed terrain, Staff Sergeant Henwood's patrol moved about two hundred yard when the point of the patrol reached a four strand barb wire fence. Two of the patrol passed the wire fence without mishap. As the officer in charge of the patrol worked his way through, a concealed enemy machine gun fired rapid grazing bursts along a clear field of fire paralleling the fence, wounding the officer. Seeing the critical situation and with disregard to his own personal safety, Staff Sergeant Henwood voluntarily moved to the aid of the helpless officer. While extricating him from the wire fence, the officer was again wounded by machine gun fire. With determined courage Staff Sergeant Henwood finally tore the casualty loose and dragged him twenty-five yards to safety and immediate medical treatment. Staff Sergeant Henwood's gallant and selfless act was responsible for saving a wounded man from almost certain death reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. Home Address: Dorothy M. First Lieutenant MILTON C. WOLFE, (01317966), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Mount Myoko, Luzon, Philippine

Islands, from 28 April to 1 May 1945. First Lieutenant Wolfe, Mortar Platoon Leader, was active in manning forward Regimental Observation Posts and directing the fire of artillery as well as that of Infantry weapons in an exceptional manner. During this period he occupied a forward observation post in the vicinity of Mount Myoko. Since his was the only position from which mortar fire on enemy positions could be effectively controlled, Lieutenant Wolfe, with utter disregard to his own personal safety, elected to stay at this position, despite enemy machine gun, direct 47mm and intermittent mortar fire. His superior direction of fire upon the enemy positions aided materially in the success of our troops. LYTHE, (33555871), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Pulete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 31 March 1945. A truck convoy was ambushed by a squad of Japanese soldiers along a bulldozer road cut through the jungle and forced to return four hundred yards to their starting point. Upon learning that the motor officer and motor sergeant were missing and that two three-quarter ton trucks had been abandoned, Private First Class Lytle, a driver, accompanied by another soldier, volunteered to return on foot and attempt to find the missing men and rescue the trucks. Though discovered by the Japanese, one of whom he wounded, Private First Class Lytle continued on his mission. Finding no trace of the two missing men, Private First Class Lytle returned to the trucks. With great difficulty and in spite of both front tires being blown out on one of the trucks, he succeeded in getting them turned around on the steep, narrow road and driven to a point of safety where they could be fixed. Private First Class Lytle's devotion to duty in the face of grave danger was an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR—Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Technician Fifth Grade FRANK P. LATINO, (20225636), Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Baleho, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 16 February 1945. Technician Fifth Grade Latino, a bulldozer operator acting as a relief operator on a caterpillar D-7 angle-doser was employed in construction of a supply road to forward infantry units. After the bulldozer had cut for an hour and fifteen minutes, during which time it had worked well down the forward nose of the hill, artillery shells began to fall in the immediate area. Fifty rounds were fired including four near misses with one hitting under the left track puncturing the fuel tank in three places and severely damaging the bulldozer. Technician Fifth Grade Latino at the first firing had taken cover in the nearest defiladed spot. With field glasses he spotted the damage to the fuel tank and final drive housing. With disregard of his own personal safety, he crawled to the bulldozer, turned it around, and drove it over the hill to a defiladed spot, thus saving a valuable piece of heavy road building equipment. Technician Fifth Grade Latino's actions and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest standards of the military service. Home Address: Mrs. Lena Latino, (Mother), Caribaldi Street, Bernardsville, New Jersey.

Lieutenant Colonel ROBERT L. STEVENSON, (0343589), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 30 April 1945. Lieutenant Colonel Stevenson, Battalion Commander, leading elements of his command through the lines of an infantry company, advanced approximately seventy-five yards, when they were pinned down by an enemy heavy machine gun located on the objective. From his position in a forward observation post located about one hundred yards from the objective, Colonel Stevenson located the enemy machine gun and immediately placed fire upon it although armed only with a carbine. Due to the excellent position of the enemy, small arms fire had little effect upon them. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, while in full view and under direct fire of the enemy machine gun, he left his cover, called for and directed the fire of a bazooka team upon the enemy position. When the fire of the bazooka failed to silence the enemy gun, although still under fire and pinned to the ground, Colonel Stevenson then moved to a point where he could direct fire, although himself exposed to both enemy fire and shell fragments from the fire of the M-7, succeeded in directing the accurate fire which destroyed the enemy gun and forced the remaining

enemy to retreat. Lieutenant Colonel Stevenson's gallant actions, far above and beyond the call of duty, coolness and superior leadership at a time of great danger, were an inspiration to his entire command and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Private First Class THEODORE WILCZEWSKI, (11019156), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 18 April 1945. Private First Class Wilczeski, an automatic rifleman, was in a position on a slope approaching a high knoll where an infantry company had hastily dug in the previous afternoon. A Japanese force launched a furious attack from a knoll in front of the infantry company. An enemy heavy machine gun was set up on the right flank and was delivering a withering enfilade fire pinning everyone to the ground. Private First Class Wilczeski, along with another man, knowing that the enemy machine gun would have to be eliminated if the enemy attack was to be repulsed, on his own initiative and in the face of enemy machine gun, rifles and mortars, deliberately exposed himself to the intense enemy fire in order to locate the enemy machine gun position. After locating the enemy machine gun, Private First Class Wilczeski, with complete disregard for his own personal safety while exposed to intense enemy fire, moved to a position where he could deliver fire on the enemy machine gun causing many casualties on the enemy. Private First Class Wilczeski's gallant actions above and beyond the call of duty and coolness under enemy fire were an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and were in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service. SILVER STAR--Awards

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Major WILLIAM R. COLE, (0387282), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 7 May 1945. An infantry company was attacking a series of wooded knolls on an important ridge line. The top of the hill was the only place where observation was possible and this was under intense enemy rifle fire. Major Cole, Battalion Executive Officer, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, while in full view and under direct fire of enemy snipers located in dense woods on a reverse slope, exposed himself intermittently over a period of two hours in order to register and adjust supporting artillery and mortar fire. Major Cole's gallant actions, accurate fire direction and personal bravery were an inspiration to the officers and men of his unit and were in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service. Home Address: Mrs. Maxine Cole, (wife), 19 East Dickson Street, Fayetteville, Arkansas.

Private First Class MORRIE L. GALVEZ, (39590817), Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Putian, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 4 May 1945. Private First Class Galvez, a bulldozer operator, was proceeding to a forward construction job when he was stopped and told that the enemy had two automatic weapons firing across the road over which the bulldozer had to pass. Private First Class Galvez knew the equipment was needed desperately forward to complete a vital evacuation and supply route to the fighting men above. Although unprotected by armor plating, and realizing that the bulldozer speed could not exceed five miles per hour making an excellent target, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, he voluntarily drove the bulldozer through withering fire laid down by the enemy's automatic weapons. Private First Class Galvez's quick thinking, coolness under fire and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all who witnessed his deed, reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. Sergeant STANLEY A. GREENFIELD, (33393020), Armored, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 12 April 1945. Sergeant Greenfield was the tank commander of the second of two tanks which were supporting an infantry attack. Both vehicles had to be pushed by a bulldozer to the line of departure because of the steep grade. Both vehicles travelled in column until a forty yard advance revealed a slight left turn in the ridge. The ridge was an approach to a small knoll which was strongly defended by enemy infantry supported by direct artillery and mortar fire. The second tank was assigned the mission of supporting and protecting the left flank with fire from the tank weapons. After the lead tank had advanced fifty yards along the ridge, the infantry dug in because of intense enemy fire. After firing the entire supply of ammunition in each tank and being ready to withdraw, the tank directly

behind stalled and its engine could not be started. A withdrawal could not be affected unless the other tank turned around to push the stalled tank to the rear. At this time, with utter disregard to his own personal safety, Sergeant Greenfield dismounted under the fire of two enemy machine guns, ran about twenty-five yards and took charge of maneuvering the tank to a covered position. Sergeant Greenfield's gallantry and intrepidity were an inspiration to all who witnessed his deed and were in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service. Technician Fourth Grade KAY INGRAM, JR., (38025019), Corps of Engineers, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Minuli, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 4 April 1945. Technician Fourth Grade Ingram, a diesel mechanic, realizing the vital need of a deadlined bulldozer, volunteered to revert back to his former duty as operator to drive the open bulldozer to the repair shop through a road block from where he had been fired upon as he drove past enroute to the disabled equipment. Fully cognizant of the risk to his life, he drove the slowly moving bulldozer back through the block, seeking what cover he could by hanging on the reverse side of the motor, courageously and daringly exposing himself at intervals to operate the steering clutches. Technician Fourth Grade Ingram's gallant action made the bulldozer available for vital work in maintaining and building main supply routes, and his voluntary action above the call of duty reflected credit on himself and the military service. Captain EDWARD S. KAULAKIS, (0452114), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 29 April 1945. Captain Kaulakis, a commander of an infantry company, moved to attack an enemy strongpoint on a knoll of a principal ridge line. Under supporting fire of machine guns, his company advanced part way up the slope of the hill when the supporting fires were lifted. The enemy, from holes cut in tunnels through the reverse slope, opened fire with rifles and machine guns. Captain Kaulakis observed another machine gun being put into action on the top of the hill by six enemy soldiers. With utter disregard for his own personal safety, he led a charge up the hill which surprised the enemy in the act of opening fire and secured the top of the hill. Captain Kaulakis' gallant actions and quick thinking were an inspiration to his men and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. SILVER STAR (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER)—Award

By direction of the President, in addition to the Silver Star awarded to First Lieutenant John W. Martin, (02042866), as published in General Orders No. 56, Headquarters USAFISPA, 9 March 1943, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to him by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918).

First Lieutenant JOHN W. MARTIN, (02042866), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Pinangatalan, Luzon, Philippines Islands on 8 February 1945. First Lieutenant Martin, Platoon Leader, was sent out to investigate the nearby terrain where a small enemy patrol had been spotted. Almost immediately contact was made by the patrol with a large group of Japanese who were advancing toward the bivouac area, and a messenger was sent back for reinforcements. Lieutenant Martin called for an assault mortar and a light machine gun to be brought up, and with six other men moved to intercept the enemy. In the face of heavy fire from the advancing enemy, he deployed his men in the best positions possible. With disregard for his own personal safety, Lieutenant Martin ran forward to an exposed piece of ground, personally killed five of the enemy and prevented the main force of nearly sixty from flanking his unit. Maintaining his position despite the continued enemy fire, he then directed a machine gun and mortar into position to force the enemy back. Lieutenant Martin's extraordinary courage, disregard for his own safety and personal example in holding an exposed, untenable position until reinforcements arrived, inspired the other members of the outnumbered group to stop a determined enemy force from attacking the troop and its vehicles which were still moving into bivouac nearby. Staff Sergeant Bonstelle, a machine gun section leader, manned a machine gun on the far flank of an infantry company. An enemy tank ran the gauntlet of the company front along the street in spite of the bazooka fire, with the machine gun on the turret of the tank raking men in half-prepared

positions causing many casualties; Staff Sergeant Bonstelle, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, laid down rapid fire directly at the turret machine gun. The enemy tank drove on attempting to overrun his position. He was severely wounded in the face and on the body from flying fragments of 47mm shells, but nevertheless continued to man his post, firing at the tank turret which was inflicting such devastating damage. Bazooka fire stopped the tank within five to ten feet of his position, but still the tank turret gun continued to fire. Although badly wounded, Staff Sergeant Bonstelle did not leave his gun until he had completely neutralized the enemy machine gun. Staff Sergeant Bonstelle's gallantry and courage saved many more men from being wounded and his coolness and intrepidity under such adverse conditions were an inspiration to all who witnessed him and were in keeping with the highest standards of military tradition. Private First Class VANCE R. BROWN, (38101141), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces southeast of Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 18 April 1945. Private First Class Brown, an assistant automatic rifleman, was in a position on a slope approaching a high knoll where the infantry company had hastily dug in the previous afternoon. A Japanese force launched a furious attack from a knoll in front of an infantry company. The enemy machine gun was set up on the right flank and was delivering a withering enfilade fire and pinning everyone to the ground. Private First Class Brown, and another man, knowing that the enemy machine gun would have to be eliminated if the enemy attack was to be repulsed, on his own initiative and in the face of the enemy machine gun, rifle and mortar fire, deliberately exposed himself to enemy fire in order to locate the enemy machine gun position. After locating the enemy gun, Private First Class Brown, knowing there was only one full magazine of ammunition, secured a belt of machine gun ammunition and moved to a position where effective fire from the automatic rifle could be laid on the machine gun. While the other man was firing at the enemy machine gun, Private First Class Brown was at his side removing ammunition from the machine gun belt and filling the empty magazines, all the while exposed to intense enemy fire. Private First Class Brown's gallant actions, coolness under fire and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions and were in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service. AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL.--By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec II, Pub 3, D, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant ROBERT SMITH, 3807213, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 22 March 1945. On that date Company "B" was making a flank move toward Balete Pass from the east. Staff Sergeant SMITH was with the leading squad and a scout dog was working with his platoon. The dog had worked with the company in the past and all of the men had confidence in his ability to detect the enemy, however, on this day with the wind blowing toward the enemy and dampness of the jungle, the dog was unable to detect the enemy until the leading platoon passed the first enemy position. After the platoon began to climb the steep path, and the dog detected the enemy's presence, Staff Sergeant SMITH went forward with some other soldiers to investigate. At about this time the Japanese in the rear opened fire on the platoon, inflicting several casualties. Seeing this, Staff Sergeant SMITH, not wanting to leave the wounded behind, crawled with the other uninjured men into a position where he could fire on the rear position. In order to fire on the enemy, Staff Sergeant SMITH had to expose himself to enemy fire but did not hesitate. Because of his heroic actions five wounded men were able to reach the remainder of the company. Staff Sergeant SMITH's actions in the face of grave danger were an inspiration to all and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home address: Mrs. Lela N. Technical Sergeant ELMER E. SNOWDEN, 37472675, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 29 March 1945. On the afternoon of 28 March, Company "B" attacked a hill 300 yards south of Lone Tree Hill. It became dark before the objective could be taken so the company was forced to take up a defensive position in an unfavorable location. During the early part of the night, the enemy made four attacks on the position using rifles, knee mortars, and hand grenades with incendiary attached to them. By midnight, all our hand grenades and 60mm mortar ammunition had been expended and it would be impossible to stop another attack with rifle fire. Realizing this, Technical Sergeant SNOWDEN moved around the position and collected 32 rifle grenades from the other members of his company. At 0100 when the next attack began, he fired these grenades, although he knew that if one of them accidentally hit a limb, he would be instantly killed by his own weapon. Through his initiative and courage, Technical Sergeant SNOWDEN, without regard for his own personal safety, kept the enemy from overrunning his company's position and thus saved the lives of many of his comrades. Technical Sergeant GECSEI, who was with the mortar section, ignored the fire and crawled forward to the third platoon leader. Here he learned the situation and prepared to lay 60mm mortar fire to help the platoons withdraw. He could not see the enemy positions from where he was located so, taking a radio, he started moving forward to a better position. Under his direction, the mortars knocked out two machine guns and kept the enemy pinned down so that the platoon was able to rescue the wounded and withdraw to a better position. Technical Sergeant GECSEI's heroic actions in the face of grave danger were an inspiration to all and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Captain CHARLES E. HUNT, 0400300, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces on Luzon, Philippine Islands, from 11 January to 30 June 1945. Staff Sergeant HARRY KANZE, 11020710, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces near Balete Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 31 March 1945. On this day Company "B" was attacking a grassy hill about three hundred yards south of Lone Tree Hill. The hill was defended by about twenty-five Japanese supported by three heavy machine guns. Twice the company attacked the hill but was unsuccessful because of the excellent observation and fields of fire. The third time however, the company was able to work around the flank, setting to the bottom of the hill without being observed by the enemy. By calling for mortar fire, the Japanese had been forced to remain in their positions on the reverse side of the hill. Arriving at the bottom of the hill, Staff Sergeant KANZE's squad, which was leading, began to move up the open ground as soon as the mortar fire had been lifted.

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GO 506, Hq 25th Inf Div, 18 December 1945, continued.

A few Japanese began to appear and seeing our troops approaching, began to fire. The squad, not having any protection or cover started back down the hill. Staff Sergeant KANZE, seeing this, shouted to his men and began to run up the hill firing. The squad immediately followed his example and also began firing. By Staff Sergeant KANZE's quick thinking, courage and leadership, the objective was taken without a casualty. Staff Sergeant KANZE's heroic actions in the face of grave danger were an inspiration to all and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Home Address: Mrs. Mary L. Captain GEORGE R. COOK, 0463913, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the Japanese forces on Luzon, Philippine Islands, from 12 April to 20 April 1945. Captain COOK, then a Company Commander, personally conducted one of the most difficult offensive operations ever undertaken by a rifle company of this regiment. His company position, on the reverse slope of narrow, bare Crump Hill, faced at a distance of 25 yards a well defended enemy strongpoint on the opposite slope. Ordered to eliminate the Japanese position, Captain COOK made daily personal reconnaissances to his front and flanks for over a week, each time necessarily exposing himself to close, direct small arms fire, grenades, and observed artillery fire. He led two patrols which discovered and knocked out key points of the defenders line. By his fearless leadership in the face of continued danger, Captain COOK maintained the spirit and will of his depleted company, which was subsisting without adequate rations or water and faced with nightly infiltration attacks. His gallantry over this period was a major contribution to a successful assault on the strongpoint, thereby eliminating a vital enemy key to the Balete Pass citadel. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR MEDAL (Posthumous).--By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 25th Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant EMIL E. BEIERLE, 20130160, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Kapintalan, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 1 May 1945. In the attack on a narrow razorback ridge dotted with a series of small knolls in the vicinity of Kapintalan, the forward elements were pinned down by heavy machine gun fire as they neared the top of one of the knolls. The platoon of which Staff Sergeant BEIERLE was Platoon Guide and which was the leading platoon, was ordered to take and secure the two knolls that held the enemy gun positions. It being impossible to make a frontal assault because of the enemy's strategically located guns, Staff Sergeant BEIERLE without hesitation volunteered to attempt to work around the left side alone. Taking his rifle and as many hand grenades as he could carry, he slowly worked his way around the hill, despite the knowledge that if discovered, his life would be in extreme danger. Working his way up to within fifteen yards of the left machine gun position, he threw three hand grenades and completely destroyed the position. Then crawling up near the knocked out position to a point where he could fire on the second machine gun position on a small knoll opposite, he silenced the gun by rifle fire. While attempting to silence the third machine gun position he was killed. Staff Sergeant BEIERLE's gallantry in action was an inspiration to all and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.. Private First Class DONALD E. WARREN, 37528050, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the Japanese forces at Lupac, Philippines, on 7 February 1945. On this night the strongest and best bulldozed road east of Lupac held by a reinforced platoon, was the scene of an attempted break through by eight enemy tanks and approximately thirty-five riflemen. After a fierce fight during which three of the tanks were knocked out, the platoon leader, seeing that all his anti-tank ammunition was gone and at least one man seriously wounded, ordered a withdrawal. Private First Class WARREN, a Machine Gunner, and another soldier volunteered to remain behind and cover the withdrawal of the rest. Private First Class WARREN still had four boxes of ammunition when the platoon withdrew. This he expended over a period of five minutes and enabled the platoon to successfully withdraw. However, his companion was seriously wounded during the short action. Private First Class WARREN then rendered the machine gun useless to the enemy by removing the cover from it. He then tried to assist the other soldier, but his companion's wounds were so serious that he soon died. Staff Sergeant Baker, seeing this, took command and gave the order to advance. By his quick thinking and excellent leadership, the platoon moved forward to a better position, reorganized and was successful in its attack.
